### Juan Trejo Pleads Guilty To Voluntary Manslaughter

Juan Trejo, Jr., age 25 of Rotan, indicted last March for the murder of Jimmy Armendariz, age 45 of Rotan, pled guilty last Friday to voluntary manslaughter in Judge Weldon Kirk's 32nd District Court.

Trejo was indicted for alledgedly emptying three rounds of ammunition from a .25 caliber pistol into the chest of Armendariz.

The incident took place at approximately

9:20 p.m. Tuesday, March 18th at the Trejo home in the 600 block of East Burnside Street in

Trejo pled guilty to voluntary manslaughter on October 24th and received 10 years in the Texas Department of Corrections (probated), was fined \$2,500 plus court costs and other probation fees.

## All Gin Managers Set For Lower Bale Count gin in "a couple of After surveying the

Fisher County cotton gin managers earlier this week, it appears that most are anticipating a much lighter crop this season. Of the seven Fisher County gins, five were contacted last Tuesday.

Dave Williams,

manager of the Farmers Gin at Rotan for the past three years, is anticipating ginning approximately 2,500 bales this season which is down from the 6,390 bales last season.

Terry, Kirmet manager of Terry's Gin at Roby hopes to be ginning by the 15th or 20th of November and anticipated a final bale count for the season of 3,500 which is down from 9,000 last season. In the off season, Terry Gin has installed an new UD press.

Helms, Danny manager of the Hobbs Gin for the past 5 years, hopes to be open and operating within a month or six weeks. Last season the Hobbs Gin had a total bale count of 6,300 and this year Helms hopes to finish the season with 3,000 bales.

## County Veterans Eligible For New Veteran Land Programs

The Texas Veterans Land Board made permanent a dramatic increase in benefits for Veterans, benefits that will expand from \$20,000 to \$55,000 said Garry Mauro, Chairman of the Texas Veterans Land

Board. 'By adopting these recommendations, the number of state benefits for Texas Veterans has

been permanently tripled," Mauro said. "Because the programs are financed through the sale of federal tax exempt general obligation bonds, it doesn't cost Texas taxpayers a

single penny. In unanimous action Tuesday, the Texas Veterans Land Board agreed to make permanent a four-month trial

program that broadens guidelines to allow qualified Texas Veterans to use all three--rather than only one--of the Texas Veterans benefit pro-

"This will allow Texas Veterans to participate in all three Texas Veterans programs, greatly increasing the state benefits now available to Texas

Veterans," Mauro said. 'What this means is Texas Veterans can now get a \$20,000 loan to buy a house AND get a \$20,000 loan to buy

land AND get a \$15,000 home improvement loan to make repairs to their residence," Mauro said. "Let me urge all Texas Veterans who've always wanted to use more than one of our fine programs

to act now to take advantage of our low interest rates.'

In the past, Texas Veterans were limited to only one loan with the Texas Veterans Land "Now, after Board. overwhelming acceptance of the public and our Texas Veterans over the four-month trial period," Mauro said, "the board gave unanimous approval to

the expansion of benefits.

A Texas Veteran who has already received one loan will now be eligible to apply for a loan from one or both of the remaining programs as well. For example, a Veteran who had already received a Texas Veterans land loan could now apply for a Texas Veterans housing or

home improvement

-- The Texas Veterans Land Program offers eligible Texas Veterans a \$20,000 loan at 8.75 percent to purchase a minimum of five acres.

-- The Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program offers eligible Texas Veterans a \$20,000 loan at 9 percent to apply to the purchase of a home.

-- The Texas Veterans Home Improvement Program, the newest benefit program, makes available up to \$15,000 at 11.5 percent to make substantial repairs to a Veteran's residence.

For a safe costume: \*Make each costume short enough so the child won't trip when going up and down

\*Use bring colors or big patches of white to

give good visibility. \*Use fire retardent fabric or treat material with a chemical fireretardent. \*When making masks or hoods, allow large enough holes to assure easy breathing and good

> makeup or face paints instead of a mask. \*If face paints are used, make sure they are designed for this purpose, are nonpoisonous,

and wash off easily.

\*Prevent fires by using small flashlightsnot candles--to light

jack-o-laterns. \*Do your trick-or-treating before dark, especially if you have young children, and go with them. Set a curfew for older children and enforce it.

\*Instruct children to stay in their own neighhoods and to call only on people they know and trust.

\*Remind children to use sidewalks rather

than cutting through yards and vacant lots to prevent tripping over

objects. \*Give each child a flashlight and remind them not to shine them into anyone's eyes,





**Tax Planning** By Gerald Rodgers CPA



YOU DO FINANCIAL PLANNING

Everyone does financial planning. Some people do their own planning quite well; others need assistance.

Financial planning is more than just paying your bills on time and keeping an accurate checkbook. At least annually you should prepare two schedules. Both are easy to do and, if done once a year, will provide you with very valuable information on where your money is coming from, where it's going, and how you're doing on saving for retirement.

It's difficult to discuss financial affairs without some financial terminology, but don't be intimidated by any of the terms. The first thing you need is a balance sheet, a listing of all of your assets and debts. The difference between the two is your net worth. When valuing your assets, be realistic. Put down the amount you ald expect to receive if you sold the asset in a re sonably short period of time, not what you paid for the property and not what you would like to sell it for.

The next schedule you need is a cash flow statement. This is a listing of all the sources of cash to be received during the year as well as a list of all of the disbursements you expect to make. This may be more meaningful if it's done on a month-by-month basis for the next twelve-month period. The difference between your total cash receipts and your anticipated disbursements represents your cash flow. It can be either positive or negative. If you have negative cash flow on a consistent basis, you should review your overall investing and spending program.

These two simple schedules give you your starting point (your net worth) and an indication of your ability to accumulate additional assets through investing surplus



## County Agent Report

By Richard Spencer

Fall fertilization of lawns promotes early spring green-up. dense, vigorous turf produced by proper fertilization also keeps winter weeds down. A complete fertilizer with a 3-1-2 or 4-1-2 ratio of nitrogen, phophorous and potash is recommended at the rate of 1 to 2 pounds of nitrogen per 1000 square feet. Herbicides may be used for winter weeds but I do not recommend them

if the lawn has any trees or shrubs. I have seen too many killed from herbicides. If lawns are continued to be mowed now, a 2-3 inch high turf should be left to prevent winterkill.

tinople during the mid to late 1500's. The name tulip reflects also its area of origin, since it is derived from the persian word "turban" which the inverted flower resembles. The tulip is a member of the lily family and is represented by approx-imately one hundred species, although few are found out side of

bontanical gardens.
At one time the tulip was considered completely unadaptable to Deep South gardens; however, research has proven that with proper treatment and variety selection, tulips may be just as spectacular in Texas as they are in more northern states.

Gardners of the South must substitute a bit of artificial cold, or chilling for the bulbs, prior to planting to compensate for our rather mild winters. To achieve long, graceful stems and successful blooms, the colorful tulip demands a prior chilling of the bulbs in the vegetable bin of your refrigerator for 45 to 60 days prior to planting.

Plant the bulbs immediately upon removal from cold storage in late November or December. The gardner must obtain desired bulbs early to allow time for proper cold treatment. The tulip bulbs must remain dry in storage and pro-

tected from freezing. There are numerous tulip types and varieties providing the gardner with a wide variation of times of bloom, types of bloom, sizes, and colors.

Every election year has its one campaign promise which stands out from the others, in some cases remaining long enough in voter memory to come back and haunt the promiser.

The big '86 election campaign promise may have occurred last week when former Gov. Bill Clements vowed to seek a rollback on the tax increases passed by his opponent, incumbent Gov. Mark White.

That's going to be a tough order to fill, as he knows, but he promised to try anyway. He'll need a lot of help from the Legislature and Comptroller Bullock.

"Whether we can in fact roll back taxes from where they are, or the fees that have been established under Mark White, I don't know and we'll have to explore,' he said.

Clements, leading in polls early on, firmly and intentionally locked himself into a "stop state spending" position. You could almost hear the "click of engaged gears."

ATTACKS TEMPORARY

Clements wants to stonewall taxes and spending as part of his program to rebuild business confidence in Texas government.

White continued to criticize Clements for intending to cut education, highways and human services, and the Democrats added Clements' new position to the campaign blast-

For the most part, Clements won't say what and where he will cut, but last week he campaign, probably said the Legislature should not renew the 11/8 cent temporary sales tax it just passed in special session.

Comptroller Bob have something, negative or positive, to say about that when he issues his budget estimates next year.

And legislators, who just endured the bloodletting of two painful special sessions to pass the tax, regard the issue as more than campaigning fodder.

Changing cumstances could make



a rollback easy, but that's not in the forecast. Clements' rollback vow could be the opening shot in a political battle which could dominate what remains of the '80s.

In contrast, the Texas Agriculture Department wants to meet the future by spending more state money to develop and market new crops for

Last Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower's staff prepared to launch their push to facelift a sagging farm sector with new crops, including exotics.

Their report lists vineyards, catfish farming, crambe (a lubricant) and kenaf (a fibrous plant used in making paper) among the crops of the future.

The report aims to pursuade the Legislature to establish a \$425 million loan fund to market the products.

Kenaf, a native African plant, is like cotton and is going from the experimental to the production stage in South Texas, where a kenaf paper mill is scheduled for construction next year with state loan assistance.

The FBI is also expected to re-interview some members of both Clements and White

after the election.

The chairman of the national Democratic Party reversed his statement that the party's convention might not be held in Houston if Mark White was not reelected.

In an update, chairman Paul Kirk said Houston is the top contender for the 1988 national convention, whatever the results.

"Comptroller Bob Bullock said it best when he pointed out the deficit in state government was not caused by excessive spending. There was no way...to

know the Arabs would pull the plug."

Slagle cited statistics which show state spending actually increased faster under Clements than it did under White. "In Clements administration, spending increased 57% and he did nothing with the windfall, revenues from the oil booom--no investments in education, water, or highways,' said Slagle. Slagle made it clear that the oil price decline, the farm crisis, record trade deficits in agriculture and other industries, and cutbacks from Gramm-Rudman have caused the state budget crisis. "Mark White is not an Arab and does not make federal trade policy," Slagle noted. "He's a Texas Baptist who has done a good job in a very tough situation. It's shameful for the Republican administration to send all these guys down there to blame our woes on Mark White. They are the ones who are supposed to be working in Washington to solve federal and international problems like energy policy, farm policy, and trade policy. ## Impact Of Federal Immigration Reform Law May Take Years To Measure

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday said the economic impact on Texas of the federal immigration reform law may take years to measure.

"There's going to be little effect on the state's finances or the Texas economy in the short run and there's simply no concrete evidence to predict an impact for the long-term picture," Bullock said.

Bullock said his office has calculated that as many as 600,000 of the one million estimated illegal aliens in Texas might be eligible to apply for American citizenship under the new law.

But, he said that strict enforcement sanctions against employers of illegal aliens called for the immigration bill might dry up a source of cheap labor for many Texas businesses and in-

"For the most part, illegal aliens in Texas are paying virtually all the same taxes--sales taxes, gasoline taxes and excise taxes--as you and me," he said, "and if they become permanent citizens we aren't going to see a big jump in state revenue."

Bullock said that the federal government will make \$220 million in federal impact payments over the next five years to help the state adjust for aliens use of

public services if they become citizens.

"I'm not sure that amount of money is really going to take up the slack, but still there is no evidence to say that the impact is as severe as some officials suggest."






