A PLEASANT MYSTERY — NONE INJURED

NONE INJURED IN AUTO ACCIDENT NEAR CIRCLE

Olton Area almost contributed to the "Death Watch" count Sunday evening.

Four youths from the Springlake-Earth area overturned the car in which they were riding near the rural community of Circle. The car rolled three times, knocking down two curvemarking posts, and landed on its top—but none of the passengers was injured seriously. Gilbert Coventry, 16, the car's driver, said later he thought it "felt like the left-front wheel locked down". Coventry is the son of Mr. and Mrs. D. D. Coventry, farmers near Springlake.

Other occupants of the vehicle were Jimmy Peters, 19, his brother Robert, 20, and Jimmy Smith, 17. Jimmy Peters lives with his uncle at Needmore, his brother lives at Earth and Smith is on furlough from Fort Camp, Ky. According to the boys, they were driving to Olton after driving around in Earth. The accident occurred on the highway curve just west of Circle.

Leg Is Trapped
Robert Peters and Smith were riding in the back seat, and Jimmy Peters was sitting beside Coventry. None was thrown from the rolling vehicle. When the car landed for the last time on its top, the top was crushed so low, that J. Peters' ankle was caught between the top and the dash. A car jack was needed to free him.

Olton doctors reported all four were treated and released to go home. Robert Peters received the only near-serious injury from the accident. He received a two-inch scalp laceration. All others were just "scratched and bruised".

SNOW BLANKETS OLTON AREA; STREETS MADE VERY DANGEROUS

Snow blanketed the Olton area early Monday morning.

Approximately one and a half inches of snow fell in the Olton vicinity the first two days of this week, leaving roads in hazardous condition.

The fine, dry flakes failed to cause very much trouble to motorists on the roads by building up into large drifts. However, because the flakes were so small and dry, they packed too tightly together, becoming ice.

During the first day of snow, high winds made visibility so very poor, motorists were warned to stay off the highways.

Highways Cleared
By Tuesday afternoon, highways were, for the most part, cleared of ice. But on the Olton city streets, slightly hazardous conditions remained.

No accidents were reported by afternoon Wednesday. Most larger cities reported heavy damages from numerous collisions. The only damage caused by

freezing temperatures in Olton, according to local automotive shops, came from frozen radiators. One truck block reportedly broken.

Few people actually enjoyed this particular snowfall. Probably the only people in Olton, other than the small fry, who made the most of the cold spell were the Clovis Poteet family. They sprayed water on their driveway and turned it into an ice skating rink.

FILES INDICATE NEWS IN OLTON HEAVY LAST YEAR

School building was Olton's top news in 1958. School patrons went to the polls in June and gave their stamp of approval to a bond issue of more than a half million dollars for school construction.

Contract for the new facilities was awarded in mid-October to S. R. Duncan and Associates of Lubbock. Construction was underway at year-end.

Under construction is an addition to the existing cafeteria facility, a new gymnasium and 14 new classrooms which are being added to the south side of the elementary building.

The classroom wing also will include an all-purpose room equal in size to four class rooms.

Schoolmen here say that, when complete, the new facilities will give Olton one of the finest school plants on the Plains.

Crops Tops
Olton area made and gathered one of the finest crops in history. Grain elevators overflowed with grain sorghum and ginning was at record peak.

The Olton area ginned more than 43,000 bales of cotton. Fine weather prevailed through most of the harvest season and good prices were realized from most of the cotton crop.

Recreation Center
Olton Municipal Recreation Center had its first full year of operation as Olton's playground.

Under the leadership of its president, Carroll Cox, the Center built Olton's first swimming pool. To celebrate the opening of the pool, Olton also staged another first—its first bathing beauty contest.

Miss Linda Franks, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Eldon Franks and a senior at West Texas State College, was chosen as the Center's first beauty queen.

New Funeral Home
After years of effort on the part of local people, Olton finally got a funeral home of its own during 1958. Percy Parsons of Post established Parsons Funeral Home here.

The accompanying ambulance service has proved a boon to Olton folk and doctors credit the prompt ambulance service available as having been a definite factor in saving at least two lives.

Chamber Of Commerce
Olton Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture had its first full year of operation with a full-time manager in 1958. Its accomplishments were many. Among other things, it introduced cucumbers here as a money crop. There are prospects that a greater acreage will be grown in 1959 than in 1958.

Toy Project For Needy Children Is Rated Success
Thirty two boxes were delivered to the needy families of 124 children Christmas Eve and Christmas Day.

Mrs. Bill Dickenson, Sr., chairman of the annual unofficial project, said Tuesday she would "like to thank all the wonderful people who helped with the work and donations this year."

Boxes delivered to the families contained several toys and some candy for each child. They also held a large portion of pinto beans and potatoes.

The Mustangs thus far support a 4-7 season record. The girls have failed to take a victory in seven starts.

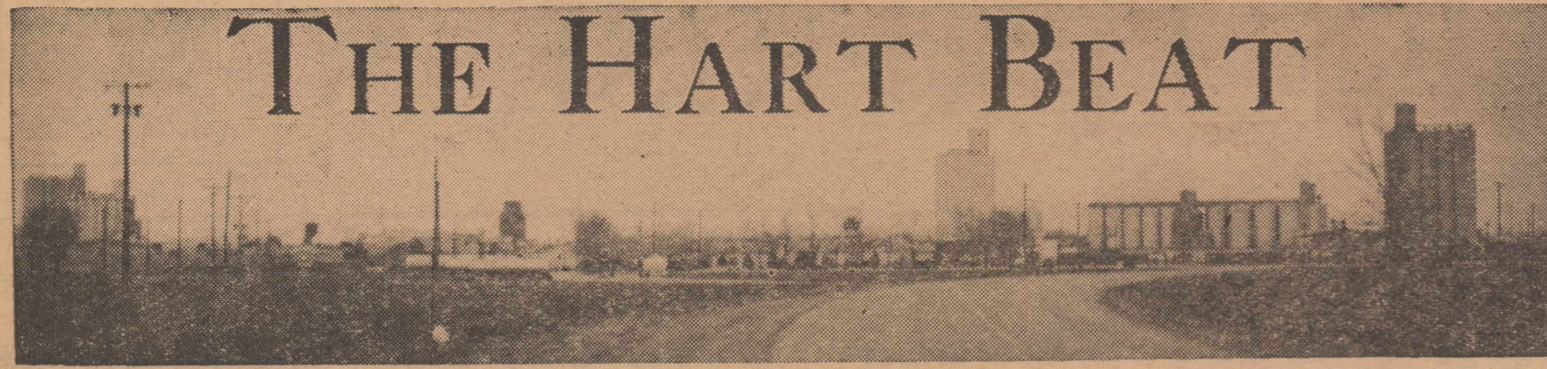
Both OHS varsity teams are entered in the Dimmitt Invitational Tournament Jan. 8-9-10. Pairings will be announced next week.
