## Crop Harvest To Reach Peak By Nov. 10 Ginners Declare

### Grain Sorghum Harvest Almost Done As Average Yields Soar

Happy is the farmer that the sun shines on.

And Olton farmers were still happy this month as the month-long streak of sunshine continued to glow and crops continued to mature.

Grain harvest was almost complete this week. One elevator operator said at least 98 percent of the 1959 grain crop had been gathered by Wednesday night.

### Mrs. Thomas Is Claimed By Death

Yields were high. Grainmen say the average yield for the area was a whopping 4,500 pounds per acre.

Prospects have brightened for a bumper cotton crop in spite of late hails which plagued the area last summer.

Maturing Cotton has been maturing by leaps and bounds under benevolent sunshine. Many farmers already have defoliated and cotton harvesting machines have begun to roll.

An Olton ginner said he received the first machined cotton early this week. By Wednesday night the six ginning firms serving the immediate Olton area had processed 6,532 bales of cotton.

Murrie Machen, Texas Employment Commission representative, said some hands are needed but are not in as great a demand as a week ago. Housing facilities for hands in the area are short.

Hand Shortage Some hands already are leaving the area. Cotton pullers did not flock to Olton as usual this year.

This was attributed to the fact that hails damaged cotton crops in the summer and under normal conditions the crop would have been short indeed in the area.

At least one Olton gin had put on a night crew and others are expected to be going around the clock within a few days.

Full Swing Ginners expect harvest to get into full swing by the tenth of next month.

There has not yet been a freeze and some farmers hope a freeze will be preceded by a frost with a freeze following within a week or 10 days.

Cotton grades have been good. Grades have run from strict middling to strict middling light spot.

Soy beans are expected to start coming in the latter part of the week. Corn will be shelled and marketed in December.

Two members of the Earl Holley family who formerly lived at Olton were hurt, one seriously, in an auto accident at a Lubbock intersection Sunday.

Mrs. Holley suffered compound rib fracture and severe bruises and cuts. The Holleys' son, Randy, 14, suffered a severe cut on the head and a neck injury.

Both are in Methodist Hospital at Lubbock. Mrs. Holley's condition is considered serious.

The two were injured when a car driven by Mr. Holley was in collision with another automobile. The Holleys were enroute home from church at the time of the mishap.

Both Mrs. Holley and her son were thrown from the car in which they were riding. Randy was hurled about 25 feet. Mrs. Holley was by the side of the car. Mr. Holley was unhurt.

The Holleys have another son, W. D., who lives here.

Some 200 head of swine of all major breeds will be auctioned at 1 o'clock Saturday afternoon at the FFA Show Barn.

Pigs to be sold are swine suitable for FFA and 4-H Club projects. The sale is being staged under sponsorship of the Olton Swine Breeders Association.

W. T. Hall, Jr., association secretary, said inquiries have been received from as far away as Orange, Tex. More than 1,500 persons have been contacted including all vocational agriculture instructors and county agents in Texas and many in New Mexico and Oklahoma.

Mr. Hall said the swine will be on display at the show barn from 5 o'clock Friday afternoon until time for the sale. Auctioneers will be W. B. Dickenson, Jr., and Jay Brown.

Olton school officials Tuesday formally accepted the new school gymnasium from the contractor.

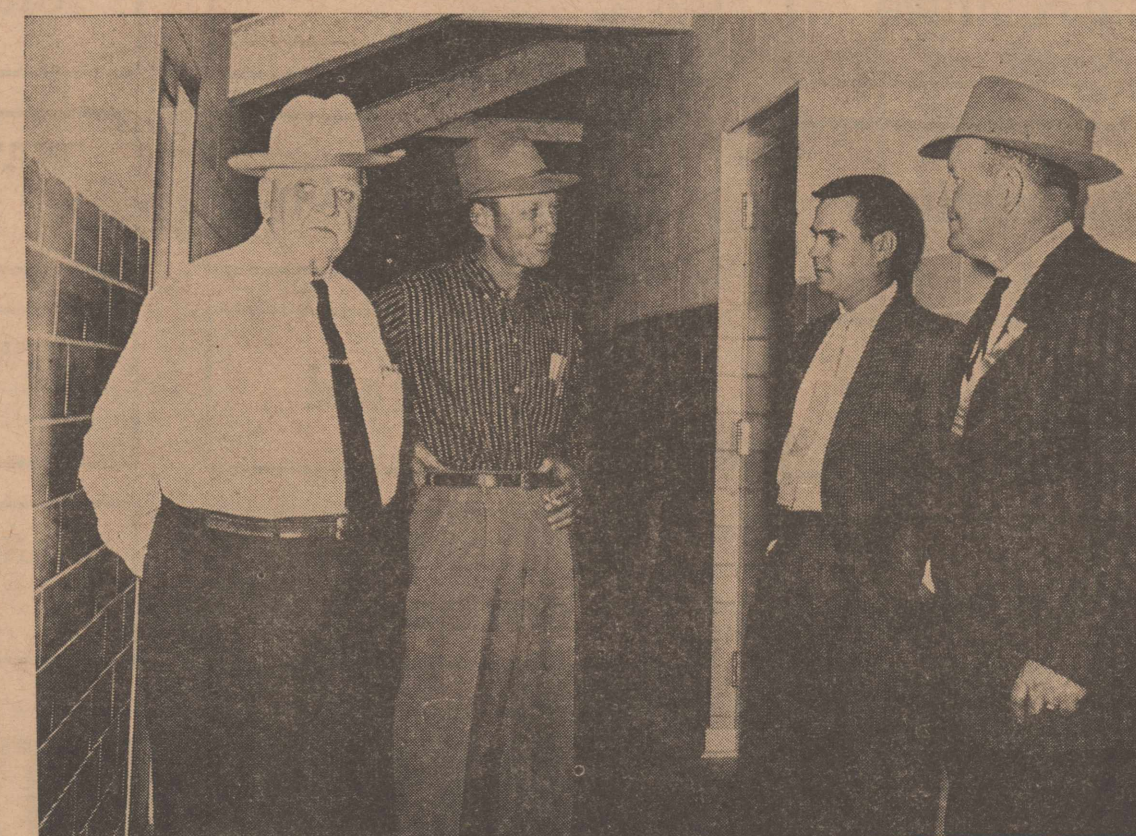
The new \$200,000 gymnasium required about a year for construction.

# Mustangs Gallop On ..... Olton 26--Morton 0

# Mustangs Grab District Lead

The Mustangs took over undisputed lead in District 2-AA Friday night by defeating the Morton Indians 26-0.

Olton eleven scored late in the second quarter of play and were never in serious danger from that point. For the second consecutive game the Mustangs used the single

wing formation to their advantage. The Mustang defense held the Indians to a total of 164 yards while they were racking up a massive 430 yards themselves.

Bull-like charges of Robert Priest and the speed of John Wayne Hair and Rande Buchenau proved too much offense for Morton's fine senior ball club. Alert defensive play saw the Mustangs recover their own quick kick and a Morton fumble to turn both into scoring drives.

### Good Defense

Although most of the players showed up well on defense, Tommy Wilson, Harold Feathergill, Kenneth Hooper, Larry Timmons and Fred Riney turned in one of their better games of the season.

Olton emerged the only undefeated team in the district with two games remaining. Those are away from home against highly regarded Lockney and Abernathy. Last week Abernathy knocked Lockney from the undefeated district teams 21-0 in a game which could have gone either way according to scout reports.

Play in the Olton-Morton game went as follows:

Mustang center Phil Neinst's kick was taken at the 15 and returned to the 26. The Indians gained to the 35 in three plays but were about one foot short of the needed yardage on a fourth down try and the ball went over to the Mustangs.

Hair picked up a first down at the 22 and Priest gained to the 16. Buchenau carried to the 15 and Hair's pass to Buchenau fell incomplete. A fourth down try by Hair through the center of the line was short by inches. Morton

was unable to make the 10 yards needed for a first and facing fourth and 4 yards to go, punted to the 35 yard line.

Buchenau made 4 yards and on the next play the Mustangs drew a 5 yard penalty for off-side. Priest passed incomplete to Buchenau and Hair ran around right end to the 25. On fourth down Priest carried to the 24 yard line for a first down. Buchenau and Hair carried for another first down at the 8 yard line. From this point the Mustangs were unable to get past the 5 yard line and Morton took possession from this point.

### Morton Drives

Morton started their own drive at this point and racked up first downs at the 26, 36, 48 and 39 yard lines before the Mustang defense tightened. An Indian fourth down punt went into the end zone and the Mustangs were operating from their own 20 as the second quarter of play got underway.

A screen pass from Priest to Hair was incomplete but Hair passed complete to Duncan at the 36 yard line for a first down. Priest carried through the center of the line to the 47 for another first and three plays later the Olton eleven was in Morton territory at the 33 yard line with a first down.

Priest carried around left end to the 3 but a backfield in motion penalty cost the Mustangs the fine run and 5 yards to the 38 yard line. On fourth down Buchenau ran

around left end to the 11 yardline but another backfield in motion penalty ruined the scoring threat and on fourth down Priest's kick went into the end zone. Morton found the Mustang defense hard going and punted from the 28 to Olton's 37 where it was taken by Hair.

### Priest Carries

Priest carried through the center of the line and in two plays set up first downs at the 48 and 40 yard lines. Two plays later Hair swept right end to the 25 for another first down. A second down pass from Priest to Buchenau was good to the 9 yard line and another first. Hair carried to the 2, Buchenau gained to the 1 and Priest went over from the 1 yard line for the score. Hair's kick was good and the Mustangs led 7-0.

Morton returned Neinst's kick from the 29 to the 40 and on fourth down, still needing 5 yards, kicked to Buchenau at the 15. Buchenau returned the punt to the 19.

Priest hit the center of the line to the 23 and on three consecutive plays Hair carried around right end making yardage to the 31 and a first down as the first half of play ended.

Neinst's kick was returned from the 21 to the 27 and the Mustang defense really tightened. Morton received a backfield in motion penalty of 5 yards on the first play and Brown and Riney threw the Indian backs for loses to the

34 yard line. Morton's kick was taken by Hair from the 39 to the 41.

Priest carried through the center of the line to the 47 yard line but a fumble was recovered by Morton at the 47.

### Pass Completion

Morton racked up a first down on a pass completion at the 39 and received two penalties in a row for backfield in motion back to the 49. Morton's kick rolled dead on the 5 yard line.

Hair's quick kick was recovered at the 42 yard line and the Mustangs began to roll. With Priest, Hair, Buchenau and Moss carrying the ball the Mustangs made first downs at the 38, 24, 13, and 1 yard lines. Priest carried into the center of the line from the 1 yard line for the second Mustang score. Attempting to run around left end, Hair was stopped short of the goal and the Mustangs led 13-0 with 2:27 remaining in the third quarter.

Morton returned Neinst's kick from the 20 to the 27 yard line. Three straight passes fell incomplete and a fourth down kick was taken by Buchenau at the 25.

### Rande Rins

Turning in his best run of the night, Buchenau returned the kick to the Morton 19 yard line before being brought down.

Three plays lost yardage to the 22 yard line but on fourth down Priest passed complete to Buchenau for the touchdown. Priest hit the center of the line short of the goal and the score was Olton 19, Morton 0 with 0:24 remaining in the third quarter. Neinst's kick was returned from the 23 to the Olton 33 before Hooper made the tackle.

Morton set up a first down at the 20 yard line as a fourth down pass interference was ruled against the Mustangs setting up a first down at the 12 yard line. Two plays later the Mustangs recovered a Morton fumble at the 5 to stop the only serious Morton scoring threat of the game.

Using only six plays and three first downs the Mustangs scored again. Priest carried to the 10, 19, 46 and 49 yard lines. Hair ran around right end to the 32 and from there Buchenau swept left end for the touchdown. Hair's kick was good making the score 26-0.

Neinst kicked to the 20 yard line and Morton returned the ball to the 34. The Indians made a first down at the 42 yard line but a fourth down pass was incomplete

and the Mustangs took over at the 40. Operating from the T formation Olton made first downs at the 48, 37 and 27 yard lines before a second down fumble was recovered by Morton at the 35. Morton gained yardage for first downs at the 49 and 31 yard lines, lost 5 yards for delay of the game and were thrown for a loss at the 36 as the game ended.

D'Lynn Hall Feted With Birthday Party

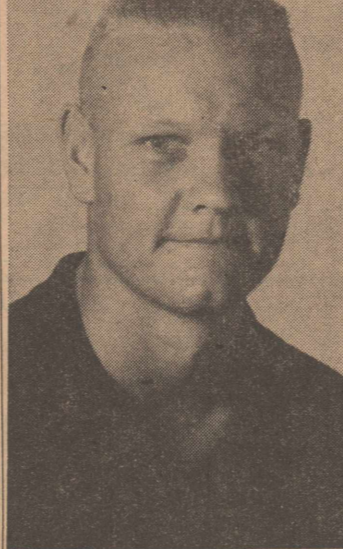
D'Lynn Hall was honored with a birthday party at the home of her mother, Mrs. Joe Hall. The young lady celebrated her third birthday Monday afternoon.

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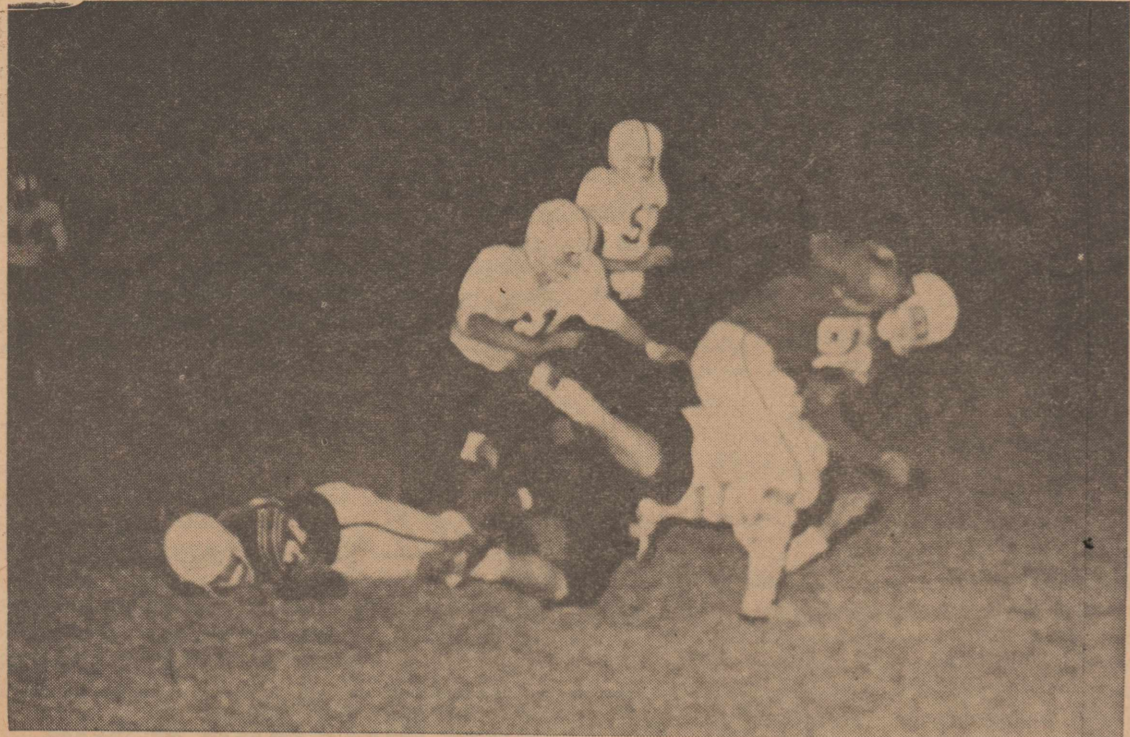

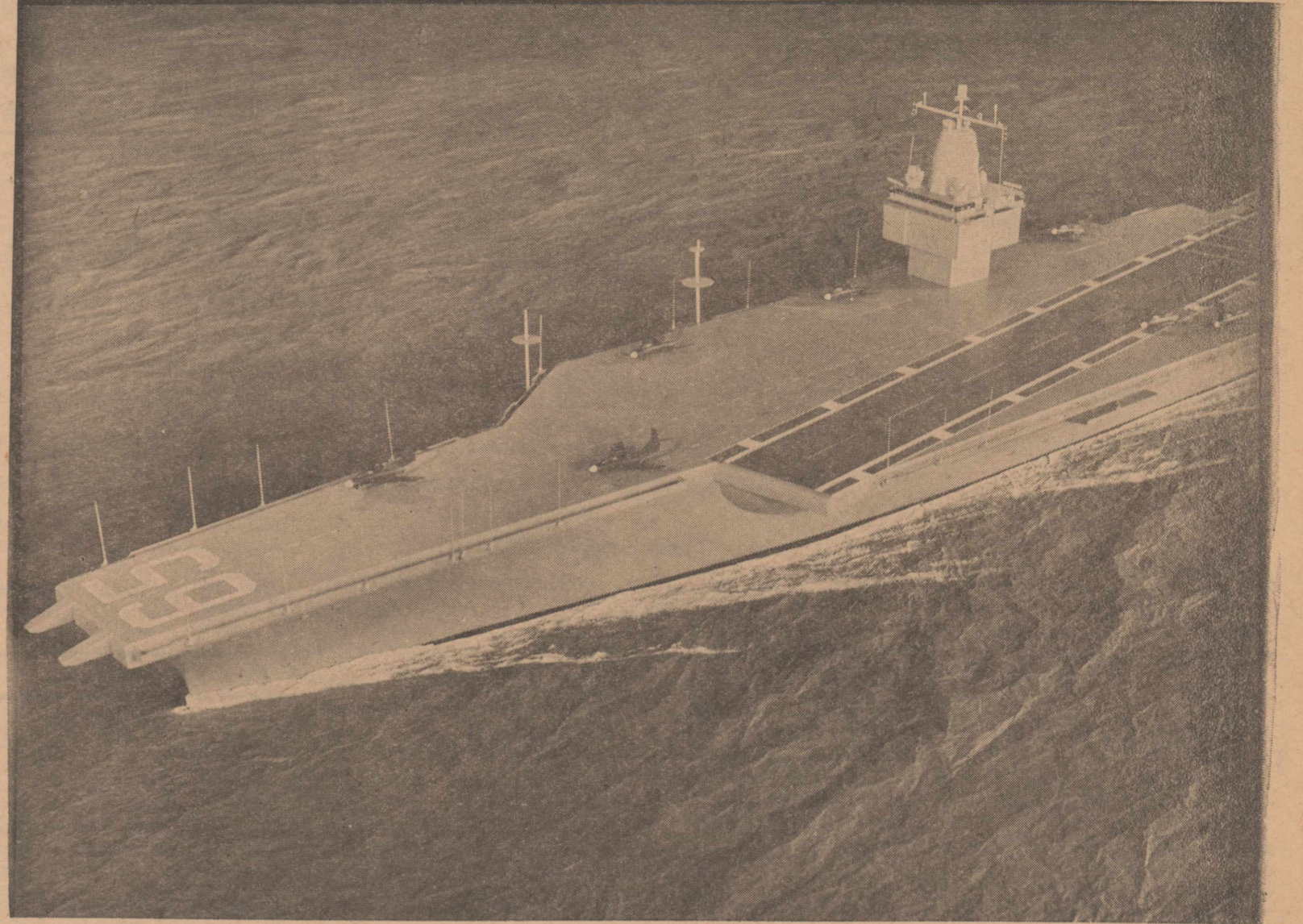

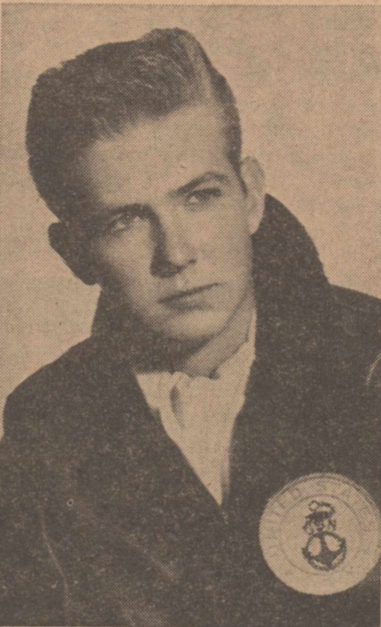


**OLD FIGHTER RETIRES**

Hallowe'en is filled with fun and excitement for kids, and even grown ups have resigned themselves to the minor pranks. The annoyance is short-lived anyway, and what kind of a person would a body be, who would begrudge a starving spook a gingersnap?

Hallowe'en has held a peculiar fascination for children in its weird legends and time-honored symbols. Actually all the spooky festivities which we now associate with Hallowe'en are relics of paganism.

About thirteen centuries ago pagans celebrated November 1 as **All Saint's Day**, at which time spirits both good and evil were believed to arise from their graves and visit the living.

Hallowe'en is an abbreviation of **Hallowed Evening**, a time of gaiety and pranks, a night for children to "plike" they are witches, ghosts and fairies.

There is no historical or educational interest in connection with the holiday, but the perverse pleasure children derive from spooking each other and employing their imaginations . . . as well as Mama's ready needle and the neighbors otherwise forbidden cookie jar . . . have made the celebration grow increasingly popular.

Hallowe'en is practically the only holiday which strictly belongs to children, Easter, Thanksgiving and even Christmas, in their commercialization, have come to be planned primarily for adults with children added only as non-paying afterthoughts.

However, Hallowe'en remains a holiday purely for the enjoyment of children . . . and gillies and ghouls and long-legged beasties and things that go whoomp in the night . . . have remained firm in the imaginations of children for thirteen centuries. Sympathetic little eyes have watched Casper the Friendly Ghost's futile attempts at spooking for many years.

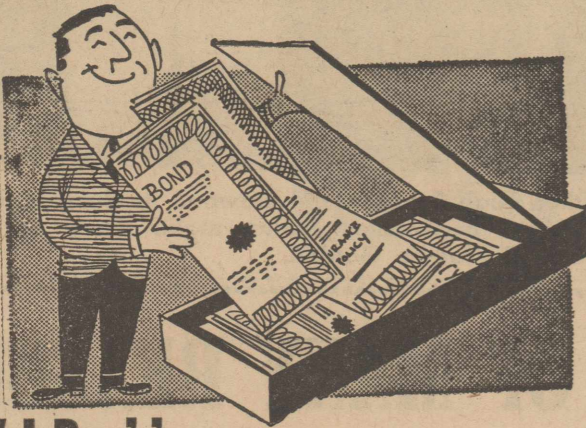

With a teenager who has a well grounded Christian background of good this thing should have little influence at all.

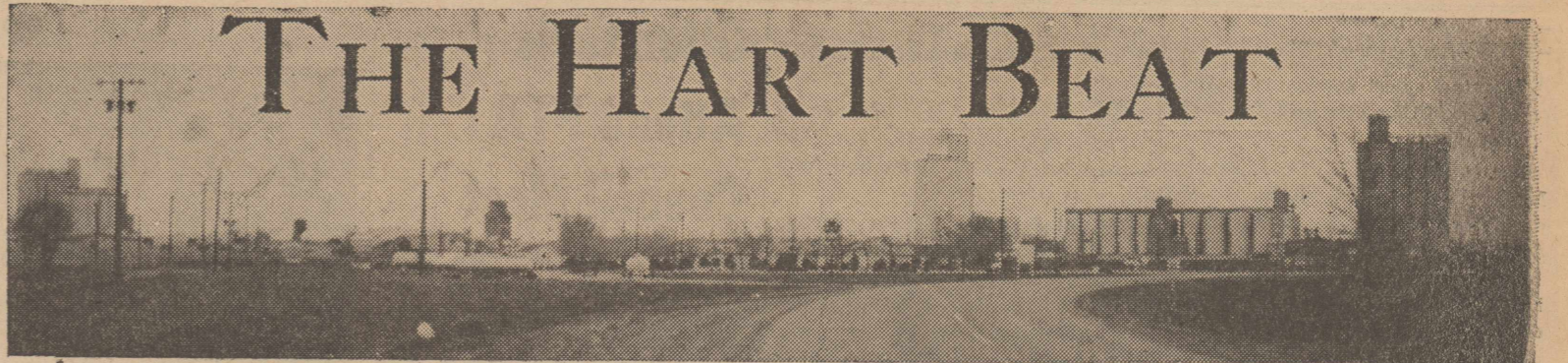

We do not have many vegetables in the plentiful line this time of year, but lettuce is more reasonable now than it has been for quite a while. It can be served in so many salads, so many ways.

**MENU:**

Veal birds  
Mashed potatoes  
Gravy  
Lettuce salad  
Buttered whole grain corn  
Fruit and cookies  
Hot rolls  
Coffee or tea

**Veal Birds:**

1½ pounds round steak cut in 3 x 5 inch pieces.  
Make your favorite dressing recipe, place 1 tablespoon or more on each piece of meat, roll up and fasten with toothpicks or tie with string. Roll in flour and brown in hot fat. Place in oven and bake until tender.

For children; anything small: cupeakes, individual meat loaves or small pies are fun.

To carry a pie away from home, put an empty, inverted pie plate on top, cellophane-tape plates together.

**GROUND RAISIN COOKIES**

¾ c. sifted flour  
½ t. soda  
½ t. nutmeg  
½ t. cinnamon  
½ t. salt  
1 c. ground raisins  
½ c. shortening  
1 c. sugar  
2 eggs  
½ c. sour cream

Work shortening until soft, add sugar and cream well. Beat in eggs, then sour cream and ground raisins. Sift all dry ingredients and add to mixture, mixing thoroughly. Chill for 1 hour. Roll out as thin as possible. Bake 8 min. in a 350 degree oven. These cookies are similar to a commercial raisin biscuit; not too sweet, not too rich.

He adds that cotton harvest which is late this year, still reveals a good per-acre yield.

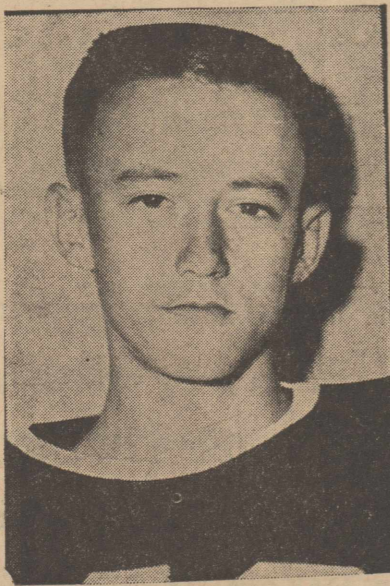
