We hope that what happened to us will be a lesson to some of our readers. We hope that we won't be writing any traffic fatality stories about Olton people next week after the Independence Day holiday.

Each year we slaughter hundreds on our highways. We who break traffic laws—although we are lucky enough to escape without ever having an accident—must shoulder a part of the blame for those dead and dying. Every time you drive above the speed limit you are contributing to the national trend which costs thousands their lives. If the time ever comes when social disgrace is attached to breaking traffic laws, people will begin to obey them and folks now destined to die in wake of grinding metal on metal will have a chance to live. Until this comes to pass, good citizens will continue to spread carnage, death and weeping with their automobiles.

A few weeks back a lot of people were complaining that the law was not being enforced sternly enough to suit them. There have since been meetings, sermons and discourses on the subject.

So what happens? We get a young man as city police chief who appears determined to enforce the law to the letter. Last weekend he and his assistants passed out 26 tickets.

So what happens? The hue and cry has been raised that the law is being enforced too sternly. Now we are of the firm opinion that only ONE set of laws ever should be enforced. There should never be one set of laws for one group and another set for another group.

If the law says, for instance, that a person should have a drivers license in order to operate a motor vehicle, we believe that it means that EVERYONE who

Olton Spray Pilot Killed Sunday In Spinning Crash

Plane Stalls In Banking Turn; Engine Ripped From Fuselage

A 27-year-old Olton crop duster was killed instantly Sunday afternoon when his light spray plane stalled and spun into the ground north of Hart.

Dead is Tom Craft, formerly of Olton and now of Halfway.

Mr. Craft was employed by M. E. Gibson of Plainview and had been flying the plane for Gibson's spraying service for about a month.

Mr. Gibson was a witness to the crash. He said he believes young Craft was trying to land because of an overheated engine when the fatal mishap occurred.

Mr. Gibson said he was enroute to the Howard Sharp farm about 9 miles northeast of Hart when he had trouble with his pickup truck. Mr. Gibson and an employee were to have flagged the pilot onto the cotton field he was to have sprayed on the Sharp farm.

Pickup Trouble
Mr. Gibson said the trouble with the pickup delayed him in getting to the field and young Craft spent several minutes flying about the area. The spray service operator reasoned that the loaded plane flown thus probably overheated the engine.

Mr. Craft was flying the sound of the plane led him to believe that the pilot was not using full power. "It reved up just before he hit," Mr. Gibson declared. "Tom was a conscientious pilot and probably was worried about the engine heating."

Stall In Turn
The plane was about 30 feet high when it stalled in a low turn. Mr. Gibson said its left wing hit the ground and the plane cartwheeled. The engine came loose

and dropped out. Young Craft was thrown from the plane. Mr. Gibson rushed to him but the young pilot was dead when he got there only minutes after the plane smashed into the ground. The young man's watch was stopped at 3:52 indicating the time of the crash. The body was lying by the fuselage of the wrecked plane.

Tried Landing
He said Mr. Craft probably was about to land the plane because of the heating trouble. He said the pilot appeared to have been lining up on a short stretch of road in preparation for landing.

Mr. Gibson summoned an ambulance from Plainview. "He was a good pilot," Mr. Gibson declared.

The plane involved was a converted PT-23. Young Craft was about to spray cotton with dieldrin on the Sharp farm. He was not carrying a full load, his employer reported.

He took off from Hart about 3:30, some 22 minutes before the fatal crash. The air was hot Sunday afternoon and had little lift, area aviators reported.

Civil Aeronautics officials are investigating.

Mrs. Craft III
Mrs. Craft, an expectant mother, is in West Texas Hospital in Lubbock. Relatives described her condition as good Tuesday afternoon, although she was unable to attend funeral services for her husband. Friends took pictures of the services for her.

Tom was born April 8, 1932 at Knox City. He attended Texas Tech, where he majored in agronomy. He was a test pilot with the US Air Force in Japan about two years. He held the rank of first lieutenant.

Jet Pilot
His flying experience was principally with jets. He was married in September of 1956 to Nobuko Matsumoto, whose father is head of a religious school in Japan. Mrs. Craft's brother, Kan Matsumoto, is a student at Baylor. He and his wife are here with his sister.

The Crafts' only child, a son died in infancy in Japan.

The Crafts came to Olton in 1957 after Tom was separated from the service. Mrs. Craft is fondly known as Jean by her friends here. Her beautiful voice and charming personality made her a favorite with First Baptist Church choir of which she was a member. The Crafts moved to Halfway about the first of the year. He was a member of the Baptist Church at Halfway.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon in Olton First Baptist Church. Officiating were Rev. John Lewis, pastor, and Rev. Carlos McCloud, pastor of the Baptist Church of Halfway. Burial was in Plainview Memorial Park Cemetery under direction of Lemons Funeral Home of Plainview.

Palbearers were Louis Clark, W. C. Gunter, Gene Cade, William DeBerry, all of Olton; Roland Willis, Littlefield; and H. C. Chafin of Lubbock.

Survivors, other than the wife, include the mother, Mrs. L. F. Glenn of Olton; the step-father, Mr. L. F. Glenn, also of Olton; and a brother, James Craft of Earth.

SURVEY MEN SAY MARKET PROSPECT GOOD

Olton Visualized As Great Vegetable Area

Doane Agricultural Service, Inc. reported this week that numerous contacts have been made with possible markets for Olton area products.

Most of the individuals and companies contacted have expressed a great deal of interest in the possibility of working through the Olton Area Development Association to locate dependable source of quality products.

Doane, currently conducting an agricultural study of the Olton area, emphasized that satisfactory markets already exist for some commodities being produced here. In these cases, the development program should exert whatever influence it can to make these local markets even better outlets for Olton area products.

In some instances, however, markets that can absorb local production at dependable prices do not exist. Citing vegetable production as an example, Doane market specialists point out that "vegetable production in the Olton area can never be expected to reach the potential it currently

offers if new, more dependable market outlets are not developed."

Doane also revealed that a number of potential markets for Olton area vegetables have indicated strongly that they are interested in purchasing quality vegetables from the Olton area.

If these opportunities are followed-up by representatives of the Olton Area Development Association after the delivery of the Doane report in mid-September, it is very possible that additional contract markets can be set up, Doane men said.

To assure maximum value from the market contacts Doane has made during the survey, a separate, confidential "Market Contact" report will be prepared and presented to leaders of the Olton development group.

The Doane organization reported that buyers of farm products are, in many cases, completely changing their methods of purchasing farm products. This has resulted primarily from increasing importance of the large super-

markets. It was reported that only nine percent of the grocery stores are presently accounting for almost two-thirds of all sales in the grocery business. These large super-

markets are purchasing increasing quantities on "specification." This means that the owner of the supermarket closely observes the products that the housewife is demanding and then specifies to a group of farmers the quality and amount of farm products he needs.

This "specification buying" is becoming increasingly popular because it offers strong advantages to both retailer and farmer. The retailer gets the high quality products he needs at the times when demand for these products is highest. The farmer is assured of a dependable market at a reasonable rate.

Doane marketing specialists said the organized development program, such as that being set up here in the Olton area, is the way for farmers to go about locating and setting up the type of markets that can make farming more profitable in this area in the years to come.

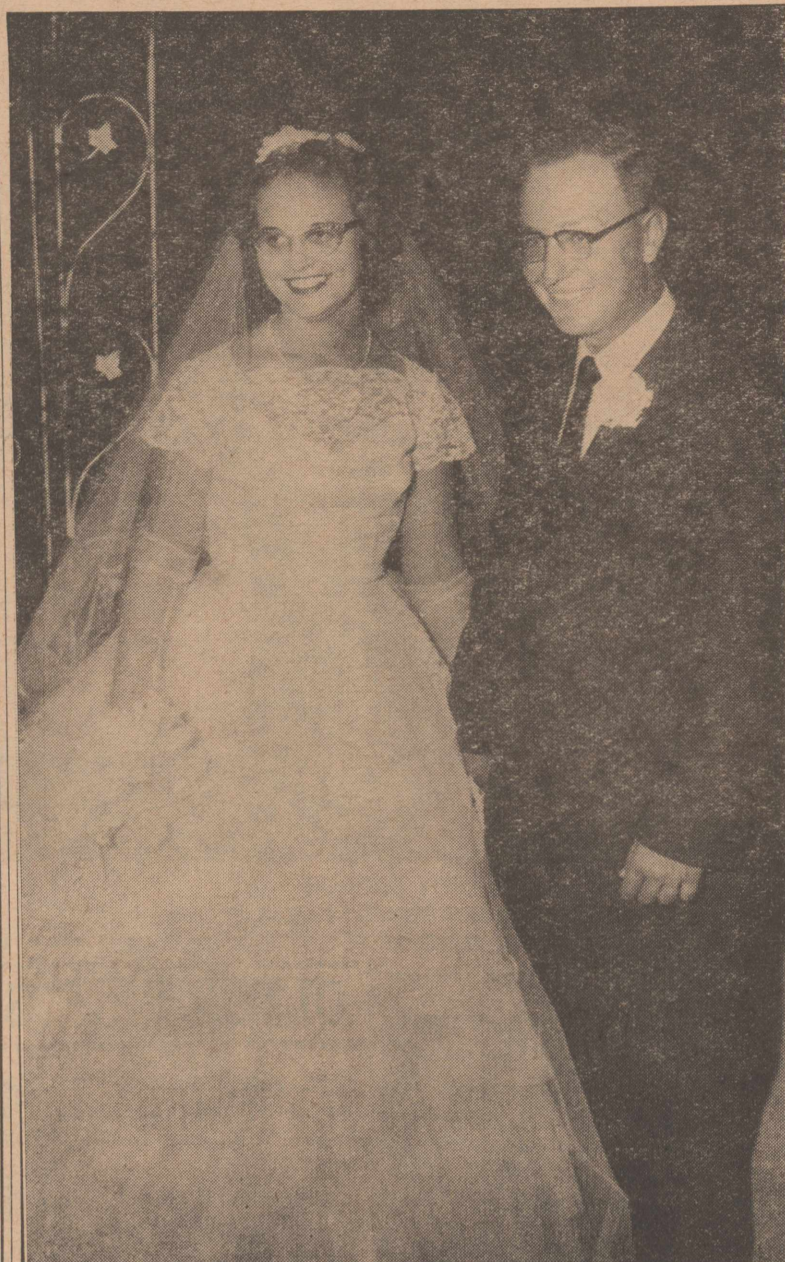

We ate promptly at 6 o'clock. Meals were very good. We lowered the flag and then went to assembly to meet our counselor and hear an outline of our activities.

The next day things got into full swing. We heard many wonderful speakers who are prominent in city, county and state government. These speakers explained operation of our government at these three levels.

Using what we had learned, we set up these three types of government. We elected our officials and they performed their duties just as the leaders of our country do.

We also had House and Senate meetings. We passed bills and made laws and went through the same processes as those of the House and Senate of our state. This illustrated our motto "Learn by Doing."

We attended church Sunday and then on Monday we visited the capitol and the governor's mansion. We visited the House and Senate which were in special session at that time.

I went with two other Castro County girls to meet our local representative and to talk to him. Also while at the capitol we had the inauguration of our governor, Ginger Meade of Houston. Governor Price Daniel spoke to us. We ate lunch on the capitol grounds and visited the governor's mansion. It is very beautiful.

Later we visited Texas University Museum. After this we returned to the school for the blind. For the next few days our activities had to do mostly with operation of the government we had set up.

Thursday afternoon we loaded on busses for Barton Springs. We enjoyed a lot of swimming and soaking up the sun.

We arrived back at the school for the blind and had a very busy

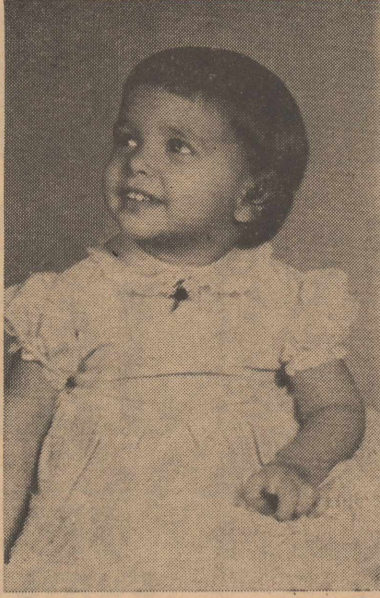
