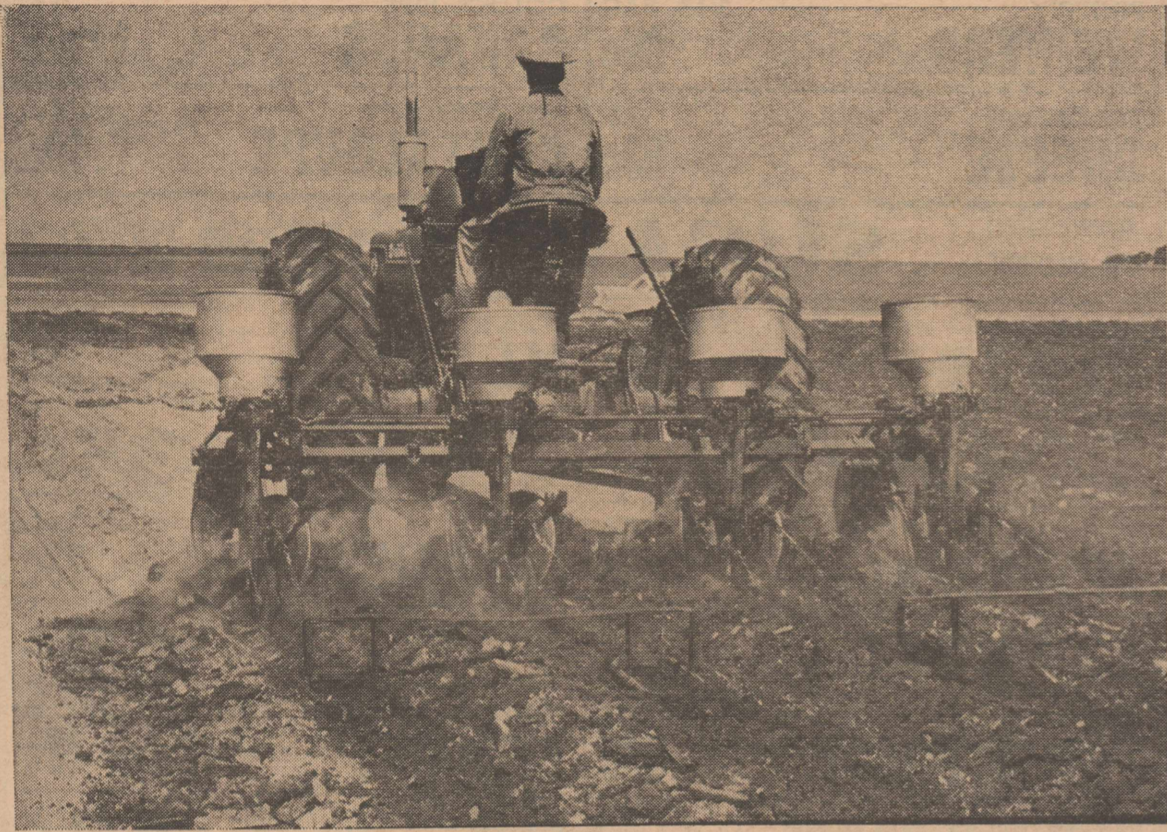




COURT FIGHTS LOOM

Olton Woman's Nephew Dies In Cistern Tragedy

Gregory Brock, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bobby Brock of Clovis and nephew of Mrs. Richard Snell, was found dead in a cistern about 11 o'clock Tuesday night near Clovis.

Mrs. Snell is the former JeVern Daniel of Olton.

The child was visiting his grandparents on their farm and packing house installation near Clovis.

Discovery of the body brought a tragic end to a search by hundreds of volunteers, including a mounted posse and Civil Air Patrol units.

The little boy had been missing since noon. The tot was found in a 6-foot cistern on the M. M. Snell farm about 9 miles southwest of Clovis.

Olton Youth Killed Here Friday In Mishap With Electric Welder

PICK-UP TRUCK FOUND PARKED BED-DEEP IN WATER AT PLANT

A 21-year-old bridegroom of four months was killed Friday morning when he came into contact with high voltage while working at Jeffrey Lumber Company Ready Mix Concrete Plant.

Dead is Cecil Jackie Hill.

The accident is believed to have occurred shortly before 11 o'clock. The boy was found about 10:55 by B. C. Cooner, who had gone to the plant to

Young Hill was rushed to the hospital in a Parsons Funeral ambulance. Dr. Basil Johns, attending physician, said the young man was dead on arrival.

Dr. Johns attempted a cardiac massage but to no avail.

Truck In Water

Albert Jeffrey, owner of the firm by which Cecil was employed, said Cecil went to the concrete plant about 10:30 o'clock. He is believed to have been killed a short time later.

Reconstruction of the circumstances surrounding the accident led folks at the lumber yard to believe that the youth backed a pick-up truck containing a portable welder up to the concrete plant. He had intended to do some welding there.

Water in a pool adjacent to the plant came up to the metal bottom of the pick-up, thereby forming an absolute ground. The pick-up was parked in the water when the accident was discovered.

The welding machine was hooked into a 220-volt line running from inside the concrete plant.

Young Hill's right hand still was on the handle of the welder when he was found by Mr. Cooner.

Mr. Cooner hurried back to the lumber yard about a block away to notify Mr. Jeffrey.

Calls Ambulance

"I think a man is dead over there," he told the lumber yard operator.

Mr. Jeffrey raced to the plant while Mrs. Lillian George, bookkeeper, notified Parsons Funeral Home.

"We were there within two minu-

tes after we were notified," declared Percy Parsons, operator of the funeral home.

In the meantime, Mr. Jeffrey had arrived on the scene. He pulled the boy's hand loose from the welder.

"It almost knocked me down," he declared. Ralph Glover, of Southwestern Public Service Company, said Mr. Jeffrey escaped death only because he did not come in series circuit with the 220 volt line as the Hill boy did.

Cecil had been employed by the lumber firm only a short time. Prior to that he had worked for Stephens & Sons as a mechanic. He was married in February to the former Miss Brenda Meadows. He had worked at the lumber yard at various times over a period of years.

Cecil was born Sept. 12, 1937 at Foreman, Ark. He had lived in Olton about 6½ years.

Last Rites

Funeral services were held at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon in Olton Main Street Church of Christ. Officiating was G. B. Stanley, Church of Christ minister, assisted by Rev. E. E. Houlette of the United Pentecostal Church in Plainview.

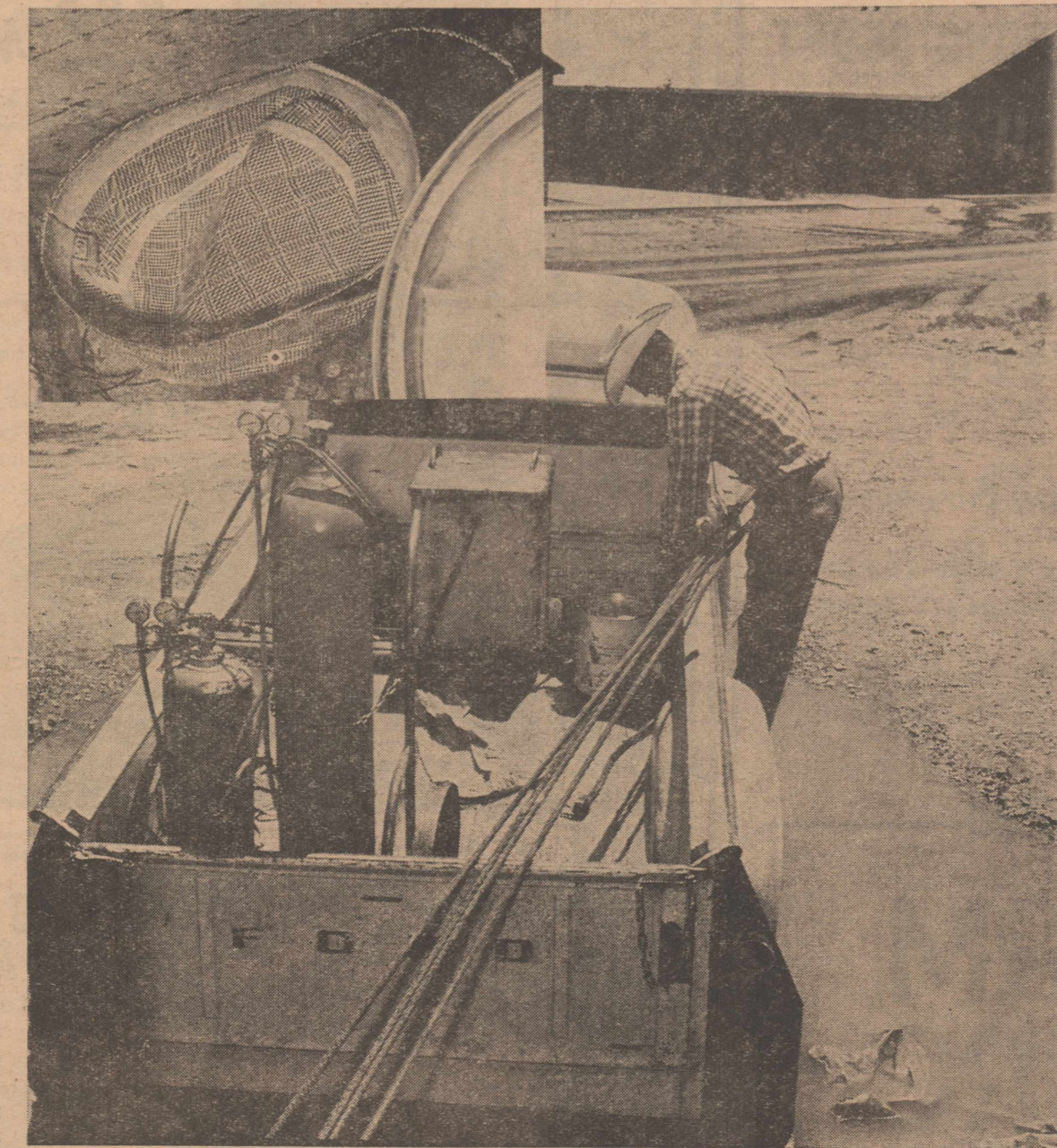

Strategy for a two-front legal battle perplexed Olton city council Tuesday night as the group met in regular session.

Field generals for the forthcoming encounters will be Frank Day and Gene Owen, Plainview attorneys who represent the city.

The city is faced on the one hand with court proceedings in which it seeks to force H. L. Dennis to move a metal building from a down town area which the city contends is within the fire zone.

Looming on the other hand is a \$100,000 false arrest suit being brought by Lupe Martinez.

JUDGE ORDERS BUILDING, GROUND UP FOR BIDS

Showdown Near In Hospital Case

Judge E. A. Bills Wednesday ordered Receiver Billy Hall to begin accepting bids on the building and grounds of Olton Memorial Hospital.

Judge Bills' court order was the first indication that a settlement in the drawn-out litigation involving three osteopathic doctors might be nearing a climax.

Special Judge Willard Street appointed Attorney Billy Hall receiver in the case last September. The court case is styled Dr. B. J. Souders vs Drs. James E. and Lynn Fite.

Dr. Souders, through his attorneys, last September alleged that some \$144,000 in land, building, equipment and accounts receivable is involved.

Souders and the Fite brothers once were partners in operation of the osteopathic hospital.

Dr. Souders moved out of Olton Memorial Hospital in March of 1956, according to his attorneys. He moved to a Main Street location following personal disagreements between himself and Dr. James E. Fite.

Receiver Hall said he has been instructed by the court to begin collecting accounts owed to the hospital. The Littlefield attorney, whose office is at 306½ Phelps, indicated that the hospital case may come to a showdown within the next few weeks.

Day said no trial date has been set on the Dennis case. Judge E. A. Bills last week denied an injunction sought by the city to force Dennis to move the building.

Dennis is represented by T. Wade Potter and Hank Gowdy, Littlefield attorneys.

No Permits
The building in question is a

metal structure. It was moved from a site on Main Street in the block just off Highway 70 in north Olton. It now is situated just across the street from the I. B. Holt home in the downtown area.

Day Tuesday night recommended that the city grant Dennis no permits for any type of utility service such as water, electricity, and gas until the law suit is settled.

Day told the council that the city must file an answer in the Lupe Martinez false arrest case by next Monday or lose the \$100,000 law suit by default.

Executive Session

Upon recommendation by Day, the council went into an executive, closed door session to discuss the two law suits. Press and spectators were asked to leave the room while the confab was going on.

During the executive session, Day and Owen were retained to handle the Martinez case with a fee of \$500 and retained to handle the Dennis case on a retainer fee of \$100.

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon in Amarillo.

Raise Salary

The council also voted to raise the Day and Owen monthly retainer fee from \$30 to \$50. The city attorney said he suggested the closed-door session after a note was handed to him from a member of the council asking that such a session be held.

Mayor D. Y. Ray and the city of Olton were named in a \$100,000 damage suit by Lupe Martinez, convicted Olton bootlegger. Martinez charges false arrest.

Martinez was arrested by Ray May 20 in a house in south Olton. The mayor signed a complaint charging vagrancy.

Gene Owen is scheduled to prosecute the vagrancy case before City Judge W. B. Smith, Jr. Date for the trial has not been set.

City council members discussed bootlegging here.

Can't Stop It
Day said the way to stop bootlegging is to get people to quit drinking liquor.

"You can't do it," the city attorney declared. "Good, substantial citizens buy it and keep it and drink it." He declared. "If you didn't have any market, you would not have anyone in the business."

"Public opinion is against enforcing the liquor laws," Day went on. "Police officers work against it and fines are levied but it don't stop it."

Councilman A. D. Adams said County Sheriff Dick Dyer had pledged himself to a whole-hearted battle against illegal liquor sales.

"He'll come over here any time, day or night to fight this liquor traffic," Mr. Adams declared.

The council discussed stop signs at side street intersections with Main and with Avenues E and G.

Garbage Collection

The city council also passed an ordinance providing for compulsory trash collection to be supervised by the city. Trash collection fees of \$1 for residences and \$2 for business houses will be added to water bills each month.

Charges will become effective July 1 for August billing. Receptacles not larger than 60 gallons nor smaller than 30 gallons must be provided by patrons.

Trash will be collected at two-week intervals at residences and each week at business houses.

In other action, the city agreed to send three members of the city fire department to Texas A & M College for an extension course in fire fighting. Each fireman who attend the school will be allowed \$125 for expense money.

FARM SURVEY READY BY SEPTEMBER 15TH

Three Doane Agricultural Survey men here this week said the survey should be complete about Sept. 1.

Doane representatives will be back in the area about Sept. 15. Here for three days this week were Joe Free, Russell Kruetzman and Lloyd Bergsma. They met with several area people Tuesday night.

Framework of an organization to follow up the survey was suggested by the survey crew. The organization will be known as the Olton Agriculture Development Association.

Officers of the association will consist of a president, vice-presi-

dent and secretary-treasurer. Officers along with heads of eight committees will make up the organization's board of directors.

The eight committees will deal with linear programming, swine, beef, cotton, vegetables, crops, allied industries and public relations and public information.

An awards committee has been suggested as a ninth committee.

Officers and committee heads will be elected at a mass meeting to be held in mid-September. Doane men will be here for the meeting.

Kruetzman said Cappers Farmer and The Wall Street Journal probably will have representatives here for the meeting in September.

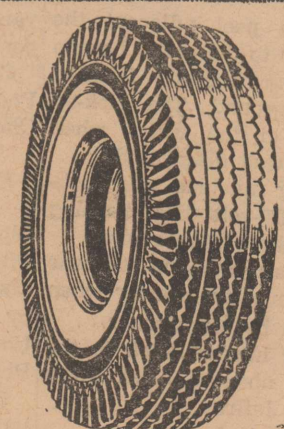

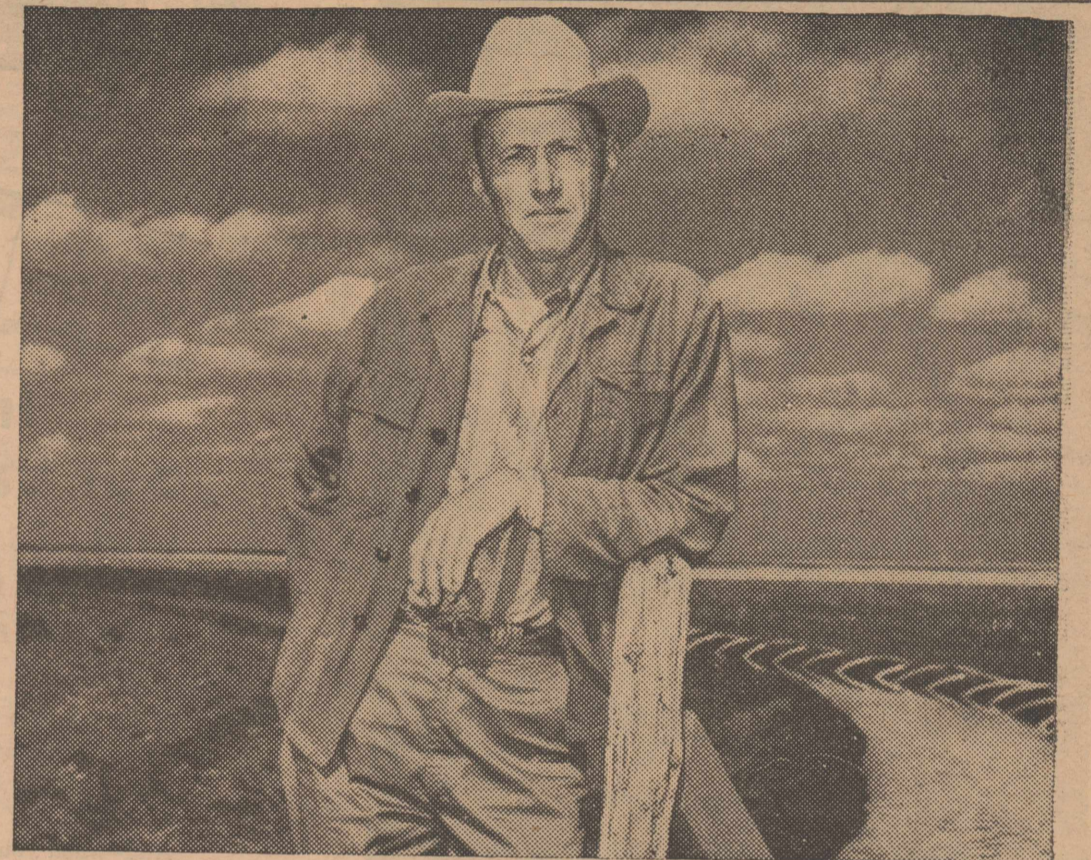

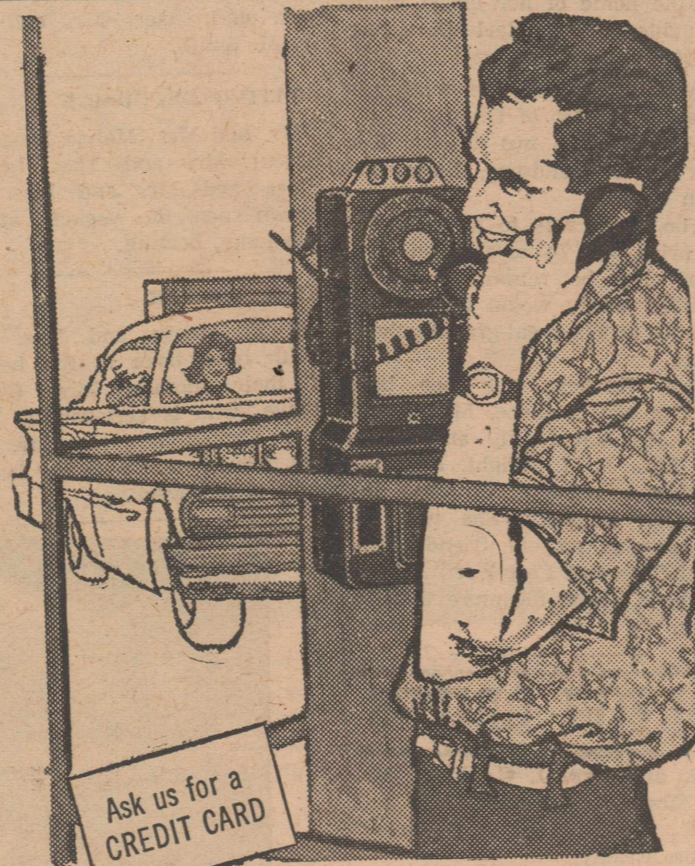

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Seniors Tired, Happy After Four-Day Tour Of Washington

"It was wonderful" all the seniors agreed as they stepped from the bus that brought them from Amarillo to Olton Saturday night. After eight days away from home the Plains of Texas were a welcome sight to the boys and girls, but none of them would ever forget the four days spent in the nation's capital or the fun of traveling on the train in a private car.

Leaving Amarillo almost four hours late on May 31, the group settled themselves for the ride to Memphis, Tenn. After breakfast the next morning, the class climbed on a bus for the Memphis Zoological Park where they viewed the members of the animal kingdom and complained of the heat. After lunch they boarded Cap'n Langford's Memphis Queen II for a cruise on the Mississippi River. Cruising down the river first the boat passed over the cable which carries network television from New York to Dallas and under the three bridges which cross the river at Memphis.

Passing the point where the water was a 102 feet deep the boat turned around and went upstream where the crew attempted to land on a sandbar, but were unsuccessful. That night the class boarded "The Tennessean" for the last part of the trip to Washington.

Arriving in Washington the next evening, the first glimpse of the

lighted capital came from the train windows. Tuesday morning the seniors and sponsors donned raincoats and took off via bus for a tour of the capital building and the Bureau of Printing and Engraving. At the latter they were informed that fifteen days are required to complete a bill and that twenty-nine million dollars are printed daily. They saw bills in denominations up to \$100,000 and a promissory note worth \$5,000,000.

As the class approached Lincoln Memorial the rain stopped and they climbed the steps to the white temple to view the immense sculptured statue of Lincoln and to read once more the Gettysburg Address and the Second Inaugural Address.

After lunch the first stop was Washington Cathedral which only a few days before had been the scene of John Foster Dulles' funeral. The majestic Gothic structure is made even more beautiful with stained glass and symbolic carvings. Of particular interest inside the cathedral were the Tomb of Woodrow Wilson and the Lee-Jackson Memorial.

As the rain continued to fall the group crossed the Potomac River into Arlington, Va., the home of the Pentagon. Driving into a huge underground parking area, the class entered and left the \$83,000,000 office building without becoming wet. Inside they visited

its huge Concourse which is operated principally as a shopping center. Back across the Potomac the group concluded the afternoon's tour in Smithsonian Institution.

Some of the favorite exhibits of the class were Lindbergh's "The Spirit of St. Louis," Wiley Post's "Winnie Mae," the Wright Brothers' plane, and the Hope Diamond, the world's largest blue diamond. The girls enjoyed the clothing worn by the hostesses of the Presidents.

Everyone was free to select the evening's entertainment. Most of the students went to the Casino Royal to hear singer Bobby Darin, and some went to the play "Sunrise at Campobello" starring Ralph Bellamy. The remainder enjoyed one of the many good movies showing in Washington.

A member of Representative Mahon's staff was waiting for the class the next morning. He presented them with passes to the Senate and House of Representatives and mechanical pencils stamped with House of Representatives before taking them to visit the Library of Congress.

There they viewed the Military Banner of General Eisenhower and the Gutenberg Bible. Going to the Capital Building, they were greeted by Mr. Mahon who took them down on the floor of the House and each class member sat for a moment in the chair belonging to the Speaker of the

House Sam Rayburn.

They then went into the office of Senate Majority Leader and Texas Senator Lyndon Johnson where he chatted with them briefly before being joined by Senator Ralph Yarborough. The three men went out on the steps of the capital building and were photographed with the class.

Senator Johnson took the class to the floor of the Senate and pointed out his own desk and that of Minority Leader Dierksen. The class went to House of Representatives once more to watch them open the afternoon session. Here Mrs. Mahon joined them for a short time.

The afternoon was free to spend as each senior pleased. A large number returned to Smithsonian Institution, some visited the Folger Shakespearean Library or returned to the Library of Congress, and several visited the National Archives Building. Other places visited were the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the National Art Gallery.

In the evening the class boarded a river cruiser for a two-hour trip down the Potomac River to an amusement park at Glen Echo, Md.

Thursday morning the class climbed on their bus once more and drove to Jefferson Memorial and then to the Iwo Jima Statue, the largest sculpture ever cast in bronze.

They visited Arlington National Cemetery and Arlington Memorial Amphitheatre. Before leaving they viewed the hourly Changing of the Guard at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

The Custis-Lee Mansion, a memorial to Robert E. Lee was the next place of interest visited by the class as it is situated on the edge of Arlington Cemetery. It was built by George Washington Parke Custis, the foster son of the first President, and became the home of Robert E. Lee when he married Mary Custis, the great-granddaughter of Martha Washington.

Mount Vernon, the beautiful home of George Washington, was visited next. A short walk took the class to his tomb located on the site which he selected a few months before his death.

Returning to the city of Washington, the class visited the White House. They were informed that as soon as the White House closed to the public each day at noon the downstairs rooms were put into use for state occasions.

The final afternoon was spent at Washington Monument and the Lincoln Museum. An elevator reaches the top of the Monument in seventy seconds or 898 steps lead to the top of the 555 foot, five-one-eighth inch structure.

The Lincoln Museum is housed in the Ford Theatre and has on display a number of Lincoln relics and mementoes of the assassination including the door of the box where Lincoln sat, the derringer and spurs used by John Wilkes Booth, and the flag in which Booth's spur caught and tripped him.

There was still much to see and do, but time had run out and the group went to Union Station to board the train for the trip back to Amarillo. Arriving in Olton at 8:30 Saturday night, a tired but proud group of boys and girls bade each other goodbye and made plans to meet at a later date to share all the pictures and movies made on the trip.

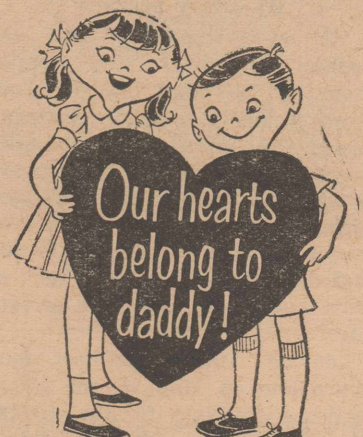

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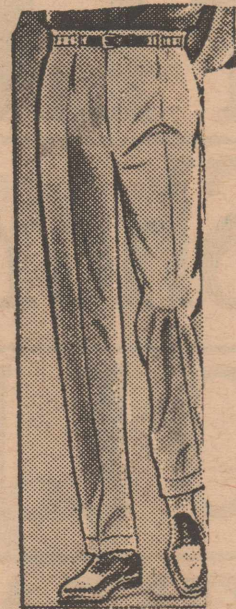

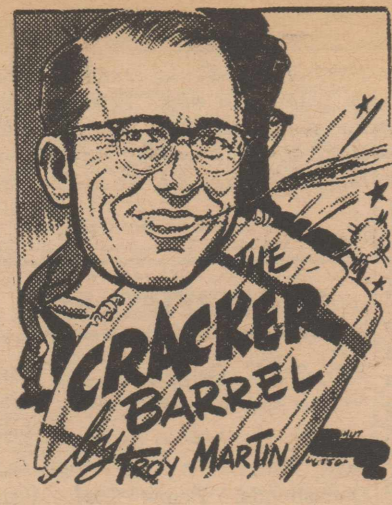

The city council Tuesday night went into executive session. Executive session simply means that the council excluded all but its members and its legal counsel.

This was an entirely proper procedure. The council wanted and needed to talk strategy with its attorneys. The city is faced with two court battles which could be grave in consequences.

Strategy to be used in the litigation ahead should not become street talk. This newspaper will have no complaint if strategy discussed is not handed about by members of the council itself until it becomes street gossip.

While in executive session Tuesday night, the council acted officially upon at least three issues.

With this aspect of the closed-door meeting we do take issue. We do not believe that any board handling public money should take official action to spend any part of same in any session not open to the public.

Do not get us wrong, we are not haranguing the city council. With all our heart, we believe that we have a good and conscientious group which has the best interests of the city at heart. We see no intentional wrong in the council's vote to hire legal counsel while in executive session in this instance. We believe that in this case it was action taken innocently and without thought of its implications. We point out the fact that it was done merely in an effort to make our position clear in case of recurrence.

Executive session, wrongly used, could become the tool of sinister men either in high or low echelon of government. This newspaper and column is dedicated, not so much to the much-publicized freedom of the press as to JOHN Q. PUBLIC'S RIGHT TO KNOW.

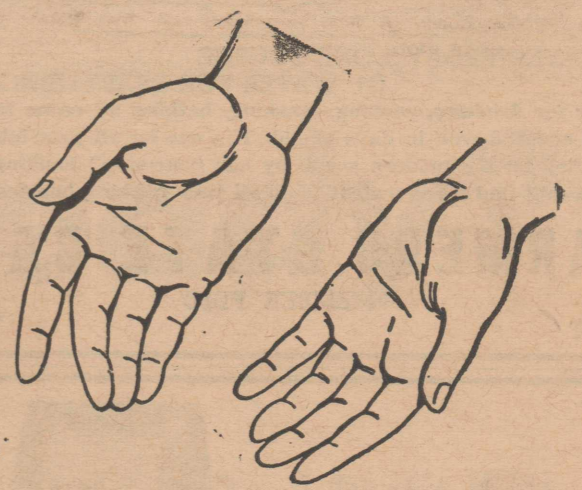

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LEGAL NOTICE

ORDINANCE NO. 106

An ordinance regulating the collection and disposition of garbage and trash within the City Limits of Olton, and providing a penalty for those who fail to provide proper containers or receptacles for such garbage and trash.

Whereas, the City of Olton has no garbage disposal plant or other facilities for the collection of garbage and trash from the residences and business houses of the citizens of Olton; and

Whereas, the accumulation of such garbage and trash creates a breeding place for mosquitoes and flies, and rats and other disease-bearing animals, thereby causing a highly unhealthy and unsanitary condition throughout the City of Olton; and

Whereas, such condition, as it now exists, greatly multiplies the hazards of spreading infectious diseases and greatly impairs the health and comfort of the inhabitants of said City; and

Whereas, the City, in order to defray the costs of collection such garbage, may make a charge of \$1.00 per month for each residence and \$2.00 per month for each business, or the City may increase the water bill \$1.00 monthly for each residence and \$2.00 monthly for each business, at the election of the City Council, by adoption of a resolution designating the method to be used to defray such costs; and

Whereas, the City of Olton has determined to assume the duty and responsibility of collecting, removing and disposing of such garbage and trash;

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the following ordinance be passed and adopted:

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Olton:

Section 1: Every person or persons occupying a residence within the city limits of the City of Olton hereafter be required to provide a suitable metal receptacle or steel container, in capacity not to be larger than 60 gal. and not less than 30 gal., and place same in the alley or street behind or at the side of such residence for such garbage and trash.

Section 2: Every such person or persons so occupying such residence shall place all garbage and trash in such receptacle.

Section 3: Every person, firm or corporation occupying and using a place for business or commercial purposes is hereafter required to provide a steel container or other metal receptacle in the alley behind such business for such garbage and trash, and every such person, firm or corporation shall place all such garbage and trash in such receptacle.

Section 4: All such garbage and trash shall be picked up by the City once every two weeks at every residence, and once each week at every place of business, and remove it to the City's dump grounds for disposal.

Section 5: The funds necessary to defray the costs of collecting and disposing of such garbage shall be as follows: The City may make a charge of \$1.00 per month for each residence and \$2.00 per month for each business; or the City may increase the water bill \$1.00 monthly for each residence and \$2.00 monthly for each business at the election of the City Council, by the adoption of a resolution designating the method to be used to defray such costs.

Section 6: Any person, firm or corporation who shall fail to provide a suitable metal container or receptacle for the deposit of such garbage and trash, or any such person, firm or corporation who shall carelessly or negligently throw garbage and trash on the ground or leave same out in the open, and not placed in such container, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction therefore shall be fined in any sum not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$100.00, and each day such person, firm or corporation shall fail to provide such metal container or shall permit such garbage and trash to remain in the open and, or on the ground and not placed in such garbage container shall constitute a separate offense.

The sale was cut short by a sand storm. A scheduled auction sale was postponed.

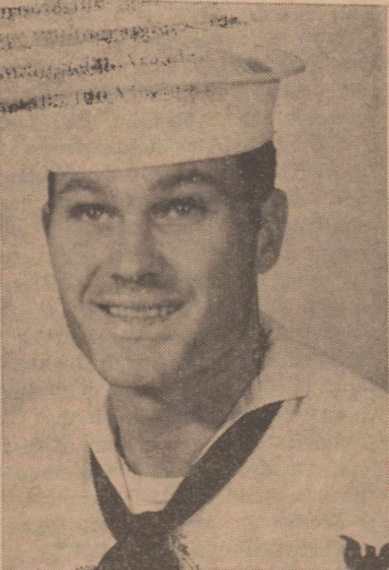
