Fisher County Cotton Hits 19,296 Bales For Season

Cotton production in Fisher County took a surge last week but the recent bad weather may put strains on production for this week, according to reports from gin man-

agers. Through last Tuesday morning the seven Fisher County cotton gins reported total bales ginned for the week of 8,014. The

Rotan Gin had the highest production for the week recording 1,959 bales.

Total production for the season amounted to 19,296 bales. The Rotan Gin baled a total of 5,094 thus far this season to lead the seven Fisher County gins. Second in total production was Hobbs Gin with 3,096. Other gins and total bales ginned: Terry Gin 3,751; Hobbs Gin-3,096; Farmers Union Coop Gin-3,005; Farmers Gin-2,381; Longworth Gin-1,419 and Sylvester Gin-550.

Rotan School Failure Rate Hits One In Four Students

Rotan School Board members were informed last Monday night, by the three building principals, that approximately 1 of every four students attending school at Rotan failed to pass at least one or more subjects during the most recent 6 week grading period.

High School students had an overall failure rate of 30% while junior high students reflected a failure rate of 32% with primary students showing a 12% rate. The average figured 24.6% school wide of students failing one or more subjects.

Superintendent Alton Field in making his monthly report to the school board members informed them that he didn't see any way the Rotan school would remain in the UIL AA classification next year. He said he reported average enrollment for reporting period to determine classification at 120.215. Classification alignments for the 1986-87 school year to be announced on January 30th.

Field also reported the results of the TEAMS tests; status of the planning on the construction of a new track field; asbestos detection and a request from interested parties concerning textbooks in the primary building. He reported to the board concerning recent vandalism to school windows, informed them of an insurance audit and reported that five agriculture stock show students had failed one or more subject in the 2nd six week semester. In his final item reported to the board, Field said he had checked into building use fees charged by Western Texas College.

The board went into executive session for approximately one hour last Monday night to discuss disciplinary action and conduct a discipline hearing. Immediately following the closed session the board voted to expel a student for the remainder of the 1985-86 school year. Superintendent Alton

Commissioners Asking For Insurance Bids

The members of the Fisher County Commissioners court met last Monday morning and among other business discussed, decided to advertise for bids on automobile insurance for the approximate 42 vehicles owned by Fisher County.

The 42 vehicles covered have been insured this year through Roby Insurance Agency at an approximate premium of \$15,500.00. Commissioners are going to accept bids on coverage in the near future for next years coverage of the fleet of 42 vehicles.

In other action, Fisher County Commissioners did not receive any bids on a motor grader for Tommie Jack Stuart's precinct.

Commissioners authorized officials to upgrade a copy machine in the office of Fisher County Agent. The new machine, allow-

ing for trade, is expected to cost an additional \$300.

Commissioners granted an easement right of way to Telecom Incorporated in precinct one and discussed the possibility of purchasing a washer and dryer for the Fisher County Sheriff's Department. No action was taken on this item.

In final action the commissioners discussed the possibility of moving offices for the Fisher County Sheriff's Department in light of the consolidation with the Rotan Police Department. No action was taken on this item.

Roby Board Informed Of New Bus Delivery In May

The members of the Roby Independent School Board received notification from Superintendent Jimmie Laurie that the school bus ordered last spring is to be delivered to the district in May of 1986. The GMC, 53 passenger bus will cost the Roby School \$22,122.00.

Roby board members discussed teacher, superintendent and principal evaluations; approved placing

Evelyn Nowlin on the substitute teacher list and agreed to leave the same career ladder committee in place for 1985-86 year. That committee consists of Merle Lovett, Dora Reyes, Mickey Early, George Price and Jimmie Laurie.

Laurie discussed the UIL re-alignment schedule with board members informing them that he had reported 120 students to UIL officials for re-alignment cutoff purposes. Notification is expected on January 30th concerning UIL districts.

In final action the Roby school board accepted the resignation of Mrs. Edith Langford as bus driver for health reasons. She has been replaced by Tim Smith, band director.

Roby High Juniors Average 97%

County Students Average Below State In TEAMS Testing

Ninety-one percent of the state's 11th graders passed the English portion of the new high school graduation test, according to a report last week by the Texas Education Agency. In Fisher County, that percent dropped a few percentage points to 88% for the three county schools. Roby had 33 junior students taking the test with 32 passing the English portion for a 97% pass rate. They ranked highest of the three schools involved. McCaulley had 7 junior students tested with 6 passing for 86% and Rotan had 27 juniors taking the test with 22 passing for a passing rate of 81%.

Eighty-eight percent of the 191,000 students test-

ed statewide in October passed the mathematics portion of the TEAMS exit examination. In Fisher County, the percentage figure fell again below the state average. Rotan, Roby and McCaulley junior students had an 82% pass ratio, falling 6 points below the state average. Roby students had the best pass ratio scoring 97% with only one failing of the 33 tested. McCaulley showed a 71% pass ratio with 5 passing of the 7 being tested. At Rotan 21 passed of the 27 tested for a ratio of 78%.

Beginning with the class of 1987, students must pass both parts of the exam to get a high school diploma. The requirement is part of the 1984 educa-

tion reform package approved by state lawmakers.

State education officials had predicted a 25 percent failure rate. Although figures were not available on how many students passed both portions, the 91 percent and 88 percent pass ratio indicated a strong showing overall.

Speaking of the test, Alton Field, Rotan School Superintendent said, "That is a little lower than I expected", referring to the test results. He indicated that with the SAT scores and various tests last year, he felt Rotan would be above the state average. Field plans on a remedial program for those juniors failing the test and possibly making

tutoring mandatory prior to the next testing in the spring.

Jimmie Laurie, Roby Superintendent, said "We are very pleased with the results of the TEAMS testing at Roby."

The TEA staff presented the results to the board last week.

"We are extremely pleased with these initial results, especially in light of our prediction that 25 percent would fail," said W.N. Kirby, state education commissioner.

High school juniors who failed either portion will have three more chances before graduation. A 70 percent score is required for passing. Each portion contains 72 questions. District-by-district re-

sults were not available from the education agency. Those scores are being mailed to districts by the California firm that developed the exam.

TEA figures showed that white students performed best on the exam: 94 percent passed the math test, and 96 percent passed the English test.

Eighty-two percent of the Hispanic students passed the math test, and 84 percent of the Hispanics passed the English test.

Seventy-two percent of the blacks passed the math test, and 81 percent of the blacks passed the English test.

Overall, 22,400 students need "remediation" in math skills, and 16,900 need extra work in English

skills, according to the education agency report.

"We know where we have weaknesses and where we need to improve," said Brumley.

Dallas school board member Kathryn Gilliam said that although she is pleased with the 80 percent passing grade in Dallas, she is concerned about those that failed.

"The critical thing will be what kind of program we'll put in place to assist those kids," she said. "I don't think tutoring is the answer. I think it's going to have to be something tailor-made for those kids."

An informal survey of Texas school districts Thursday showed 80 percent to 100 percent of juniors passing the test.

"I think it shows that students can do the work if they are motivated," said Linus Wright, superintendent of the Dallas school district. "They realized this was a serious test and they responded."

Dallas saw about 80 percent of the students taking the test pass the math portion and about 83 percent pass the language arts portion.

In the affluent Highland Park district, 100 percent of the students who took the test passed both parts.

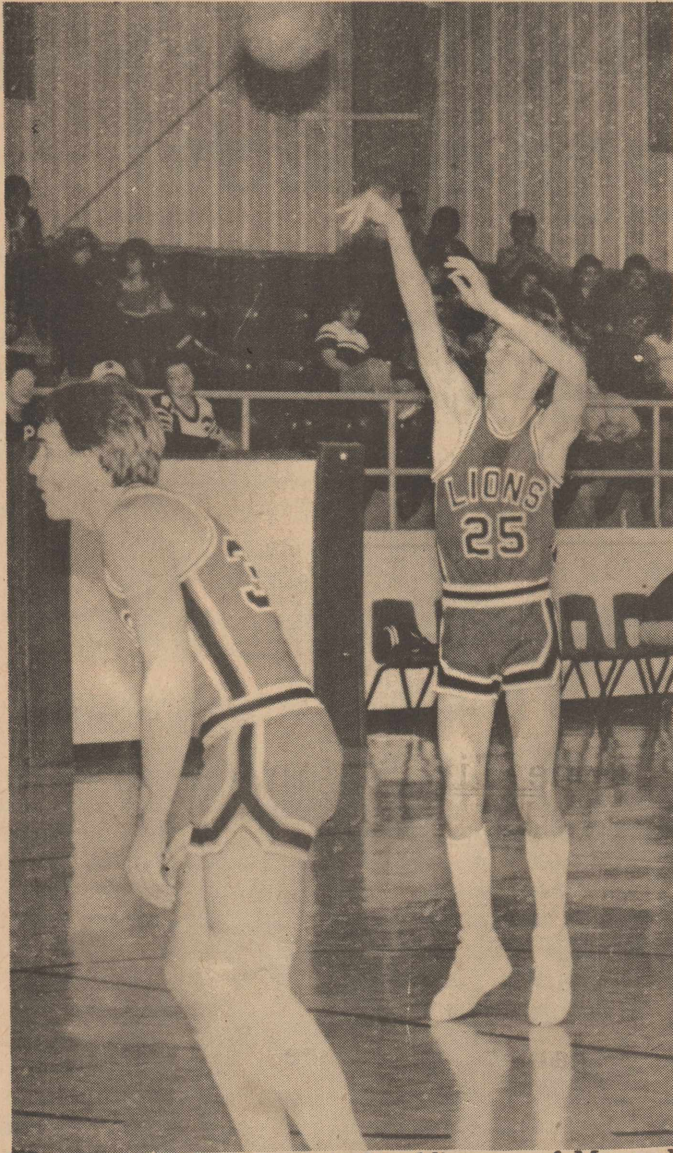
Amarillo reported 92 percent on the language arts, and 90 percent on math. In El Paso, 89 percent of the juniors passed the math portion and 90 percent the language arts portion.

In Port Arthur, 79 percent of the juniors taking the mathematics portion of the test passed, and 80 percent mastered the language arts portion.

San Antonio reported that only one of eight school districts fell below the predicted 75 percent.

"We wanted the students to realize that this test was important and we're happy," said Harlandale Superintendent Yvonne Katz.

Keith Cruse, director of the Texas Education Agency-administered tests, attributed higher-than-expected scores to school district's preparation of students-cram courses ranging from distribution of sample tests to tutoring.

Tax Planning

WHAT'S NEW IN TAXES?

Have you been wondering lately what's happened to tax reform and all those promises of a fairer and simpler tax system? First we had the Treasury's proposal, then we had President Reagan's plan, and now the House is working on yet another version of tax reform.

It may be a situation of too many cooks spoiling the stew. As one official said, "It has become clear that whatever happens is not going to look much like tax reform." Special interest groups are lobbying to retain tax benefits for themselves, and politicians are making compromises in an effort to keep tax reform alive. The result so far is mainly a reshuffling of deductions and tax "loopholes" with no fundamental tax reform. Whether Congress or anyone else can still shape a plan that salvages basic reform remains to be seen. Estimates of a date for passage of new legislation vary from before year-end to mid-1986.

However, one bit of good news comes from a provision in the 1981 Tax Act which took effect in 1985. This provision "indexes" tax brackets and exemption amounts, keying them to the consumer price index. Because the CPI showed a 3.7% increase in 1985, 1986 tax brackets and the personal tax exemption will be increased by the same amount.

preventing inflation from nudging taxpayers into higher brackets.

This inflation adjustment will give the average four-person family earning \$20,000 a year a \$32 dollar tax cut in 1986; that average family earning \$50,000 will get a \$146 tax cut. Singles with \$20,000 income will see a \$25 tax cut; those with a \$50,000 income will have a \$190 tax cut.

The bad news is that the social security tax increases in 1986. The rate goes from 7.05% to 7.15%, and the wage base subject to tax increases from \$39,600 to \$42,000. A person earning \$42,000 or more will, therefore, pay an additional \$211 in social security tax in 1986.

High Plains Report

Now that the crops are in and the rush of harvest is over, it's time to begin thinking about the 1986 season and what can be done to increase your

chances of success. As always, base your decisions on how you can efficiently make the most of your time and resources.

Two interrelated areas to closely monitor are irrigation and cultural practices. As our underground water supply continues to decrease, pumping costs skyrocket and profit margins narrow. There are, however, several ways for High Plains farmers to improve their efficiency in this vitally important area.

Conservation tillage can provide benefits not only to farmers using irrigation, but dryland farmers as well. While clean tillage provides a trash-free seed bed, it also increases the hazards of soil and wind erosion. Even more important is the fact that clean tillage decreases the soil's water storing potential and increases soil crusting from rain hitting the bare soil. This creates problems when trying to establish a vigorous, uniform crop.

On the other hand, conservation tillage—optimum retention of crop residues on the soil surface—will reduce wind and water erosion, increase water retention and thus increase yields.

Stubble mulch tillage, no-till, minimum-till and till planting are all conservation tillage practices. Chiseling and disking qualify if crop residues are maintained on the surface.

In a study conducted at Bushland, Texas, stubble mulch tillage slightly increased soil water levels and wheat yields when compared to disk tillage. Stubble mulch tillage also helped control wind and water erosion.

No-tillage systems are the most extreme type of conservation tillage. However, these practices are gaining in popularity and have some definite advantages, including: the control of wind and water erosion; labor and energy savings; reduced tractor and equipment costs, and yields equal to or better than those achieved with conventional tillage systems.

Conservation tillage systems are more complex than conventional tillage systems and require a higher level of management. Start on a small scale at first to avoid problems—but do give it a try. We cannot afford to pass up the opportunity to conserve our land while increasing our profitability.

In the second game, Rotan was defeated by Roscoe 31-29 with two Rotan players each scoring 8 points in the loss. Lynette

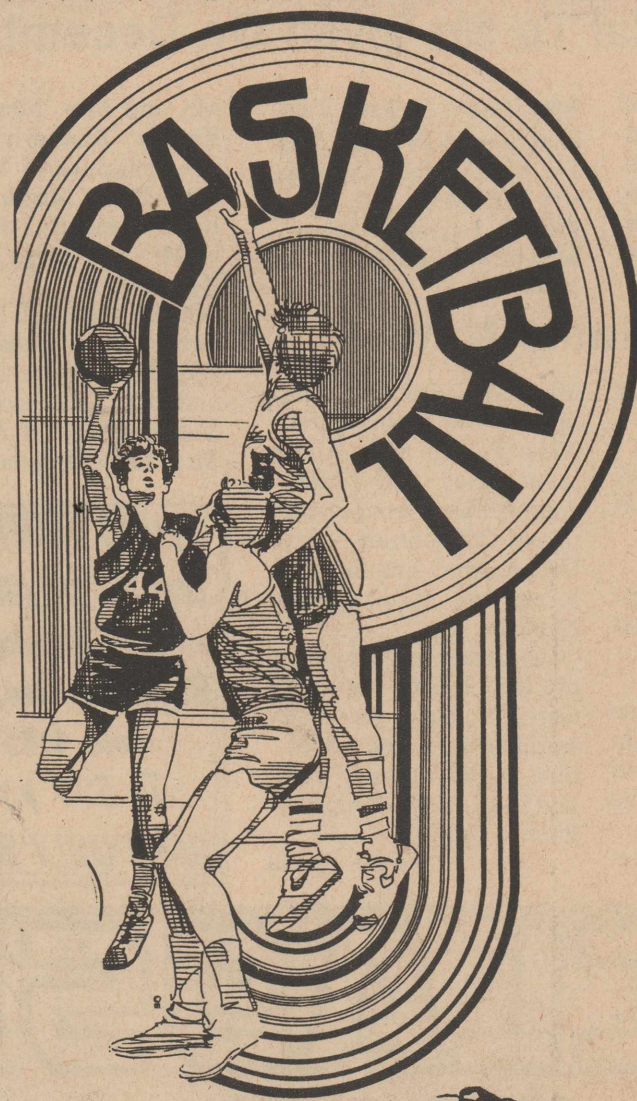

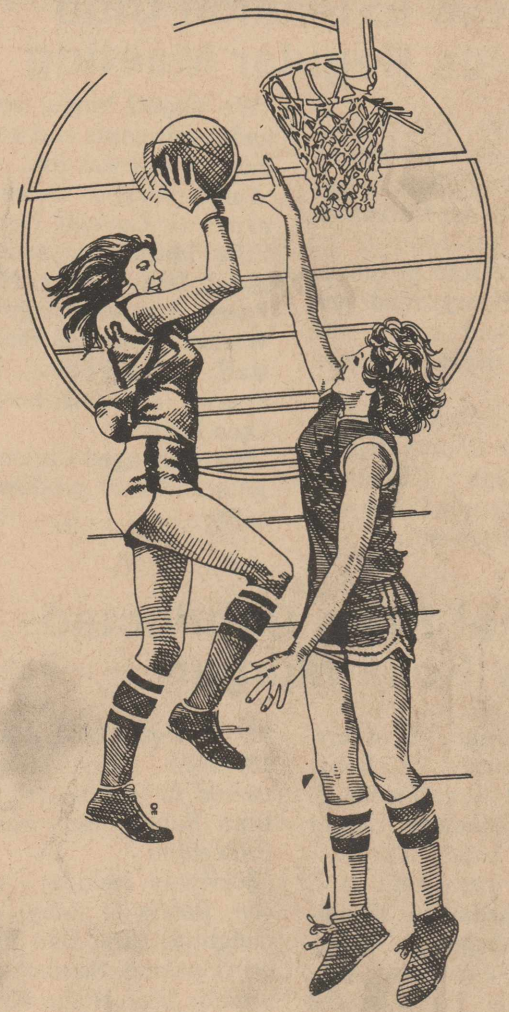

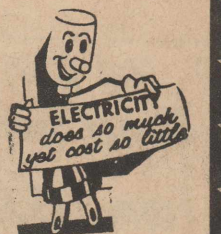

Tax Planning

WHAT'S NEW IN TAXES?

Have you been wondering lately what's happened to tax reform and all those promises of a fairer and simpler tax system? First we had the Treasury's proposal, then we had President Reagan's plan, and now the House is working on yet another version of tax reform.

It may be a situation of too many cooks spoiling the stew. As one official said, "It has become clear that whatever happens is not going to look much like tax reform." Special interest groups are lobbying to retain tax benefits for themselves, and politicians are making compromises in an effort to keep tax reform alive. The result so far is mainly a reshuffling of deductions and tax "loopholes" with no fundamental tax reform. Whether Congress or anyone else can still shape a plan that salvages basic reform remains to be seen. Estimates of a date for passage of new legislation vary from before year-end to mid-1986.

However, one bit of good news comes from a provision in the 1981 Tax Act which took effect in 1985. This provision "indexes" tax brackets and exemption amounts, keying them to the consumer price index. Because the CPI showed a 3.7% increase in 1985, 1986 tax brackets and the personal tax exemption will be increased by the same amount.

preventing inflation from nudging taxpayers into higher brackets.

This inflation adjustment will give the average four-person family earning \$20,000 a year a \$32 dollar tax cut in 1986; that average family earning \$50,000 will get a \$146 tax cut. Singles with \$20,000 income will see a \$25 tax cut; those with a \$50,000 income will have a \$190 tax cut.

The bad news is that the social security tax increases in 1986. The rate goes from 7.05% to 7.15%, and the wage base subject to tax increases from \$39,600 to \$42,000. A person earning \$42,000 or more will, therefore, pay an additional \$211 in social security tax in 1986.

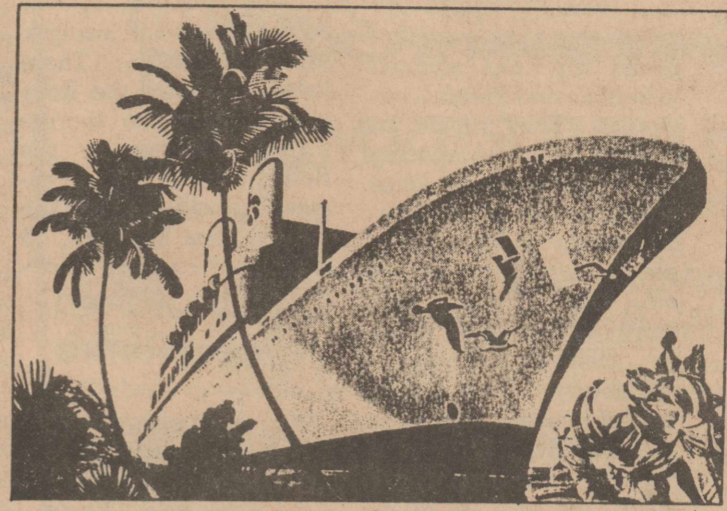

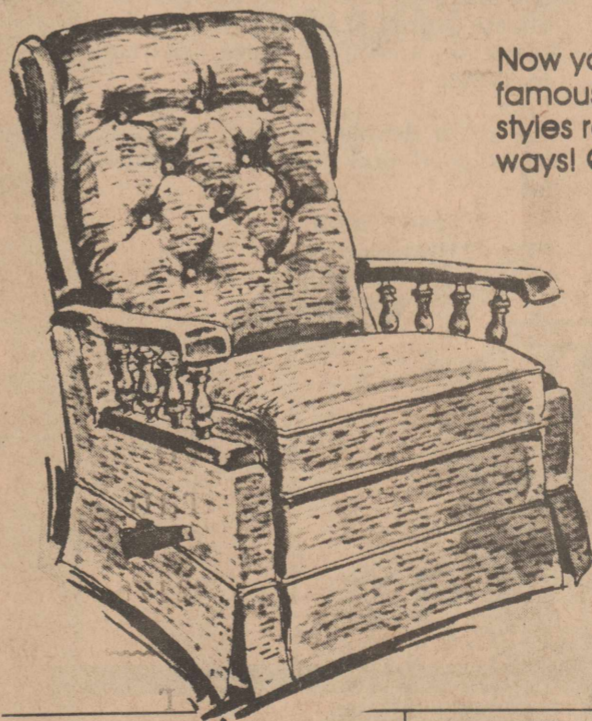

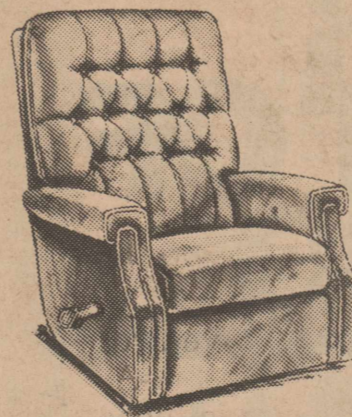

County Agent News

By Richard Spencer

Greenbug populations are moderate to heavy in a good many Fisher County wheat fields. There have been a good many ones wiped out by greenbugs over the county. Producers should be on the lookout for these pests and if the fields are not being grazed, they may need treatment.

Fall is considered the most ideal planting season for most ground covers, vines, shrubs and trees. The most critical aspect of any transplant effort is for the plant to re-establish an effective system of feeder roots before it is subjected to serve stress. By planting in the fall, new plants have several cool, leisure months during which to proliferate new feeder roots before the rigors of summer heat and drought set in. Research indicates that planting now will give plants almost a full growing season advantage over

planting next spring. Those fall planted materials are supposed to have enough root development by spring to be able to effectively use on early spring application of fertilizer for even faster growth. Choose tough low maintenance, pest-resistant plants that are adapted to local environmental conditions. They should be allowed adequate spacing and large growing trees should not be planted under power lines. Some plants to stay away from are Arizona ash, sycamore, cottonwood, poplar, fruitless mulberry, chinaberry, silver maple, tree of heaven, arborvitae and euonymus. When planting, dig generous holes, fill with an open, well-drained growing mix, and mulch the soil surface with 6-8 inches of dry grass clippings, leaves, straw or other organic material to moderate soil temperature. Water regularly throughout the fall and winter.

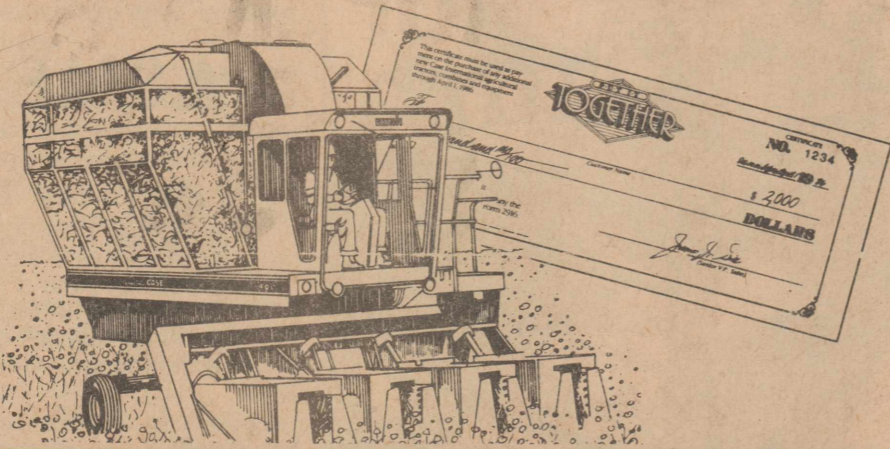

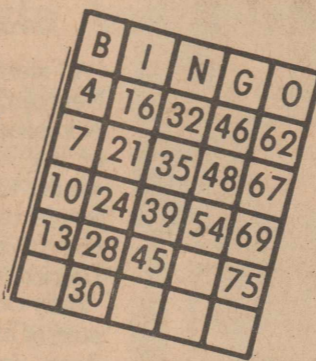
