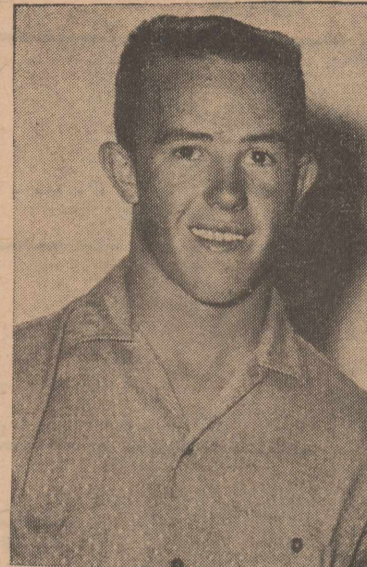
John Hair Is Seventh FFA Lone Star Boy

Defense Offers No Testimony; Will Appeal To County Court

Lupe Martinez was found guilty of Vagrancy last Friday.

A six-person corporation court jury made up of four men and two women deliberated about 40 minutes in reaching the verdict.

The jury assessed a fine of \$200.00 and court costs of \$39.50. Attorney Andrew W. Stroebel, representing the defendant, immediately announced intention to appeal.

City Judge W. B. Smith, Jr., remanded the defendant to the custody of Police Chief Floyd Cavin and he was placed in city jail.

Martinez remained in jail until about 9 o'clock Friday night when bond was posted. Bond was set at twice the amount of the fine assessed, plus court costs.

Martinez was charged with vagrancy. The offense was alleged to have occurred May 20. The defendant was taken into custody by Mayor D. Y. Ray on that date. A \$100,000 false arrest suit still is pending in connection with the arrest.

Prosecuting for Olton was Gene Owen of Plainview, member of Day and Owen law firm which represents the city.

Owen hammered at the allegation that Martinez was not "gainfully employed" at the time of the arrest.

Three Witnesses

He paraded three witnesses. Bob Starritt, city maintainer operator, testified that he had worked frequently in the vicinity of Lupe's house and had never seen Lupe "gainfully employed."

Floyd Cavin testified that while he (Cavin) was on the Highway Patrol he had several occasions to see Lupe here and had never seen him "gainfully employed."

Mayor Ray testified that he has known Lupe "six or seven" years.

Present officers of the board are H. A. Hysinger, president; O. E. Patterson, vice-president; M. E. Lambright, secretary; and directors are Jim Kemp, Fred Hicks, T. J. Roberson and Owen Jones.

and had never known of Lupe having a job. He said he has never seen Lupe working.

No Testimony

Stroebel offered no testimony in defense but pronounced that the jury must be convinced that the city had proven its case beyond "reasonable doubt." He pointed out that no witnesses who took the stand had kept an eye on the defendant all the time and that Martinez reasonably could be assumed to have had a job when none of the three were looking.

In the courtroom and taking notes on the proceedings was County Attorney Curtis Wilkinson. Stroebel's appeal puts the case in county court where Wilkinson is prosecutor.

Members of the jury were Mrs. J. H. Austin, Wayne Moore, Jack Straw, Dial Henley, Mrs. Glen Singletary and Walter Schreier. Straw acted as jury foreman and handed the verdict to Judge Smith who read it aloud.

Area Prominence

Connection with the whopping \$100,000 false arrest case vaulted the otherwise obscure vagrancy case into area-wide prominence. In spite of the publicity the case had received, however, there were few people on hand for the trial.

Most of the spectators came from the group assembled for jury duty. Having been challenged for one reason or another, many of them remained to hear testimony.

Twelve jurors were chosen from a total of 27 talesman. Fifteen were challenged for cause. Each counsellor exercised three pre-emptory challenges.

Foundation Recharge Well Stores Water

Water valued at \$1,320.00 was stored underground through the recharge well at the High Plains Research Foundation at Halfway in one week recently.

Dr. T. C. Longnecker, foundation director, placed this value on the 22 acre feet recharged from the 25 acre playa lake following recent rains which totaled 3.85 inches. The estimated value was based upon the additional yield obtained when one acre foot of irrigation water is applied to cotton.

The intake rate of 800 gallons per minute was maintained for the entire week. Every 24 hours during the week the pump was operated for 30 to 40 minutes and the well back flushed to dislodge any siltation. This was done to prevent clogging the underground formation.

Approximately 150 acre feet of irrigation water is used annually on the quarter section of land where the recharge well is located. The 22 acre feet of water recharged from the 3 days of rain would thus represent 15 percent of the annual irrigation water section.

The 25 acre lake bottom will be planted in grain sorghum as a part of the lake land reclamation research at the Foundation.
