# Hospital Board Discusses Insurance

The members of the Fisher County Hospital Board issued a directive to Gary McGee, hospital admini-

strator, last Monday night citing that he write a letter to all hospital staff members, both active and cour-

tesy, requiring that they show proof of carrying a minimum mal-practice insurance of \$500,000 by

mid September 1985. The action was necessary, on the part of the hospital board, in order to

comply with underwriting practices of the St. Paul Insurance Company (through Rotan Insurance

Agency-agent Joe Burk) that stipulated before liability insurance could be written on the hospital all staff doctors (active and courtesy) must show proof of being covered under the minimum \$500,000 mal-practice insurance.

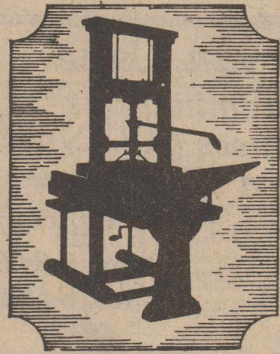
Board members adopted a motion that unanimously passed 4-0 requiring medical staff members to carry the \$500,000 mal-practice insurance. Members Dave Williams, Billy Jeffrey, Raford Hargrove and Frank Mitchell voted for the motion. Board member Glenn Copeland was

not present at the meeting.

Newly appointed Fisher County Hospital Administrator Tommy Suttlehan was present at the meeting last Monday night, with Gary McGee, to meet with board members. Suttlehan and McGee are both associated with YDP Corporation, the company holding a contract to oversee the administration of the local hospital. Suttlehan was promoted to the local administrator post by YDP from director of nursing at the Gorman hospital. McGee is being

promoted to vice president of operations for YDP charged with the general care of Rotan and two other YDP hospitals. The change took place on June 10th.

In other action, McGee reviewed utility expenses (the May utility bill was \$7,523.00 for electricity for 130,800 kilowatt hours), discussed insurance commission payments, reviewed full-time employee staffing and gave board members a comparison summary of revenue to expenses in light of occupancy.

## Rotan School Board Members Grant Salary Adjustment To Office Force

The members of the Rotan Independent School Board adjusted the salaries of school custodians and office personnel last Thursday and listened to a report from Athletic Director Richard Gorman concerning the results of a baseball survey he conducted with area athletic directors.

The board granted office personnel an approximate 4% salary increase and placed custodians on a straight salary basis for 1985-86 versus the hourly wage paid during the just completed school year.

Board members authorized new superintendent Alton Fields to advertise for bids on a commercial washer and dryer for the athletic department.

Athletic Director Richard Gorman reported that he surveyed 44 area schools concerning the possibility of starting a baseball program in the spring. A total of 41 athletic directors responded to the survey. Three schools (Brownfield, Merkel, and Windthorst) currently have a program with Wylie (Abilene) scheduled to begin spring baseball in the near fu-

ture. The others responding had negative comments on beginning a program. The new superintendent is to survey superintendents with the same

survey and report back to the board in the next few months.

Board members accepted the resignation of Cecilia

Greenlee with regrets. She has been teaching kindergarten. The board also officially hired Richard Smith as the new junior high coach.

## Rotan Police At Full Strength With Hiring

Rotan Police Chief H.W. Grady moved his police force up to full strength with the hiring on June 18th of Euwel Dwayne McKay of Brownwood, Texas.

McKay, son-in-law of Patrolman Floyd Bankston, is 24 years old, married and the father of one child.

He formally completed the 9th grade at Tahoka High School and received his G.E.D. from Brownfield High School.

He was employed by Mulkey Construction Company in Brownfield before being hired by the Rotan Police Department. He worked there from March 1985 to June 1985 as a heavy equipment operator. Prior to that he was with T & C Tank Company in Denver City from December 1980 to March 1985 as a truck driver. He worked for Gifford Hill Western in Lubbock from Feb. 1978 to March 1979 as a mixer operator in the

plastic pipe division.

His starting salary with the Rotan Police Department is \$1,150.00. He is scheduled to begin certification school in Abilene in September and should complete the 420 hours course in November.

McKay is a certified emergency care attendant (ECA). He secured the rating while a member of the Denver City Volunteer Fire Department.

## Hunter Pleads Guilty Given Probation

Eugene Paul Hunter, age 50, of El Paso, pled guilty to involuntary manslaughter, a third degree felony, at some point during his trial by jury last week in Roby and received a sentence of 5 years in the Texas Department of Corrections (probated for 5 years) and a fine of \$1,500.00, according to a spokesman in the office of the District Clerk in Roby. Hunter was being tried for a car accident that resulted in the death of two people in May of 1984.

## Police Office Will Move In Three Weeks

The members of the Rotan Police Department are scheduled to move into their new location (the building next door east of the present Police Department) in approximately 3 weeks, according to Police Chief H.W. Grady.

"Workers are installing telephone lines, doing minor carpentry remodeling and doing electrical work at the present time," said Grady.

## Tommy Suttleham Named New Hospital Administrator

Tommy Suttlehan has been promoted to the position of Hospital Administrator at the Fisher County Hospital replacing Gary McGee, who has served in that capacity for the past 3 years.

Suttlehan, former director of nursing at the YDP Corp. administered hospital in Gorman, took over duties on June 10th. McGee was promoted by YDP Corporation to the position of vice president of operations over the Fisher County Hospital and two other hospitals within the YDP network. Suttlehan, age 34, and his wife Kathy are the parents of three children. The couple have twin daughters, Jennifer and Christine-age 11 and a son, Christopher, age 7.

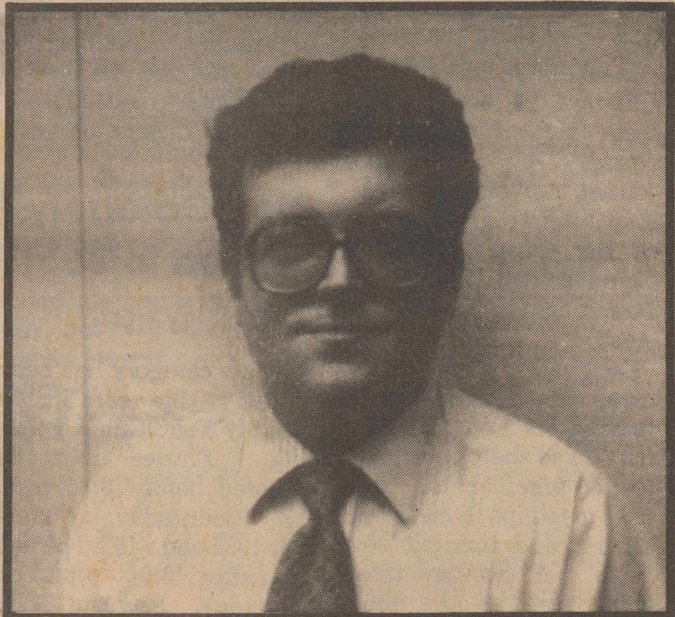
He is originally from Denison while Mrs. Suttlehan is a native of Sherman.

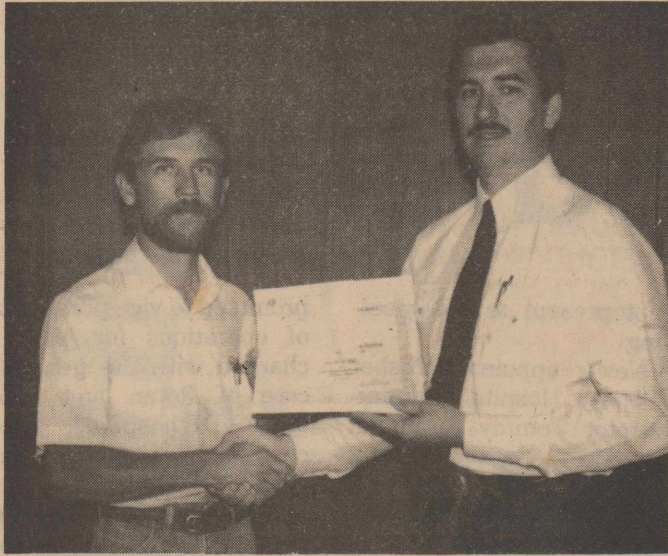

## Perry, Rheta Thomson Attend Fire Convention

Chief Perry Thomson and Rheta Thomson members of the Rotan Volunteer Fire Department attended the 109th Annual Convention and Conference of the State Firemen's and Fire Marshals' Association of Texas, held June 9 through 12 in Waco.

Speakers included Dr. Charles Patterson, Killean; Bob Murphey, a Nacogdoches lawyer and a former Association president; and Hugh Keepers, of the Texas Railroad Commission's Liquefied Petroleum Gas Division, in Austin.

Each year the convention gives paid and volunteer firefighters from throughout Texas the opportunity to get together for business meetings, a memorial service and training sessions. A two-day trade show features the most modern firefighting and rescue equipment. About 1,500 firefighters, firemen's auxiliary members, families and guests attended this year's convention.

The State Firemen's Association serves both volunteer and paid firefighters by sponsoring the municipal firemen's training school each July at Texas A&M University, administers a certification program for volunteer firefighters and fire marshals in Texas; and represents some 40,000 firefighters before the Texas Legislature. The Association's monthly magazine, Texas Firemen, has more than 4,600 subscribers and includes technical articles and news about the state's fire service.

"The convention gives us the best opportunity of the year to stay in touch with the needs of our members," said Ed S. Kirkham, executive manager of the Association. Perry serves as second vice president of the Midwest District of the Firemen's and Fire Marshals' Association of Texas. While attending the state convention in Waco he was appointed to a committee to judge the booths of the participants on the trade show floor.

Perry attended classes in certification for firemen and pension program. Rheta serves as state chaplain of the Texas Firemen's Auxiliary. She

assists in the mens memorial service, conducts the ladies memorial service, where the names of Mrs. A.B. Parker and Mrs. Horrace Arrington were added. Rheta presides over the presentation of the past presidents of the Texas Firemen's Auxiliary. She attended classes in parliamentary procedure, ways and means for auxiliaries.

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# Fandangle In Albany This Weekend

The taming and settling of the frontier west as "seen through the eyes of pioneer children," will be relieved in the 47th production of the Fort Griffin Fandangle during six performances set for June 20-22 and June 27-29 in Albany.

which was created in 1938 by Albany playwright Robert Nail, relates through narration, song and dance the story of the settling of this part of Texas during the final decades of the 1800's. The show is presented in the Fandangle Association's own outdoor theater

located approximately one mile west of town, truly giving the audience the "look and feel of times long since past."

Tickets can be reserved by calling the Fandangle's ticket office, located in the depot building in Albany, at either 915-762-2525 or 915-762-3642. Ticket prices range from \$3 to \$7 per person and should be purchased or reserved in advance. If available, tickets will also be sold at the gate.

"We had a record year last year, with four of the six performances sold out, and ticket sales are going as well or better so far this year," stated Patsy Rose, the association's executive better spiritleaders. Approximately 75 other acts ranging from Class to AAAA attended the

courthouse lawn. The meals are catered by Joe Allen's Bar-B-Q of Abilene for \$5.25 per adult plate and \$3.00 for children under 10 years of age. One special attraction for visitors is the Old Jail Art

Center, which recently completed a large expansion and remodeling project. The art center will feature a special Fandangle exhibit this year entitled, "Women of Albany." The show consists of spe-

cially commissioned photographs of Albany women from all walks of life. The collection was photographed by Rick Williams of Austin.

The Art Center will also be displaying many pieces from their permanent collection which includes mostly modern works by such artists as Amedeo Modigliana, Henry Moore, Pablo Picasso, John Sloan, Morris Graves and Paul Klee.

A special exhibit of paintings by Alice Reynolds and her father A.W. Reynolds will be hanging in the lobby of the First National Bank of Albany. The bank will be open during its regular hours for visitors.

Miss Reynolds was a co-founder of the Fandangle and served as its music director for over 40 years.

The annual Fort Griffin Fandangle Parade has been scheduled this year for June 27 beginning at 6:00 p.m. The event usually

draws over 100 entries from both local organizations and area towns.

"We hope that Fandangle visitors will come to Albany several hours prior to the performances so that they can have plenty of time to see the many other attractions that we have to offer," stated Lucas.

"If you haven't seen the Fandangle lately you should. The theme of the show changes each year with new scripts, new songs and new performers," commented Lucas.

The Fandangle cast is made up of over 250 local citizens who begin working as early as February on the annual production.

"We are very excited

about our show this year," stated Fandangle director Marge Bray. "There have been several new songs written to tell our story through the experiences of the children of the frontier."

## Tax Planning

### WHO IS A CPA?

"I had my CPA do it." This is a common phrase used by many people to refer to the person who assisted them with financial information. Services such as tax return preparation, tax planning, bookkeeping, financial statement preparation, computer systems design, and a host of other management services are provided by many types of people. Not all of them are Certified Public Accountants.

The CPA designation dates back many years and is issued to individuals under very strict requirements. Educational and internship requirements differ from state to state; however, most states require at least an undergraduate college degree and one or two years of on-the-job training. Every CPA must pass a comprehensive 2 1/2 day examination which is uniform throughout the United States. In other words, any individual with "CPA" behind his name has passed the same rigid examination regardless of which state issued his certificate. Most states also require that CPAs take continuing professional education courses each year.

Other designations such as LPA (Licensed Public Accountant) or PA (Public Accountant) come under a less stringent set of testing and licensing requirements.

There are no licensing requirements for designations such as Tax Specialist, Bookkeeper, Estate Planner, Financial Planner or most of the other terms having financial implications.

The CPA designation has gained wide-spread respect for professional competence and independence. This is due, in part, to the profession's very strict technical and ethical standards.

If your tax and financial advisor does not have the designation "CPA" behind his or her name, he or she is probably not a "Certified Public Accountant."

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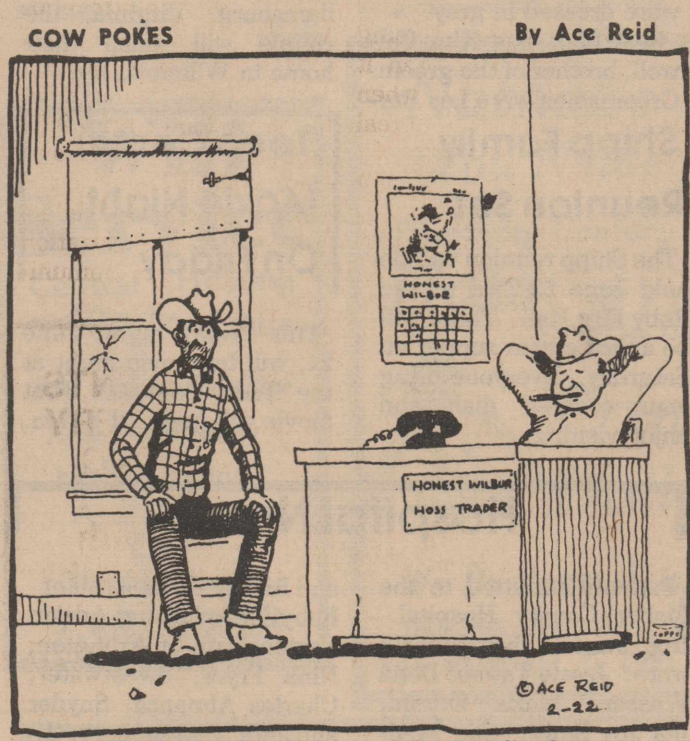

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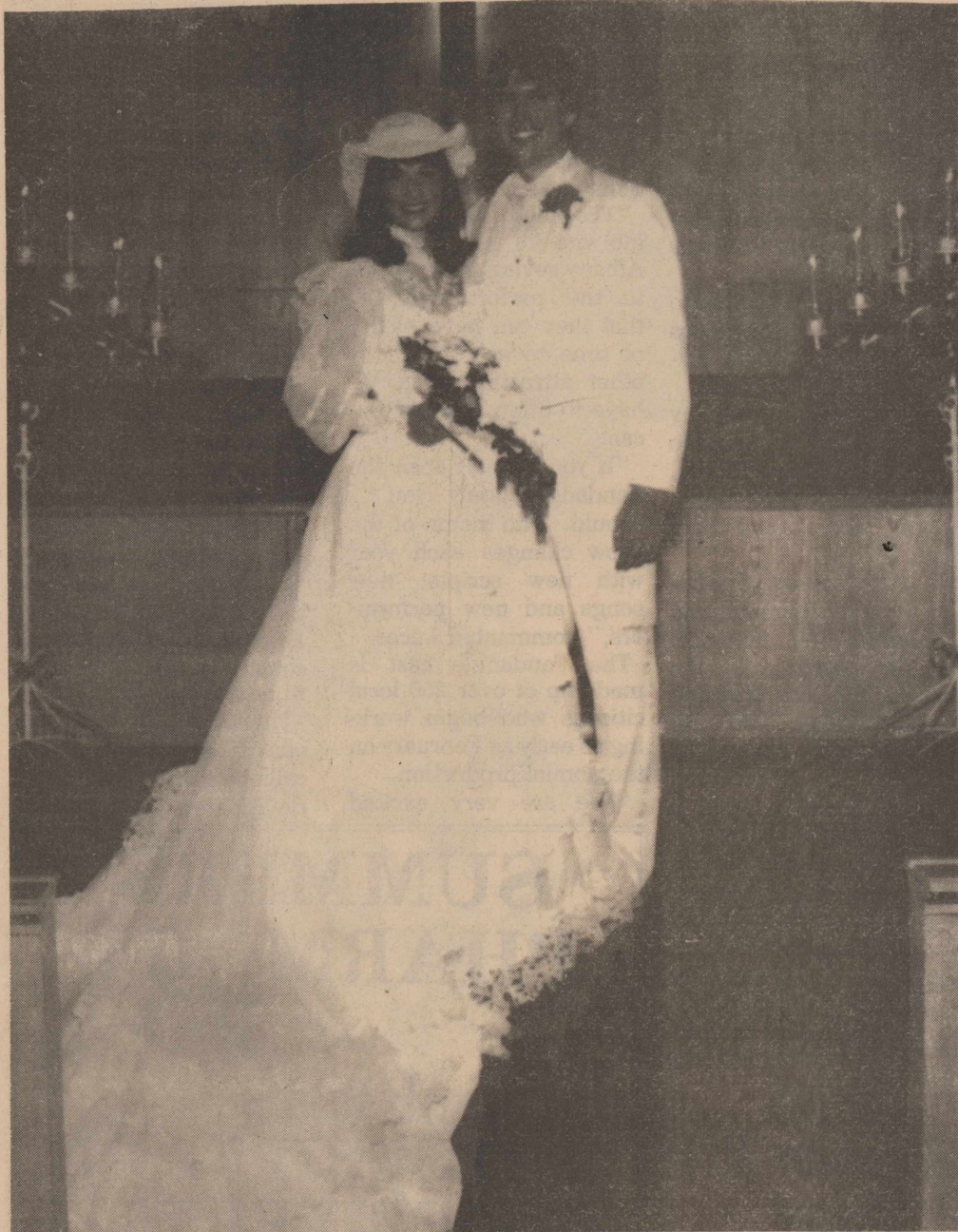

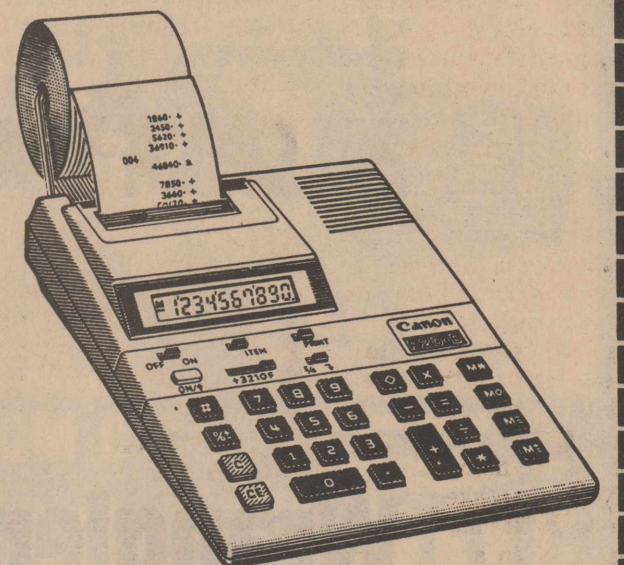

## County Agent Report

By Richard Spencer

Results have been obtained from the wheat standard variety test on the Jimmy Wright farm located near Busby. The wheat was planted on October 8, 1984 and harvested May 23, 1985. The results of the 14 varieties are as follows: Harpool 1114-48 bu., Mustang-36.8, TAM 107-33.6, Golden Acres 5227-32.6, TAM 108-27.2, Hawk-26.4, TAM 105-26.4, Chisholm-24, Wrangler-22.4, Sturdy-22.4, Lancota-21.6, Tex Red-20.8, Bounty-20.5-20 and Vona-19.2.

In a fertility test on the Gary Floyd Farm located between Roby and Rotan, TAM 105 Wheat fertilized with 68-0-0 (dry area) yielded 40 bushels per acre and the unfertilized yielded 18 bushels. In another fertility test on the Brad Stuart farm located 4 miles NE of Roby there

was no significant difference in Russian wheat fertilized with 40-0-0 plus 1 quart of Zinc and the unfertilized. The fertilized and unfertilized wheat both yielded in the 40 bushel range.

\*\*\*\*\*

For high level reproductive performance, beef cows need a mineral supplement with 10 to 12 percent phosphorus. A two-year Extension demonstration showed that lack of adequate phosphorus can delay conception, which means a late calf crop and generally lighter calves. In the study, two herds of crossbred cows received an 11 percent phosphorus mix the first year. Then the level was reduced to 8 percent in one herd the second year, and cows in that herd were slower to conceive.

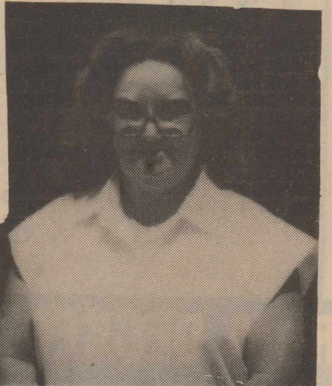

Many people already have fruit and vegetables ready to freeze, can,

pickle, or preserve. If you are among those people and need to brush up on proper methods to use, below are some things to remember.

First, the product you are putting away by whatever method will be only as good as the product you started with. By this we mean if the product isn't ripe or is overripe, the food preservation method used will not improve the quality.

In canning, be sure to use standard jars and lids. Jars you bought salad dressing, peanut butter, pickles, preserves or any product in at the grocery store isn't suitable for home canning. These jars break easier, do not have level tops in order to get a seal and in general the companies tell us were originally made for what they call "packers" jars. All canned foods, pickles, preserves should be processed in a pressure canner or waterbath. Low acid foods should be preserved while high acid foods may be waterbathed. Every pressure canner should be tested each year to be sure the gauge works correctly and there is no steam loss. If the pressure gauge isn't correct, or if the canner loses steam, the internal temperature does not get hot enough

to kill the organism causing the deadly poison botulism.

If you need your pressure canner tested, please call to arrange a time. I can test it before you need to use it. This past week I've tested canners for Helen Noles, Thelma Smith and Frances Morgan.

You might also like a copy of our bulletins on canning, freezing, pickles or preserves. To request copies of these or get your canner tested call the County Extension Office at 776-2171 or come by to see us in the county courthouse.
