Two Fisher County 4-H Members Get \$8,000 Houston Show Scholarships

Jennifer Leigh Wright and Richard Lynn Spencer, both outstanding Fisher County 4-H members, received a four-year \$8,000 college scholarship from the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.

Jennifer, daughter of June and Jimmy Wright, Roby, has been an active 4-H member for nine years. A Gold Star and county leadership award winner, she also was selected to attend the National Shortcourse and Heritage Tour. She served as Texas 4-H Council secretary, district vice president and president of her county council.

Graduating fourth in her class from Roby High School, Jennifer was an officer of the National Honor Society, class officer and class favorite. She also was an FFA and FHA member and participated in a number of sports and UIL competitions.

Jennifer, who plans to major in agricultural communications at Tarleton State University was one of 50 recipients of Houston Rodeo scholarships presented at the state 4-H Roundup. The Show will present 50 four-year, \$8,000 scholarships to FFA members during their July state convention.

Ricky, son of Kathy and Richard Spencer, Roby, has been an active 4-H

member for 10 years. He received the Gold Star and Santa Fe record book awards and showed the champion Angus at the State Fair of Texas. He has attended the national 4-H congress, served as a

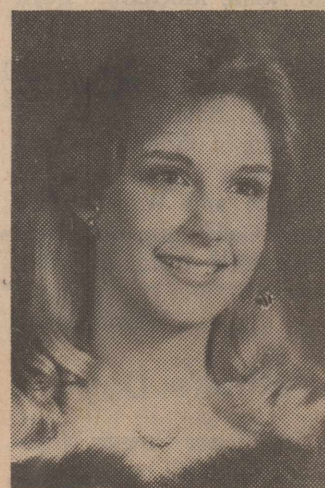
teen leader and was president of his club, as well as delegate to the district 4-H council.

Saluatorian of his Roby High School class, Ricky was also president of the National Honor Society and treasurer of FFA. He participated in football, basketball and track and received awards for citizenship and perfect attendance.

Ricky, who plans to major in animal science at Texas Tech University, was one of 50 recipients of Houston Rodeo scholarships presented at the state 4-H Roundup.

With the receipt of this scholarship, Jennifer and Ricky become a part of the largest agricultural scholarship program in the

United States. The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo is the nation's largest donor of agricultural scholarships and, during the coming school year, will provide assistance to some 469 students in Texas colleges and universi-

ties through the annual program alone. This represents a commitment in excess of \$2 million.

The winners of Show scholarships are carefully selected from hundreds of applicants and are the best in the state from the standpoints of academics and leadership. Students must major in some form of agriculture at a Texas college or university.

"These scholarships are made possible because people have made the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo one of the most popular entertainment events in the Southwest," said Dr. Joseph T. Ainsworth, Show president, in presenting the awards. Proceeds generated by spectators provide the funds for the scholarship program of this renowned charitable organization, whose efforts, actions and revenues are used directly to benefit youth and support education.

"The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo is very proud of our continuing commitment to outstanding students like Jennifer and Ricky," said Ainsworth. "The scholarships we present today represent a most important investment in the future, assisting a worthy young person to receive the education necessary to fulfill his or her potential and meet the challenges of tomorrow."

Commissioners Asked To Help With Indigent Bill

The members of the Fisher County Commissioners Court met in regular session last Monday and reviewed a letter from Callan Clinic requesting financial assistance from the county in helping pay a doctor bill for a patient the clinic felt came under the category of "indigent". The pati-

ent was hospitalized under the care of Dr. Maurice Callan after apparently suffering a minor stroke. At the time the patient was married to an American citizen. After being hospitalized, the husband of the patient left her. He also left her without the ability to pay any funds on hospital or doctor bills. As the patient's health returned, she was driven by ambulance to Dallas and flown to Canada, her native land. The Callan Clinic was left with an unpaid bill of some \$3,400. The letter to Fisher County Commissioners requested help in reducing the outstanding bill. Commissioners tabled any action on the letter pending review of a recently passed Texas law concerning indigent patients.

In other action Wayne Harris, a Fisher County Susquecintennial Chairman, informed commissioners of some plans for the celebration on the local level in 1986. Harris indicated that the committee was planning a county wide bar-b-que to coincide with the 150th birthday of Texas, 100th birthday of Fisher County and 40th anniversary of the Fisher County Fair and Rodeo.

In final action Fisher County Attorney Rudy Hamric appeared before the commissioners requesting approval to advertise for bid for an approximate 5 acre tract of land originally purchased by Fisher County as a road. The road was never built and the former owner of the land is requesting permission to re-purchase the 5 acres that is in the middle of his pasture. The court authorized Judge Marshal Bennett to act in their behalf in accepting bids and disposing of the pro-

perty. At a special meeting held May 28th, the Fisher County Commissioners Court accepted the bid from Treanor Equipment Company for the new price of machinery for precinct #4. Also accepted was the motion to hire one jailer to become in compliance with a letter from the jail commission.

E.J. Kiker Honored As Volunteer By 4-H Group

Two 4-H leaders from the Rolling Plains area were among 28 in Texas honored at the 1985 State 4-H Roundup at Texas A&M University, June 5. Margaret Berry of McAdoo and Earl J. Kiker of Rotan were recognized as the top adult volunteer leaders in the Rolling Plains District of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System. The Extension Service is the parent organization of 4-H.

Each was presented the Texas 4-H Salute to Excellence Award provided by the Texas 4-H Youth Development Foundation, the service organization of 4-H, through a grant from the Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Co. of Waco and the Raymond Dickson Foundation of Hallettsville.

Kiker, who is in the stocker cattle business, has been a 4-H leader for some 15 years. He has directed most of his efforts to the Fisher County Junior Leaders 4-H Club.

He has served as a leader for beef, sheep and swine projects and also is the organizational leader for

the club. Kiker has personally financed livestock projects for a number of underprivileged youth, has hauled their animals to shows, and provided lodging for the youth during the show period.

Kiker also has instructed 4-H members in stocker cattle selection and management. Through his efforts, several Fisher County 4-H'ers are now in the cattle business.

Shooting Death Of 14 Year Old Investigated Locally

Fisher County Sheriff Mickey Counts arrested Sean McLendon, age 20, of Sylvester and charged him with involuntary manslaughter in connection with the Sunday night shooting of Wade Martin, age 14, of Haskell.

The incident took place approximately 2 to 3 miles southwest of Sylvester while the Martin boy and McLendon were riding in a vehicle driven by Mike Douglass, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jackie Douglass of Sylvester. The incident took place at approximately 3:00 a.m.

After receiving the gunshot wound from a .22 cal. pistol, Martin was transported to the Hamlin Hospital by Douglass and McLendon, where he was pronounced dead on arrival.

Preliminary reports after the incident, conveyed to Sheriff Counts, indicated that the weapon was on the dash of the pick up, the vehicle hit a washed out spot in the road and the weapon discharged hitting Martin, this said Counts "proved to be false."

"From reports now, it appears that McLendon was playing with the gun, thought it was on an empty chamber, put to the Martin boy's head and pulled the trigger", said Counts. Sheriff Counts said that

reports indicated that McLendon had been drinking at the time of the incident.

After being arrested and charged with involuntary manslaughter, McLendon posted a \$10,000 bond and was released from the Fisher County jail.

Martin was an ex-step brother of Mike Douglass. Services for the youth

were conducted in Haskell last Tuesday. An autopsy was performed.

The incident is scheduled to be brought before the Fisher County Grand Jury on June 19th, according to Counts.

The incident was investigated by Sheriff Mickey Counts and Deputy Sheriff Gene Pack.

Rotan Little League In Team Area Play-Off Game

Through play last Monday night, the Yankees and Rebels are tied for first place with each team having 3 losses. The Yankees are 7-3 while the Rebels are 8-3.

The Yankees play the Pirates on Friday, June 14th while the Rebels play

the Vets.

On Monday, June 17th the Rebels and Yankees play a make-up (rain) game. If needed there will be a playoff game between the Yankees and Rebels if both teams are tied at that point.

Hunter Trial Held In Roby

The jury trial of 50 year old Eugene Paul Hunter of El Paso went into session in Roby last Monday, according to Sheriff Mickey Counts. Hunter is being tried by petit jury for negligent homicide result-

ing from a car accident killing two people.

The two car accident took place in May 1984 on highway 180 when Hunter driving a 1981 Buick collided with the 1964 Ford Falcon driven by Jesus

Jose Baeza of Mineral Wells. The collision resulted in the death of Jesus Jose Baeza and the death of Martin Baeza while injuring Hunter of El Paso and Jimmy Baeza of Mineral Wells.

Mitchell Feels 80-90% Of Cotton In Fair Shape

Frank Mitchell, County Executive Director of the Fisher County ASC office in Roby, indicated last Tuesday that "Fisher County farmers are probably 80 to 90 percent planted and up or they will be able to save what is not up", commenting on the status of the recent rains with respect to the planting of the 1985 cotton crop.

Mitchell indicated that he has talked with numerous Fisher County cotton farmers and has driven county highways looking at the status of planting. "Quite possibly the worst spot in Fisher County is northeast of Rotan," said Mitchell, "the northwest area out of Rotan also has some problems," concluded Mitchell.

There are a lot of areas where farmers will be forced to scratch seeds to get a stand, washed out areas that will have to be replanted, but across the county, Mitchell felt most

cotton farmers were in fairly decent shape as a result of the recent rains.

County Doused With 3.75 Inches Rain In Week

Unlike recent years when the dry, blowing West Texas sand was an indication of how "rain starved" Fisher County has been. Or like several times in the past, when the only living plants in the cotton fields were weeds, if they could survive on the dry conditions, Rotan has been blessed with rain. According to Annie Weems, local record keeper for the National Weather Service, Rotan has received 3.75 inches of rain within the past week. From Wednesday of last week to Tuesday of this week the rain has come down and shown a beam of hope that this may be another good year.

State Capital Highlights

The dynamics of Texas politics are changing fast in the wake of the recent legislative session, but the new leaders who are emerging from both parties may be challenged soon by shifts in the state's economy.

Several lawmakers earned gold stars for the business-like way they cut \$1.2 billion from the state budget without raising taxes, but everyone, Democrat and Republican alike, is well aware that a major tax increase looms in the near future.

The Lone Star State's government has no projected surplus. None whatsoever. Thus, if oil prices drop any at all, the Legislature could have to come back into special session to raise taxes to fund basic government. By its Constitution, Texas cannot operate on a deficit.

And so the new heroes, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, House Speaker Gib Lewis, budget chairmen Sen. Grant Jones and Rep. Jim Rudd, may be basking in short-lived public gratitude.

The New Democrats The budget-cutting feat

was a real boost for Democrats, particularly conservatives, who disproved the Republican line that Democrats cannot be trusted to manage tax dollars.

The conservatives even earned the gratitude of some liberals for increasing their party's respectability in the wake of the '84 defeats. Yet they could lose it all if the money crunch comes and they fail to repeat their blue-ribbon fiscal performance.

Granted, they had the help of the Republicans who serve in the Legislature. The budget cutting was a bipartisan effort that saw most lawmakers place the good of the state above the good of their political parties.

But since the leadership was composed of Democrats, one unlikely event has occurred; conservative and liberal Democrats have, for the most part, called a truce to their perpetual war.

White: Up or Down? One exception to that cozy little scenario is Gov. Mark White, who caught criticism from some fellow Democrats in the waning

hours of the session. They said White didn't exercise enough leadership, but his supporters, pointing to the new indigent care package he rammed through in the three-day special session, say that he did.

As recent poll indicated that 46 percent of Texans think the governor did a good or excellent job, more than the 41 percent rating given to the Legislature. Only 16 percent frowned on him.

The New Republicans The Republicans gained in stature, too, and show many signs of emerging from minority party status. Besides the clout they wielded in the Texas House under the leadership of Gerald Geistweidt, R-Mason, Ed Emmett, R-Houston, and Tom Craddick, R-Midland, they now have the beginnings of a healthy party fracas themselves.

It's most obvious in the jockeying for the GOP gubernatorial nomination. Former Democrat Kent Hance of Lubbock switched parties only to find himself challenged by U.S. Rep. Tom Loeffler, also of West Texas, and a whole host of other potentials.

Some of the big names that loom out at you are former Gov. Bill Clements, former Democratic Speaker Bill Clayton, Dallas Cowboys coach Tom Landry, and Amarillo oilman T. Boone Pickens.

Clements jumps Gramm Now that Republicans stand to make a good run for the Governor's Mansion, some long-time party loyalists are not so keen at handing the nomination to new converts, former Democrats, and that's where the inner party squabbling lies.

Usually, Republicans keep their family bickering quietly to themselves, but some dissension came out last week, by no less a personage than Bill Clements himself.

Clements accused U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm of dividing and polarizing the GOP by endorsing Kent Hance for governor. Both are former Democrats, and the endorsement has come early, before the other GOP candidates have even announced for the race.

Gramm's recruit Gramm personally recruited Hance for the Republican Party, but Clements told an oil producer's group that Gramm showed bad judgement. "An endorsement by a senior person like myself or Gramm is divisive and causes polarization...The wounds and scars it would cause would not be helpful."

"It's more a Democratic way of acting. Maybe Senator Gramm has not gotten used to being a Republican," Clements said.

In comparison with recent post-Legislature years, the jockeying for position is coming much, much earlier. And the early signs indicate that 1986 could be a year that departs from political tradition for both parties in many ways.

RECORDKEEPING LAW REPEALED

The controversial law requiring "contemporaneous recordkeeping" to substantiate tax deductions and credits taken for the business use of vehicles, personal computers, and other equipment has been repealed.

The business use of such equipment can now be substantiated by "adequate records or sufficient documentation." Written logs kept as the equipment is used are no longer required; instead, receipts, expense account records, trip sheets, etc., will be considered adequate recordkeeping.

Anticipating that such easing of the rules will result in less tax revenue, the new law reduces allowable depreciation deductions and investment credit for vehicles. Investment credit for vehicles purchased after April 2, 1985, is limited to \$675 (former limit, \$1,000). The new law puts a cap on first year depreciation of \$3,200 (formerly \$4,000) and a cap of \$4,800 (formerly \$6,000) annually for subsequent years.

The new law does not intend to give taxpayers the freedom to deduct whatever they choose for business use of equipment. 1985 tax returns will ask taxpayers six questions about claimed deductions and credits. For example, for automobiles the taxpayer must give the total number of miles driven during the year, the percentage of personal use claimed, whether the vehicle was used for commuting and, if so, the commuting distance, whether the vehicle was available for personal use, and whether adequate records or sufficient evidence exists to justify the deduction and whether or not such evidence is written.

Keeping a written record of business use will still be the surest way to substantiate deductions and credits to which you are entitled.
