BUSINESS BUY/SELL AGREEMENTS

The price paid for a going business will often exceed the fair market value of the tangible assets.

In business jargon, this excess is usually referred to as "blue sky." Under the tax regulations, this excess gets very specific treatment. The blue sky is either goodwill or a covenant-not-to-compete.

The amount of money allocated to goodwill can be treated by the seller as capital gain and, therefore, is afforded a more favorable tax treatment. The buyer, however, cannot deduct goodwill during his ownership of the business. The buyer must treatment the goodwill as part of the cost of the business should he ever re-sell it.

The dollars allocated to a covenant-not-to-compete are favorable to the buyer. The buyer is entitled to write off the allocated dollars over the life of the covenant (in effect, he can depreciate the value of the covenant). The seller, on the other hand, must report the covenant dollars as ordinary income as opposed to the more favorable capital gain.

All too often the buy/sell agreement is silent as to the allocation between goodwill and a covenant-not-to-compete. The buyer will probably treat the blue sky as covenant and the seller will treat it as goodwill. This inconsistent treatment is unacceptable to the IRS. Upon audit, the IRS will adjust the tax returns for consistent treatment and assess back taxes and interest.

It is in the best interests of both the buyer and seller to have the allocation for goodwill or convenant spelled out in the contract. It is always unpleasant to have an IRS audit adjustment on a prior year return.

The tax consequences of the blue sky allocation can be significant. To get the best tax advantage, consult your accountant early in the sale negotiations.




Funeral Services Held For Martin Warren

It's time to start planning a fertilizer program for winter wheat production.

For producers who plan to follow wheat with wheat, fertilizer recommendations will depend upon fertilizer rates applied to the previous crop and yields obtained. Also, fertilizer carryover may have been higher than normal due to heavy rust infestations which plagued 1985 wheat production and reduced the crop's ability to utilize much of the applied fertilizer.

These factors and other unusual circumstances influencing the nutrient status of the soil indicate that a soil test should be a sound investment at this time.

Producers who have not yet made a final decision to plant wheat this fall, but wish to leave the door open to plant corn, grain sorghum or cotton this spring, can submit a soil sample now and request fertilizer recommendations for all cropping alternatives. Resulting fertilizer recommendations than can be used to assist each person in making cropping

The Extension Service Soil Testing Laboratories at Texas A&M University and Lubbock are ready to assist wheat producers in making these economically important decisions. Although new automated laboratory procedures and computerized integration and reporting of soil test results have improved speed and precision, soil test recommendations can be no better than the quality of the soil sample analyzed.

Therefore, it is important to collect soil samples which are truly representative of the field being

should be collected from each field or area of a field to be tested.

Each composite sample should consist of 10 to 15 subsamples randomly collected with a probe or shovel and thoroughly mixed together before taking the composite sample. To sample the soil, remove the top inch and collect the soil samples to a depth of a six inches. Our office can provide soil sample bags and detailed instructions for sample collection.



-Should college admissions standards be made more difficult across board?

--Should some institutions be closed down or merged with other schools?

--Should colleges go back to holding classes on Saturdays and include more evening classes?

-- Should students be required to pass exit exams, similar to the exam which graduating high school seniors will be taking this

Tough Politics If you enjoy watching complicated politics, you'll love the careers-on-theline decisions that promise to plague lawmakers in this drama.

Many a seasoned politico will tell you that local school politics are the toughest around, mainly because emotions are stronger when you're dealing with children and their futures.

But with the higher education issue, college kids represent a voting constituency of their own, and if the reform program is highly controversial it might turn into a hot campaign issue.

Legal Winner On the subject of hot campaigns, the Justic Department last week quietly approved the special election in the First Congressional District.

Specifically, the feds found nothing amiss in the manner in which the governor and Texas secretary of state set the election date. The agency insisted it must approve the date to prevent violations of the Voting Rights Act.

Texas Attorney General Jim Mattox said the state will continue its appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court to prevent further infringements on state law.

Clergy Role Mattox had a full week

Earlier he was busy straightening out a new child abuse reporting law that conflicts with church doctrines.

Then on Thursday, while he was flying back to Austin from Huntsville his state plane depressurized and filled with smoke. The plane landed safely, but the electrical system fire caused a stir.

His legal opinion earlier in the week also caused a stir among religious leaders. Mattox ruled that a new law requiring all citizens to report suspected child abuse cases exempts only lawyers defending accused criminals, and not clergymen.

Thus, a clergyman who hears a confession to child abuse is legally required to report the offender to authorities or suffer penalty.

Mattox said he personally does not agree with that idea, and recommended that the wording be changed by the Legislature to accommodate church practices and teachings.

Gramm Probe Even though he refunded more than \$21,000 in possibly illegal contributions, the Federal Election Commission will continue to audit Texas Senator Phil Gramm.

An FEC spokesman said last week the agency is

urging federal court to enforce a subpoena for Gramm campaign records. Gramm's camp called it a huge fishing expedition by the feds.

Aide Quits The Texas speaker's top aide, Neal "Buddy" Jones, himself a former

legislator, will quit to go

into private law practice. Speaker Gib Lewis tapped state Rep. Doc Arnold, D-Terrell, to take Jones' place. Arnold will have to resign his seat in the Legislature, necessitating a special election to fill that vacancy, probably

in November. The new job pays \$60,000 a year. **Short Takes**

Texas Republican secretary Holly Decherd will serve as vice chairman of U.S. Rep. Tom Loeffler's statewide steering committee. Loeffler says he will announce for governor

officially by Labor Day. Gov. Mark White urged the State Bar of Texas to prosecute lawyers, including some from outside of Texas, for soliciting clients in connection with the crash of Delta Air Lines Flight 191 at the D/FW International Airport.



Get names and addresses of all adivers and passengers involved. Note the year, make, model and license number of the other car or cars, and the name and addresses of the insurance company and agent.



Don't admit responsibility for the accident; don't make any statements, except to the police. Do not divulge details of your insurance

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
