## Booster Club Still Selling Reserve Ducats

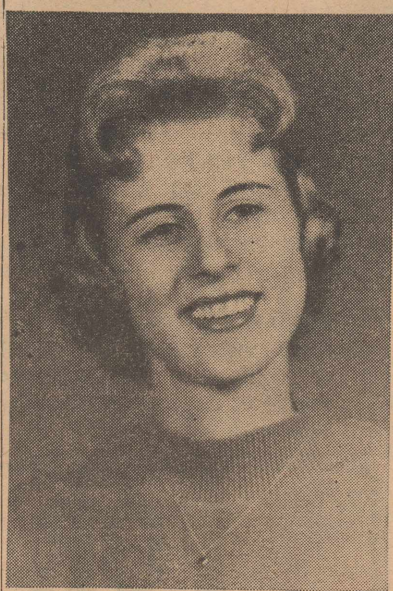
Sale of reserve seat tickets for Olton Mustang home games is lagging, according to Mrs. G. H. Bley.

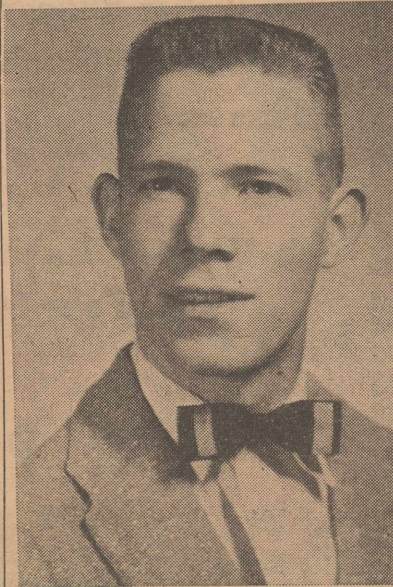

Beset by financial problems, the city council at a called meeting last week voted to take 35 percent of the actual evaluation of city property as a taxing basis.

Taxing basis formerly was 25 percent of actual value of property on tax rolls.

The city's general fund during the fiscal year which ended Monday had operated more than \$2,000 in the red. The general fund took in \$27,761.40 during the year.

City officials pointed out that about \$35,000.00 will be required to operate the city during the fiscal year which began Sept. 1 even if the city has no capital outlay.

Mayor D. Y. Ray said that one of the city police cars must be replaced and the city may find it necessary to build an additional jail cell to maintain state approval.

## Bob Ball Cuts First Load Grain Monday

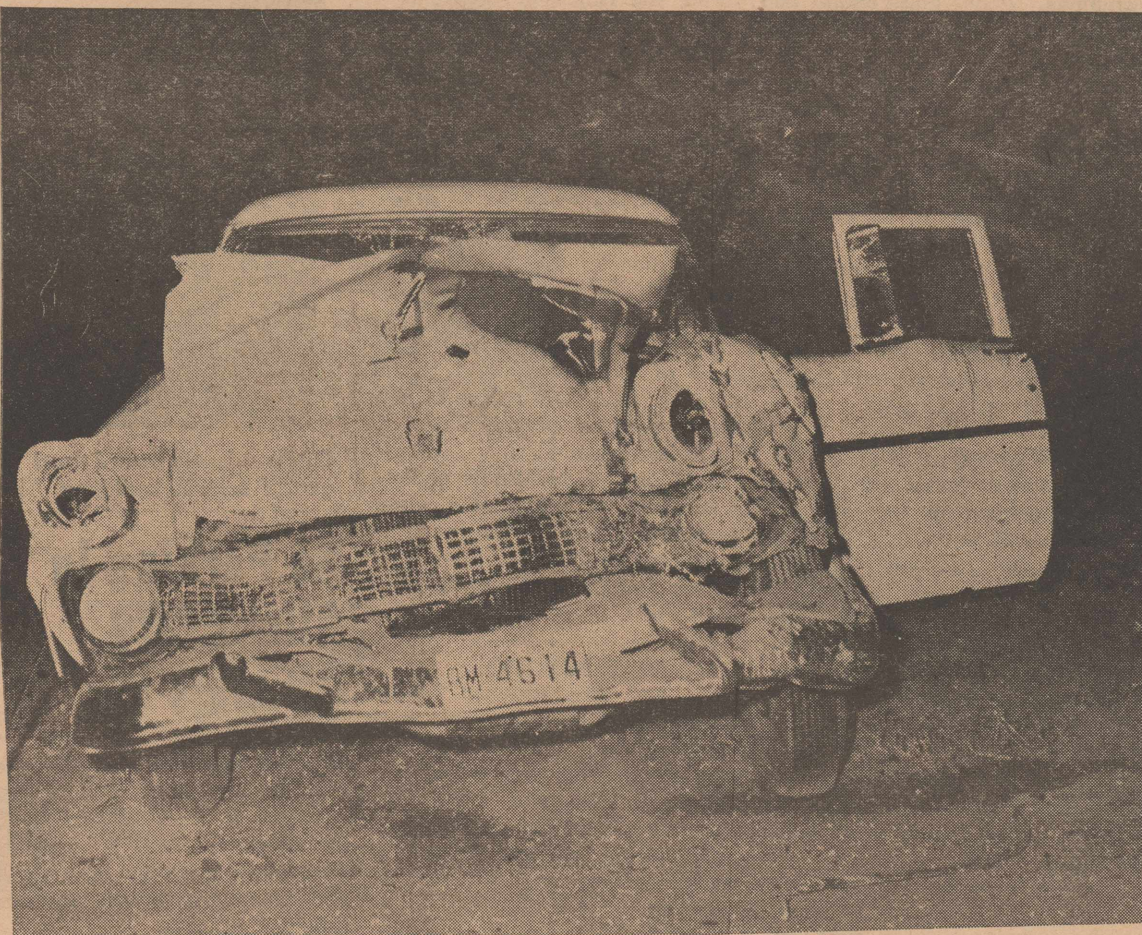
Bob Ball cut the first load of grain Monday, Sept. 1.

Ten cases of infectious hepatitis have been reported in Olton during the past month.

This information came this week from Dr. E. J. Souders, city health officer.

Hepatitis is a liver disease which causes yellow jaundice. The disease can be fatal. It was charged with causing the

Of the ten stricken, six already have recovered. Most recently stricken were Charlotte Loveless, Ira Foster, Donna Digby, 10 years old and Joe Martinez, 4 years old.

## TWO BABIES UNSCATHED IN GRINDING CRASH

# Accident Injures Couple Near Here

An Olton couple was seriously hurt near here late last Friday afternoon in a grinding crash from which their two small children escaped uninjured.

Injured were Mr. and Mrs. Buren Lansford.

Their car collided with a pickup truck at the intersection of a dirt

road and Farm To Market Road 2284 about 8 miles northeast of Olton.

Mrs. Lansford suffered fracture of the left ankle, chest injuries, broken rib, skull fracture, severe bruises and a gash on the right leg below the knee. Mrs. Lansford lost a great deal of blood before reaching the hospital here.

Mr. Lansford suffered head injuries, cuts about the head, bruises and severe shock.

They were given emergency treatment at Community Hospital here and then rushed to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock.

Mrs. Lansford still is being treated at the Lubbock hospital. Mr. Lansford was dismissed early this week.

Highway patrolmen investigating the accident said the Lansford car was traveling south on the farm to market road while the pickup truck was traveling west on the dirt road.

Officers said the pickup truck was operated by Roy Parr, farm laborer employed by A. J. Givens of Halfway. Patrolmen said the pickup belonged to Mr. Givens.

Wreckage indicated that the car broadsided the pickup which was crossing the pavement. The pickup overturned and came to rest (Continued On Page Seven)

Funeral services for Sam Jones, 65, Earth, brother of Charlie Jones of Olton, were held Saturday afternoon in First Baptist Church at Earth.

Mr. Jones, pioneer farmer and rancher, moved to the Earth area 40 years ago. He died Thursday night of last week at his home. He was ill only a few hours.

He was instrumental in organizing Citizen's State Bank in Earth and had served as a director since its opening. He was a veteran of World War I.

Survivors include the widow; a daughter, Mrs. Lucille Wheat, two sons, Keith and Carl, all of Earth; six brothers, Claude of Plainview, Ernest of Dimmitt, Virgil, Bence and Arvil, all of Hale Center, and Charlie of Olton; a sister, Mrs. Myrtle Flake of Lubbock; and seven grandchildren.

Burial was in Earth Cemetery.

### BEEF HEIFER SHOW FEATURED AT STATE FAIR

The Junior Livestock and Poultry shows during the 1959 State Fair of Texas, Oct. 9-25, will offer a total of \$24,487 in cash premiums and will feature a Beef Heifer show for the first time.

Some 2,000 Four-H club members and Future Farmers are expected to exhibit their milk fed steers, market steers, beef heifers, dairy heifers, sheep, fat lambs, pigs, turkeys and broilers.

The premium total is an increase of \$3,429 over the \$21,058 offered last year.

The Beef Heifer show will offer \$4,200 in premiums. Judging will be held Oct. 21 in Angus, Brahman, Hereford, Santa Gertrudis and Shorthorn classes.

Premiums and dates of the other junior shows at the fair are as follows: market turkeys, \$800, Oct. 10; Delaine-Merino sheep \$518, Oct. 12; Rambouillet sheep, \$518, Oct. 13; market broilers, \$700, Oct. 17; dairy heifers, \$4,145, Oct. 21; milk fed steers, \$2,842, Oct. 21; fat lambs, \$2,005, Oct. 21; barrows, \$4,229, Oct. 21-22-23, and market steers, \$4,050. Herdsman awards of \$480 are also offered.

The Junior Livestock Auction sales, which come as a grand climax to the junior shows, will offer the youngsters an opportunity to take home some real folding money in their jeans. Last year's auctions resulted in total receipts of \$136,585 for the 882 boys and girls who participated.

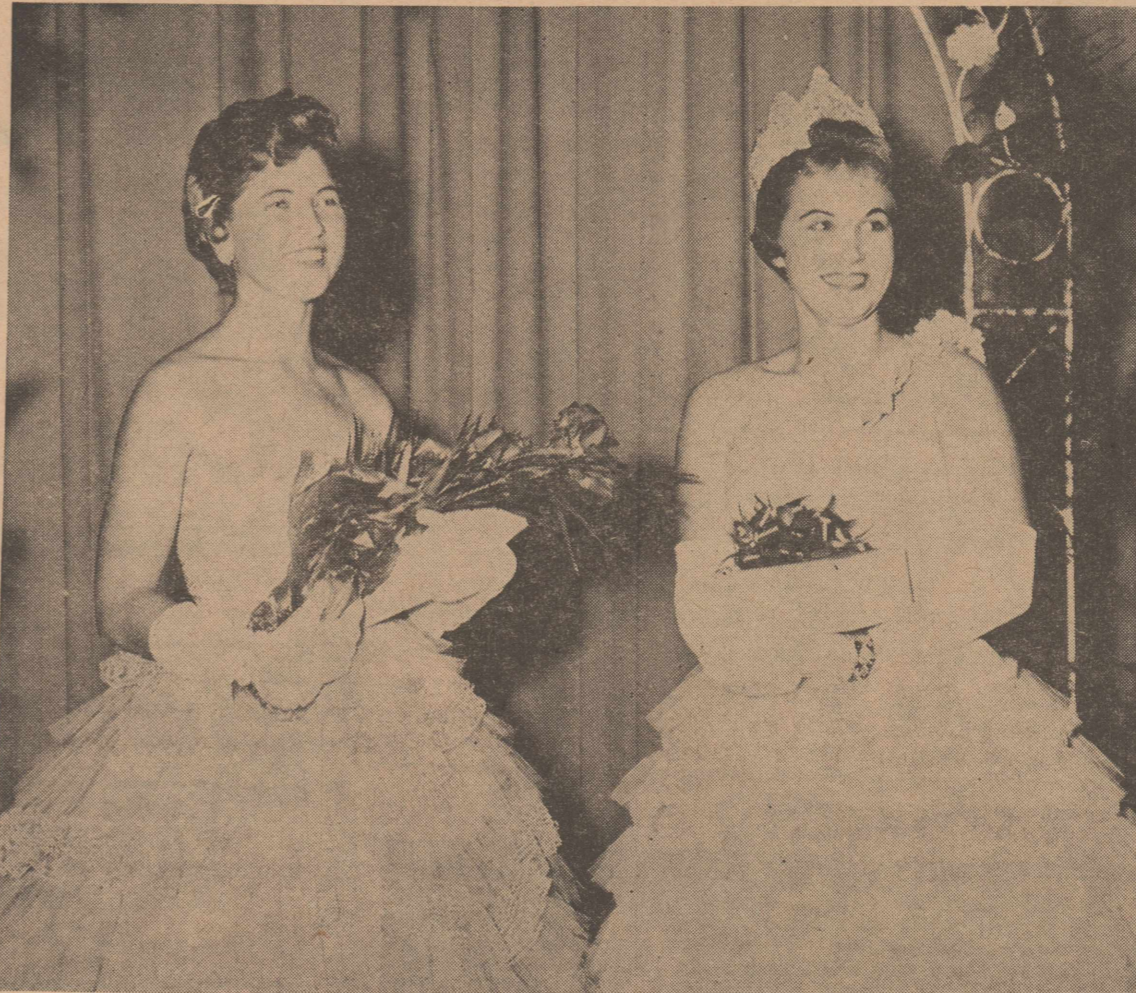

## KITCHEN KORNER BY LELLA GALLION

Since school has started again we usually change our meal time around and serve the main meal in the evening instead of at noon. It is a good idea to keep in mind that a heavy evening meal doesn't have time to digest properly so try to keep it a fairly light meal. The meals served at the lunch room are well balanced and we should encourage our children to eat their main meal there.

### MENU

Quick Chicken Pie  
Parsleyed potatoes  
Blackeyed peas  
Stuffed tomatoes  
Apple pie macaroon

### Quick Chicken Pie

2 cans boned chicken  
1 can cream of mushroom soup  
1 small can peas and carrots (optional)

1 can biscuits  
Combine chicken, soup, peas and carrots in well buttered baking dish. Put in a preheated oven of 400 degrees. Bake 20 minutes. Remove from oven, place biscuits on top and return to oven until biscuits are brown. Serve at once.

We don't care for the boney pieces of chicken, so when I fry chicken I put the wings and back in a plastic bag and freeze them. When there are several packages accumulated in my freezer, I boil them together and remove from the bone to make chicken pie or chicken and noodles. That

way, the chicken isn't wasted and we enjoy it both ways.

The small green apples are at the stores now. They make delicious apple pies. They are usually quite sour and need a little extra sugar. If you use the same amount of sugar as for other apple pies serve, with ice cream.

### Apple Pie Macaroon

5 to 6 apples  
1/2 t cinnamon  
1/2 cup salted pecans  
2 c sugar  
1/2 c shortening  
2 well-beaten eggs  
1 cup sifted flour  
1/2 c butter

Peel and thinly slice apples in a large pie tin or baking dish. Sprinkle with 1 cup sugar, cinnamon and pecans. Make a batter of eggs, sugar, flour, shortening, and butter. Mix well and spoon over top of apple mixture. Bake in slow oven 300 degrees F. until batter makes a crisp top, about one hour. The pecans may be omitted if desired.
