No Changes Anticipated At Rotan Soil Conservation Office

The announcement in last Tuesday morning's Abilene Reporter News concerning the closing of the SCS office in Abilene didn't come as any surprise to Charlie Black, Rotan Soil Conservationist.

"The trend over the past few years has been

to close area offices and consolidate them with larger offices," said Black. The Nacogdoches office was closed in 1984, Brownwood closed last year and the announcement that Abilene was closing is probably the first of three or four more that

will be consolidated with larger area offices.

"We do not anticipate any office closing or reduction in the work force of the Rotan office," said Black. It is anticipated that the local SCS office will be placed into either the Lubbock or Big Spring area.

Commissioners Appoint Betty Carter As Election Judge

Fisher County Commissioners met last Monday for their regular monthly meeting and as part of the business conducted, appointed Betty Carter of Rotan to replace Leonard Cleveland as election judge of Voting Box 1a. In addition to honoring the request from Leonard Cleveland that he be replaced, they moved the future voting box location from the Rotan City Hall to the Rotan Fire Station. This move was initiated in order to comply with an order that the location be accessible to elderly and handicapped

voters. Commissioner Billy Henderson made a motion seconded by Commissioner Jimmy Wright outlining that future utility lines laid across county roads be at least 30 inches below the lowest part of the bar ditch.

The final order officially passed by the court involved granting the Fisher County Senior Citizens Center \$700 toward the purchase of a lawn mower. The remaining portion of the cost of the mower is to be raised by the senior citizens in the form of donations.

Rotan Pool Will Open Soon

The Rotan pool painting was finished last Tuesday in preparation for the opening of the 1986 season. Rotan City Secretary Kenneth Vann indicated that the pool will probably open

on Tuesday, June 17th. "We have finished the painting, will backwash, re-scrub the pool area and treat the water before the opening," said Vann.

County Agent Report

33 Fisher County 4-H members will be competing at State 4-H Roundup this week in College Station. Wish these 4-H'ers luck at their state contest.

Cotton farmers are anxious to get into their fields to finish planting. As has been stated many times, the weather changes in West Texas.

Who would have thought we would have gotten this much rain in June after being dry so long.

Cattle grubs are a problem in all Texas counties. Now through July is the time to treat cattle for these pests. The cattle improve in performance after these pests are controlled.

There are many materials available that are easily applied for controlling cattle grubs.

Beef cattle producers should cull their open cows each year. Production costs have become so high, producers can no longer afford to keep open cows. The salvage value of the open cows can be used for cash flow or replacement heifer costs.

News On Commodity Certificate Holders From U.S. Department Of Agriculture

U.S. Department of Agriculture officials today reminded commodity certificate holders and warehousemen operating under a Uniform Grain Storage Agreement that disputes concerning commodities transferred from Commodity Credit Corporation inventory must be resolved between the certificate holder and the warehousemen.

The officials said warehousemen also should be aware that certain procedures permitted under the UGSA, such as an allowance for a protein tolerance when shipping CCC-owned wheat, do not apply to settlements between warehousemen and third parties who acquire CCC-owned commodities "in-store".

The officials said they are clarifying these provisions because of the expected large number of in-store transfers resulting from the use of commodity certificates in CCC programs.

Under procedures for exchanging commodity certificates for CCC-owned commodities, CCC will transfer the title of the commodity to a certificate holder at a CCC storage location. According to USDA officials, when the certificate holder takes physical possession of the commodity, any set-

lement regarding the quality or quantity delivered will be solely between the certificate holder and the warehousemen.

Annual Fort Griffin Fandangle To Be Held

As Texans celebrate the 150th anniversary of the founding of the state this year, the people of Albany, Texas will continue a 48 year tradition of celebrating the westward development of Texas with six performances of the Fort Griffin Fandangle.

The annual outdoor production, which was created in 1938 by Albany playwright Robert Nail, will be presented on June 19-21 and June 26-28 at the Prairie Theater located one mile west of Albany. Approximately 250 local residents join together each year to relate the story of the settling of the Clear Fork of the Brazos area through narration, song and dance.

Tickets for the six nightly performances can be reserved by calling the Fandangle's office, located in the depot building in Albany at 915-762-2525 or writing to: Fandangle, Box 185, Albany, Texas, 76430. Tickets range from \$3 to \$7 per seat and should be purchased or reserved in advance.

Fandangle executive secretary Patsy Rose stated that ticket sales, which opened to the public on June 2, are "brisk again this year." She suggested that ticket orders be placed as soon as possible in order to receive the best selection of seats. Discounts are available for groups of 20 or more people.

The 1986 version of the Fandangle will salute the State of Texas and the history woven into its colorful past in conjunction with the statewide celebration of the Sesquicentennial.

"The theme of this year's Fandangle will center on Texas and the settlement of this part

of Texas following the war for independence," said Marge Bray, Fandangle director.

Several new songs have been written by the show's musical director, Louann George, that tie the early day settlers in West Central Texas to the war for independence through their memories and stories told by their ancestors.

"We couldn't directly relate the show to the war with Mexico because it happened several years before settlers came to our area," said Mrs. Bray. "However, there will be scenes that will take the audience back to the events of the 1830's the struggle for independence through memories of the settlers that moved to the Fort Griffin area later."

"We have about 10,000 people who visit Albany each year during the Fandangle and we try to make their visit memorable through several other activities related to the Fandangle," said Donnie Lucas, publicity director. "We hope that our guests will come early and take part in the various activities going on during Fandangle season."

Stores and businesses in the downtown area are traditionally decorated with antiques and other items from the western frontier period. Several restored homes and buildings, most of which are well over 100 years old, are also open for to the public on performance days.

Visitors will be able to enjoy a western style barbecue meal catered by Joe Allen's Bar-B-Que of Abilene on the lawn of the historic Shackelford County Courthouse from 5:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. each perfor-

mance night. Tours of the courthouse, which still houses its original

courtroom, are available to the public during the evening.

U.S. Dept. Of Agriculture To Poll Wheat Producers

On June 18, the U.S. Department of Agriculture will begin to poll wheat producers to determine whether they favor the imposition of mandatory limits on wheat production, a USDA official announced today. The poll is required by the Food Security Act of 1985.

Richard W. Goldberg, acting under secretary

for international affairs, and commodity programs, said the poll is non-binding upon the Secretary of Agriculture and response by wheat producers is voluntary. Producers will be asked if they favor imposition of mandatory limits on production of wheat which will result in wheat prices that are not lower than 125 percent of the cost of production.

Each producer will be mailed a wheat poll ballot on June 18. Responses must be postmarked by July 7.

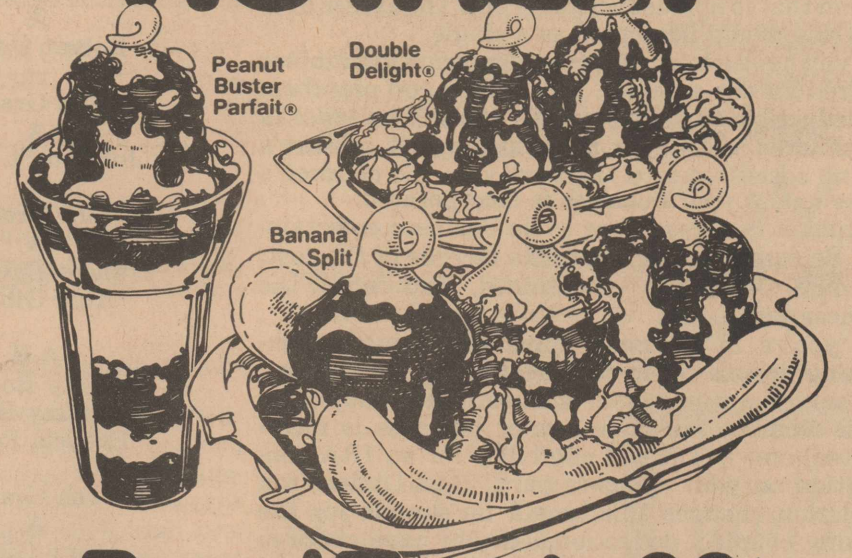
just not so. Each year the Fandangle uses new songs, new scripts and new cast members to tell its story.

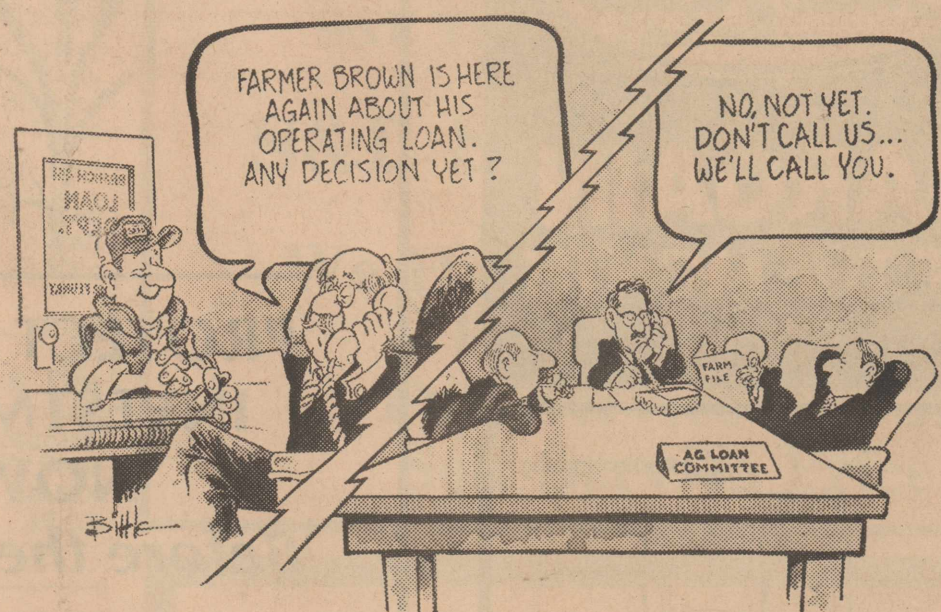

WARM WEATHER TAX TIPS

Summertime can be a great time for cutting taxes if you make the right moves. Consider these possibilities:

If you and your spouse work, the cost of sending your children to a summer camp may qualify for the child care credit. Specialized camps or educational camps don't qualify.

That summer clean-up around the house will probably produce outgrown clothing and household items you no longer want. Donate them to a charitable organization for a tax deductible contribution.

If you mix business with summer vacation travel, the business portion will be deductible. That includes your lodging, meals, transportation, and incidental expenses (such as tips) to the extent they are business-related. Taking your spouse along on a business trip isn't deductible unless his/her services or presence is business-related. However, the portion that is non-deductible is only the excess over what you would have paid as a single.

If you have a business, consider hiring your minor children for the summer. The wages you pay them are deductible to your business and will be taxes in the children's lower or zero tax bracket. There's also no social security tax to pay on the children's wages unless your business is incorporated.

Summer is a good time to do business entertaining. Be sure you keep complete records of the cost, the date, who was entertained, and what the business was.

If you're in business, consider having a non-working spouse fill in for vacationing employees. The salary you pay your spouse is not subject to social security tax (unless your business is incorporated) and will create eligibility for an IRA contribution on your spouse's part. Also, unless tax legislation changes this, you'll be eligible for the working couple's deduction. If you have children who require child care, you'll also be eligible for the child care credit.

State Capital Highlights

Capitol architects trying to put the recast Goddess of Liberty back on top of the Capitol have an easier task than the next wave of lawmakers who will balance the state budget.

The architects briefly tried using a Texas National Guard helicopter to lower the Goddess onto her post, but winds and wet weather aborted those attempts.

The day before, Texas House members convened in their Chamber for a special one-day meeting where Comptroller Bob Bullock warned them the budget deficit could hit as high as \$2 billion.

Bullock said slumps in construction, retail, and manufacturing industries have compounded the problems caused by low oil prices, and a rapid turnaround in oil prices won't solve the problem.

He suggested the way out is to broaden the tax base, which perhaps would allow a lower tax rate.

BROADENED SALES TAX

Bullock's news startled legislators, and in his speech he jabbed the cold, hard facts, including the reminder that some wouldn't be re-elected. Naturally, with Election Day just a few short months ahead, many favored cutting the budget to meet available revenues without a tax hike.

Some, like Texas Education Commissioner Bill Kirby, urged a tax increase to avoid loss of state services.

Kirby asked lawmakers not to retreat from the reforms which, along with growth in enrollment, are driving up the price of public education. His preference was to raise taxes and make no budget cuts in education.

BULLOCK, HOBBY

But look for budget cuts to be made everywhere, and for the sales tax base to be broadened when the

Legislature meets next January.

That's the path recommended at this point by both Bullock and Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, who together are probably the two figures most respected inside state government.

In fact, if all state officials took a detailed test on Texas government, Hobby and Bullock would be valedictorian and salutatorian, but who could say in what order?

Both have served some 16 years in office. Hobby controls the state budget while it's in the Legislature. Bullock controls it out in the real world. In the real world, Hobby is opposed for re-election; Bullock is not.

CLEMENTS' ALTERNATIVE

An alternative plan is pushed by former Gov. Bill Clements, a Republican, and his plan could pick up some voter support.

Clements is for cuts, not taxes. But he also wants to use dedicated funds, not taxes, to balance the budget after cuts are made.

His plan means changing state law to undedicate those funds, particularly for highways and education. While Hobby, a Democrat, hasn't commented on Clements' plan, he is thought to have no great love for dedicated funds.

PRISON CONSTRUCTION

An unusual plan to issue bonds for prison construction was approved last week by the Board of Corrections to help the state immediately build a prison without going into debt.

Texas Attorney General Jim Mattox must still approve the legality of the plan.

The new, non-profit Anderson County Development Corp. will issue \$78 million in bonds to build a prison on state land in Anderson County. The Legislature will decide next session to lease or purchase the prison.

The directors of the corporation are three county commissioners of Anderson County.

The procedure is modeled on the legal one for building state health facilities.

Mattox, by the way, revealed last week he is continuing to be harassed by an unknown source, the latest incidents being a dead cat someone left on his doorstep and veiled threats left on his answering machine.

Some months ago, two fires, both suspected acts of arson, broke out almost simultaneously in Mattox's state offices in Austin and Fort Worth.

Last week his home was picketed by a religious group opposed to state licensing of children's homes.
