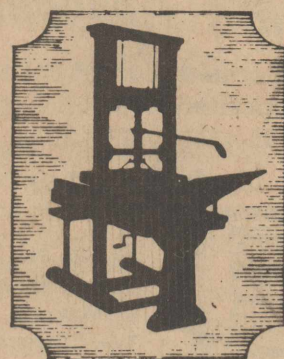

F.C. Commissioners Vote To Appoint Economic Development Commission

The Fisher County Commissioners voted last Monday to appoint a Fisher County Economic Development Commission, according to Fisher County Judge Marshal Ben-

nett. The commission, to be made up of between 12 and 15 members, will have the responsibility of trying to secure new businesses and industry for Fisher County.

Commissioners are to make individual recommendations of people they feel will be suited for the Fisher County Economic Development Commission at the August Commissioner's meeting.

In other action the Commissioners (1) ap-

proved the quarterly treasurer's report; (2) Approved a slate of election judges and locations-the only change was moving Precinct Box 1a to the Rotan Fire Hall and naming Betty Carter as election judge replacing Leonard Cleveland; (3) Commissioners acted on a request from Betty Helms asking that the spot at the Fisher County Airport leased by Charlie Joe Helms be

turned back. Commissioners in turn leased the spot to Robert Goodgame of far east Fisher County.

In final action the Commissioners approved a resolution concerning the expenditure of funds for the improvement of Texas highways. This resolution was sent to Texas United States representatives and Texas State Senators.

Drama Workshop Offered By WTC, Begins On July 28

A drama workshop for students who have completed grades 5, 6, and 7 has been scheduled by the Continuing Education department of Western Texas College starting July 28.

Classes will meet from 1-4 p.m., July 28-31 and Aug. 4-7.

Instruction in the workshop is designed to build theatre foundations in speech, movement, creative dramatics, improvisation and audition techniques.

A group performance entitled "Threatre Is"

will be performed at the conclusion of the workshop.

Directing the workshop will be Jim Rambo, assistant professor of speech and drama at WTC.

Students are to pre-register by calling the Continuing Education Office at 915-573-8511, extension 240, by July 24. Enrollment will be limited to 20 students. Fees for the workshop will be \$35 per person and are to be paid when students register at 12:45 p.m. on July 28.

The Rotan-Roby Little League participated in the double elimination tournament held recently. They played Hamlin and came away victorious with a win of 11-9. Rotan was down 9-4 going into the 5th inning. They scored 3 in the 6th and 4 in the 6th to pull out the win. Fisher County artists are invited to exhibit their paintings in the Womens Division at the Fair, which will be held August 28th, 29th and 30th in Roby. Luella Waddell, chairman of the art division, states this is the fifth year to

have an art exhibit, and it was proved to be a popular addition to the Womens Division.

Classes in oil, water color, chalk, tole, pen and ink and decorative painting may be entered. Entries will be accepted all day

Wednesday, August 27th, with an entry fee of \$1.00 per painting. Paintings will be judged by an accredited art judge, with ribbons being given to first, second and third places. Complete information will be published at a later date.

Another Fuel Cost Refund

West Texas Utilities Company's retail customers will receive another fuel cost refund and a significant decrease in their future electric bills if a request filed Tuesday in Austin is approved by the Public Utility Commission of Texas.

WTU is asking permission to refund a total of \$5.7 million in retail revenues collected in excess of actual fuel costs, and to lower its fuel charge rate for the months of September, October and November. The total refund includes \$5,425,372 in actual fuel cost savings which have accumulated from March through June, plus \$306,511 in interest.

This would be the third time for WTU to make a refund and to lower its fuel cost factor since its last rate increase in November, 1984. Over \$17.6 million was refunded in August 1985, and \$9.3 million was refunded in May 1986.

"This is not an acutal rate case filing," WTU President Glen Churchill explained. "It is an adjustment possible because the price of our boiler fuel has been declining. Any savings

we can make on fuel cost is passed on to our customer as soon as permitted."

The due amounts on customer bills include both fuel costs and base rates. Utility companies are not allowed to make money on fuel. WTU has had no change in its base rates since 1984.

If a reduction in fuel rates, technically known as the Interim Quarterly Fixed Fuel Factors, if approved, WTU officials estimate the fuel cost charges to its customers will drop by 24 percent, or \$7.9 million, during the three-month period beginning in September.

After the state's Public Utility Regulatory Act was amended in 1983 the PUC ordered the use of the fixed fuel factors and their use was recently re-adopted in an emergency fuel rule. Previously, an automatic fuel adjustment matched fuel billings to fuel expense each month. These immediate adjustments prevented over-recoveries of fuel costs and made refunds unnecessary.

Under WTU's proposal, all existing retail customers would receive refunds through one-time credits to their bills in the billing month of September. A typical residential customer would receive about \$11.

Natural gas is the principal fuel for all of WTU's eight major power generating stations. In recent years, fuel costs have amounted to more than half of the company's total operating costs, but have dropped from all-time high of \$3.18 per million BTU in 1983 to \$1.88 in June, 1986.

Q. How much money is WTU planning to refund?

A. Fuel cost savings available for refunding amounts to \$5.4 million.

With interest added, the total is \$5.7 million.

Q. How is the interest calculated?

A. In accordance with rules of the Public Utility Commission, interest was calculated at a rate of 13.08%, the cost of capital approved in the Company's last general rate filing.

Q. How much refund can the typical residential customer expect?

A. \$11.

Q. How will refunds be calculated and made?

A. WTU will comply with the refund provisions of the Commission's new emergency fuel rule. The total refund will be allocated to each rate schedule based upon that schedule's kilowatt-hour usage for the period in which the over-recovery occurred. Once the refund is allocated to each rate schedule (class) the refund amount is divided by the projected kilowatt-hour usage for that class during the month of refund to develop a refund factor which will be applied to individual customers' usage billed in the refund month. There are twenty-three (23) rate schedule classes.

Q. When did the Commission adopt the new fuel rule?

A. The Commission's new fuel rule was adopted on an emergency basis on February 21, 1986. It has not yet been permanently adopted.

Q. When will the emergency rule become permanent?

The Commission extended this emergency rule until August 20, 1986, but has set a July 18 hearing to permanently adopt a rule.

Rotan School Board Hires Milton Jensen, Math Major

The members of the Rotan School Board hired two teachers at their meeting on Friday night, July 11th, according to Superintendent Alton Field.

The board hired Milton Jensen, a native of Avoca, Texas, and educator with 17 years teaching experience. Jensen has taught in public schools for 15 years and comes to Rotan from Gorman, Texas. He has two years of teaching at the college level. He is a graduate of Texas Lutheran College and has done graduate work at Tarleton State University. He is a math major.

The board also hired Christine Cottle. She has a master of arts in Spanish and received her masters degrees from the University of Texas at El Paso. She has taught English at Sacred Heart in Yokohama, Japan and taught Spanish at the University of El Paso. She is 37 years and has two children. A 16 year

old son and 14 year old daughter.

In other action, the board adopted the student handbook as presented, adopted a change in the discipline management plan and

accepted the resignation of Dr. Don Bryan as Rotan Primary Principal.

Board members tabled the bids on the construction of a track facility.

Success Seminars For Freshman Hosted By WTC

Western Texas College will host the second of three Summer Success Seminars for incoming freshmen on July 17.

The Seminars are planned for students who will be enrolling at WTC for the first time as full-time freshmen. Students will have the opportunity to meet with counselors to plan their schedule and to pre-register for the fall semester starting Sept. 4. Fees do not have to be paid at pre-registration but will be billed in August instead.

Parents are encouraged to accompany their student to the Seminars. Students and their

parents will be guests of the college for a noon meal.

The final Summer Seminar is scheduled on Aug. 5.

Students planning to attend either seminar are to make reservations by calling the Admissions Office at 915-573-8511, extension 394, as quickly as possible so arrangements for the meal and other programs can be completed. There is no charge for attending the Seminars but students who need to take the Asset test before registering will pay a \$5 fee. Starting time for both Seminars is 8:30 a.m.

Local students awarded this honor for 1986

include: Jerry Carter, Julie McQueen and Lynette McQueen.

As members, these students will have the opportunity to compete for college scholarships through the Society's National Awards Program. This scholarship program, now in its seventeenth year, is funded by 140 colleges and universities across the nation. To preserve the honor, these members' names and their accomplishments will be listed in the Society's 1986 Membership Registry.

Jan Posey returned to Rotan July 2 following a 2 week trip to Washington D.C., to attend Citi-

zenship-Washington Focus-a citizenship and leadership training program at the National

4-H Center. Jan was among 47 4-H members from Texas and 681 from 9 other states who

participated in the program.

Citizenship-Washington Focus is designed to help young people understand their rights and responsibilities as citizens and increase appreciation of the American heritage. Throughout the weeks the teenage participants took field trips to historical and cultural sites, visited federal agencies and community organizations and learned about government procedures. On Wednesday, June 25, they spent the day on Capitol Hill to get a close-up view of the political process and to meet with members of Congress. They visited Charles Stenholm and sat in on a couple of hours of discussion on Contra-Aid in the House. They also visited the Supreme

Court and were given a tour of the Capitol and Library of Congress.

In workshop sessions at the National 4-H Center, the young people learned and practiced leadership skills, discussed and debated legislative issues and policies, proposed possible solutions to domestic and international concerns, and held simulated congressional hearings and county council meetings. They also developed a plan to incorporate what they learned into ongoing 4-H programs in their home communities.

They learned how to speak on their feet without preparation and how to teach and encourage others to do so. They learned how to present a proposal before a committee and lobby to have it accepted. They learned what it took to become an American citizen and went thru all procedures as if it was them.

Jan believes one of the best parts of her experience was being able to share ideas with other 4-H members from across the country. They were given new ideas on projects to do in their own community. They also were given the chance to hear about other lifestyles.

Jan also enjoyed seeing the sites of

Washington D.C. Probably her favorite part was being given the honor of representing not only Texas, but 4 4-H'ers who placed the 4-H wreath on the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

Citizenship-Washington Focus is arranged by National 4-H Council in support of the 4-H program of the Cooperative-Extension system of the state land-grant universities and the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

CREDITORS' AGREEMENT

Many small businesses have cash flow problems. If the cash shortage is excessive and the condition continues for a long time, the creditors could create a squeeze that brings about the failure of the company.

If you are unable to pay your creditors on time, at least keep in touch with them. If you extend credit to your customers, you know what it's like to send monthly statements and get no response. Put yourself in your creditors' shoes. Most business people are willing to lend a helping hand to their customers if they think they're being treated fairly.

If you can see a future for your company and want your creditors to give you some breathing room, consider using a creditors' agreement.

Most unsecured creditors realize that if your company fails, they will receive little or nothing on their account. If all the creditors agree to forestall any formal collection procedures for a year or two, your company might get back on its feet. The unsecured creditors have a choice of forcing collection now and receiving nothing, or agreeing to wait and perhaps getting partial or total payment.

If all unsecured creditors are treated equally in terms of future partial payments, you should find them willing to participate in an agreement.

Your secured creditors, such as the mortgage holder on your building, may be less patient since they have specific assets which they can sell to satisfy your obligation to them. If you have an agreement from your unsecured creditors to postpone formal collection procedures, you may find your secured creditors willing to go along with your plan.

Some dying companies do not warrant the time and effort it takes to secure this agreement. Meet with your business advisors to determine your best course of action.

Maria Garcia, 72, longtime Fisher County resident, died at 6 a.m. Sunday, July 13th at Rice Springs Care Home in Haskell. Burial was in the Hobbs Cemetery under the direction of Weathersbee Funeral Home.

Mrs. Garcia was born October 29, 1913 in Uvalde, Texas. She moved to Fisher County as a child with her parents, the late Rosalio and Rafelita Salais. She married Madaleno Garcia, April 17, 1931 at Roby. Mr. Garcia died December 19, 1975.

Mrs. Garcia was a member of the Catholic Church and made her home in Haskell for the past year.

State Capital Highlights

State Comptroller Bob Bullock and U.S. Rep. Jack Brooks of Beaumont-two of the toughest office holders anywhere-have teamed up on a move which could bring Texas a quick \$100 million a year to apply to the state's budget problems.

That's how much sales tax money Texas would get if Congress passes Brooks' bill-H.R. 5021--to require national mail order firms to collect and remit state sales taxes. "These big firms are doing \$3 billion a year in Texas business at the expense of the local merchants of Texas," Bullock said.

Congressional backers of Brooks' bill say that they need evidence of widespread public support in order to move the legislation--and that's where Bullock comes in.

He is leaving no stone unturned in prodding the merchants of Main Street to write their congressman. He is blitzing the state with a letter writing campaign, with an advertising campaign paid for by local merchants, with television spots and by working with trade associations.

Bullock, convinced that Texans congressmen aren't the only ones who need to be convinced, said he is

"taking a page from the mail order folks' own book by sending blueprints and examples of the Texas campaign to supporters in all other states."

"I am also trying to convince the White House to get behind the bill as a tradeoff in giving the states some \$1 billion in new sales tax revenue to replace programs the President wants to cut from the federal budget," Bullock explained.

SALARY INCREASES

Clements, asked where spending should be cut, sidestepped by saying that wasn't his job, but he recommended again charging all agencies, commissions and departments to prioritize and cut their own budgets.

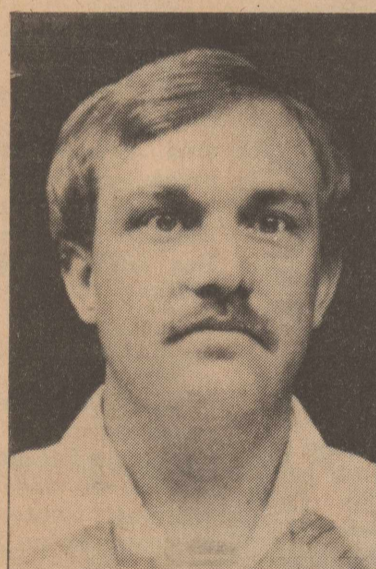

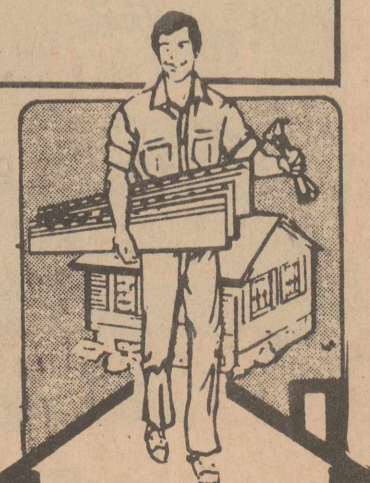

County Agent News

By watering, fertilizing and mowing your lawn properly, you can reduce your water bill as much as 40 percent during the summer months. Conservation by the homeowner provides the only solution of high water bills and excessive water demands during our hot and usually dry Texas summers. In small towns where industrial demand for water is low, lawn watering may account for as much as half of all the water used during the summer months. Even in large cities, lawns get 30 to 40 percent of all water supplied by large cities. Lawns need about 2 inches of water per week during the summer and this mostly has been irrigation. Water only when your lawn shows stress by discoloration and wilting, water to a depth of 4-6 inches, don't use excessive nitrogen, and cut your grass at a higher mower setting.

Spider mites are tiny but they can cause big problems in gardens and lawns.

These pests prefer tomatoes, beans and peas and do most of their damage in hot, dry weather.

Spider mites, also called red spiders, are only 1/60-inch in length and vary in color from white to green to red.

The tiny pests can build up quickly and

completely engulf plants. They lay eggs on the underside of leaves, which hatch in four to five days. A complete life cycle takes three weeks, and as many as 20 overlapping generations can occur in a single year.

Mites spin a thin web which often can be seen on the underside of an infested leaf. They feed by inserting their mouth-parts into the tissue and sucking juice from the plant. While feeding, they inject toxic substances into the plant.

Infestations of spider mites can be identified by tiny white spots on the underside of a leaf. Heavy infestations cause bleaching or yellowing, first along the main leaf veins and then throughout the

plant. The plant may also shed buds and small fruit. Spider mites can completely defoliate a plant if not controlled.

Control of spider mites is often difficult and requires from two to four applications of insecticide at five-day intervals. Plants should be checked frequently for spider mites since

the pests can build up rapidly.

Insecticides registered for controlling spider mites in gardens are diazinon, kelthane, malathion, ethion, and sulfur. However, avoid using sulphur on vine plants as severe plant change could occur.

As always, read and follow label directions on all insecticides.
