Twenty-one Olton Public School teachers received special service pins at Olton's first Teacher-Appreciation Dinner held in the school lunchroom Thursday evening.

In addition, Fred Stockdale, band director, was presented a plaque as Teacher of the Year in Olton, and Fred Gordon, elementary school principal, received special recognition and a "gift from friends."

Some 200 parents and teachers attended the affair, which was sponsored by the P-TA, Olton Garden Club, Bykota Study Club, New Century Study Club, Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, and Olton Lions Club.

Louis Hair was master of ceremonies. Rev. John E. Lewis said the invocation, and W. T. Hall Jr., offered a tribute to teachers. School Supt. Joe W. Harper presented the special service awards in four categories, according to the number of years a teacher had taught in Olton public schools.

For five through nine years, pins were presented to Mesdames Freda Worley, second grade teacher; Lois Turner, fourth grade; Ruby Sturch, second grade; Ruth Ford, Senior English; Jewell Dale, first grade; Jewell Campbell, sixth grade; Messrs. Joe Turner, high school coach; Jeff Smart, assistant coach; Jimmie Goss, assistant and basketball coach; Harry Ford, high school math; Robert Fisher, junior high principal.

In the 10 through 14 year group were Mesdames Bettie Daniel, seventh grade; Naomi Cooner, seventh grade; Linnie Campbell, eighth grade; Juanita Adams, fifth grade; and Susie Aikman, first grade.

Medals for 15 through 19 years of service were received by Mrs. Margie Slatten, lunchroom business manager; Mrs. Ruth Franks, third grade; and Fred Gordon, elementary principal.

The pins were designed exclusively for Olton teachers by Mr. Harper, with the assistance of a salesman from the engraving company. They feature a burning taper inside a circle, topped by a gold star. Around the circle is engraved "Olton Public Schools."

In the ten-year pins is a red stone; in the 15-year pins, a green; in the 20-year, a blue; and in the 25-year pin, a diamond.

Mrs. Elmer Moore presented the plaque to Mr. Stockdale on behalf of Olton's three federated study clubs. Mrs. C. S. Silcott made the presentation to Fred Gordon.

Olton Second In Dist. Track Meet

Olton thincalms garnered 43 1/2 points last week end in the district track meet at Lubbock to win second place.

Abernathy with 49 points was first. Rande Buchenau was first in the 100-yard dash with a time of 10.6 seconds. L. H. McAdams was first in the 220 with a time of 23.5 seconds. Jimmy Robbins was second and Buchenau was third.

Arno Hall tied for first and Gary Lawson was fourth in pole vault. Hall cleared the bar at 10 feet, 6 inches.

Hall was fourth in discus and Robbins was fourth in broad jump. Hall was high point man for the meet with 8 1/2 points to his credit.

Buchenau will go to the regional meet at Lubbock Saturday afternoon in the 100 yard dash. Bodkin will compete in the 440 as will both relay teams.

Grade school tracksters was third in their portion of the meet. Barry Prestridge was the king pin in that division.

He was first in the 100 yard dash with a time of 11.2 and first in the shot put with a distance of 33 feet, 10 inches. He also placed second in the 75 yard dash.

The 440 relay team was third.

South Plains Farmers Riled Over "Cold Decked" Hearing At Mill

Al Muldrow of Brownfield will be principal speaker at a farm labor meeting to be held at 8 o'clock Friday night in the district court room at Littlefield.

Spokesman for the group calling the meeting termed it one of the most important that farmers will be asked to attend this year.

It concerns wage laws and threats to unionize farm labor.

The spokesman for the group said the Department of Labor plans to put into effect a number of regulations which "could ruin farmers."

Mr. Muldrow is on the Mexican sub-committee to the department of Labor.

Several Speakers Also speaking will be John Kendrick, Brownfield banker. He will talk on legislation now before Congress and its probable effect on businessmen and farmers.

Another speaker will be Joe Sooter, president of the West Texas Employers Group.

In the meantime, management and attorneys for Plains Co-Op Oil Mill at Lubbock walked out of a heated formal hearing on the proposed unionization of the mill.

Mill Hearing Olton people attending the meeting said management walked out when its attorneys were denied the right to cross examine a testifying union representative.

The Lubbock Avalanche identified the hearing officer as Charles Steere of the National Labor Relations Board's regional office in Fort Worth.

AFL-CIO United Packing House Workers is attempting to unionize the huge Lubbock mill, world's largest processor of cotton seed products.

Lloyd Graham, manager of Olton Co-Op Gin, attended the meeting. He said Steere quizzed the union representative from a prepared list of questions.

Cold Deck The Avalanche said attorneys for the mill labeled the questioning "cold decked." They complained that without being able to cross examine there was no way to determine the validity of the answers given by the witness.

Mr. Graham said evidence was presented tending to allege that 43 mill workers who earlier had signed application cards for membership in the union no longer wanted to join the UPWA.

Refuse Cards Mill attorneys then asked the whereabouts of the 43 cards and requested that they be produced at the hearing. Mr. Graham said the cards were not produced.

The Avalanche quoted Mr. Steere as saying the NLRB regards the staging of an election among employees as the best way to resolve the issue.

Olton farmers look upon the organizing of mill workers at Lubbock as an entering wedge to organize all farm labor.

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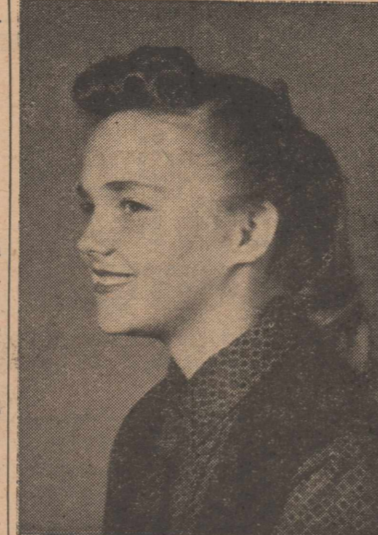
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JANIS SHARP IS BEAUTY QUEEN

Hart Church Is Listed In 1959 Yearbook

The Hart Assembly of God Church is included in the national release of statistics in the 1959 Yearbook of American Churches.

This report lists the Assemblies of God eighth in number of churches, out of approximately 255 US denominations. This group is one of the youngest in the country, having been founded in 1914.

According to the Rev. Edward R. Fairbanks, Hart pastor, the church's Sunday School enrollment is more indicative of the size of the denomination than its membership, as many churches do not stress membership. The denomination estimates about 893,530 students.

Statistics in the Yearbook were compiled by the National Council of Churches in Christ. It lists all denominations in the US, including those not a member of the Council.

Jack also has done well in other phases of school work. He was district winner in declamation this year.

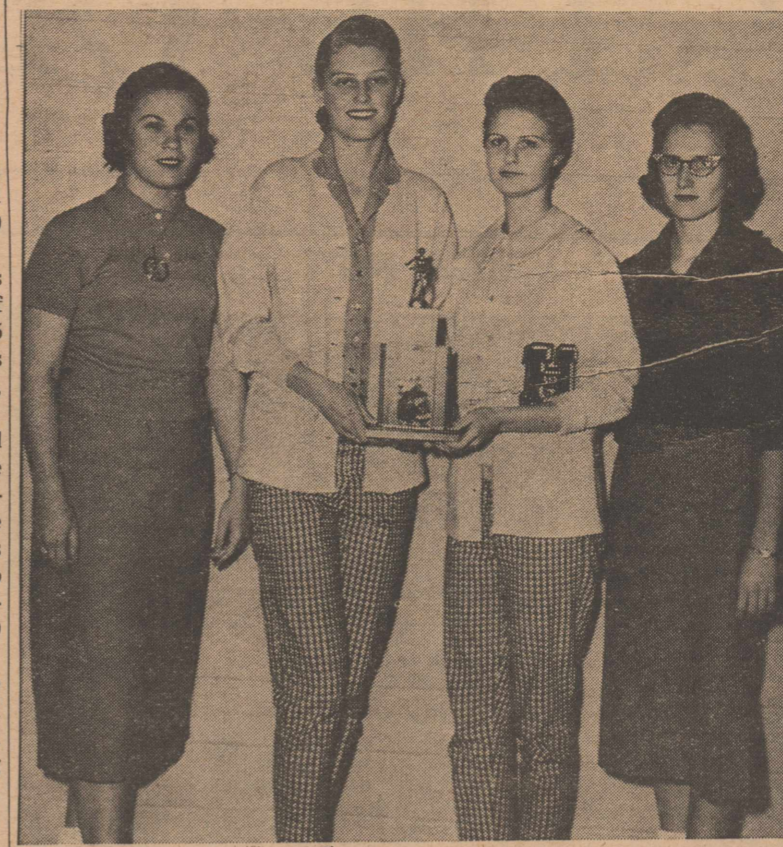
Hart Lions Enter Contests

Stuffed Pork Chops
Have your butcher make pockets in thick pork chops. Allow one chop for a serving. Wipe chops with a damp cloth. Prepare your favorite dressing and fill pockets in pork chops with it. Close pockets with toothpicks. Lay chops in a baking dish or skillet, pour milk to a depth of 1/2 inch. Do not cover chops with milk. Cover baking dish and bake in slow oven, 300 degrees for 1 1/2 hours. Remove cover and brown 15 min. If milk evaporates, add a little water once or twice during cooking. When done you will have ample gravy for serving.

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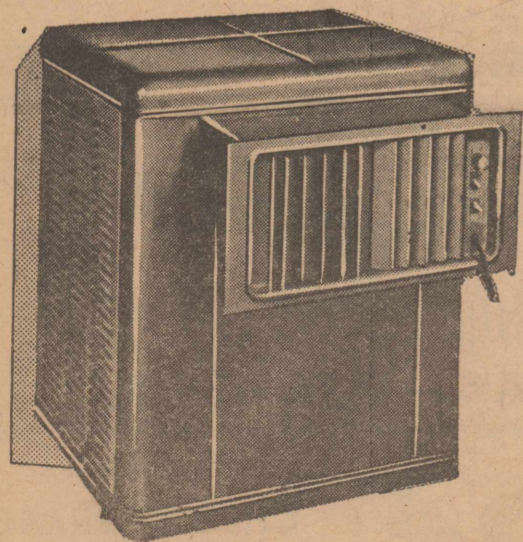

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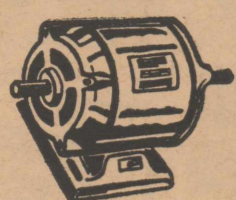

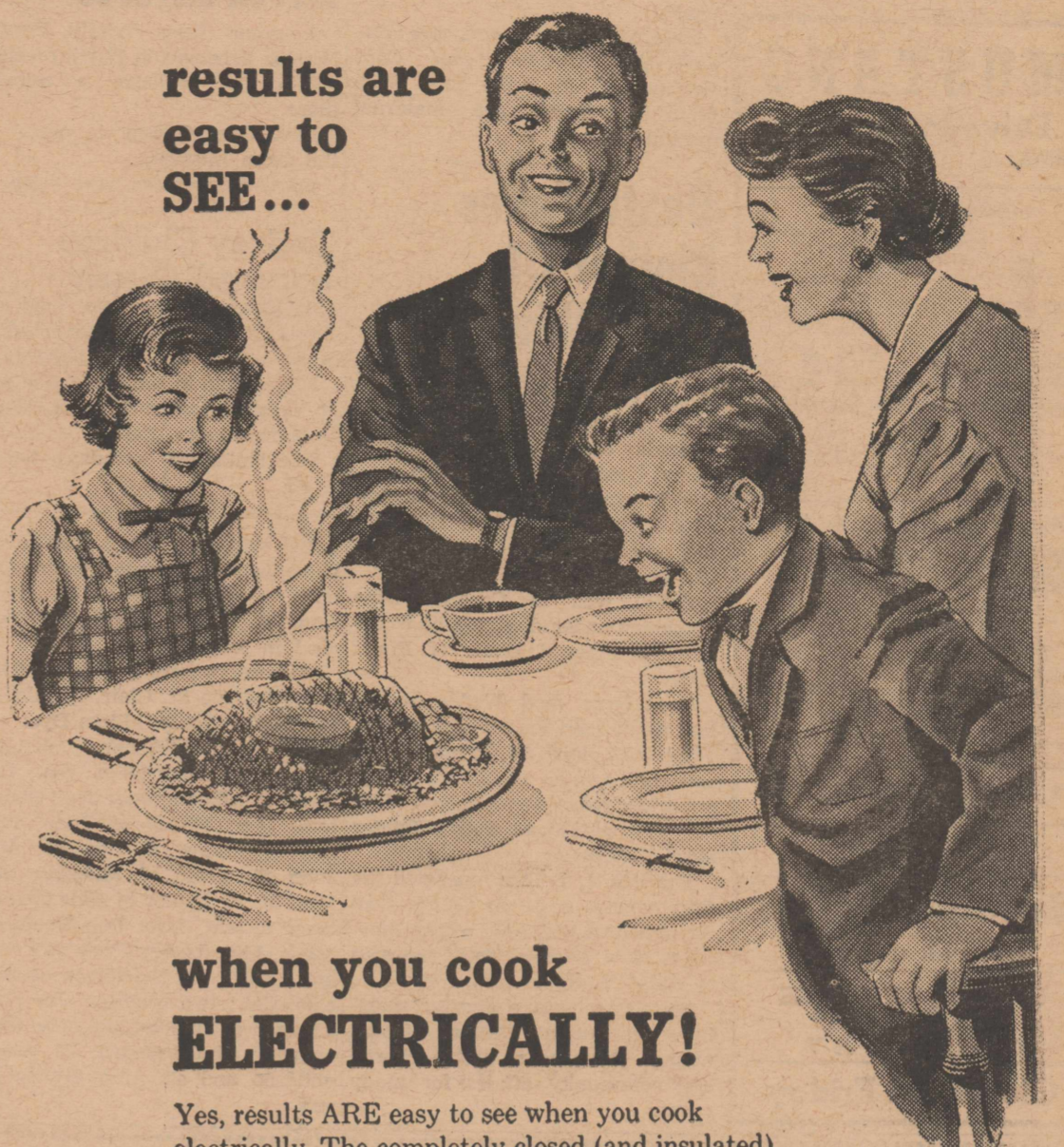
