Some eight countries will be represented including Iran, Japan, Portugal, Vietnam, Brazil, Argentina, Saudia Arabia and Ethiopia. Madam Ali Geito, German actress of stage and screen, is in charge of the group. She formed the group through cooperation of the YMCA. Its purpose is to help create a better understanding between America and her allies. Regular Springlake Lions Club meeting time has been postponed until Saturday noon. Wives will attend the meeting. Madam Geito will speak at the luncheon and will interview exchange students. She worked in the underground during World War II. She has appeared on all the major TV networks in this country. The tour will begin at 11 o'clock Saturday morning and continue until 5 o'clock Saturday afternoon. ### City Dads Hear Health Officer On Livestock

Olton city council paid the bills and raised the salary of the chief of police Tuesday night in the only official action taken in its October meeting. There was some spirited discussion on other topics but no concrete moves were made. City Health Officer B. J. Souders told the commission that all "big livestock" constitute a health hazard inside the city limits. He later clarified this statement to mean animals such as pigs, horses, cattle, etc. Dr. Souders was most vehemently opposed to hogs inside the city limits. He said keeping of livestock tends to encourage breeding of flies and mosquitoes. The doctor said he, in his capacity of city health officer, has had two recent complaints on hogs. Quizzed by Councilman A. D. Adams, the doctor admitted that he sees no threat to health from livestock "at the present time." The council first voted on an ordinance regulating water fates and installations and then the ordinance was withdrawn for further study before it ever was recorded in the official minutes. City council is studying the possibility of a paving project with the city to participate in the cost at a ratio of 10 percent. Police Chief Floyd Cavin's salary was increased from \$325.00 per month to \$350.00. City Secretary Bernice Smith reported on the completed tax roll. This year's assessed taxes come to \$39,659.89, as compared to \$27,761.45 last year. It was also brought out that the city has spent \$1,233.16 in overhauling a city well.

### Frank Ruiz Is Charged With Liquor Violation

Frank Ruiz was charged with liquor law violation over the weekend. He was arrested by city police. Police Chief Floyd Cavin said Ruiz is accused of selling liquor to minors. Ruiz entered a plea of not guilty to the charges Monday and was released on bond of \$1,000. Cavin said he was arrested a short time later and lodged in Olton city jail on a charge of driving without a drivers license. Twenty-one persons were booked at city jail last weekend. One was in a traffic accident, 11 were charged with gaming with dice, four were charged with fighting and five were charged with being drunk.

Muleshoe's Mules will be out to spoil Olton's homecoming Friday night. The Mules meet the Mustangs at 8 o'clock in Memorial Stadium here in the first conference contest of the year for both clubs. Both teams are licking last Friday night's wounds. Muleshoe fell before Friona and Olton lost to a powerful Dimmitt Bobcat squad. Muleshoe also has lost to Dimmitt. The score in that contest was 30 to 12 while the score in the Olton-Dimmitt ball game was 38 to 12. The Mules will be depending on big backs in the persons of Darrel Oliver and J. L. Black. Oliver at fullback is a 191-pounder. The Mules deploy from a straight T and a wing T. They are mostly a power club and so far have not depended a great deal on aerial attack. Olton High School will welcome her old grads Friday. Climax to the day's activities will, of course, be Olton's first conference game of the season to be played at 8 o'clock in Memorial Stadium against the Mules from Muleshoe. The parade will proceed down highway 70 to Main, down Main to Ninth, around the square and straight down the street that runs to the grade school building. Members will disperse at the bus parking lot at the high school. **Nineteen Floats** Ten school floats and nine club and organization floats have been entered in the homecoming parade. 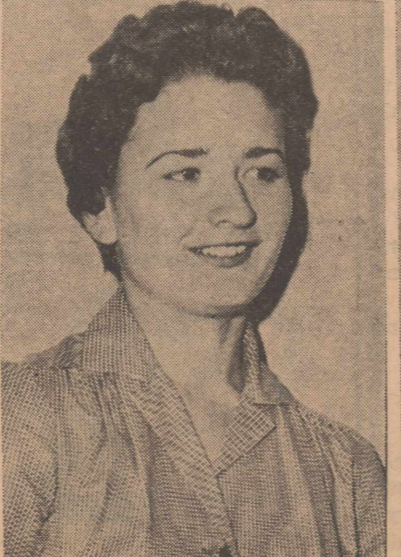

# Mustangs Drop Lop-Sided Game To Tough Dimmitt Bobcat Squad

Olton's Mustangs closed the season's non conference play Friday night with a loss to the strong Dimmitt Bobcats 38-12.

The Mustangs now have a 3 won, 3 loss record, which is good considering the opponents they have faced this season. The locals have been victorious over Petersburg, Hale Center and Hereford. Their defeats at the hands of three of the stronger teams in the state, Littlefield, Floydada and Dimmitt.

The Mustangs failed to play the type of football they are capable of playing against Dimmitt and the score did not reflect the difference in the two teams.

If the Mustangs are able to capture the district title they will probably meet the Bobcat eleven in the bi-district play-off which should prove to be a much better game than Friday night's contest.

The game played in near perfect weather went as follows:

The Dimmitt Bobcats took Phil Neinast's kick at the 30 and returned it to the 41 yard line.

Racking up first downs at the 35, 21 and 7 yard lines, the Castro County team scored early in the first period with fullback Junior Coffey going over right guard from the 7 yard line. An attempted pass for 2 points fell incomplete and Dimmitt led by a

score of 6-0.

The Bobcat kick was taken by John Wayne Hair at the 15 yard line almost breaking loose, Hair returned to the Bobcat 40. Rande Buchenau carried to the left side of the line for no gain. Priest hit the center of the line to the 37 and on third down Hair's quick kick was blocked and the Bobcats recovered at the Mustang 35.

The Bobcat made 8 yards, tried the line for no gain and were penalized back to the 42 yard for illegal use of the hands on offense. Three plays later the Mustangs recovered a Bobcat fumble after a pass completion at the 15. Buchenau, attempting to run around left end, lost yardage to the 9 and on second down Priest's pass to Buchenau was complete at the 21.

Hair carried around left end to the 25 just inches short of a first down. Priest's kick was good to the Bobcat 34 as the ball carrier was tackled immediately by Jimmy Moss.

Three plays later, Junior Coffey picked up a first down at the 45.

Needing 2 yards for a first down, at the 47 Coffey hit the right side of the line for yardage to the 40. At this point a pass play clicked as the Bobcat left end crossed the double stripe for Dimmitt's second score of the game. A pass completion for 2 points

gave Dimmitt a 14-0 lead.

Buchenau returned the kick from the 15 to the 36 yard line as the first quarter of play ended.

Priest's second down pass fell incomplete, but on third down he hit Duncan at the 49 for a Mustang first down. Hair lost yardage to the 46 on an attempted pass. Priest's attempted pass was knocked down and the Mustangs kicked to the 27. Picking up first downs at the 43, 44, 26 and 5 yard lines the Bobcats combined a passing attack with the hard running of Junior Coffey to set up the third Dimmitt score. Another pass play clicked for the extra 2 points and the score was Dimmitt 22, Olton 0.

Buchenau returned the kick to the 19. Hair went through the right side of the line to the 20. Priest lost to the 14 as he attempted to pass and the Mustangs kicked to the 44 yard line.

The Bobcats picked up a first down at the 33 and on the next play Neinast intercepted a Dimmitt pass and returned it to the 22.

Hair completed a pass to Priest at the 3 for an Olton first and goal situation. Priest picked up a yard through the center of the line. Buchenau tried the left side of the line for no gain. Priest carried down near the 1 yard line and on fourth down Hair was

stacked up just inches short of the score as he ran around right end. Time in the first half ran out before Dimmitt could get off a play.

Hair returned the second half kick to the 48. Buchenau carried through the right side of the line to the 45 yard line, but Dimmitt recovered an Olton fumble at that point to stop the Mustangs once more.

Needing two first downs and using only 8 plays Dimmitt scored on a 28 yard jaunt around left end. Using his favorite receiver, the Bobcat quarterback passed complete for the extra points and Dimmitt led 30-0.

A short kick was taken by Moss at the 35. He returned it to the 45. Priest's pass downfield to Buchenau was incomplete. Priest hit Buchenau at the 43 for a first down. Priest hit the line to the 34 and racked up a first down as he carried into the line to the 29. Priest carried around left end to the 27. Buchenau ran around right end for another first down at the 19. Hair running right end pitched out to Buchenau good to the 16. Buchenau carried over left tackle for the first Olton touchdown. Priest's pass to Buchenau fell incomplete and the score was 30-6.

Neinast's kick was returned to the 35 yard line. The Bobcats picked up three first downs, exchanged 15 yard penalties with Olton and used 8 plays for yardage to the 6. An offside penalty cost the Bobcats 5 yards and on second down quarterback Barnes hit Ratcliff again from the 7 yard line and the last Dimmitt touchdown. The same combination clicked for 2 points and it was Dimmitt 38, Olton 6.

Buchenau was tackled immediately at the 20 yard line as he took the Bobcat kick. Priest went through the center of the line to the 26 and Hair passed complete to Buchenau for a first down at the 31. Priest carried to the 32 and Duncan tried the left side of the line for no gain. On fourth down Priest's kick went out of bounds at the Dimmitt 45.

The Bobcats, in three plays, picked up yardage to the Olton 49 and kicked to the 22 yard line on fourth down.

Hair lost yardage to the 11 as he attempted to pass. Priest was rushed as he lost back to the 2 trying to find a receiver. From the end zone, Priest's third down kick went to the 37.

The Bobcats picked up yardage to the 31 and on fourth down Brown recovered a Dimmitt fumble at the 30 yard line.

Priest passed complete to Duncan at the 38 yard line. Priest's pass to Schenck fell incomplete and on third down Priest went through the line to the 44 for a first down. Hair ran around right end to the Dimmitt 48. Priest completed a pass to Brown for no gain.

A pass from Priest to Riney was incomplete. On fourth down Priest carried to the 45, picking up enough yardage for a first. But an illegal use of the hands on offense penalty set the Mustangs back to the 37. Facing fourth down and needing 17 yards, Priest kicked to the 40.

Dimmitt gained short yardage and received 15 yards for illegal use of the hands on offense. A Bobcat pass was intercepted by Tommy Wilson at the 25, and Wilson went over untouched for the second Mustang score. Hair's pass to Buchenau was incomplete and the score read Olton 12, Dimmitt 38.

Neinast's on side kick was taken at the 44. The Bobcats started to eat up yardage and the clock. They picked up first downs at the 46 and 35 yard lines. With 15 seconds remaining in the game, Buchenau recovered a Dimmitt fumble at the 23.

An attempted pass from Priest to Schenck fell incomplete. Buchenau picked up a Mustang first down around right end at the 35 yard line, as the game ended.

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### Visitors Show Keen Interest In Recharge Well

Visitors to the High Plains Research Foundation at Halfway have a keen interest in the recharge well and the bench leveling research projects under way.

Mr. James Valliant, assistant water engineer at the foundation, reports a total of 77.2 acre-feet of water recharged to date in 1959. Irrigation water can be valued at \$65.00 per acre-foot applied to cotton, which would mean that the recharge water is worth approximately \$5,000.00. This is more than half the total initial cost of the recharge well. This recharged water was from approximately 7 inches of rainfall between June 2 and July 16 and tail water from surrounding acreage up to September 12. Plans for 1960 include a filter system to study the effect of silt removal on recharging. Land now in lake bed will be put into cultivation since it can now be drained of rainfall runoff and tail water.

Twenty five acres of benches have been constructed on the north slope of the recharge lake to study yield, cost of production and water efficiency. Parallel benches of 8, 12 and 16 rows (40 inch rows) are being used to study the effects of different depths of soil removal on crop yields. These benches will also be used in a comparison study of crops grown on benches, contoured land and slopes. Water applied will all be metered and moisture blocks will be used to determine time of irrigation. Grain sorghum is being grown on these benches and the adjoining slopes in 1959

and it now appears that the benches will outyield the slopes by a considerable margin.

Irrigation studies for the coming year will include time of irrigation on cotton and grain sorghum, skip row irrigation and determination of time of irrigation with moisture blocks.

Tony George, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leon George, slipped on a rock early this week and suffered a cut on his knee. Three stitches were required to close the wound.

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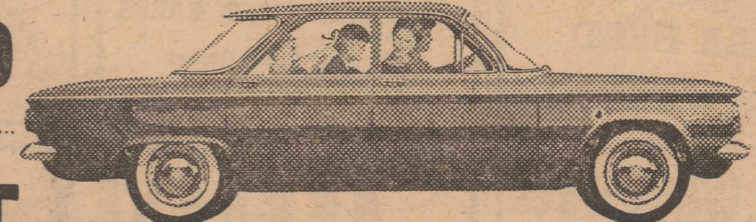

My doubtful donation for the day is a dubious dissertation on the Disgusting and Distasteful Duty of Disposing of Dirty Dishes. The far-flung title may sound a trifle inappropriate for such a mental task . . . but I sometimes let my imagination get the best of me and the allusive alliteration seemed too good to make its way into the old wastebasket (where most of the things I write do—or should go.)  
Be that as it may, what I am frankly (if a little hesitantly) admitting, is that I detest dirty dishes, but not quite with the consuming passion that I deplore doing them.  
I have approached the subject from every possible angle, only to meet with the same discouraging results. I have tried ignoring them, not only for meals, but for days; but alas and alack, there inevitably comes a time when the family is hungry, the dish cabinet as bare as Old Mother Hubbard's, and only an egg turner and a can opener crouch in a far corner of the silver drawer. I have even tried creeping up on my blind side and subtly changing my own attitude toward this unwholesome chore, but no amount of rationalization or re-conditioning has helped a bit. A psychiatrist would do me no good . . . (I've considered it seriously), as I was neither forced to do too many dishes in my youth, nor was I allowed to skip the task entirely (though I would have been over-joyed at the prospect of the latter.)  
I have read several articles and even one poem singing of the ethereal beauty and soothing effects on the human soul, of a lovely pan of warm soap suds. (I hope the authors are resting peacefully in some nice quiet institution.) My only reaction to their earnest efforts was a feeling of Phooey! Poetry and dirty dishes! One might as well write a sonnet extolling the delights of diaper training!

I did run across one quotation that I considered applicable however. Something about the test of education being the ability to make oneself do what he knows he HAS to do at the time it OUGHT to be done. I have tried gazing dreamily out of the kitchen window, while I mentally re-landscape the backyard, re-arrange the furniture or make over last year's formal into a neat little number that will dazzle the crowd . . . but to

Letters to superintendents throughout the area, with full information about the special day,

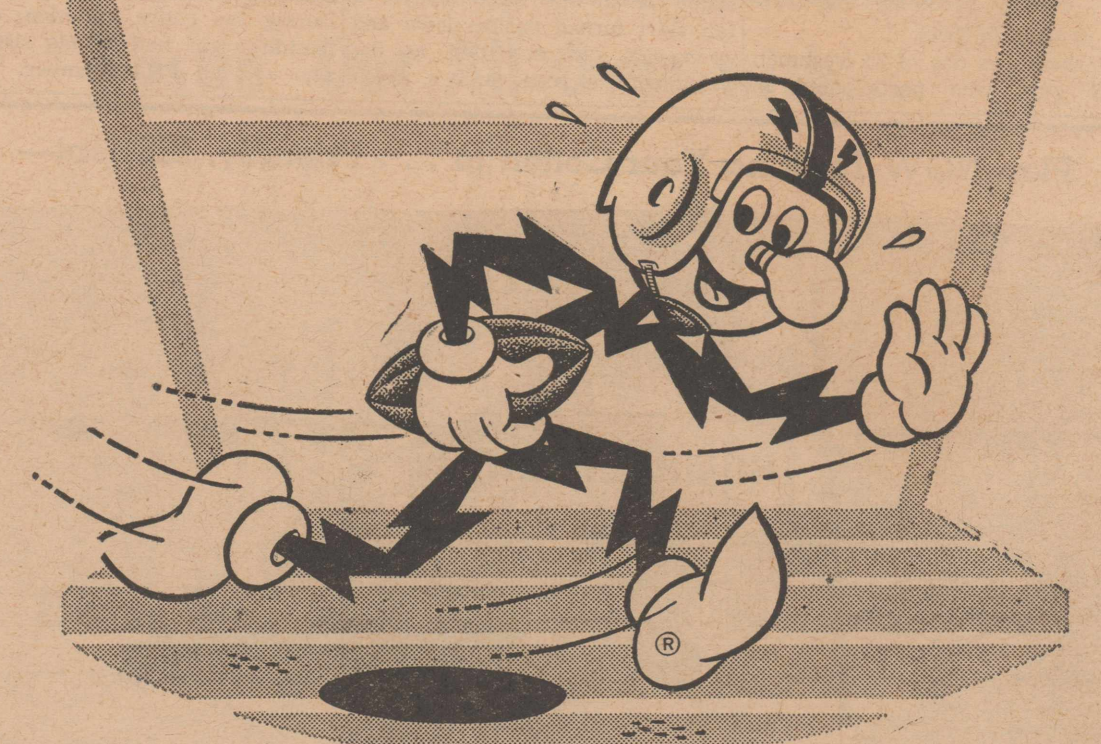
are being mailed by Dr. Emmitt Smith, coordinator of public services.

JUNIOR HIGH CLEARED IN 52 SECONDS

Smoke Billows As School Stages Realistic Drill

A realistic fire drill was staged in the Olton Schools Friday morning. Only the school administrators were aware of the plan to hold the drill. The purpose of the surprise

drill was to determine how the students, teachers and any school visitors might react to an actual fire in the school.

Police, ambulance and fire department were summoned for the drill. The plan was conceived to determine how quickly and safely these public services could act in case of fire, tornado or emergency alert in connection with the school.

Tom Smith, Olton Firechief, with the cooperation of the principals of the three schools, conducted the fire drill. Fred Gordon, elementary principal, reported his building was cleared in 53 seconds.

The Junior High building, according to Principal Morrison Asman, was cleared in 52 seconds. This was a three second improvement over the fire drill staged in that building early in September.

High School Principal, Don Waldrup, reported his students were clear of the building in 36 seconds.

Traffic blocks were set up at the intersections of Main and 8th, G and 7th, and G and 9th Streets. Traffic officials quickly set up the blocks and allowed no traffic to pass during the time of the drill.

A traffic problem was discovered at the entrance to the elementary building. Mr. Smith stated that cars were parked completely surrounding the East wing and up to the entrance. No space

for the fire truck was available. The Firechief said this situation would have to be alleviated immediately.

Another problem found by the fire department concerned the alarm system in the elementary building. Several of the classes could not hear the alarm even with the aid of the public address system. This too will be facilitated.

Neither of the two fire escapes in the Junior High building is clear for hasty exit. The windows and are of the type which open out flat. The windows are hinged in the center and block the fire exit from the top. School administrators stated that doors will be installed in place of the windows.

The Firechief remarked that in case of a real fire, some of the students would have to be brought down from the top stories of the Junior High building by means of a ladder, as the stairway would be too crowded.

Excluding the above mentioned problems, the drill went smoothly and safely. Ambulances and police were on the job instantly and carried out their duties with no precludes. Volunteer firemen were summoned quickly and worked at their jobs efficiently.

All involved were satisfied that the surprise fire drill went very well, except for a few Junior High students, who seemed somewhat disappointed that the school was not actually on fire.

Also the High School Principal reported a number of calls from distressed Mothers, who appeared to think the fire was genuine.

This fire drill was staged in connection with Fire Prevention Week, which is being observed throughout the nation.

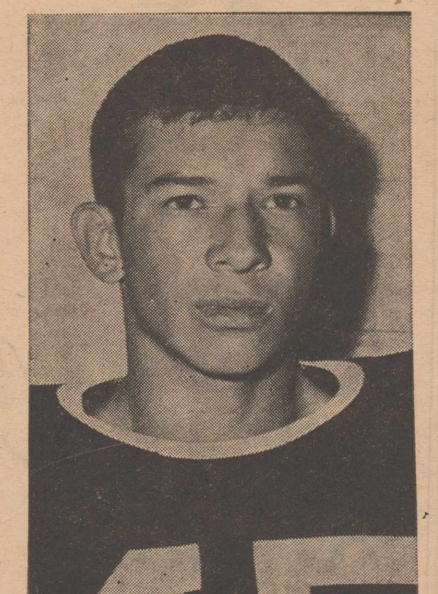

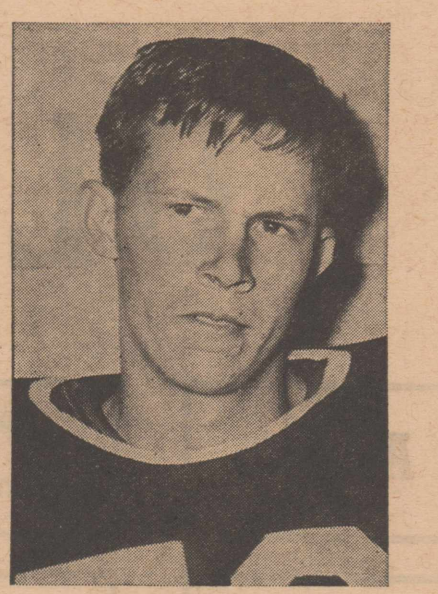

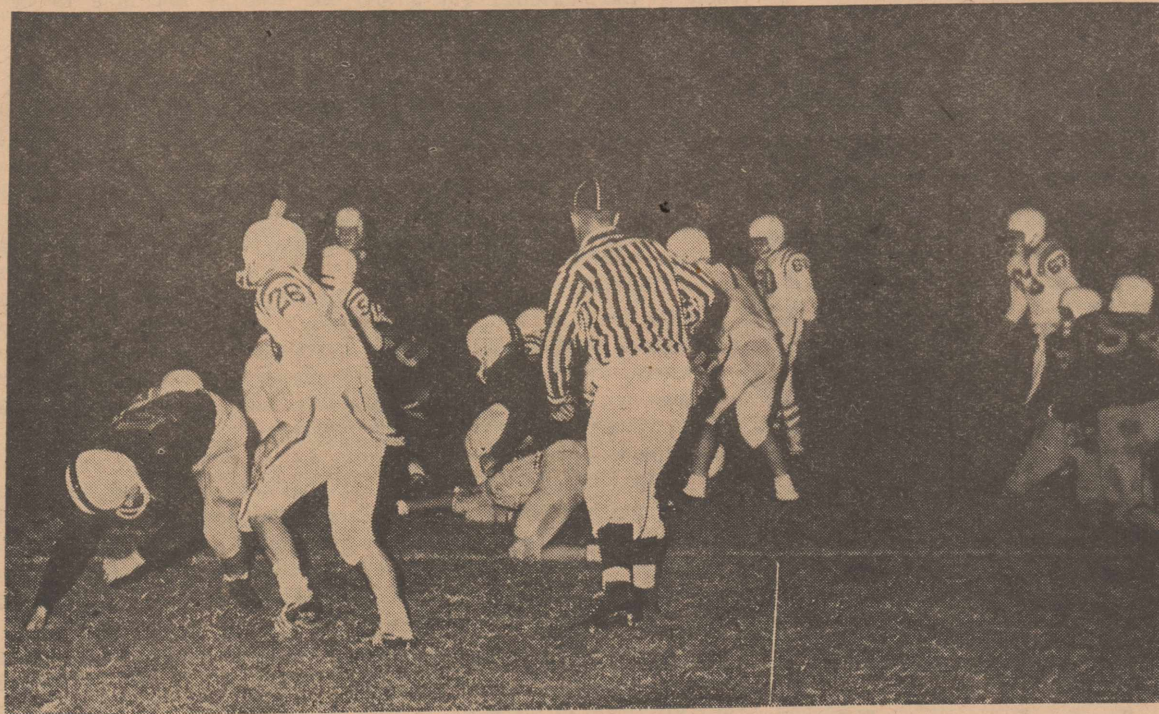
