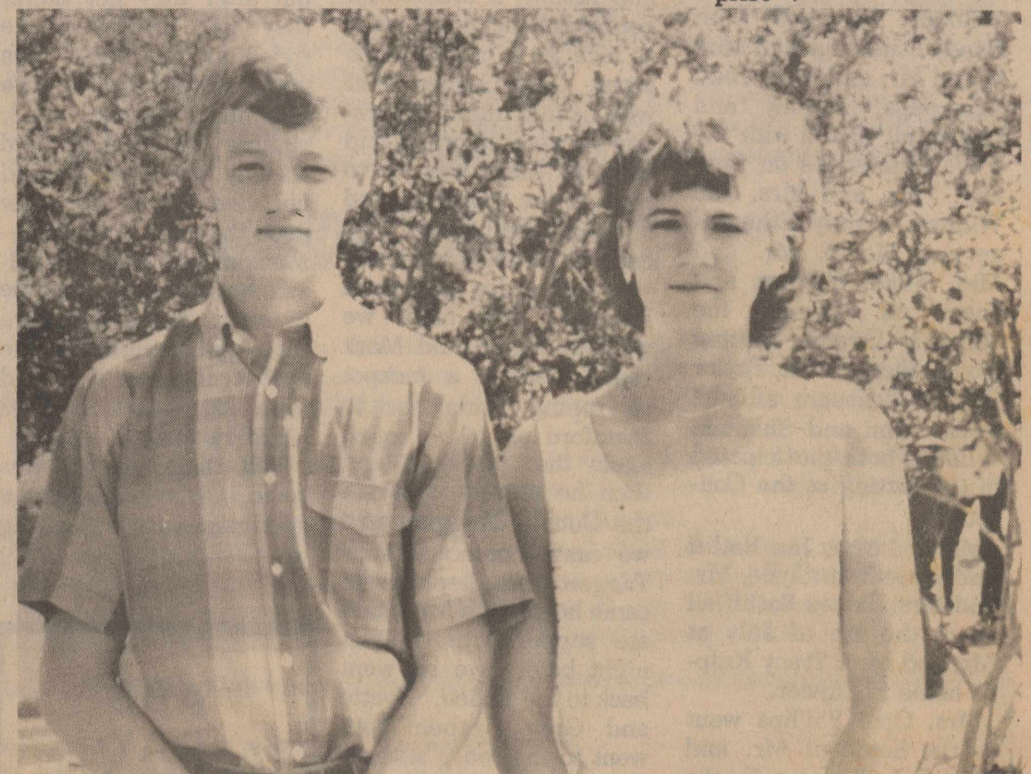
The first evening's activities consisted of Dr. L.D.

Rotan School To Purchase Eight New Apple Computers

The members of the Rotan School Board conducted their first monthly board meeting with new Superintendent Alton Fields last Monday night and during the meeting voted to hire Sue Branch as a teacher in the elementary building, subject to assignment, and accepted the resignation of first grade teacher Alice Dennis.

The board approved the new student handbook as outlined by High School Principal David Hargrove. The only major changes in the book will be to implement the required changes in order to comply with House Bill 72, said Fields.

Superintendent Fields reviewed with the board progress on several issues including (a) purchasing, (b) bids on a washer-dryer for the field house, (c) accepting bids on the construction of a new all-weather track field (d) progress on re-working the new gymnasium floor and (e) the status of the baseball survey being conducted with area superintendents.

In the area of purchasing computers, Fields informed the board that he intends to purchase approximately 8 additional Apple 2E computers for use in classroom instruction before school begins in September. The computer purchase was approved last year, and funds allocated out of the 1984-85 budget.

Fields informed the board that he has instructed Coach Gorman to secure names of commercial washer-dryer firms from information that will be handed coaches at Coaching School in late July. He intends to study this information, secure bids and hopefully have the washer-

dryer in place for the beginning of school.

Fields is scheduled to meet with a track representative from Lubbock at the end of the week and begin outlining plans and specifications for the new all weather track field. The board earlier approved the project. The projected cost is based on condition of curbs at the present site, drainage additions that will need to be made and the type of base needed for the all weather surface. Bids should be before the board in September or October.

Work is scheduled for this summer on re-working the gymnasium floor at the new gym. Workers are

scheduled to sand, replace needed boards, refinish the surface and re-stripe the floor before school opening in September.

The final item reviewed by Fields to board members included the status of the baseball survey being conducted with area superintendents. Fields indicated that the survey firms were just recently mailed and should be reported upon more detailed at the August session of the board.

Action on salaries for lunchroom personnel was tabled until the August meeting.

The members of the Roby Independent School Board have hired Ken Jernigan, a resident of Lubbock, Texas, as the new head football coach and athletic director for the Roby School for the 1985-86 year, according to Jimmie Laurie, Superintendent.

Roby School Board Hires Personnel

The Roby School Board recently filled two vacancies in teaching fields for the 1985-86 school year with the hiring of Ronald Hester and Terri Arons, according to Superintendent Jimmie Laurie.

Ronald Glen Hester of Snyder has been hired as the high school english teacher and Terri Lynne Arons of San Angelo has been hired as the Roby high school math teacher.

Hester is a 1983 graduate of the University of Texas while Arons received her degree at Angelo State University in 1981.

The members of the Roby School Board conducted a short meeting last Monday night during which they approved a school milk bid for 1985-86, hired all lunch room personnel for 1985-86, and re-hired the bus drivers for the coming school year.

Lunch room manager Edith Langford as well as Nae DeLosSantos, Minnie Rivas and Zelma Mauldin were all re-hired as lunchroom personnel for 1985-86.

Bus drivers rehired by the Roby board include Norma Parks, Alvin Seaton, Francis Morgan, Edith Langford and Ricky Williams (1/2 time).

The board left the prices of meals served at the lunchroom at \$1.25 for adults, .75 for grades 5-12 and .60c for grades kindergarten through grade 4.

Jernigan has coached at Klondike (1976 - 1980), at Amherst (1980 - 1981), at Comanche (1981 - 1982), and at Roosevelt High School in Lubbock from 1982 until being hired at Roby.

At Roosevelt he was the head boys track coach, assistant varsity football coach and was involved in 8th grade boys basketball. Jernigan and his wife

Deborah Ann were married in February of 1974. They have two children, Trey age 7 and Tara age 4. He is a 1970 graduate of Abilene High School, 1976 graduate of McMurry College and a member of the Auburn Street Church of Christ in Lubbock, Texas.

He holds a Texas Teacher Certificate for health and physical education, speech and driver education.

Billions of dollars in cash and property are donated each year to various charitable causes and charitable organizations. Part of the public's generosity may be due to the tax deductibility of qualifying contributions. Tax legislation now under consideration may change the tax treatment of contributions. However, whether charitable giving remains deductible or not, any individual giving to charities should do so intelligently. The object of charitable giving is to have the donated money or property used by those in need, not to have the funds diverted for administrative purposes or, worse yet, for the personal use of individuals running the charity.

Never allow yourself to be rushed into making donations. Take the time to check the organizations and give only to those that spend the most where you want your contributions spent on charitable activity.

Two organizations that provide information about

charitable giving and various charitable organizations are the Council of Better Business Bureaus (1515 Wilson Blvd.; Arlington, VA 22209) and the National Charities Information Bureau (19 Union Square West; New York, NY 10003). The Council of Better Business Bureaus offers two free booklets on charitable giving. The National Charities Information Bureau provides a free guide on charitable organizations. The NCIB evaluates different charities to determine if board members of charities have conflicts of interest that might affect how contributions are used. It also checks how much charities spend on fund raising and administrative costs in relation to the amounts spent on actual charitable activity.

If charitable giving is a part of your way of life, stay abreast of tax legislation affecting contributions. Also discuss your charitable activities with your tax advisor to get the best tax benefits for your donations.

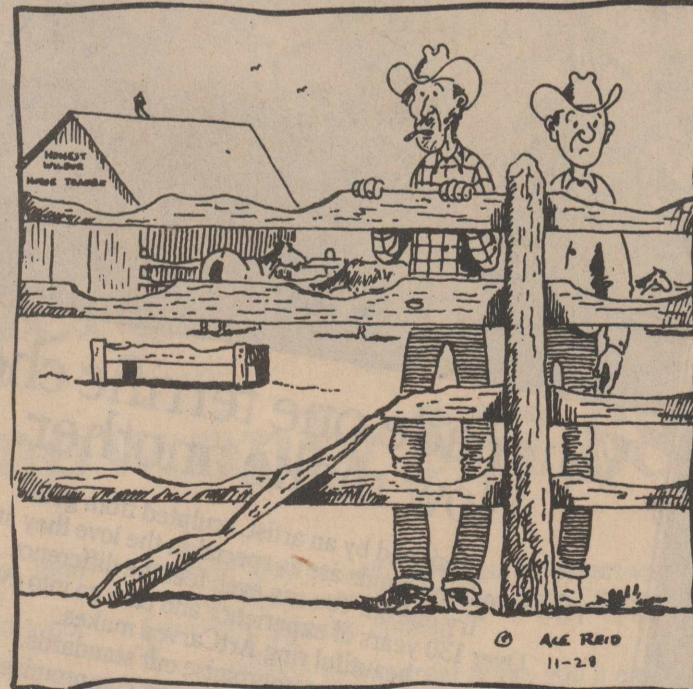

WTU To Refund \$13.7 Million In Fuel Costs Savings

West Texas Utilities Company filed a petition Tuesday with the Public Utility Commission of Texas asking permission to refund \$13.7 million in fuel costs savings and interest to its retail customers.

Glen D. Churchill, WTU president and chief executive officer, said the refund is possible because of efforts by the Company to reduce production costs by obtaining cheaper boiler fuel and buying available economy power from other companies. As result, WTU has actually been able to spend less for power plant fuel than was anticipated when the fuel factors were established by the PUC.

The savings have accumulated since August 1984 when the fuel recovery account was last reconciled by the Commission. The total available for refunding includes \$12.6 million in actual savings, plus an estimated \$1.1 million in interest.

"We want to pass these savings on to our customers as quickly as possible in order to bring some relief during the season of hot weather and high utility bills," Churchill said. "While we are not yet due for a reconciliation, we are voluntarily asking permission to make refunds now."

Since 1983, electric customers in Texas have been charged for fuel according to fixed fuel factors set by the PUC. This method of fuel cost recovery was ordered by the PUC to replace the automatic monthly fuel adjustment which matched fuel billings to fuel expense immediately and under which utilities had operat-

ed for many years. Under present rules, a reconciliation of the fuel costs may be required a year after the factors are

fixed, but adjustments are possible sooner if actual fuel costs are substantially above or below the amount being charged.

"Over the past several months, the Company has made considerable savings by purchasing surplus power from other compan-

ies cheaper than WTU could generate it, and by taking advantage of a softer natural gas market," Churchill said.

Refund amounts will vary with the amount of the customer's usage. The average residential customer is expected to receive about \$32.

The petition filed Tuesday is for an exception to PUC rules requiring a formal reconciliation procedure. A full fuel cost reconciliation for WTU is not due for several months.

Experience has shown that reconciliation proceedings are quite lengthy, delaying refunds reaching the customers. For the reason, the Company is asking the Commission to make an exception to its rules so that refunds can be made immediately during the hot summer season.

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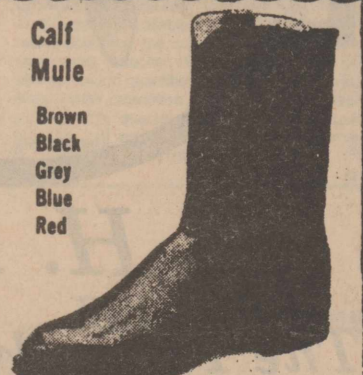
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Pesticide Spraying Season In Full Swing

(Austin, July 1, 1985) June 21st marked the first day of summer—and for many rural residents that meant pesticide spraying season is in full swing. Drifting pesticides can ruin paint finish on cars, damage gardens and trees, but most of all they can injure people, pets and livestock.

Scaling Named Chief Of Soil Service

Wilson Scaling of Henrietta, Texas became chief of the USDA Soil Conservation Service on May 21. In the July issue of Soil and Water Conservation News, he said he is pleased with his new job. "The Soil conservation Services runs an excellent voluntary soil and water conservation program," Scaling said. "I'm proud to be named the agency's new chief and I am confident in my knowledge and understanding of the strong partnership between SCS and conservation districts."

"I've learned firsthand how that partnership works - as a practicing steward of the soil, director of the Little Wichita Soil and Water Conservation Districts, and member of the National Association of Conservation Districts."

Conservation districts are governed by locally elected landowners who coordinate conservation work within their district. Scaling said he firmly believes soil and water conservation is the key to America's long-term productivity in agriculture. "Conservation has served my family well for many years," he said. "It's the care that my ancestors have taken of the natural resources that's keeping our livestock operation in north-central Texas profitable today."

"I plan to lead SCS in helping many more people share the feelings of pride and satisfaction that taking good care of the soil, water, and other resources has given me and my family. I believe SCS and local conservation districts working together have the natural ability to make it happen for generations to come," Scaling concluded.

Soil and Water Conservation News is the official SCS magazine.

"This year, the rules of the road are different. For the first time ever, Texans can find out when and what pesticides are being sprayed around them," explained Pam Mavrolas, Pesticide Project Coordinator for the Texas Center for Rural Studies. The Center is a non-profit educational group helping Texans to protect themselves and their property from pesticide damage.

"The new rules may not stop pesticide drift, but they can let you know before crop dusters spray fields so that you can leave the car, cover your garden, or bring your children and pets inside," Mavrolas cautioned. Children are particularly vulnerable to pesticide poisoning, sometimes becoming ill from much smaller exposures than would ever affect an adult. To be on the safe side, children should not be outside when spraying is going on or while pesticides are in the air.

Mavrolas outlined the procedures necessary to follow in order to get information about aerial spraying. People living or working in buildings adjoining fields where pesticides are being sprayed may send a letter to the farm operator of that land requesting a day's notice of all aerial spraying. The letter should include: 1) your name and address; 2) home and business phone numbers and the hours you will be at each number; and 3) the date of the request. The farmer can choose from several ways to notify the requestor, so any person requesting notification should contact the farmer and find out how he/she will be told. Also, notification should be given in Spanish where appropriate. Mavrolas advised that a copy of the letter be sent to the Texas Department of Agriculture by certified mail.

"The rules are especially critical for folks with special sensitivities to pesticides," noted Mavrolas.

People with chemical hypersensitivities, allergies, or other medical conditions who live within 1/4 mile of the field to be sprayed can request that they be notified of aerial spraying. "But, the process to request this type of notification is a bit different," explained Mavrolas. In addition to supplying the information required by adjacent neighbors, a letter of confirmation signed by the requestor's doctor is required. The request must be sent to the nearest TDA District Office for approval, not to the farmer.

"One of the new rights most people don't know about allows them to call the farmers, whose fields are being sprayed and find out what chemicals are used," Mavrolas noted.

The farmer is required to know or have access to the trade and common chemical name, a copy of the label, and other safety information. "I can't stress enough the importance of knowing what's

being sprayed. Once you know the name, you also can find out how it should be applied and what are its health effects," stated Mavrolas.

Mavrolas recommended that people interested in

receiving notification call the TDA toll free hotline-1-800-TDA-REGS for more details on the regulations.

The hotline operates from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. and after hours on an answering machine. For informa-

tion on pesticides and their health effects, call the Texas Center for Rural Studies at (512) 474-0811.

The parents of the bride and groom hosted the

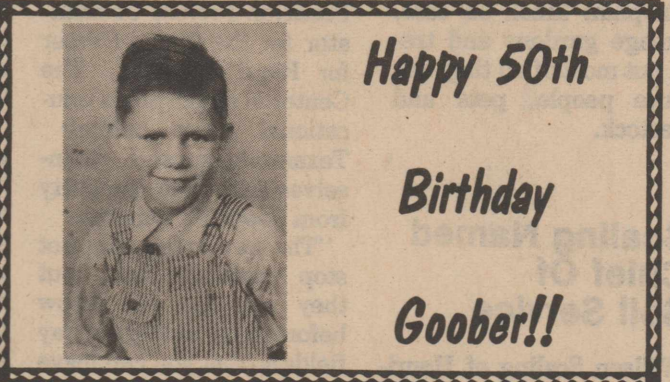

WTU To Refund \$13.7 Million In Fuel Costs Savings

West Texas Utilities Company filed a petition Tuesday with the Public Utility Commission of Texas asking permission to refund \$13.7 million in fuel costs savings and interest to its retail customers.

Glen D. Churchill, WTU president and chief executive officer, said the refund is possible because of efforts by the Company to reduce production costs by obtaining cheaper boiler fuel and buying available economy power from other companies. As a result, WTU has actually been able to spend less for power plant fuel than was anticipated when the fuel factors were established by the PUC.

The savings have accumulated since August 1984 when the fuel recovery account was last reconciled by the Commission. The total available for refunding includes \$12.6 million in actual savings, plus an estimated \$1.1 million in interest.

"We want to pass these savings on to our customers as quickly as possible in order to bring some relief during the

ed for many years. Under present rules, a reconciliation of the fuel costs may be required a year after the factors are

fixed, but adjustments are possible sooner if actual fuel costs are substantially above or below the amount being charged.

"Over the past several months, the Company has made considerable savings by purchasing surplus power from other compan-

ies cheaper than WTU could generate it, and by taking advantage of a softer natural gas market," Churchill said.

Natural gas is the principal fuel for all of WTU's eight major power generating stations. In recent years, fuel costs have amounted to more than half of WTU's total operating revenues.
