



Foundation Recharge Well Stores Water

Water valued at \$1,320.00 was stored underground through the recharge well at the High Plains Research Foundation at Halfway in one week recently.

Dr. T. C. Longnecker, foundation director, placed this value on the 22 acre feet recharged from the 25 acre playa lake following recent rains which totaled 3.85 inches. The estimated value was based upon the additional yield obtained when one acre foot of irrigation water is applied to

The intake rate of 800 gallons per minute was maintained for the entire week. Every 24 hours during the week the pump was operated for 30 to 40 minutes and the well back flushed to dislodge any siltation. This was done to prevent clogging the underground formation.

Approximately 150 acre feet of irrigation water is used annually on the quarter section of land where the recharge well is located.
