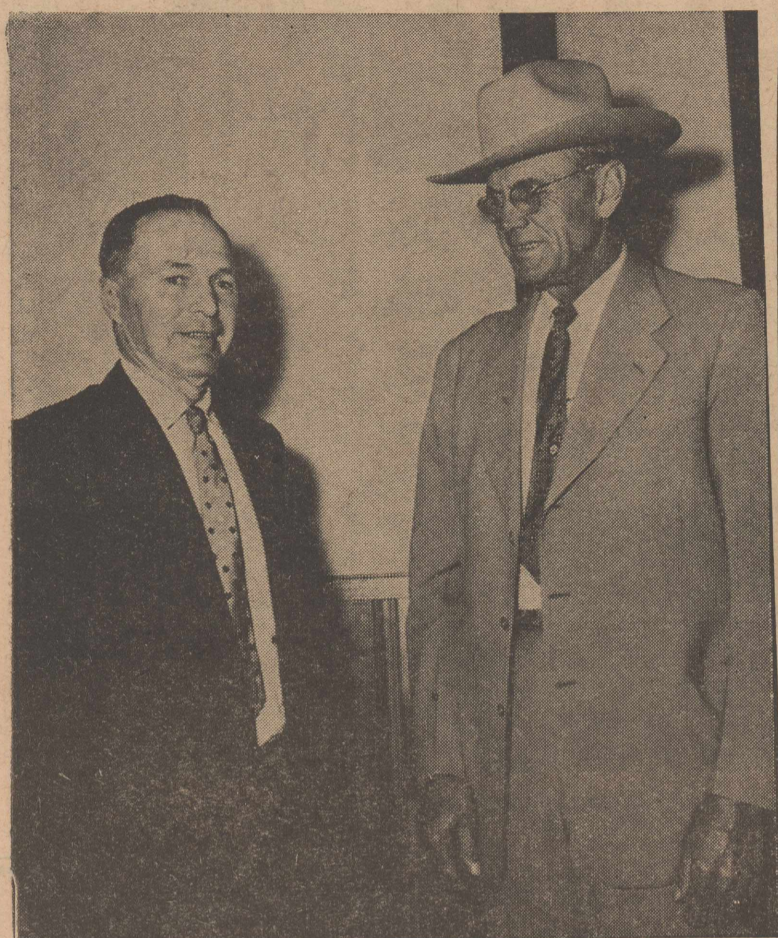




Olton Station?

No DPS Station For Olton Yet Says Crowder

Lack of man power will keep the Department of Public Safety from establishing a station in Olton in the near future.

This is the essence of what Major Bob Crowder, department commander for this area, told a group of Olton men last Friday at a meeting at Ideal Cafe.

We will keep Olton in mind and recommend that a station be established in your town as soon as possible," Major Crowder said.

Major Crowder said that right now some 115 men are needed to fill department positions at stations already established.

Major Crowder said that his department needs help in getting applicants for patrolman. Applicants must be between 21 and 35 years old, at least 5 feet, 8 inches tall and have a high school education or its equivalent. Applicants must be of good moral character.

He said a patrolman must lose his job because the hours are long and the pay is short. While in training a rookie receives \$300 a month. After three months of training he is placed on the road with an experienced man and gets \$350 a month. Top pay is \$380 a month.

Bowling Alley For Olton Now Assured

Olton will have a new bowling alley.

Jesse Watson of Springlake this week announced that he would build an 8-lane bowling alley at the western outskirts of town on Highway 70.

The building will be 50 feet by 140 feet. Mr. Watson purchased a tract 235 feet by 173 feet for the site. He bought the land from C. T. Mason.

He said he purchased a tract which will have ample parking space around it. The building will be set 50 feet back from the property line.

The bowling alley also will have a snack bar. Mr. Watson will operate the establishment himself.

The alleys will be equipped with automatic pin setting devices. Mr. Watson said he already has gone into contract with AFM, a pin setting equipment firm, for the necessary automatic pin setting devices.

Mr. Watson has lived at Springlake for the past 10 years. He is a member of the Springlake city commission. He moved to this area from Dallas. He farmed near Springlake until the first of the year.

Who Was Irresponsible . . .

James Hamm is editor of the Texas Tech school newspaper. A few days ago a story crossed his desk about Texas Tech President E. N. Jones.

Before James had an opportunity to print the story he was set upon by President Jones, whose actions were described by members of his own faculty as impetuous.

President Jones defended his actions upon the grounds that young Hamm and members of his staff were irresponsible. He at least insinuated that members of Hamm's staff set up the story to provide news for their paper.

Yet, Jones has been forced to admit that the Toreador did not set up the story in question and that The Toreador was covering it in good faith as legitimate news. Jones made his statement for public print, thereby jeopardizing young Hamm's chances at a job when he is graduated from college in August.

Acting on what he now admits was mere hearsay he sent a message to young Hamm which was insulting, humiliating and damaging.

All reports indicate that young Hamm's conduct was exemplary throughout the incident. As a fellow journalist we are proud of James Hamm.

He did not print the story because he felt that it just might be tinged with yellow journalism.

President Jones, acting upon what now appears to be an impulse, threatened to suspend James Hamm from college if he were to print the story. We submit that Jones now either should apologize to James Hamm in public print or himself face suspension.

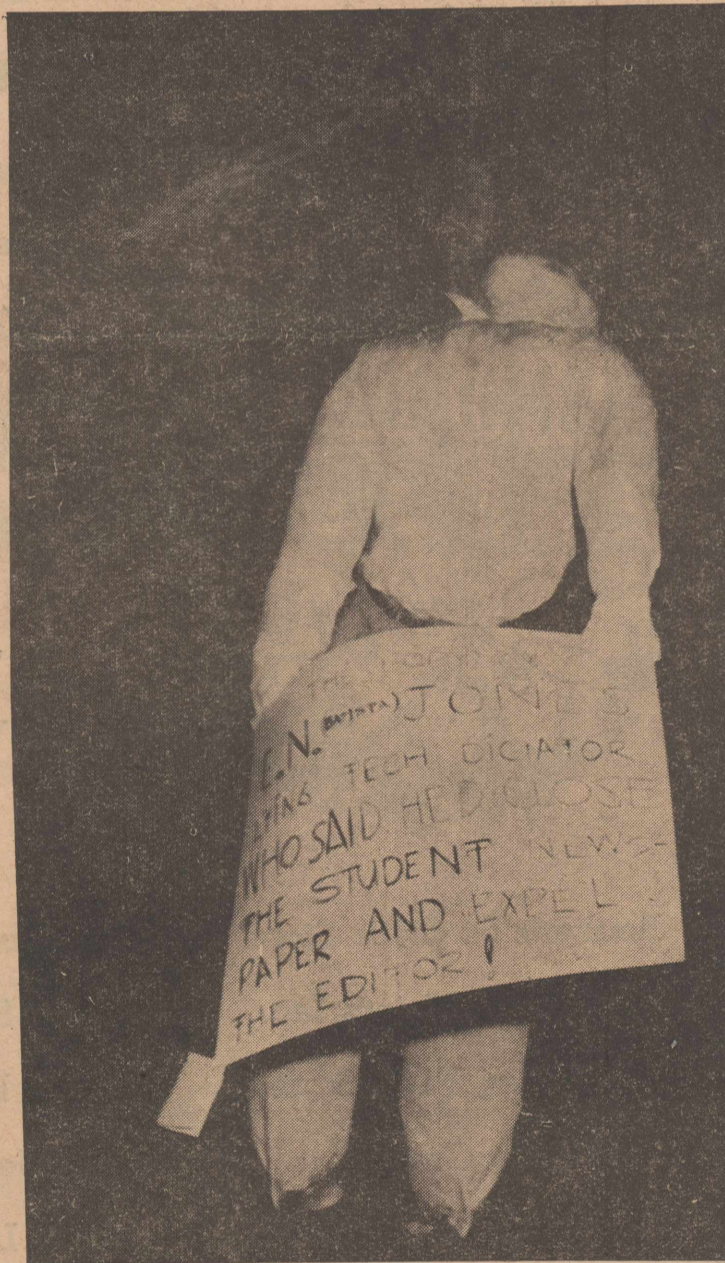
Governing body for the school newspaper at Texas Tech is set up to allow the maximum freedom to the staff of the newspaper. The staff is made up of journalism students who must learn to report news in a free press.

President Jones himself describes The Toreador as a newspaper laboratory. If it is to be a laboratory, then it must be treated as a free newspaper and not as a mouthpiece for college brass.

If Tech is not to have a free newspaper, then it should have no newspaper.

Let us hasten to add that students who participate in party raids and effigy hangings are not interested in higher learning, are wasting tax payers money and should be expelled.

This Is Lawless



This is a picture of Tech President E. N. Jones hanged in effigy. This is the very essence of lawlessness and disregard for society. Those who participated should be expelled from Texas Tech and not allowed to enter another state supported school. Dr. Jones was at least legally within his rights in refusing to permit publication of a similar picture in the school newspaper. However, Dr. Jones admits that he falsely accused the Toreador staff of Editor James Hamm of Olton of setting up this effigy to provide synthetic news for their paper. Dr. Jones' accusations were in public print. He has since admitted that he made the accusation without proper investigation and that the accusations had proved to be unfounded. By his own earlier statement, Dr. Jones is guilty of imposing censorship. Pictures such as this should be, MUST be published so that an aroused public may force a halt to such disregard for legally delegated authority. JONES ADMITS TOREADOR STAFF BLAMELESS IN EFFIGY INCIDENT

President E. N. Jones of Texas Tech this week admitted that he acted on the spur of the moment and without just cause when he threatened to suspend Toreador Editor James Hamm of Olton.

Threat of suspension came when Jones told Hamm that he'd be writing 30 to his college career at Tech if the Toreador went to press with a story about Jones being hanged in effigy.

The Toreador is the college newspaper at Texas Tech.

The effigy incident occurred a week ago Saturday. The Avallanche-Journal said it apparently stemmed from two "party raids" at the school and the naming of a faculty committee to investigate the raids.

Set Up

President Jones accused Editor Hamm's Toreador staff of setting up the effigy incident in order to provide news for the paper. Jones said he intervened to prevent publication of the story because he felt that for a newspaper to set up such a story was "not acceptable."

Belatedly, Tuesday morning Dr. Jones admitted to Enterprise Pub-

lisher Troy Martin that his accusation had been unfounded.

Hamm is a senior journalism student at Texas Tech. He said that had the story been "set up" by a member of his staff that he would not, as a matter of ethics, have printed it.

"I did not fail to print it because I was afraid of being suspended," Hamm explained to The Enterprise Tuesday. "I didn't print it because I did not know for certain at press time that some of my staff had not actually set the thing up."

Hamm emphasized that had he known at the time that Jones' accusations were groundless he would have printed the story even if it meant leaving college.

More Than College

"College is four years," said Hamm. "I'm going to stay in journalism all my life and what is four years compared to a life time. If I started giving up my principals at this early date I just about as well quit right now."

Impetuous Man

Informed sources who declined to be identified for fear of retaliation described the Texas Tech president as an "impetuous man" who acted on the spur of the moment.

The highly reliable and informed source said Jones acted with little or no investigation in the case. The Hamm boy told The Enterprise that Jones made the suspension threat without even contacting Hamm to determine whether plans were in the mill to print the story.

"He (President Jones) just took for granted that one would be printed and he moved," The Enterprise source on the campus reported.

Hamm Mature

One informed source said young Hamm behaved with "maturity and responsibility" throughout the incident. "I don't find any fault with the way James behaved," said one faculty member who knows Hamm well.

The Enterprise was informed Tuesday that Editor Hamm bears the responsibility of publishing The Toreador and normally would be responsible to the Publications Committee made up of students and faculty members.

Jones did not go through the Publications Committee with his comments as would have been normal.

President Jones somewhat sheepishly admitted that, through his ultimatum to Hamm, the effigy incident achieved a notoriety it never would have attained on its own.

Hamm said Tuesday that The Toreador has printed its final publication for the year.

Olton Church Breaks Ground For Building

In the meantime, members of the church are remodeling the manse, or pastor's home. Rev. and Mrs. Gerald Thomas are scheduled to move here soon from Lubbock. The couple has three little boys.

Olton was plunged into darkness for a half hour Wednesday night. Southwestern Public Service Company blamed line trouble near Hale Center.

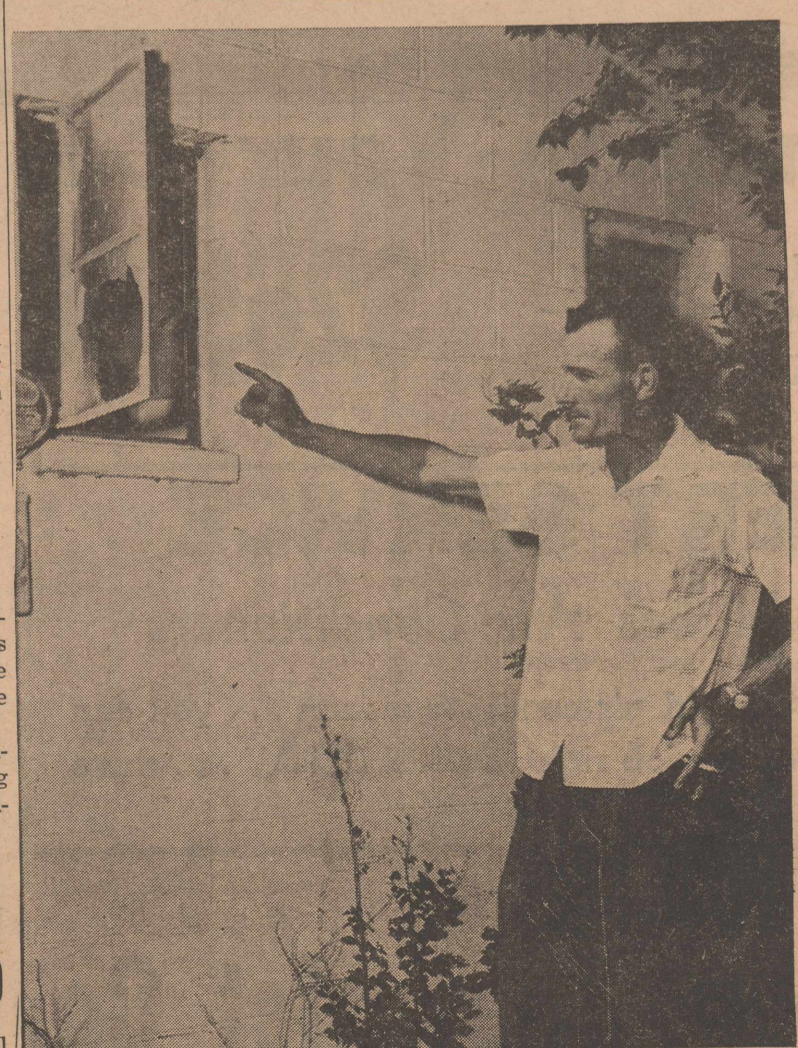
Dr. Basil Johns put stitches into a gash on the head of a small boy using a flashlight for light during the blackout. The lad was Terry Lively.

We Will Be Closed Memorial Day Saturday, May 30th

L. L. Howard, retired Olton farmer, spends his winters at Corpus Christi and his summer in Colorado but still calls Olton his home.

Mr. Howard makes canes winter and summer. Mr. Howard remembers himself in the early days at Olton as almost a one-man chamber of commerce.

He says he helped to organize Olton State Bank and the first rural mail route.

Mr. Howard still has a farm about 2 miles southeast of town and his children, Floyd and Lester Howard, and Mrs. Ruby Howard Crosby still live here. Mrs. Crosby lives on the old home place.

Mr. Howard describes himself as a Texas plowboy instead of a cowboy. He says he's been in every state in the Union and cured a serious stomach ailment by fishing for the past 25 years.

At 78 he claims himself to be a better man than he was 25 years ago. "I do all my driving and have never had an accident that was my fault," declared Mr. Howard. He says he's been driving since 1915.

Mr. Howard doesn't need a cane himself but spends most of his time and energy making canes.

In fact when Mr. Howard looks at a hunk of wood, he can envision a cane, just as a diamond cutter can envision a beautiful gem inside a crude stone.

Each year, when the May sun begins to warm up the Texas Plains, the Howards head for the Pikes Peak region. They stay there until the night air gets a snap in it in late September or October and then they head back to Texas.

Wherever they go, Mr. Howard, now veteran cane-maker, eyes on almost every piece of wood in sight. If the hunk of wood has any promise, Mr. Howard is likely to get hold of it and start to work.

Mrs. Howard thinks it is fine that her husband takes such an avid interest in his near full-time hobby.

In fact she is just as likely as not to act as a scout and keep her eyes peeled for a promising piece of wood.

It wasn't always that way. When Mr. Howard began making canes about 30 years ago, his wife considered the finished products just a nuisance. When the canes began to become a big pile of sticks in their home she decided something had to be done.

Those canes went, but by that time Mrs. Howard realized she was as interested in the canes as her husband and also was as proud of them as he was.

Mr. Howard tells this story of getting interested in cane making. "About 30 years ago we were up in the mountains near Crede and I got to looking at a pine tree. All of a sudden I thought that if I had a piece of wood like the top of the tree I was looking at that I could make a good cane."

Why did he want to make a cane? Mr. Howard doesn't know. "I just wanted to make one," he explained.

So the Howards drove out of the national forest and Mr. Howard got himself a hunk of tree top just like the one he had seen near Crede.

He made his first cane and that started it. He hasn't been able to stop since. He doesn't know how many he has made since then.

"I make them out of all kinds of wood and all I use is a hatchet, saw, rasp and sand paper," he explained.

Mr. Howard does not work with any specific aim of getting out a given number of canes each month.

"If I work at it, I can make one a day, all except the varnish finish," he said.

Mr. Howard goes at a cane this way. First he spots a piece of wood he thinks he can use for a cane. He saws this to length, then goes to work with his hatchet.

"I just hold it with my hand and start chopping with the hatchet. I never have cut myself yet. But sometimes I wonder why I haven't whacked off my thumb here," he said and held up his left thumb for a quick inspection.

He likes red cedar for making handsome canes, but has made some mighty pretty ones out of chinaberry, pine and even the root of a cottonwood.

He has a true scout's eye for dead trees and once even spotted one in the Evergreen Cemetery at Colorado Springs. The cemetery caretaker was happy to give it to Mr. Howard on Mr. Howard's promise to haul it away—which he promptly did.

When Mr. Howard began making canes, he found he had nothing to do with them except keep them around the house.

It was that first big pile of canes that his wife demanded he get rid of that put him into a more serious mood about canes.

He took 96 of them to Dallas one day and gave the canes and a check to an old folks home. He took enough canes so that each person living in the home could

have one.

Since then Mr. Howard has been making canes with a purpose. "I have never sold a cane and don't intend to sell one," he declares. "I give away every cane I make."

He has given canes to all of his relatives, to friends, to ministers and of course to old people who need canes.

Mr. Howard also sent a cane to President Eisenhower. It was made of Colorado red cedar and had a

head of a round-billed duck on the handle.

The President sent a "nice letter of thanks for the cane. The Howards cherish the letter."

Mr. Howard figures that some time in the next 10 years or so he may slow down enough to need a cane. When that time comes, he will be ready, for he has laid aside a few of the canes he particularly likes for his own eventual use.

Right now the only use he has

for a cane is to show a visitor how he can walk with two canes so that his own two feet and the two canes hit the ground in a pattern of a walking horse.

Mr. Howard can't exactly figure how many canes he has made and has no idea how many more he will make. When is he going to quit?

"It's good exercise and I'm not going to quit until I have to," he declared.

Hard Boiled Hamm Leaves Bad Taste With Texas Tech Prexy

JONES ADMITS TOREADOR STAFF BLAMELESS IN EFFIGY INCIDENT

President E. N. Jones of Texas Tech this week admitted that he acted on the spur of the moment and without just cause when he threatened to suspend Toreador Editor James Hamm of Olton.

Threat of suspension came when Jones told Hamm that he'd be writing 30 to his college career at Tech if the Toreador went to press with a story about Jones being hanged in effigy.

The Toreador is the college newspaper at Texas Tech.

The effigy incident occurred a week ago Saturday. The Avalanche-Journal said it apparently stemmed from two "panty raids" at the school and the naming of a faculty committee to investigate the raids.

Set Up

President Jones accused Editor Hamm's Toreador staff of setting up the effigy incident in order to provide news for the paper. Jones said he intervened to prevent publication of the story because he felt that for a newspaper to set up such a story was "not acceptable."

Belatedly, Tuesday morning Dr. Jones admitted to Enterprise Publisher Troy Martin that his accusation had been unfounded.

Hamm is a senior journalism student at Texas Tech. He said that had the story been "set up" by a member of his staff that he would not, as a matter of ethics, have printed it.

"I did not fail to print it because I was afraid of being suspended," Hamm explained to The Enterprise Tuesday. "I didn't print it because I did not know for certain at press time that some of my staff had not actually set the thing up."

Hamm emphasized that had he known at the time that Jones' accusations were groundless he would have printed the story even if it meant leaving college.

More Than College

"College is four years," said Hamm. "I'm going to stay in journalism all my life and what is four years compared to a life time. If I started giving up my principals at this early date I just about as well quit right now."

Impetuous Man

Informed sources who declined to be identified for fear of retaliation described the Texas Tech president as an "impetuous man" who acted on the spur of the moment.

The highly reliable and informed source said Jones acted with little or no investigation in the case. The Hamm boy told The Enterprise that Jones made the suspension threat without even contacting Hamm to determine whether plans were in the mill to print the story.

"He (President Jones) just took for granted that one would be

printed and he moved," The Enterprise source on the campus reported.

Hamm Mature

One informed source said young Hamm behaved with "maturity and responsibility" throughout the incident. "I don't find any fault with the way James behaved," said one faculty member who knows Hamm well.

The Enterprise was informed Tuesday that Editor Hamm bears the responsibility of publishing The Toreador and normally would be responsible to the Publications Committee made up of students and faculty members.

Jones did not go through the Publications Committee with his comments as would have been normal.

President Jones somewhat sheepishly admitted that, through his ultimatum to Hamm, the effigy incident achieved a notoriety it never would have attained on its own.

Hamm said Tuesday that The Toreador has printed its final publication for the year.

James Hamm My staff didn't do it.

Who Was Irresponsible . . .

James Hamm is editor of the Texas Tech school newspaper. A few days ago a story crossed his desk about Texas Tech President E. N. Jones.

Before James had an opportunity to print the story he was set upon by President Jones, whose actions were described by members of his own faculty as impetuous.

President Jones defended his actions upon the grounds that young Hamm and members of his staff were irresponsible. He at least insinuated that members of Hamm's staff set up the story to provide news for their paper.

Yet, Jones has been forced to admit that the newspaper did not set up the story in question and that The Toreador was covering it in good faith as legitimate news. Jones made his statement for public print, thereby jeopardizing young Hamm's chances at a job when he is graduated from college in August.

Acting on what he now admits was mere hearsay he sent a message to young Hamm which was insulting, humiliating and damaging.

All reports indicate that young Hamm's conduct was exemplary throughout the incident. As a fellow journalist we are proud of James Hamm.

He did not print the story because he felt that it just might be tinged with yellow journalism.

President Jones, acting upon what now appears to be an impulse, threatened to suspend James Hamm from college if he were to print the story. We submit that Jones now either should apologize to James Hamm in public print or himself face suspension.

Governing body for the school newspaper at Texas Tech is set up to allow the maximum freedom to the staff of the newspaper. The staff is made up of journalism students who must learn to report news in a free press.

President Jones himself describes The Toreador as a newspaper laboratory. If it is to be a laboratory, then it must be treated as a free newspaper and not as a mouthpiece for college brass.

If Tech is not to have a free newspaper, then it should have no newspaper.

Let us hasten to add that students who participate in panty raids and effigy hangings are not interested in higher learning, are wasting tax payers money and should be expelled.

Claiming false arrest by Mayor D. Y. Ray, Lupe Martinez, sometime convicted bootlegger, has sued the city of Olton for \$100,000.

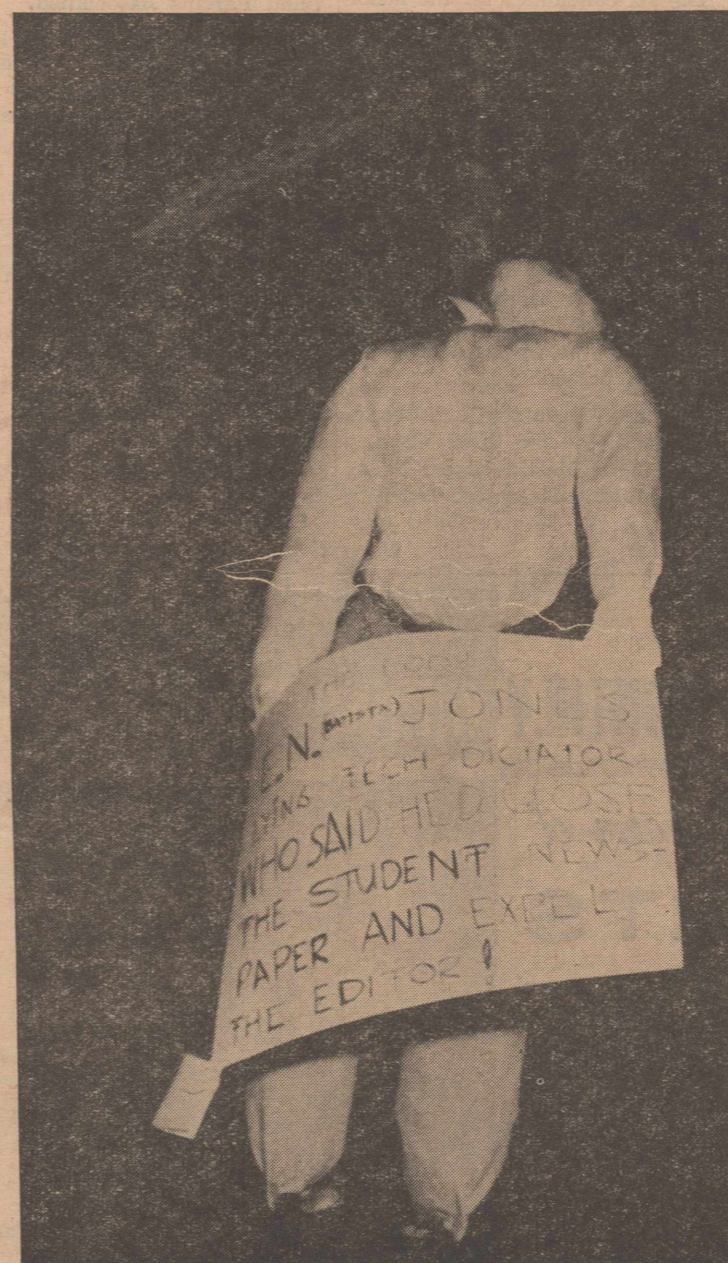
Papers were served on the mayor late Thursday by Deputy Sheriff V. L. Smith. The city council Thursday night held a secrecy shrouded meeting to which the press was not invited.

Not even the city secretary was at the meeting to record the transactions.

The meeting was stormy, to say the least, according to information gathered by The Enterprise Friday morning. Publisher Troy Martin called for an extra.

Thursday night's meeting saw Mayor Ray at loggerheads with both the city council and Chief Head.

This Is Lawless



This is a picture of Tech President E. N. Jones hanged in effigy. This is the very essence of lawlessness and disregard for society. Those who participated should be expelled from Texas Tech and not allowed to enter another state supported school. Dr. Jones was at least legally within his rights in refusing to permit publication of a similar picture in the school newspaper. However, Dr. Jones admits that he falsely accused the Toreador staff of Editor James Hamm of Olton of setting up this effigy to provide synthetic news for their paper. Dr. Jones' accusations were in public print. He has since admitted that he made the accusation without proper investigation and that the accusations had proved to be unfounded. By his own earlier statement, Dr. Jones is guilty of imposing censorship. Pictures such as this should be, MUST be published so that an aroused public may force a halt to such disregard for legally delegated authority. (Editorial Comment By Enterprise Publisher Troy Martin).

Martinez asks for a total of \$100,000 in three categories.

He alleges that he lost his job as a result of being jailed for a day and asks \$25,000 on this count.

Lupe maintains he was humiliated another \$25,000 worth. He says in his petition that he was deprived of his constitutional rights and asks \$50,000 exemplary damages.

The petition alleges that the arrest was perpetrated by Mayor Ray with malicious intent to deprive Martinez of his liberty without any legal authority.

The suit alleges that Martinez was illegally detained in city jail from 9:30 o'clock in the morning until 7:30 o'clock that night.

Records at city hall reveal that Mayor Ray is only under bond for \$1,000—just \$99,000 shy of the figure asked by Martinez.

Andrew W. Stroebel, Olton attorney, is representing Martinez in the case.

Thursday night Mayor Ray is reported to have asked the council to fire Head. The council refused. Mayor Ray is reported to have made the request to the council on a "him or me" basis.

According to information gathered by The Enterprise, Ray said he made the request because Head was "not doing his duty."

The arrest from which the suit stemmed is alleged to have been carried out May 20.

Chief Head said that he and Mayor Ray went to the house where Martinez was staying. He said that he had "asked" Ray not to make the arrest.

Head quoted the Mayor as saying he was going to run Martinez out of town or put him in jail.

"You've got to have something to put him in for first," Head said he told the Mayor. "I tried to talk him out of doing it."

The police chief said the mayor ordered him to act without a warrant in the case. He said the mayor on other occasions had ordered him to act without proper and legal authority.

"I refused to do it," Head declared.

Head said he would see his feud with the mayor to the bitter end. "I won't ever resign," he declared. Head said he was called into the council meeting about 10:30 o'clock

Thursday night.

Mayor Ray was out of town Friday morning and could not be contacted for comment. The Enterprise had no prior information that a council meeting would be called.

Martinez has a long record of brushes with the law, here and elsewhere, mostly involving liquor law violations.

Entertainment will be furnished by Farmers Union juniors from Earth, Olton and Paducah. The main program will get under way at 8 o'clock.

Equalization Board Holds First Meeting

Olton's city board of equalization held its first meeting of the year Monday.

The board is studying property evaluations prepared by McMories and Associates of Amarillo. The board conferred some two hours with James McMories of the Amarillo firm Monday.

Louie Mack Hardy was named chairman of the board and Troy Martin was named vice-chairman. G. H. Bley is the third member of the board and Laus Hair and Bill Thomas are alternates.

Next board meeting will be held Saturday afternoon. Members of the board will study evaluations fixed by McMories and then hold a public hearing.

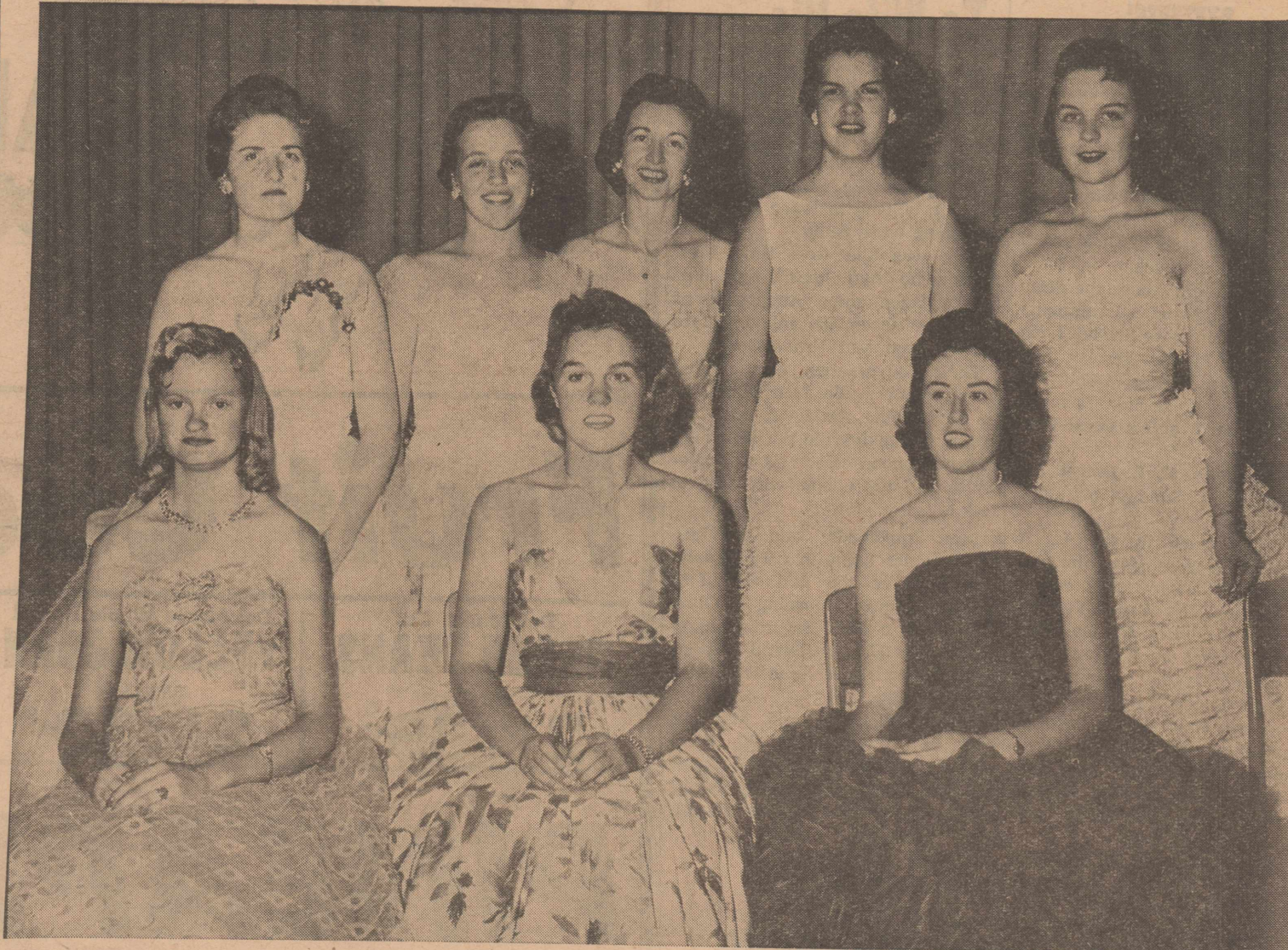
