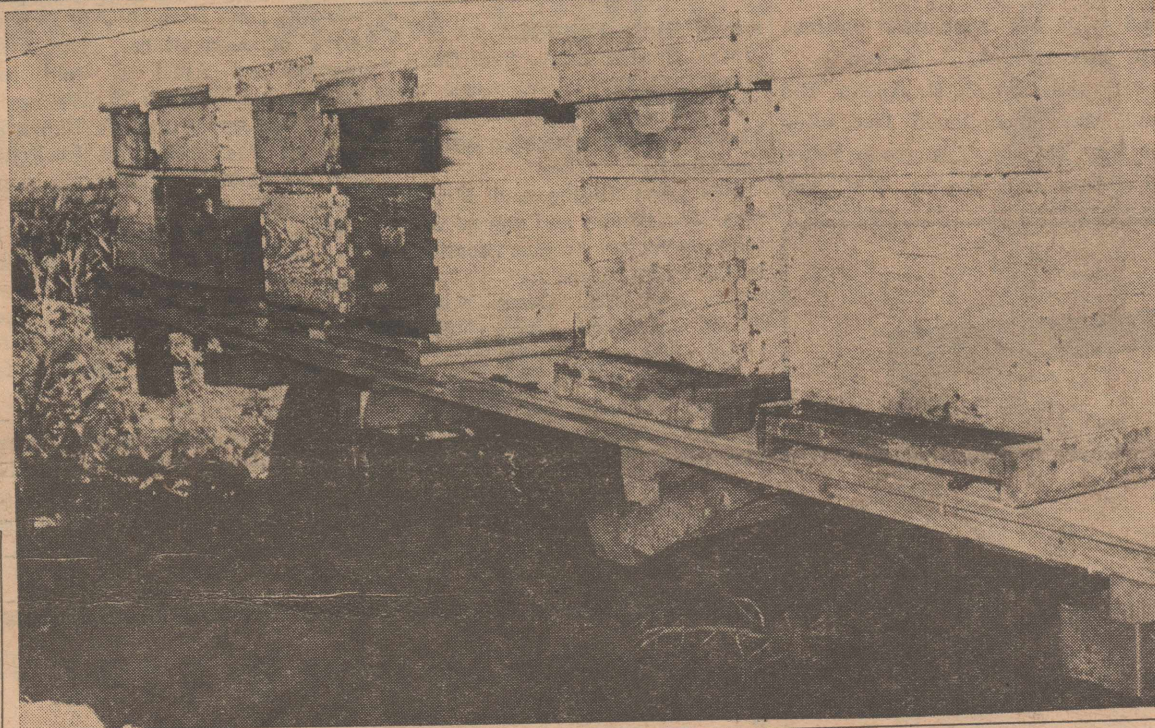
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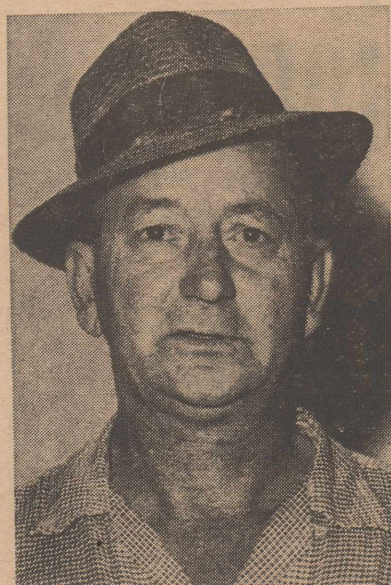


Cucumber Picking

WILL BUY, SELL, CLEAN, STORE

Partners Open New Bean Shed

James Cowart and Johnny Hodges have announced that their bean and seed cleaning and processing plant will do custom work at harvest time.

The plant will be known as Hodges and Cowart Bean and Seed.

"We will buy and sell," the partners announced. "We will clean and let you sell, clean and store or clean your seed and let you take them home."

Both Mr. Cowart and Mr. Hodges are farmers. The processing plant will be located at the James Cowart farm about 3 1/2 miles north of Olton on Hart highway.

Mr. Cowart said his firm will offer a year around market for beans and peas.

"We will specialize in beans,

but will clean any seed," he said. The plant will be equipped with new clippening equipment with clay rollers for removing dirt.

Mr. Cowart said the plant will employ five people at harvest time. Mr. Cowart and Mr. Hodges and their relatives have about 400 acres of beans and peas.

"At first we had planned to build the plant for our own use and then decided to do custom work," Mr. Cowart declared.

The partners have an experimental plot. They are raising six varieties of beans in an effort to determine which will do best here.

Both men believe that beans and peas will produce a much better money crop than milo. They said price prospects look good for both beans and blackeyed peas.

Olton Farm Supply Formal Opening Is This Week End

Olton Farm Supply will have its formal opening Friday and Saturday in its spacious new building on Highway 70 in northwest Olton.

The sprawling, modern structure will have more than 6,000 square feet of floor space. Its warehouse portion will have some 4,100 square feet while its air conditioned office and display area will occupy some 2,000 square feet.

The warehouse from the present site probably will be moved to the new location for feed mixing purposes. Bulk feed soon will be added to the store's inventory.

The new building was erected by Panhandle Steel Company of Amarillo at a cost of \$25,000. It is built of steel and masonry and will give Olton Farm Supply more than twice as much space as it had in its old building.

The display area will be equipped with new fixtures. The entire west wall of that area will be covered with peg board.

Owner and operator of Olton Farm Supply is Don Spain. The building will have private offices for Mr. Spain and the Farm Supply bookkeeping department. Mrs. Albert Scribner is bookkeeper for the firm.

Employees of the store, other than Mrs. Scribner, are Mr. Scribner, Oscar Rodriguez, Sonny Bryant and Darryl Dennis.

Door prizes for the occasion include an Enginair Pump from Conally Implement Co., in Amarillo; a toaster from Stove Hardware Co., of Kansas City, Mo.; an outing set and fiberglass planter box from Amarillo Hardware Co.; Bean-Oakes general purpose compressed air sprayer, an Isotox garden spray, Ortho sprayette, Schrade-Walden pocket knife, sealed beam hunting and fishing light, Spurs swine feeder, from Taylor Evans Farm Store of Amarillo, and possibly several other prizes.

Refreshments will be served. There will be treats for the kiddies. Drawing for prizes will be held daily at 5 o'clock in the afternoon. Other prizes will be given hourly.

Last Rites For Stabbing Victim Held In Arizona

Funeral services were held Saturday in Sky Harbor Landmark Missionary Baptist Church in Phoenix, Ariz., for Max Miller, 20 years old, son of Z. D. Miller of Olton.

Young Miller was stabbed to death aboard the Thetis Bay, a Navy ship harbored in Japan. The fatal stabbing took place the night of July 19.

Relatives here have been notified that the assailant has been taken into custody and has made a statement in connection with the stabbing.

Young Miller was born Sept. 13, 1939.

Military burial was in Mesa Cemetery in Phoenix.

The young man was serving with the US Navy at the time of his death. He had been married four months and his wife, Marilyn, lives at Hope, Ark.

Survivors, other than the wife, and father, include the mother, Mrs. Ona Copeland, Flagstaff, Ariz.; three brothers, Gerald and Donald Miller, both of Phoenix, and Jimmy Miller, US Navy, and a sister, Mrs. Margaret Stems of Phoenix.

Khrushchev's itinerary is not definite but he already has announced a desire to visit Texas, probably Dallas and Houston.

Mr. Money will teach in junior high school and his wife will teach second grade. Mr. Trostle also will teach in junior high school and Mrs. Trostle will teach first grade.

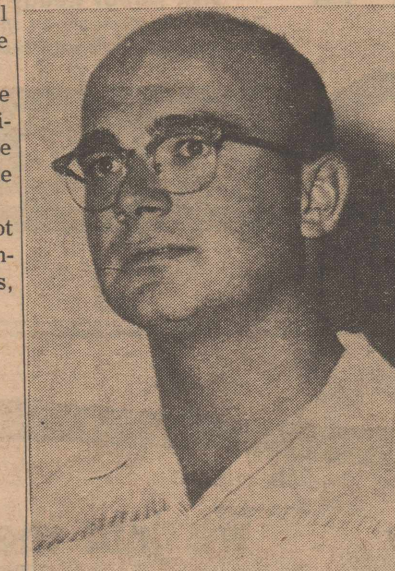
Mr. Harper said youngsters who have not had proper vaccinations should get them immediately.

Doane's Survey Of Olton Area Near Completion

Doane's Agricultural Service survey of Olton School District is nearing completion, according to information received this week by Wayne Cooper, manager of Olton Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

Mr. Cooper received a report from Doane's Russell Kruetzman, who is in charge of preparing the survey findings.

Mr. Kruetzman said his firm needs to know how many copies of the survey will be desired by Olton people. Doane furnishes the first five copies at no cost.

The price will run \$5.00 for copies ordered at first printing. Cost will be about \$8.00 for copies ordered thereafter.

"We are presently having meetings to formulate recommendations for the report," Mr. Kruetzman noted in his letter to Mr. Cooper. "We have every faith that the program will help set the Olton community head and shoulders above other communities in the High Plains area."

Halfway Station Gets Independence

The rapid progress of the High Plains Station at Halfway in Hale County in attaining full stature as an agricultural research center now warrants reorganization of the station on an independent basis, Karl Hoblitzelle of Dallas, according to President of the Texas Research Foundation.

Texas Research Foundation established and staffed the 310-acre High Plains Station in the fall of 1956 at the request of farmers, ranchmen, businessmen and industrialists in that region," Mr. Hoblitzelle said.

"The phenomenal success with which our neighbors on the High Plains have developed that station into a fully functioning research center in an incredibly short period is heartening confirmation of the Foundation's self-help philosophy."

A charter from the State of Texas for the new institution, to be known as the High Plains Research Foundation, was granted on April 8, 1959, with the Executive

Safflower Added To Test Crops At Halfway Station

Safflower has been added to the 1959 research program at the High Plains Station of Texas Research Foundation at Halfway, Dr. Johnny H. Davis, Associate Head, stated today.

This new research program has been included at the request of farmer supporters of the Station who want information of Safflower varieties suitable to the area.

The five varieties for the test were secured from the US Department of Agriculture. They were planted on April 17 and had germinated by April 20. The varieties being tested include Nebraska 6 & 10, Pacific 1, Gila (Arizona) and an experimental strain number A-5731.

These varieties were planted in two row plots 22 feet long in four plots for each of the 5 varieties. In addition to this test, three acres each of Nebraska 6, Pacific 1 and Gila were planted for observation.

Interest In Corn Increases Silt Control

Increased interest in corn production for the 1953 growing season has recently developed in this area. The available information on corn production can be summarized as follows:

1. Land: Should be of medium to high fertility and fairly level to insure good water penetration.
2. Fertilizer: 100 to 150 pounds of nitrogen either preplant or sidedressed early, and on sandy lands or land that has previously given response to phosphate, 60 to 80 pounds of P2O5.
3. Planting: Plant as early as practical, usually from April 10th to May 1st. Earlier planting gives more opportunity to harvest before corn falls down. Plant at a rate to get 16,000 to 18,000 plants per acre or one plant every 8 or 9 inches in 40 inch rows (usually 10 to 12 pounds per acre).
4. Irrigation: Moisture requirements are critical at silking and tasselling and the corn will probably need one irrigation after silking to develop ears. Corn will require three to five irrigations depending upon maturity type of hybrid, rainfall, type and contour of land.
5. Cultural Practice: About same as for grain sorghum.
6. Harvesting: Corn should be harvested when moisture gets from 15 percent to 20 percent. Some reports indicate that corn can be combined with moisture ranging from 20 percent to 25 percent. This practice reduces harvesting losses and permits earlier harvesting, but requires drying the grain.
7. Varieties: There are many good commercial white and yellow hybrids of early, medium and late maturity. Some of these are: Texas 17w, 26, 28 and 30; Agrono 104; Conrads 3; Watsons III; Funks G779W and 740; TRF 9 and 10; PAG 485; DeKalb 1002 and 1023; Northrup King KW5.
8. Expected Yield: 90 to 130 bushels per acre.



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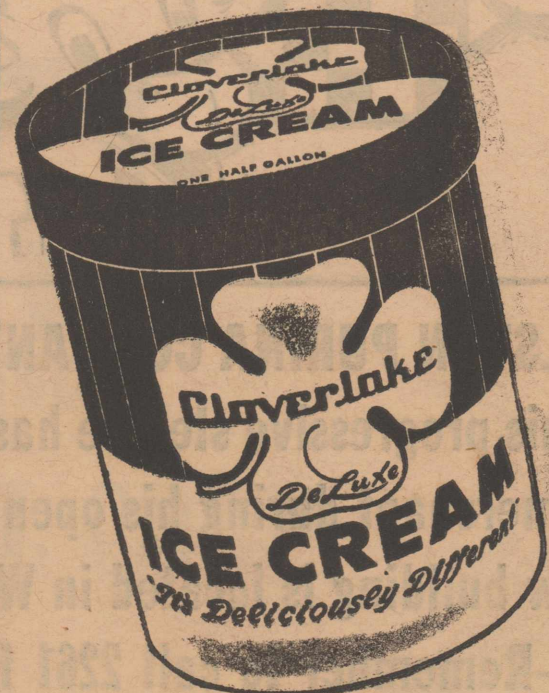
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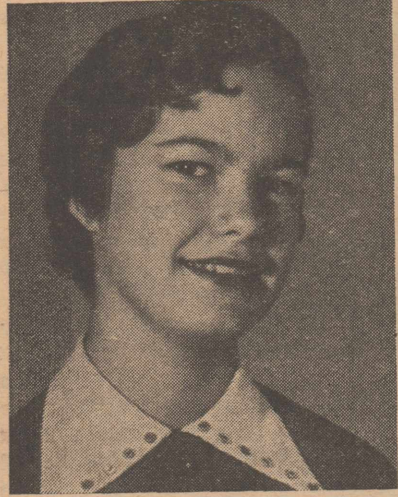


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Springlake WMS Meets Monday

Recharge Well Stores \$1,320 Water One Week

Water valued at \$1,320.00 was stored underground through the recharge well at the High Plains Research Foundation at Halfway in one week recently.
Dr. T. C. Longnecker, foundation director, placed this value on the 22 acre playa lake following recent rains which totaled 3.85 inches. The estimated value was based upon the additional yield obtained when one acre foot of irrigation water is applied to cotton.
The intake rate of 800 gallons per minute was maintained for the entire week. Every 24 hours during the week the pump was operated for 30 to 40 minutes and the well back flushed to dislodge

BUGS HAVE DONE SOME ADVANCING TOO

Fertilizer Changes Face Of Farming In One Decade

"The bugs have made more scientific advances than anything else connected with farming since I have been in this business. Every time a new chemical is developed they come up with a new resistance." Doubtless many Olton farmers share the opinion held by Don Spain.
In the eight years since his Farm Supply business was established Mr. Spain thinks that the most marked change on the agricultural scene in this area is the increased use of fertilizers. More corn is being planted due to the development and use of hybrids. He feels that the development of hybrid sorghums has increased the yield potential even more than did the corn hybrids.
"I have observed an increased interest in premium grade and longer staple cotton, particularly in the past year or two. Acala or some other picker-type cotton cuts down on hand labor expense." Several new crops have been introduced since the early days of the business, namely sesame, castor beans and safflower. "Sesame," Mr. Spain thinks, "is good for the economy." Vegetables are an addition also and he "hopes good markets will be found for locally grown vegetables." The Farm Supply has also watched the building of the first caged-layer houses and the development of hybrid chickens. "One of the greatest advancements made in this community is the growth of the 4-H and FFA show into one of the area's foremost shows." Mr. Spain continued, "This is a reflection of the progress and improvement made by the community."

Answer Questions On Fertilizers

There is a great deal of interest in fertilizers in this area. Just as true in anything else, the farmer should understand the need, use, and value of it before purchasing and using it. This means that there are several basic questions that should be answered and understood. In the first place—

1. What Is Fertilizer?

The answer is fertilizer is plant food. There are many different kinds of plant food elements and each one has a definite and specific function to perform in the plant. Most of these plant foods are present in ample quantities to feed the crops. However, it should be recognized that different crops have different needs and vary widely in their ability to take or extract their food from the soil. Then too, the soils often vary from field to field. In general, the plant foods that are most likely to be deficient in this area are nitrogen, phosphorus and potash.

2. What Does Nitrogen, Phosphorus And Potash Do For The Crop?

The main function of nitrogen is to produce vegetative growth. It is more generally deficient for the crops and soils of this area than any one of the three.

There are two principle functions of phosphorus. One is to stimulate early root formation and thereby enable the plant to germinate and come out of the soil running and to keep going to early maturity. The other function is to stimulate fruit production. Both are very important.

The main function of potash is to give vigor to the crop. This means that it is a sort of a health food like fruit juices are to man.

Each of these plant foods do specific things for the crop. One can not substitute for the other. They must be kept in balance to get best results.

3. What Kind Of Fertilizer Should Be Used?

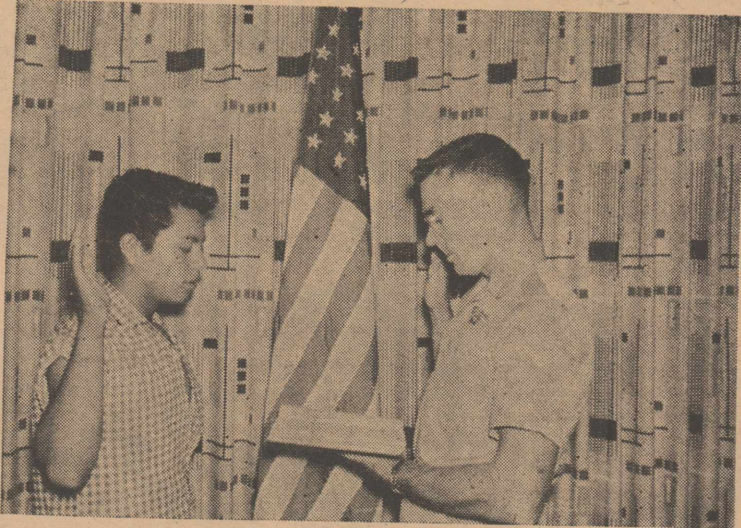
It is impossible to give one single answer to this question because soils vary in what they contain and crops vary in what they need and can get from the soil. In the clay soils, or hard lands, the experiment station recommends mainly nitrogen, but also some phosphorus on crops like cotton, sesame, and truck crops. The loam soils, or mixed lands, generally need phosphorus along with the nitrogen on most crops and a few crops like small grain for grazing and vegetable crops need some potash. On sandy soils most crops need nitrogen, phosphorus and potash, all three, and often in larger amounts than on clays or loam soils.

The specific amount of each of these major plant foods needed will vary from soil to soil and from crop to crop. The experiment station has published some general recommendations that can be very helpful. The agricultural leaders, fertilizer dealers, and representatives have these recommendations, or know about them, and can help you.

A soil test made in a reputable laboratory by a well trained agronomist can be very helpful. The growth, appearance and yield of last year's crop can also be very helpful.

Best of all, take all of these things into consideration and then try out changes in fertilization only on a part of the field. This would enable the farmer to try out the new fertilization program on his particular crop and soil. Then he could make up his own

mind whether it was better or worse than his old method, when they were both tried out, side by side.

4. When Should Fertilizer Be Put Out?

Nitrogen, generally becomes available fast and with plenty of water can move about in the soil. Usually some or all of it should be applied before the crop is planted, or very soon after the crop comes up. On sandy soils, it is usually better to apply some nitrogen before planting and some nitrogen should be applied late as a side dressing. None of the nitrogen should be applied late because this tends to make the crop continue to grow and thus delays maturity.

Phosphorus in most fertilizers is very lazy, or slow to dissolve and become available. It does not move about much in the soil. It normally should be applied well down in the soil, and before planting, in order to get the most from it. There is, however a water soluble type of phosphorus that is immediately available and stays available longer than the ordinary phosphates used in most other mixed fertilizers. This water soluble form of phosphorus can be used very effectively as a side dressing but should be put out as soon as practical after the crop has come up, because the little baby plant needs plenty of phosphorus available to it from the very beginning.

Potash in its speed of reaction and movement fits in between nitrogen and phosphorus. It does not become available as fast, nor move about as much as nitrogen but is available quicker than most phosphates and moves about more in the soil than phosphates.

5. Where Should Fertilizer Be Applied In The Soil?

Fertilizer is food for the plant. Therefore it should be applied at such a place and in such a manner to enable the crop to get the most from it. This means that some of the nitrogen and all of the phosphorus should be placed near the seed and in a band, (keep 2-3 inches of soil between the fertilizer and seed). The reason for this is that some of the nitrogen and much of the phosphorus is needed by the plant in early life.

There is also another very important reason for banding the phosphorus fertilizer. At the very best, the crop cannot get over one-third of the phosphorus that was applied back in the first years crop, and often it is much less.

The soils of this area have an abundance of lime in them, and this lime joins, or unites, with the phosphorus and makes it become less available; so when phosphate is put out in a band,

Again, perhaps it should be pointed out that the water soluble phosphates contain less lime in them and therefore become available quicker and stay available longer than the phosphates used in most mixed fertilizers.

Potash normally should be put out before or soon after planting, in order to get the most benefit from it.

In the final analysis, fertilizers are used to make money. If all of the above facts are taken into consideration and the right kind and amount of fertilizer is used in a good management program, fertilizer can and will pay a very handsome return on the investment.

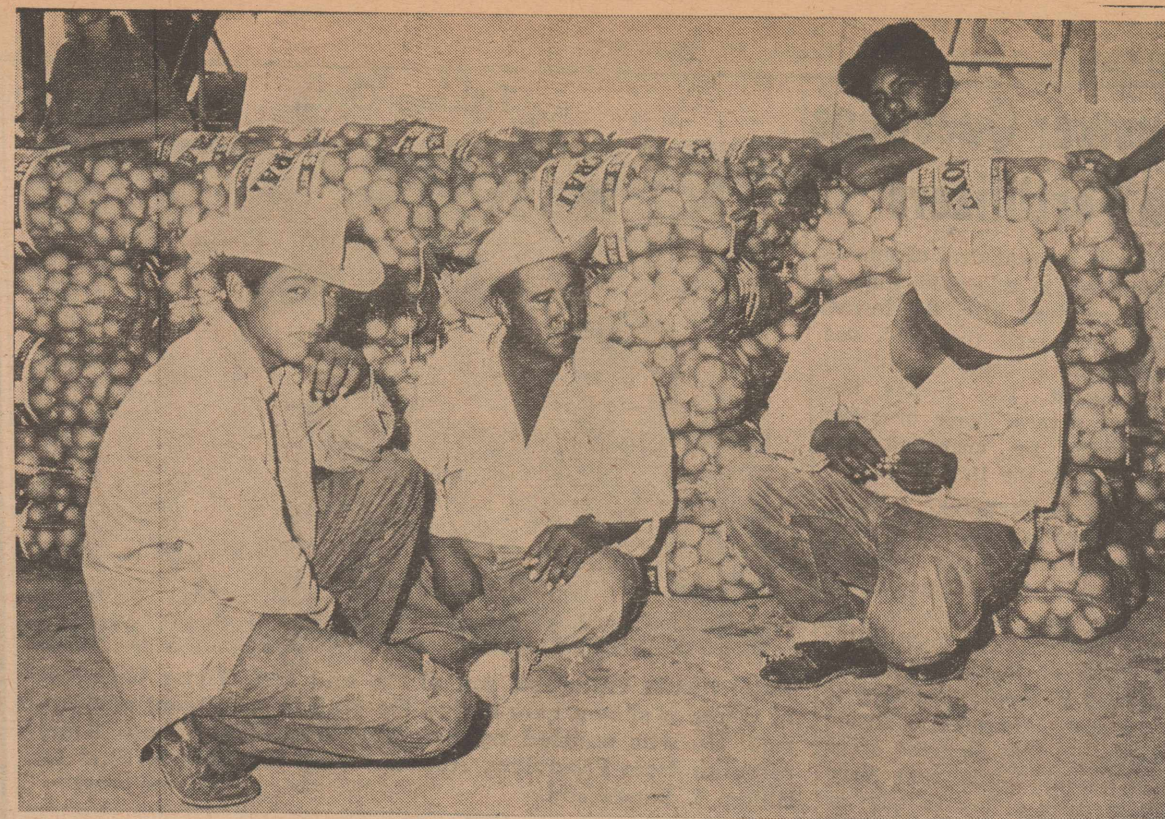

While in WT, Betty was a member of Pi Omega, serving as president of the sorority as a junior student.

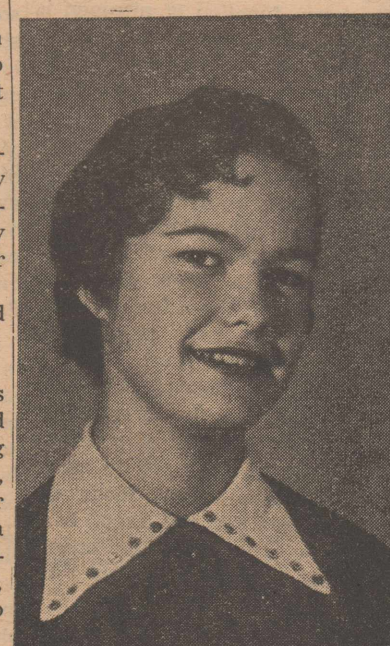

Researches Try For Answer To Problem

Research started on sediment problems involved in recharging lake water to the underground water bearing sand at the High Plains Station at Halfway in March. The silt content of water entering the well is being measured and the total amount of silt removed by pumping is being determined in the test. The extent of the movement of sediment in the underground sand is being observed thru the use of the three four-inch test wells located 8, 50 and 100 feet from the recharge well. Included in the program is a study of any bacterial pollution for the underground water supply caused by recharging.

Two graduate students of the Geological Department of the School of Engineering at Texas Tech are conducting the experiment as a part of their work toward a masters degree. Their research is under the supervision of Dr. F. A. Wade, Head of the Geology Department at Tech and W. L. Broadhurst, Chief Hydrologist for the High Plains Underground Water District. Funds for the project have been supplied by the Water District. Bob Winn and Tom Cullinan are the graduate students selected to carry on this project which will take 5 months to complete.

Cooperating in this important conservation project are the US Geology Survey, the Texas Board of Water Engineers and the High Plains Station.

147 Varieties Corn Tested By Halfway Station

One hundred and forty-seven varieties of white and yellow corn hybrids were included in the 1958 corn research program at the High Plains Station of the Texas Research Foundation at Halfway. The tests were under the supervision of Lawrence Gundy, corn breeder from the Texas Research Foundation.

each containing 49 entries, were conducted. The average yields on these tests were 77 to 97 bushels per acre while individual entries ranged from 56 to 135 bushels per acre. The tests included hybrids now available in the High Plains plus a number of mid-season and early commercial and experimental hybrids.

Nine yellow hybrids out of 50 tested produced yields above the test average of 97 bushels per acre. The top yielding yellow hybrids were: Texas 28, 134.8 bu.; Asgrow 104, 122.4 bu.; Watson III, 121.6 bu.; Conrad 3, 121.3 bu.; Texas 30, 116.3 bu.; Texas 26, 116.1 bu. and Conrad No. 1, 115.5 bu.

The high yielding white corn hybrids were: G779w, 132.9 bu.; Asgrow 105w, 121.3 bu.; Asgrow 101w, 114.2 bu.; TRF 9w, 105.2; Asgrow 107w, 102.3 bu. and PAC-633w, 101 bu. White corn acreage increased in 1958 in the High Plains. White corn buyers discovered that the Angoumois grain moth, a serious problem for corn in storage in the corn belt, had not yet heavily infested corn storage in this area. This has increased the market for white corn especially in the Muleshoe area.

The variety tests were planted April 25 with 26 pounds of nitrogen and 78 pounds of phosphorus applied in bands at planting time. This was followed by 150 pounds of nitrogen applied as a side dressing on May 5.

Farm Supply Had Start In Warehouse Building

The first home for the Olton Farm Supply was an old warehouse purchased from the Co-Op Gin. The structure which was located east of the present Smith Gin office has since been torn down. Its doors were first opened for business in December 1951 by co-owners Don Spain and Paul

Edwards. Mr. Edwards was an agricultural instructor in the Veterans Extension School. The partners bought the lot and building at the site now being vacated from George Bodkin, and moved to that location in March, 1952.

First to handle anhydrous ammonia in Olton, the Farm Supply started hauling it from Muleshoe in 1952. This they continued to do until the lot on Highway 70 was purchased in 1954 and storage facilities were installed there. A 40x44 foot dock-high warehouse was another addition that year.

Purina dealership since 1955, and a yearly visit to the Purina Research Farm at St. Louis, Mo., has been made by Mr. Spain or a store employee.

There are four full-time employees at the store. Albert Scribner has been employed there since 1956, and Mrs. Odessa Scribner has been bookkeeper since 1957. Oscar Rodriguez has been with the store for two years, and Daryl Dennis has recently been employed. Sonny Bryant is working parttime this summer.

Expansion and age of present facilities necessitated the new building. Parking space was at a minimum as was display, office and storage space. Having the feed mill in the same building with the store made maintenance difficult. The contract for the new building had already been signed when the wind ripped the front from the building this spring, but plans for completion were speeded up.

Study Indicates Research Need

The results of the preliminary study of silt control the recharge well at the High Plains Research Foundation indicate that further research on the problem of prolonging the irrigation water supply in the High Plains will be needed.

Mr. Thomas A. Cullinan, graduate student in the Geology Department of Texas Tech, has just completed his thesis on the recharge project. The field research was accomplished at the Foundation farm at Halfway. His report indicates that untreated and unfiltered water placed underground decreased the lateral water flow from 10 percent to 14 percent from 1957 to 1959. During the recharge period of 24 hours 1,096,000 gallons or 3.37 acre feet of water flowed by gravity into the well. This water contained 2,981 pounds of soil which included 229 pounds of sand, 1,249 pounds of silt and 1,503 pounds of clay. The well was pumped out for 6 hours following the recharge period. The 275,961 gallons of water pumped out contained 3,945 pounds of soil, which measured 3,138 pounds of sand, 496 pounds of silt and 311 pounds of clay.

In his thesis, Mr. Cullinan recommends the following four points to slow the silt problem in recharge well operation. (1) periodically surging the well while pumping after recharge, (2) Recharging at a time when wind velocities are low so that more suspended sediments will settle out before the water is injected (recharged), (3) Periodic re-development of the well to loosen and remove the clogging material around the well casing, and (4) Whenever practical, a combination of recharging and pumping be followed to avoid the possibility of clogging.

The research on silt control was conducted in cooperation with Robert M. Winn, graduate student at Texas Tech, and under the supervision of Dr. F. A. Wade, head of the Geology Department of Texas Tech and W. L. Broadhurst, Chief Hydrologist of the High Plains Underground Water District. The latter organization supplied the scholarship fund for the work. Cooperating on the project were Paul Retman and Gene McAddo of the US Geological Survey, Wayne Wyatt for the High Plains Underground water District, Dr. T. C. Longnecker, Director and Dr. Johnny H. Davis, Assistant Director, of the High Plains Research Foundation at Halfway.

Hart Sprayed For Mosquitoes Monday Night

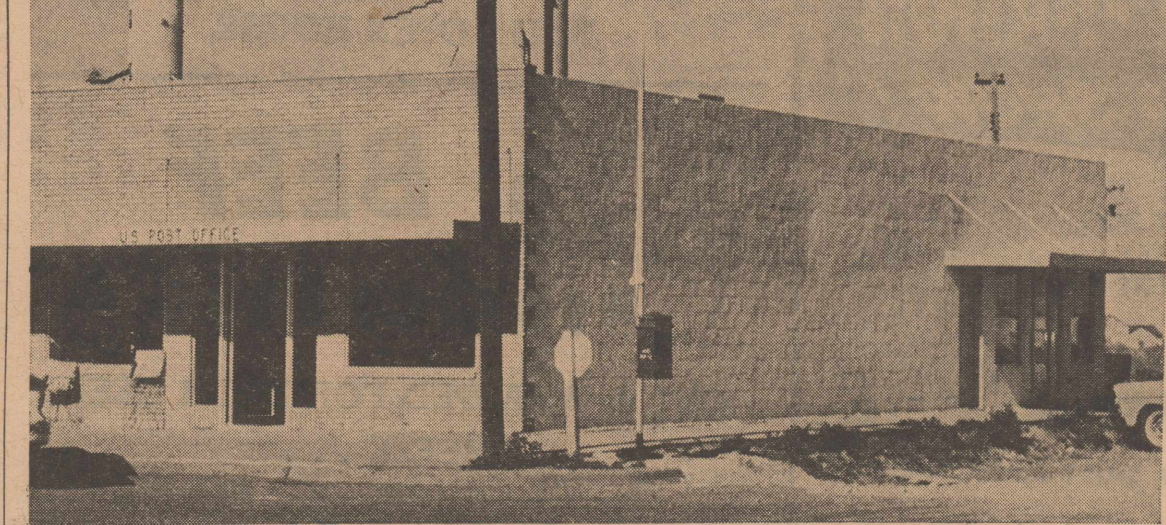
Hart was sprayed for mosquitoes Monday night.

KITCHEN KORNER

BY LELIA GALLION

So many of us have cucumbers to can this time of year, that I thought you might like a few pickling recipes.

Bread and Butter Pickles

- 25 to 30 medium-sized cucumbers
- 8 large white onions
- 1/2 cup salt
- 5 cups cider vinegar
- 5 cups sugar (2 1/2 pounds)
- 2 T mustard seed
- 1 t turmie
- 1/2 t cloves

Wash cucumbers and slice as thin as possible. Chop onions and combine with cucumbers and salt; let stand 3 hours and drain. Combine vinegar, sugar and spices in large preserving kettle; bring to boil. Add drained cucumbers; heat thoroughly but do not boil. Pack in hot sterilized jars and seal at once.

Only firm, not too ripe, products should be used for pickling. Vinegars come in grain strength. Use a vinegar of at least 40 to 50 grain strength. If too low in strength, the pickles will spoil or become soft.

Dill Sweet Pickles

- 12 medium-sized dill pickles
- 1 clove garlic
- 2 cups vinegar
- 4 cups sugar
- 2 T each of stick citamom, cloves and peppercorns

Slice dills about 1/4 inch thick; put in jars or bowl. Add garlic. Place vinegar and sugar on fire, bring to boil, add spices which have been tied in a bag. Boil 5 min., then pour hot over the pickles. Stir pickles each day for 4 days, pack pickles into jars. Reheat vinegar solution; pour over pickles and seal at once.

Lime Pickles

- 7 lbs. cucumbers
- 9 cups sugar
- 1/2 gallon vinegar
- salt and spices to taste
- 3 cups lime

Dissolve lime into 2 gallons of water. Put cucumbers in lime water and soak overnight. Next morning wash well, then soak in clear water for 3 hours. Mix sugar, vinegar, salt and spices. Pour over drained cucumbers and soak overnight in this. Next morning cook pickles in vinegar mixture for 35 min. Pack in hot jars and seal.
