Silt Problem In Recharging Water Wells Studied At Halfway Station

Research started on sediment problems involved in recharging lake water to the underground water bearing sand at the High Plains Station at Halfway in March. The silt content of water entering the well is being measured and the total amount of silt removed by pumping is being determined in the test.

The extent of the movement of sediment in the underground sand is being observed thru the use of the three four-inch test wells located 8, 50 and 100 feet from the recharge well. Included in the program is a study of any bacterial pollution for the underground water supply caused by recharging.

Two graduate students of the School of Engineering at Texas Tech are conducting the experiment as a part of their work toward a masters degree. Their research is under supervision of Dr. F. A. Wade, Head of the Geology Department at Tech and W. L. Broadhurst, Chief Hydrologist for the High Plains Underground Water District. Funds for the project have been supplied by the Water District. Bob Winn and Tom Cullinan are the graduate students selected to carry on this project which will take 5 months to complete. Cooperation in this important conservation project are the U.S. Geological Survey, the Texas Board of Water Engineers and the High Plains Station.

Olton Man Friend And Foe Of Notorious Pancho Villa

One of the most vivid memories in the life of Abraham De Leon is that of standing in Mexico City long ago talking of land reforms with a big brute of a man who could smile like sunshine or scowl like death itself.

Many years have passed since that day in Mexico City. Abraham now lives here in Olton and the broad smile beneath that great mustache has been a memory for three decades.

The man who wore that smile and mustache for four years (from 1912 to 1916) struck terror into the hearts of the patrons of Olton.

He was a man whom Abraham De Leon rode with and then against. His name is the most famous name in modern Mexican history. His name was Pancho Villa.

Actually, Mr. De Leon was a soldier riding under the leadership of Menistran Carranza. For a time during the revolution which overthrew Porfirio Diaz, Carranza and Villa were allies.

Mr. De Leon describes Villa as an "hombre gordito con un mustache grande." (a fat man with a great mustache).

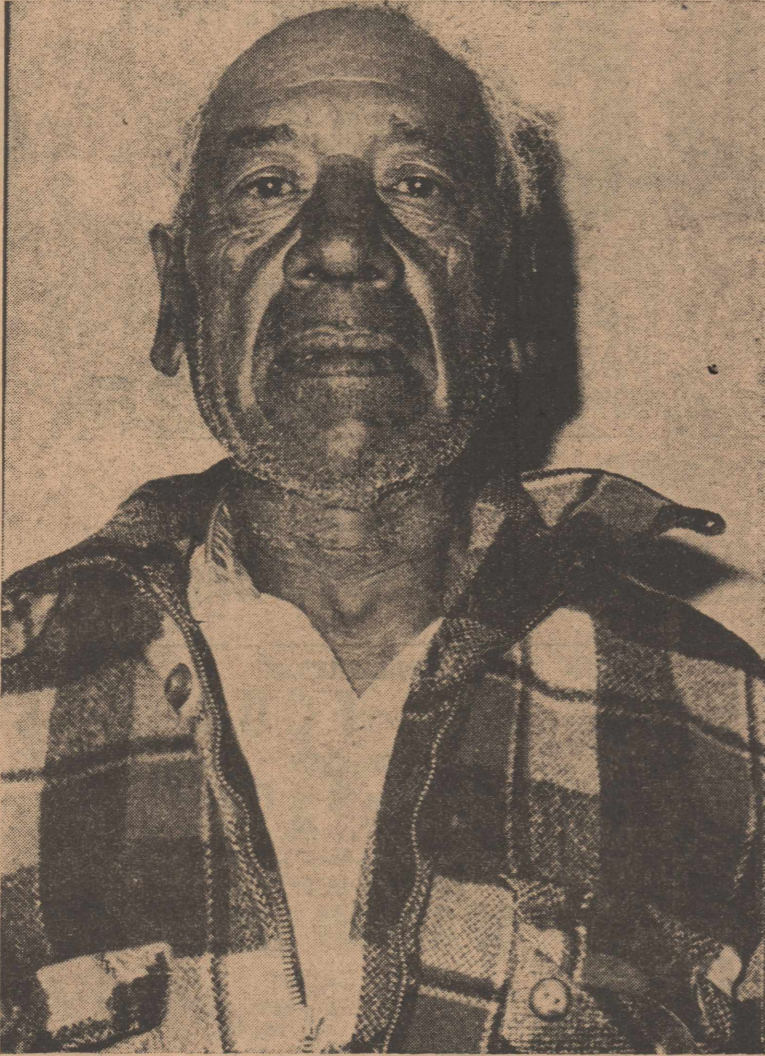
Villa was elevated to the rank of general but could neither read nor write. Mr. De Leon said Villa became infuriated and rebelled against Mexican upper crust after a patron had raped his sister.

Villa's real name was Doroteo Arango. After killing his patron, (patron is the name for boss man in Spanish) Arango fled to the hills and joined a gang led by a man who went by the name Arango was later to make famous. The chief of the gang was killed and Arango took up the name of Pancho Villa and sent it ringing from Panama to the Rio Grande and from the Pacific to the Gulf.

The remainder of Villa's story is history. Illiterate though he was, he aspired to the Presidency of Mexico. Denied this honor by his associates, he rose up against them.

Defeated at last, he was killed by an assassin.

Mr. De Leon tells an interesting story of how he got mixed up in the revolution himself.

He was the son of a tenant farmer. His patron lived in town and Mr. De Leon went into town to work as a house servant and became a very trusted retainer.

His patron was very rich and very much afraid of what the banditos would do to his fortune should the town be raided. One day he sent all the family and

other servants away. He procured a huge bottle of tequila to serve as refreshments for Mr. De Leon and the latter went to work burying the family

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treasure. Mr. De Leon smiles as he remembers how he downed the tequila and buried the treasure. After that, the patron bought Mr. De Leon a big rifle. He went with his patron everywhere as a body guard. Mr. De Leon had troubles with the mistress of the house.

She wanted to know where the gold was hidden. He wouldn't tell. He says she used all her wiles upon him in an effort to make him divulge his secret. He refused.

A cousin, Juan De Leon, got out of prison about that time. Abraham confided in him. Juan suggested that they not stay in the dangerous vicinity of a woman on the war path.

He decided that they should take a safer course like going to war. So the two joined up with Carranza and were off to the revolution.

Mr. De Leon said his leader was governor of Coahuila.

Mr. De Leon said that to this day he has not revealed the hiding place of his patron's fortune.

After the war land was given to veterans of the revolution. Mr. De Leon had a new wife (he married Guadalupe Contreras in 1916) but no money to buy farming gear so he came to Texas to seek his fortune.
