Last Tuesday, after seeing that the stand they took was causing innocent people to be hurt, asked their insurance agent to bill them for the additional premium--thus ending the standoff between the board and Callan and LeBleu.

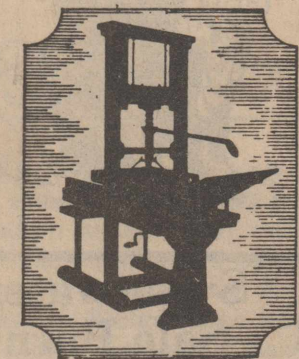

## Rotan Getting New Gypsum Transport Firm, To Employ 30 Local People

A new gypsum trucking organization, Builders Transport, laid preliminary groundwork with the Rotan City Council last week in preparation for beginning a Rotan terminal that could eventually employ 30 local people and contain a fleet of approximately 20 trucks.

Builder's Transport President B.M. Shirley of Camden, South Carolina; Builder's Transport Attorney David C. Petruska of Fulbright and Jaworski of Dallas and John Delaplaine, manager of National Gypsum Plant-Rotan met

with members of the Rotan City Council last week to discuss the future of the new transport firm in Rotan.

The members of the Rotan City Council agreed to cooperate with Builder's Transport in structuring a Community Development organization with the Rotan Mayor to appoint the Board of Directors. Builder's Transport agreed to provide legal services for the structuring of the organization and pay all fees involved in the non profit

organization registration. The non-profit status will allow Builder's Transport, and other new potential Rotan businesses, to sell low interest rate bonds, tax free to private investors.

Builder's Transport has leased the old Rolling Plains International (Snyder Truck and Tractor) building south of the Rotan City Hall with an option to purchase. They plan on remodeling the facility. It has been estimated that the tax roll will

be increased by 1 1/2 millions dollars.

The Rotan City is scheduled to meet with Builder's Transport attorneys on October 3rd to finalize the plans.

In other action, the Council heard a request from Rotan School Superintendent Alton Fields requesting cooperation in solving a water problem at the track field. He asked if a waterway could be placed at the dam on the golf course to alleviate standing water on the track field.

The council discussed the central dispatching, paid a deficit of \$169.50 for the Rotan Community Center and planned a joint meeting with the Council and Rotan Housing Authority Board to discuss police security at parties and dances at the Community Center.

The tax rate was set at 53 cents per \$100 valuation for the City of Rotan. The

Rotan Water Authority tax rate was reduced from .14 cents per \$100 valuation to 8 cents due to the good financial condition of the authority.

## Rotan Man In Jail Under \$32,500 Bond

A 27 year old Rotan man was arrested by Rotan police last Saturday and after all charges were filed a total bond of \$32,500.00 was set by Roby officials on the incident.

David Mark Wylie, 27 of Rotan, was arrested at approximately 6:15 p.m., in the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company parking lot in Rotan, while on foot and charged with the following offenses-(1) making alcohol available to a minor (2) disorderly conduct (3) aggravated assault on police officer, three counts and (4) retaliation.

Wylie is currently in Fisher County Jail. The two police officers involved in the assault were Police Chief H.W. Grady and Officer Floyd Banton.

### FRANCHISE FRAUD

For every way there is to make money, there are five ways to lose it.

The sales pitch by those who would like to sell a "get-rich-quick" scheme is that you can "get-rich-quick" with little or no effort. That pitch should put you on your guard if you believe the old adage, "There's no such thing as a free lunch."

There are numerous franchises and business schemes which stand no chance of making a profit. The basic requirement in all these schemes is that you have to part with real money. The sad truth is that many people are "sales-pitched" out of their hard-earned savings. The proof in this lies with the thousands of people who have lost all their savings. The promoters, of course, would never offer you such a list of people. You will, however, be given several dazzling success stories.

If you don't know what you're doing, ask somebody who has experience in the field in which you're considering an investment. Listen to all your promoter has to say and accumulate all the written information about the products as well as any contracts, guarantees, etc. If you're still interested in "buying in," spend some time with an independent advisor.

It's necessary that you consult someone who is independent (does not stand to gain financially regardless of your decision). Most people who have lost money on the "get-rich-quick" business schemes would have saved their losses in both time and money if they had spent more time investigating the project.

If you've been defrauded, you may have a legal remedy. However, most slick schemes are sold by slick promoters and your chances of getting any of your money back are very slim.

Remember, "If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is."

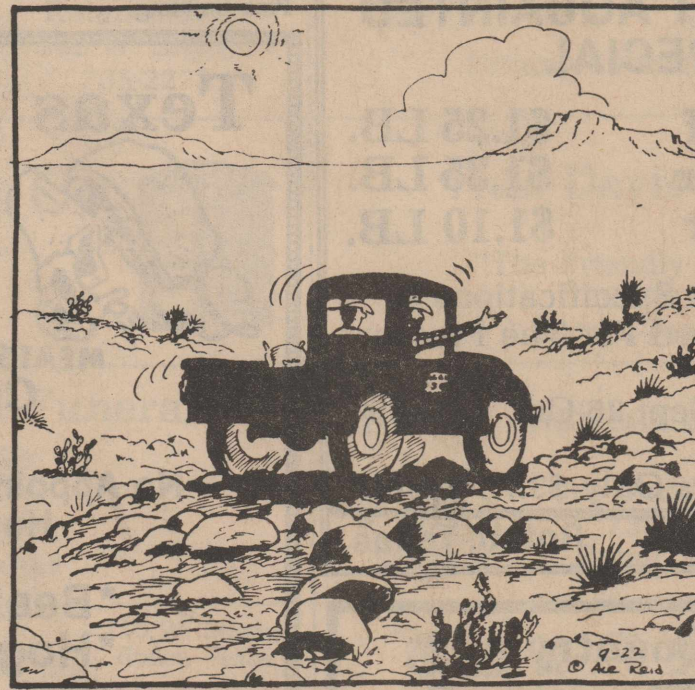

## School Districts To Provide Tutorial Services

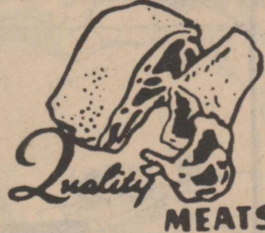

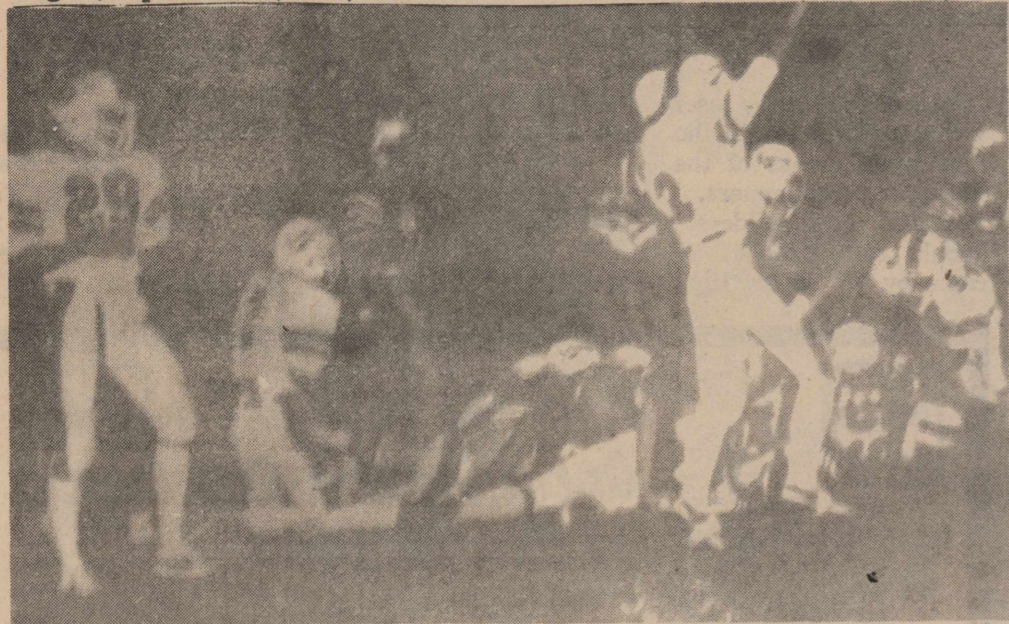

# County Agent News

By Richard Spencer

Farmers and ranchers who haven't already culled open, late-calving and poor performing cows should do so soon.

There's no need to put expensive winter feed into cows that are unproductive and inefficient. Culling the cow herd now will also help you more effectively plan on feed supplies for the winter months.

The culling process should also "weed out" cows with bad eyes, udders or feet and legs.

Also, pregnancy testing cows this fall may be a more profitable management tool than ever before.

Since it's difficult for a cow to produce a calf large enough to pay her annual maintenance bill and leave some profit for the producer, an open cow is surely losing money. In addition, cows calving late and during the summer months wean calves 30 to

90 pounds lighter than their herd mates which calve at earlier times. For this reason, it's advisable to cull cows which will calve late next year and buy a replacement which will calve early.

Whoever does the pregnancy diagnosis (usually your veterinarian) will be able to estimate the calving date on each animal and make it easy to identify next year's late-calving cows. Work toward a 60 day calving season or one that's certainly no longer than 90 days.

Removing barren and late-calving cows from the herd will increase both the herd's reproductive potential and pounds of calf weaned.

Wheat farmers are excited about getting their crop in the ground when it dries up. Rain reports received varied from 2 to 4 inches. Think about some fertilizer for your small grain. Yield

increases have been increasing each year due to response from fertilizer.

Changes facing rural communities and options for coping with them, will be explained for Fisher County families at the annual meeting Friday, October 4, of the Rolling Plains Economic Program.

The meeting will be in the Wilbarger County Auditorium, 2100 Yamparika Street in Vernon. Registration will begin at 9:30 a.m. The fee for the daylong conference is \$7.50 and includes lunch. Advance registration may be made at the County Extension Office.

"Facing Tomorrow" will be explored during the luncheon address by Sister Thomas More Bertels, a Catholic nun from Manitowoc, Wisconsin. Sister

Thomas More has earned national respect as acritic of farm issues and spokesperson for farm families.

Participants will be able to select two of three concurrent workshops

dealing with bankruptcy courts, oil and gas lease options, and personal health and fitness.

Exhibits at the program will provide blood pressure and blood sugar screening; offer computer analysis of sodium and hidden sugar in the diet, and provide an exercise program; and give county stocker cattle operators an individual computer analysis of their operations.

Stocker operators need to bring cost figures for the latter analysis.

The Rolling Plains Economic Program is a regional organization sponsored by

the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, an arm of the Texas A&M University System, to promote economic growth and development in the 30-county area.

**September Good Month For Pond Rotenoning**

If the fish population in your pond is hopelessly out-of-balance, September is a good month to remove these fish with rotenone. During October and November after water temperatures decline, your pond can then be safely restocked.

none than sunfish (bream, sun perch) and crappie. Bullheads inhabit the pond bottom and when maximum water depths exceed five feet, rotenone must be applied with special care to kill all the bullheads.

Rotenone kills fish by constricting blood vessels in the fishes' gills, suffocating them. The warmer the water, the more effective rotenone; thus, August and September are usually the best months to apply it.

Some fish are more difficult to kill than others. Bullheads (mudcat, polywogs) require more rote-

Soil Conservation Service personnel at Rotan can provide technical assistance in obtaining and applying rotenone. SCS personnel, who give assistance to landowners and operators through the local Upper Clear Fork Soil and Water Conservation District, can also help pond owners compute the cost of rotenoning and restocking as well as ways to improve the balance of your fish population.
