Russell Kruetzman and other Doane representatives will deliver the survey here Sept. 17 at the high school auditorium.

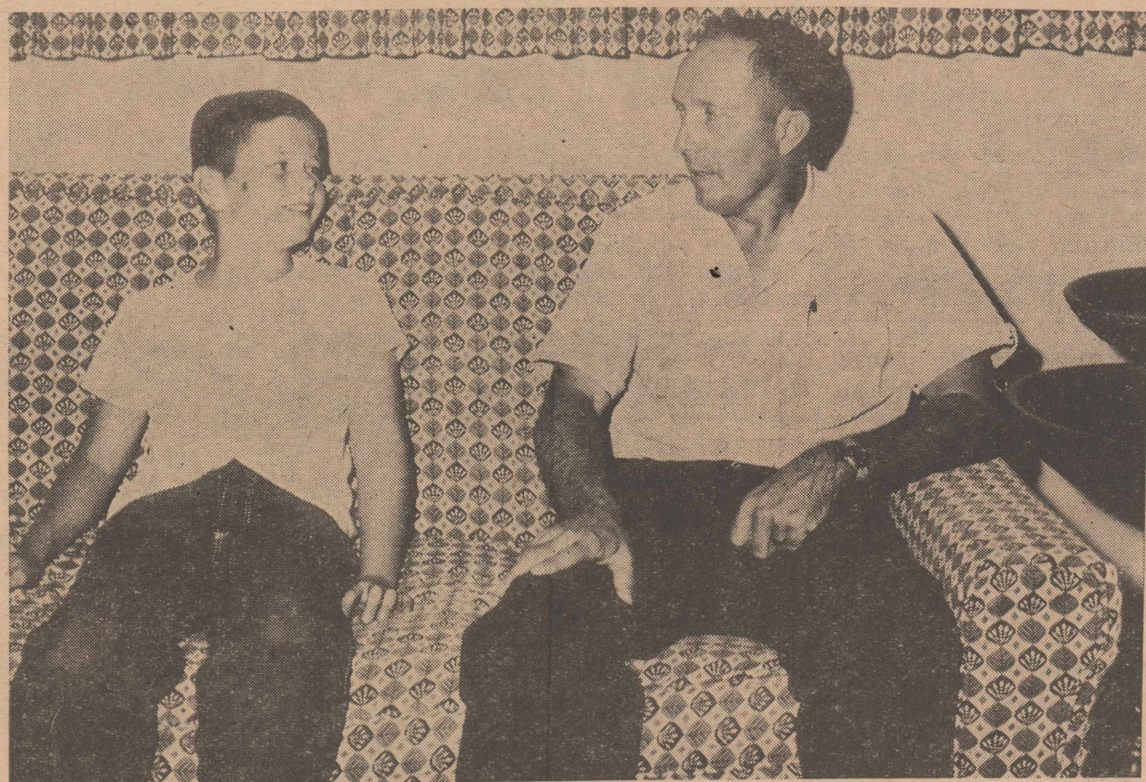
## Olton Survey Pattern For Canada Area

Doane recently received a request from a community in Canada for an agricultural development report.

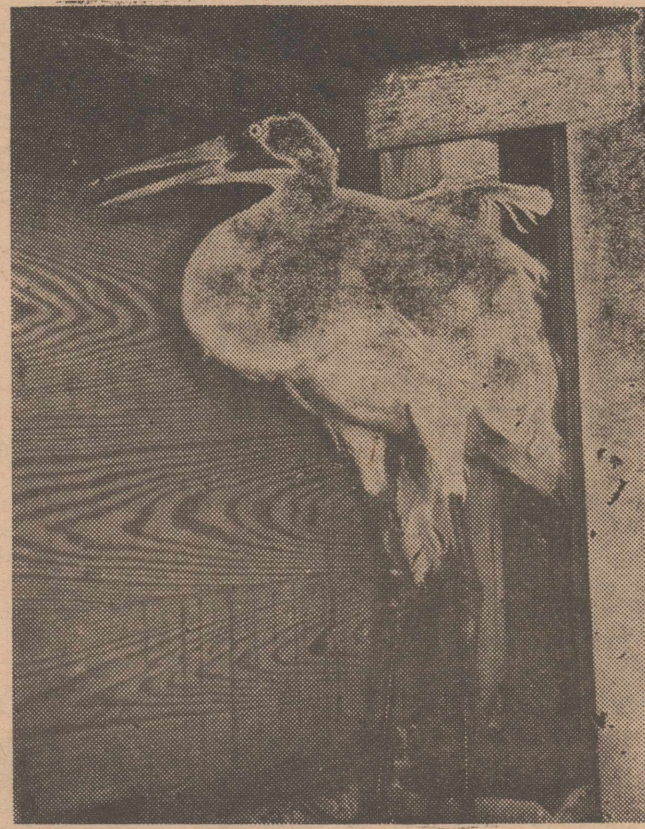
The report on Olton will be used as a model in the Canadian community.

# Whooping Crane Reports Set Off Search By Wildlife Men

## Southwest Game Experts Agog After Big White Bird Sighted

Members of an Olton family thought they saw a whooping crane near here early Monday and their report had Southwest wildlife specialists agog for two days.

Mrs. Mardema Ogletree and her three children, Judy, Vicki and Mike, saw a large white bird circling their home a mile and a half west of here about 8 o'clock Monday morning.

Mrs. Ogletree operates a book store here in Olton and has more than a passing knowledge of wildlife. Markings on the white bird aroused her curiosity and excited her.

She immediately began a search of books on migratory birds and tended to confirm her suspicion that the large fowl she had sighted might be one of the rare whoopers.

### Almost Extinct

Whooping cranes are almost extinct, there being an estimated 31 to 38 in existence. As such they are protected jealously by the federal wildlife service. Planes are even dispatched to follow the big birds from their nesting place on the Great Slave Lake in Canada to their winter home at Aransas National Wildlife Refuge on the Texas Gulf Coast near Corpus Christi.

Mrs. Ogletree notified the Enterprise of her sighting. The Enterprise immediately called John DeGani with the wildlife service in Fort Worth.

Set Off Search It was Mr. DeGani who set off the search. Pat Donley, state game warden from Littlefield, was first to arrive in Olton to hear Mrs. Ogletree's story.

A few hours later Don Kriebel, with the US Wildlife Service of Lubbock, arrived in Olton.

The Ogletrees told their story to the two wildlife experts. Mrs. Ogletree said they spotted the bird circling their home about 8 o'clock. The fowl was emitting a "beeping" cry as if in distress.

"I thought he might be a young one (whooping crane) and lost," Mrs. Ogletree reported. "It sounded like it was lost."

Mrs. Ogletree said the bird appeared to have landed some distance from the house and the family dog pursued it.

"It went back into the air," she declared, "and flew over to a corn field."

White Bird Mrs. Ogletree said the bird was white with black wing tips and flamingo coloring about the neck. She said it held its neck and legs outstretched in flight after the manner of cranes. Local lakes now are teeming with American Bitterns or herons but their flight

## Olton Harvesting First Bean Crop

Olton's bean harvest was in full swing this week.

Allen Johnston, who operates J-P Bean Company's \$30,000 bean processing plant in west Olton, said his firm has processed more than a half million pounds of beans since the weekend.

That firm is running day and night as the pinto crop pours in. The other bean processing firm here is operated by James Cowart and Johnny Hodges. It is located north of Olton at the Cowart farm.

Johnston said Arrow Foods of Dallas bought three truck loads of Olton pintos Wednesday night. "And they really liked them," he declared.

Johnston said cleaned beans are netting \$5.85 to the farmer. Jack Dyer made about 1,700 pounds to the acre. Bill Weaver will harvest more than 1,500.

"This area will have most of the bean production before long," Johnston stated.

Olton beans are finding a ready market. "We're selling Olton beans from Louisiana to Old Mexico," Johnston declared proudly. "We sent three truck loads of Olton (Continued On Page Seven)

## Olton Lad Admits Four Burglaries

A 15-year old Olton boy Tuesday night admitted to police that he took some \$43.00 from the football boys' dressing room in Olton High School gymnasium while the athletes were scrimmaging at Springlake.

The youngster also cleared up at least three other petty burglaries which have been pulled off here during the past few months.

The youngster told arresting officers Floyd Cavin and Emmett Burrow that he hid in the gymnasium while the football boys were preparing to go to Springlake. He was locked in the gym only to find his way to the loot barred by a locked dressing room door.

He broke out a window in the girls' dressing room and made his way to the outside. He then pried a screen off the boys' dressing room window and gained entry to that dressing room.

He took \$43.00 and some personal items belonging to the boys. He was taken into custody later in the evening and made a statement to Police Chief Cavin and Officer Burrow.

He admitted taking \$18.00 from the J. C. Jones Store recently. He said he also entered Ben F. Smith Grain Company and Olton Co-Op Gin Company's office. He got about \$10.00 at the gin and about \$3.00 from the grain company. He named some accomplices in some of his burglary activities.

Cavin said the boy also admitted having entered a house in the country during recent months.

The lad was taken before County Judge Pat Boone Tuesday and was released to the custody of his parents.

Arrest of three juveniles Monday cracked five week-end house burglaries and unearthed hundreds of dollars worth of loot.

Investigating officer was Deputy Sheriff V. L. Smith. Officers said the trio made a statement admitting all five burglaries.

Entered were the homes of Mrs. Bill Combest, Dewey Moses, Hopewell Baptist Church parsonage, a laborer's house on the Stinson place and the McClure home at Springlake.

Found cached in culverts in the area were four cigarette lighters, a pocket watch, one ladies' 17-jewel wrist watch, one man's yellow gold wrist watch, four pocket knives, one crescent wrench, a 22 caliber rifle and a great deal of ammunition for it, three flashlights, a portable radio and two pair of suede gloves.

The youngsters also had \$7.45 in silver and 28 pennies.

The burglaries were said to have taken place between Friday night and early Monday morning. Officers said the boys had stashed their bicycles in a cellar and were on foot when apprehended.

Ages of the youngsters involved ranged from 13 to 16. Appearing before County Judge Pat Boone, the boys were paroled to relatives.

Other candidates for the title are Johnita Gallini, 21 years old, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John

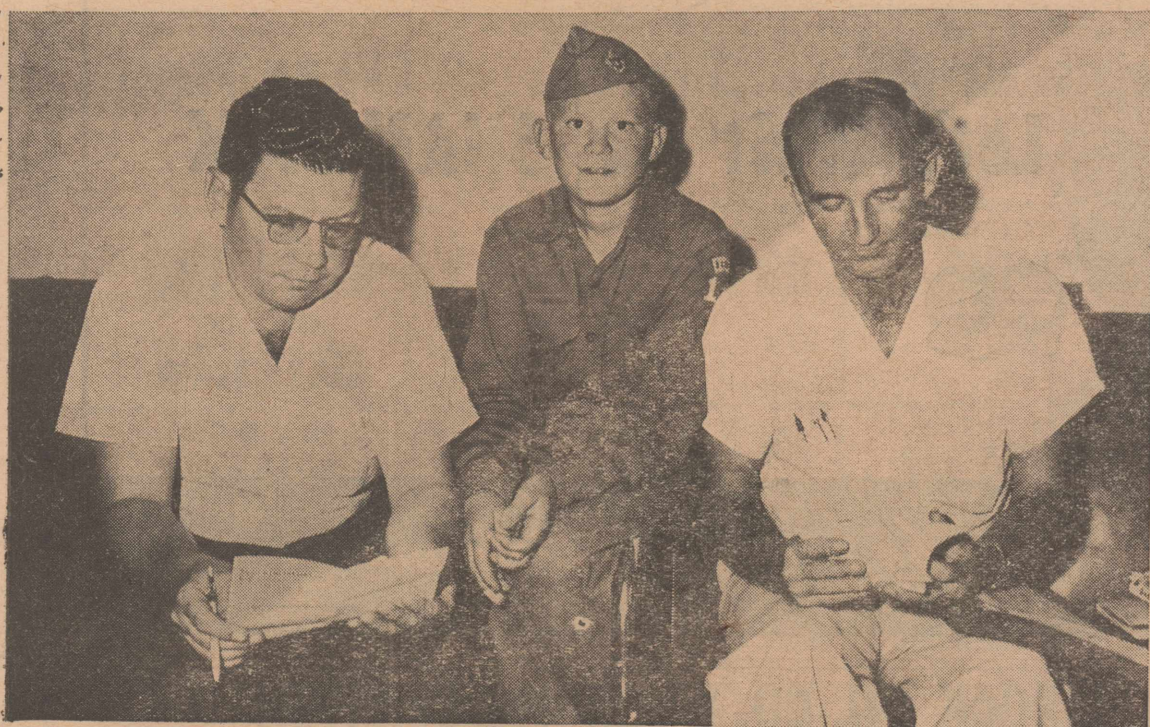

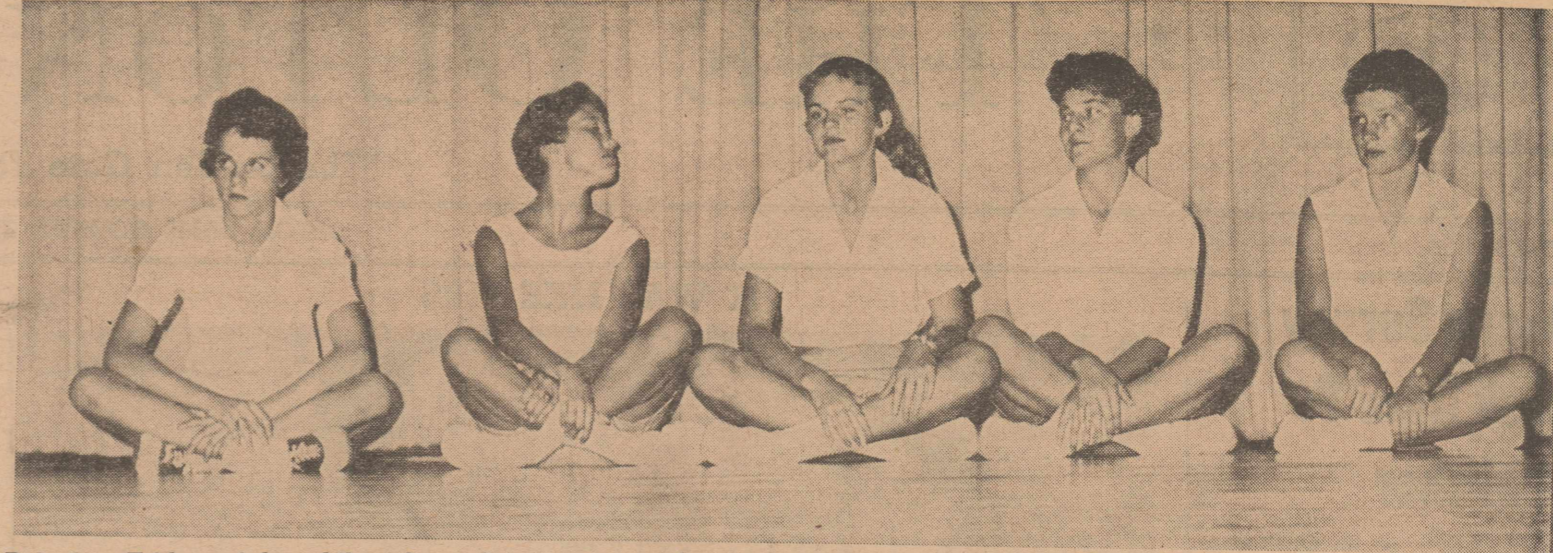

### Whooping Crane—

(Continued From Page One) is markedly different from that of a crane.

The heron flies with his head pulled back toward his body and his neck crooked. Also abounding on local lakes is the avocet, a shore bird common at this time of year.

The avocet flies much like a crane but is a comparatively small bird.

### Huge Fowl

Kriebel told Mrs. Ogletree that a whooping crane when full grown stands about 5 feet in height. The Ogletrees say the bird they saw was not nearly that large.

The two wildlife specialists made a thorough search of area lakes but could not find a bird like that described by the Ogletrees. Kriebel said he hopes that anyone spotting a large white bird will immediately call the Wildlife Service in Lubbock, Albuquerque, NM, or Fort Worth.

"Many different species of birds appear in places where they are not supposed to be," declared Kriebel. "I am inclined to believe what Mrs. Ogletree saw was an avocet. It is smaller than a whooping crane but flies like one—with its neck stretched out."

The searchers said everything possible is done to gather bits of information to assist National Audubon Society officials, ornithologists and other scientists in keeping whooping cranes from becoming extinct.

### Migration Habits

Annual southern migration of whooping cranes usually starts in mid-October. Some adult cranes arrive at Corpus Christi as late as December. Early this year the world whooper population was estimated at 31 to 38, including about three in captivity.

One pair, Jo and Crip, is in Audubon Park Zoo in New Orleans. Another one is in captivity in San Antonio.

DeGani said the whoopers are believed to have had a hatch of nine this year.

Whoopers normally migrate through Kansas and Nebraska. Late arrivals at the winter refuge and off-course sightings always make national news.

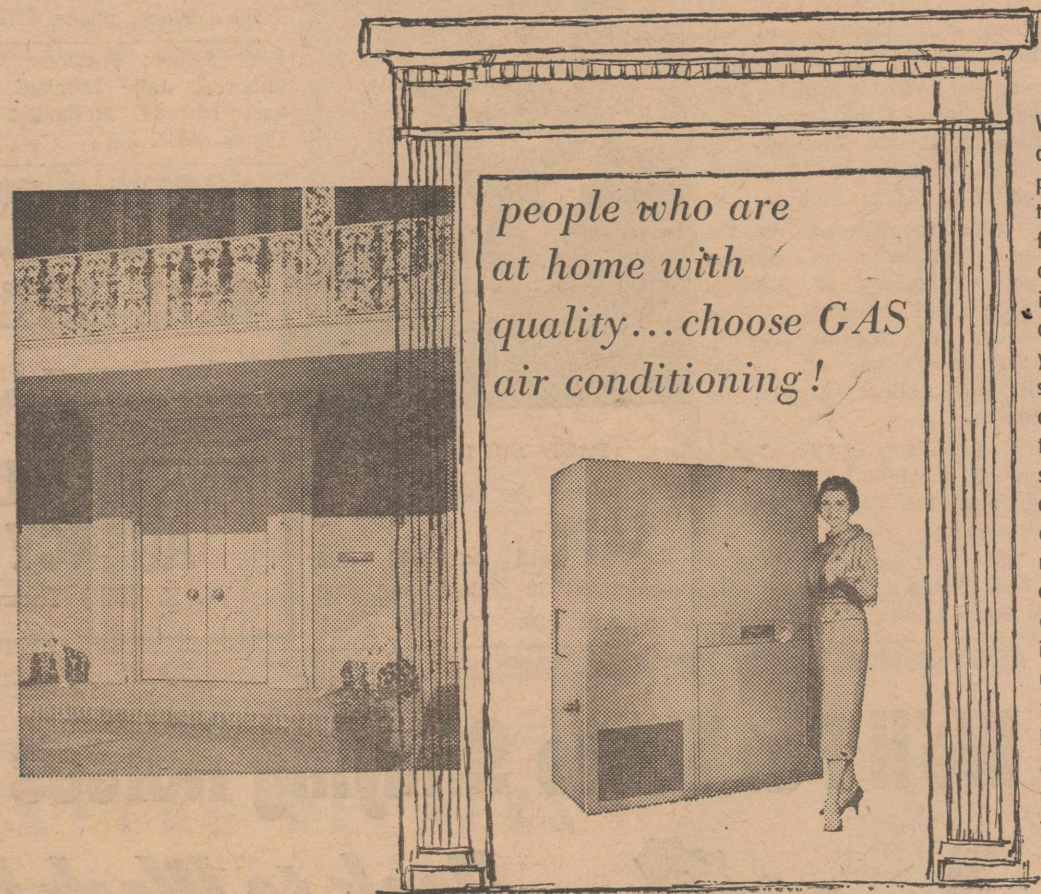

After the first few days of school, the high school and junior high student will be offered some choice of food.

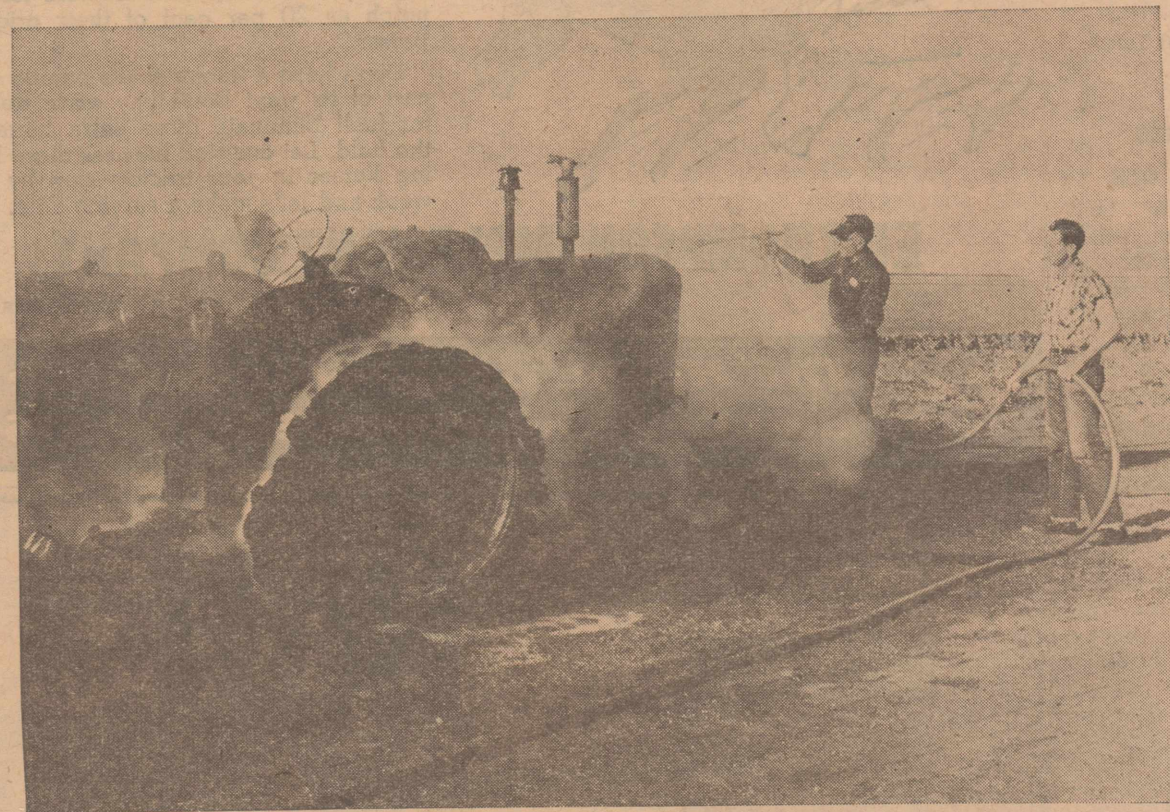

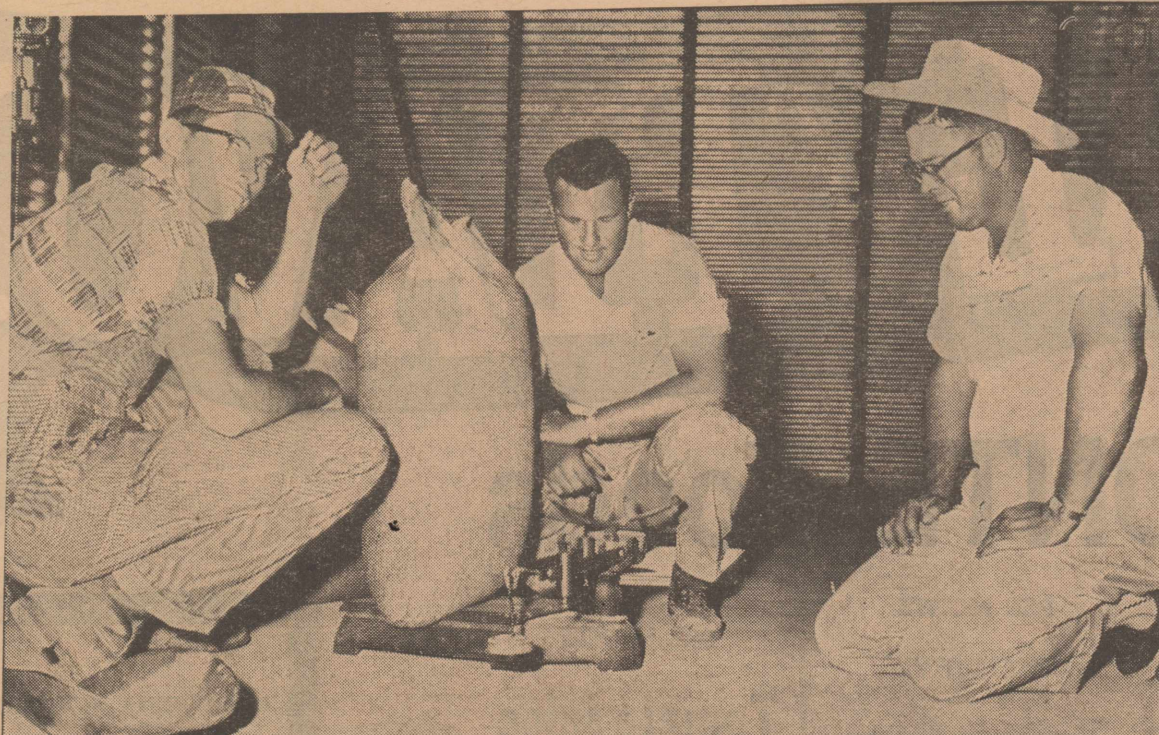

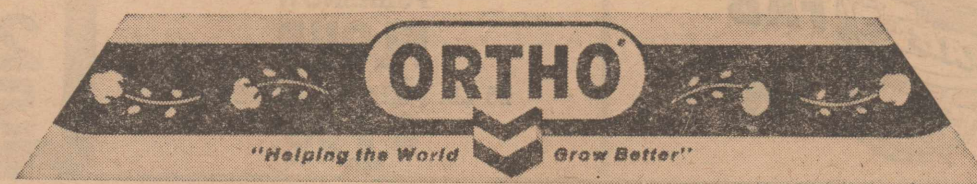
