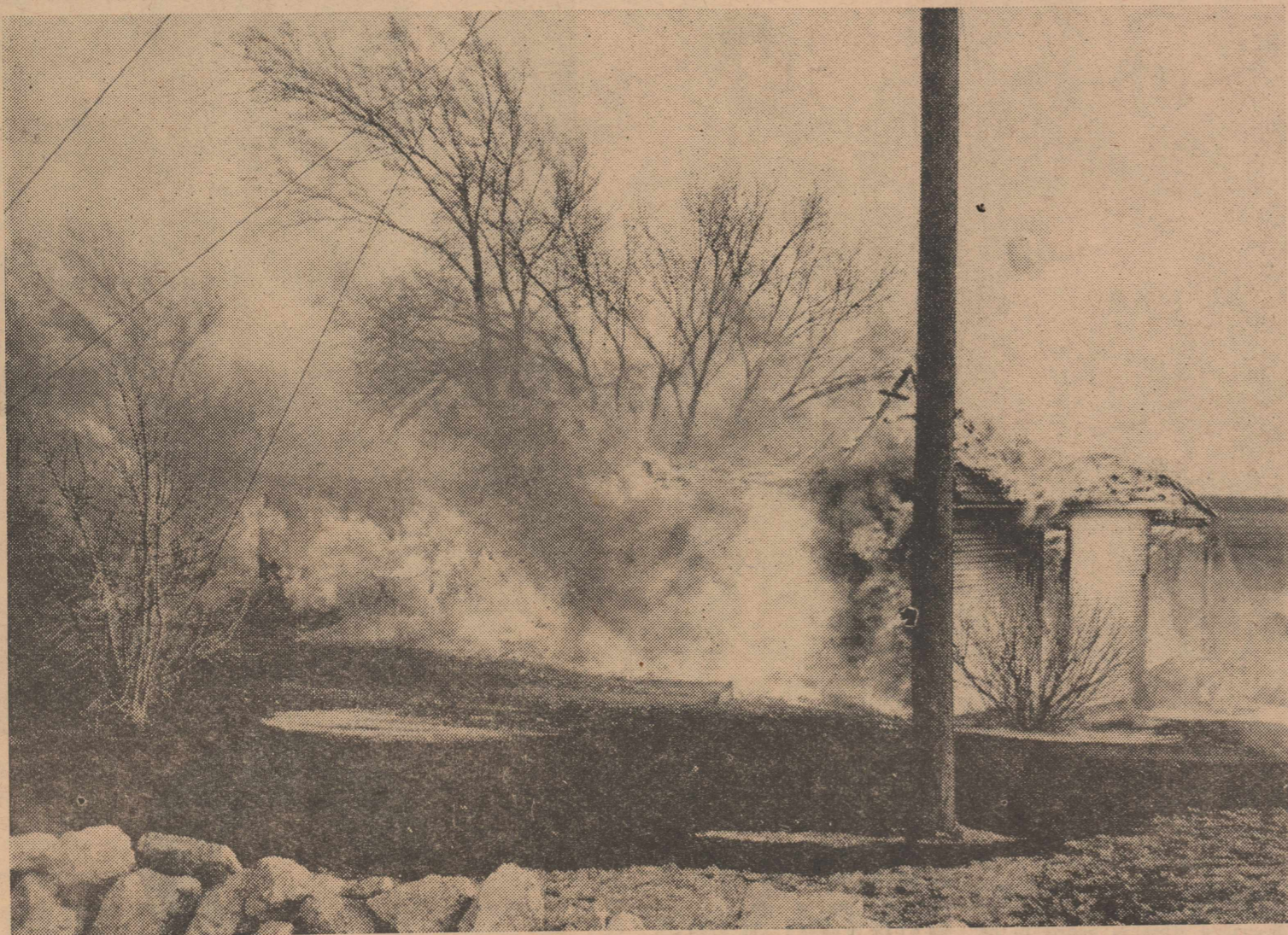

## Fire Destroys Dale Dudley Home North Of Town Sunday

Roaring flames fanned by a brisk southwest wind devoured the Dale Dudley home Sunday afternoon. Also burned were two haystacks located about 200 yards from the house. Wind-borne cinders set fire to the haystacks. Firemen saved a trailer after Dudley jolted it across a rough pasture behind a pickup truck and dislodged burning fodder from its flat bed. Dudley was able to save a part of the household furnishings. The remainder, along with the house, was reduced to smoldering ashes within minutes after hungry flames had leaped up from a clothes closet and engulfed the building. Mrs. Dudley had not been feeling well. She was lying down when her son, Ronald, 5 years

old, came in to inform her that the house was on fire. Ronald and his little sister, Kathy, 3, had been playing in the room where the fire started. Mrs. Dudley reported. Mrs. Dudley said flames were shooting about four feet high from some clothes in the closet when she went to look. She ran for the garden hose. "I never did get there," she declared. She said Dale was outside when the fire started. He rushed in and began carrying out furnishings. He was able to save only a little household equipment. "Everything went up so fast," Mrs. Dudley declared. She said the tinder-dry house was a sheet (Continued on Page Five)

## Hart Baby's Life Hangs In Balance

Little Glenda Beeson, 9 years old, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jehu Beeson of Hart, is clinging to a thread of life after undergoing heart surgery Tuesday in Dallas.

The delicate and rare operation was performed by Dr. Wilson, a Dallas heart specialist. Relatives of the little girl said he was assisted by 14 other doctors. The little girl was suffering from a chronic heart ailment with which she had been stricken since birth. She also is suffering from a heart block.

The brave little girl went into surgery with the full knowledge that she might not live through the five-hour ordeal. Doctors told the child that it was her only chance for survival. She made her own choice to risk her life for survival. "Don't worry about me," she told her parents, just outside surgery. "I'm going to be all right." Hart School sent her a special telegram and offered a special prayer for the courageous little nine-year-old. Relatives will take her tiny Chihuahua, "Pepper", to Dallas in event Glenda should call for him. "Pepper" has been her constant companion for years. Glenda will be semi-conscious for several days. ## Weigh Show Stock At Barn Thursday

Animals will start coming in Thursday of next week for Olton's annual 4-H Club, FFA and FFA spring stock show. Members of the board and former board members made a fund drive for support of the show this week. "We were well received and appreciate the response we got from both merchants and farmers," said B. C. Cooner, board president. Anyone wishing to contribute may leave their donations with Howard Hall. Bub Holt will be in charge of weighing swine and lambs. "We do not want any hogs unloaded until weighers are set up and ready to weigh those animals," show officials said. "Weighing will begin early Thursday morning. Lambs and steers may be unloaded Thursday and penned in the barn anytime before 5 o'clock in the afternoon. "We can weigh them anytime during the day," show officials said. All animals must be in the barn before 5 o'clock Thursday afternoon. No entries will be accepted after that time. Weighing calves will be Bill Smith, who is employed at Olton Co-Op Gin. Scales will be checked next Monday by Lyle Scale Company of Plainview and will be balanced and correct. There will be no weighing after that time until time to weigh in for the show. All exhibitors should report to the superintendents in charge of the division in which they are exhibiting. Swine superintendents are Don Spain, William DeBerry, Howard Hall and Henry Mathis. Sheep superintendents are Lous Hair and Owen Jones. Beef superintendents are Tom McGill and Brent Burrow. Paul Hukill will be in charge of poultry and rabbits. General superintendent for the show is Doyle Pinson. B. C. Cooner is president of the stock show board of directors.

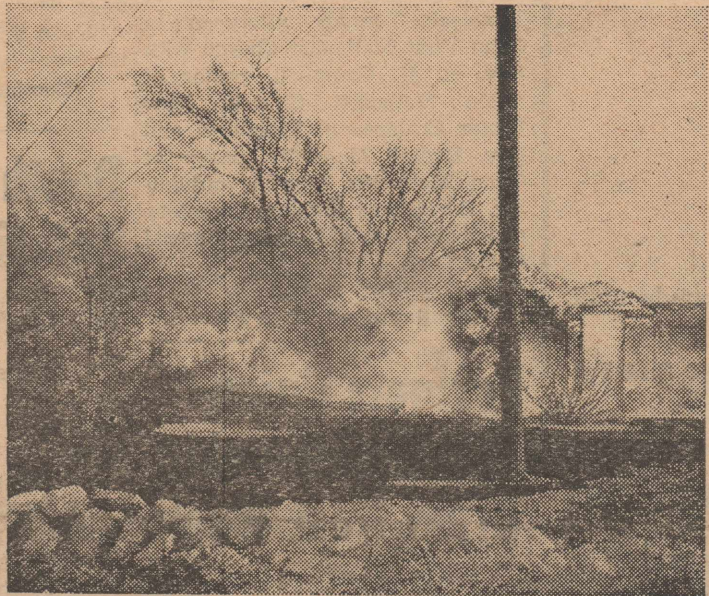

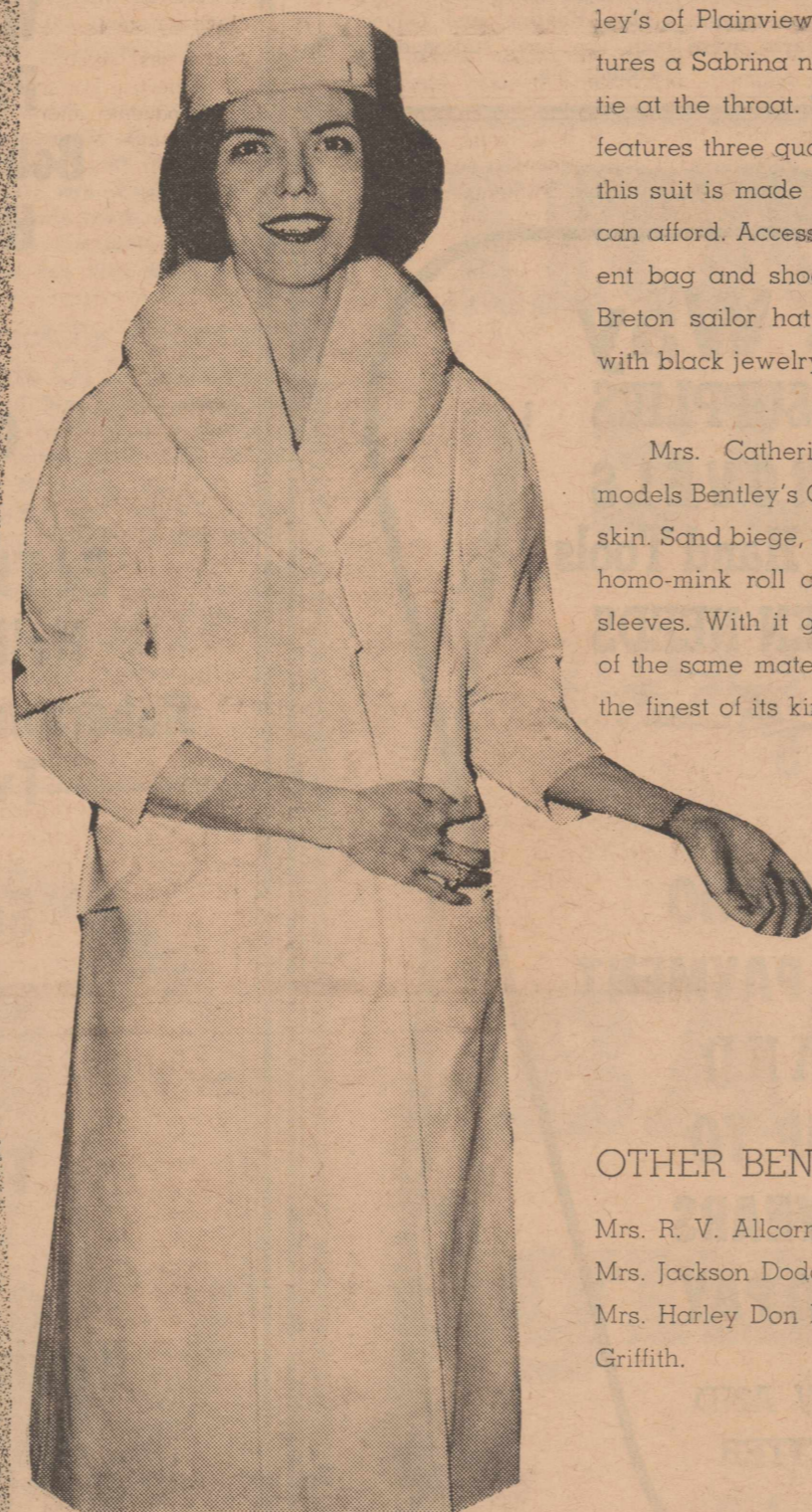

In 1958 I had 76 acres of cotton. Thirty-five acres of this land was not fertilized and made a good bale to the acre. Forty-one acres was fertilized with 200 pounds of Mathieson's Ammo-Phos water soluble 13-39-0 and produced 2 1/4 bales per acre.

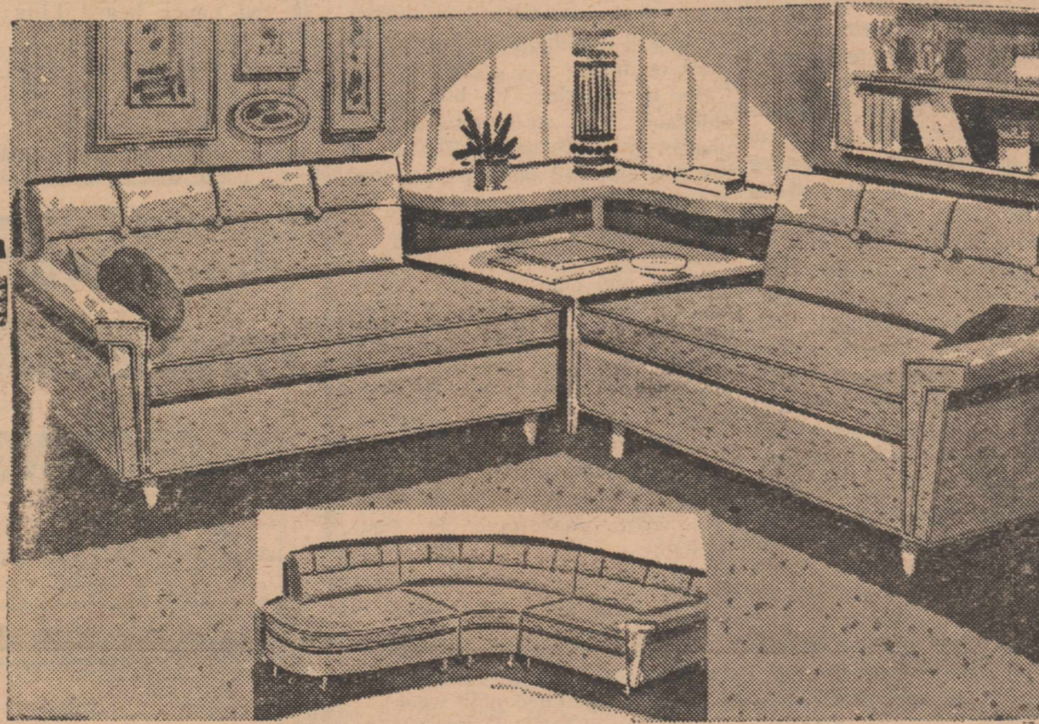

## Mrs. Dorrough Is Teacher Of Year

This award will be presented each year at the February meeting of the Parent-Teacher Association. Farmers Insurance Agency will sponsor the award.

Mrs. Dorrough was born in Lee County, and attended schools in Huntsville. She attended the University of Virginia. She was married to E. L. Dorrough in Bryan. They have two children, C. J. of Fort Worth and Mrs. Winton Pogue, Corpus Christi.

A committee of three was selected to name the recipient of this honor.

\$5,000 for Bachelor's Degree and \$4,220 to \$6,000 on Master's Degree. Cost \$74 million.

8. Increase maintenance and operation allotment to \$600 per professional unit. Cost \$7 million.

9. Increase transportation formula \$380 per bus. Cost \$3.2 million.

10. Provision for framework of a minimum educational curriculum and repeal of present antiquated statutes. No cost.

11. Provision of sick leave for all teachers. Cost \$3 million.

12. Provision for retired teachers to serve as substitutes for a limited number of days. No cost.

13. Establish regional film libraries. Cost \$250,000.

14. Establishing pre-school program for non-English speaking children. Cost \$1 million.

These proposals will not all pertain to the smaller school systems such as we have in Hart. But you will have to keep in mind that this program has to cover the entire state of Texas, large and small, and must have the provisions and forethought necessary.

The school board will have jurisdiction over the local situation which will arise. For instance, in provision No. 7, we know that to attract the better trained men and women into the teaching profession, we must maintain salaries high enough to compete with other phases of our economy.

There will be some instances where a person will have the training, but not the particular ability or talent such as will be required of them. In these cases the School Board will have its right to dismiss such individuals.

There is also another proposal that I feel should be included. The aid given by the state, based on average daily attendance, should be increased for the smaller schools. For schools having less than 1000 average daily attendance, the assistance by the state should be increased at the rate of 1 percent per 100 pupils, 2 percent per 200 pupils, etc. down to the average daily attendance of the school.

It is more expensive, per unit to operate the smaller schools and I feel there should be some consideration given here so that the students enrolled in a small school will have an equal opportunity

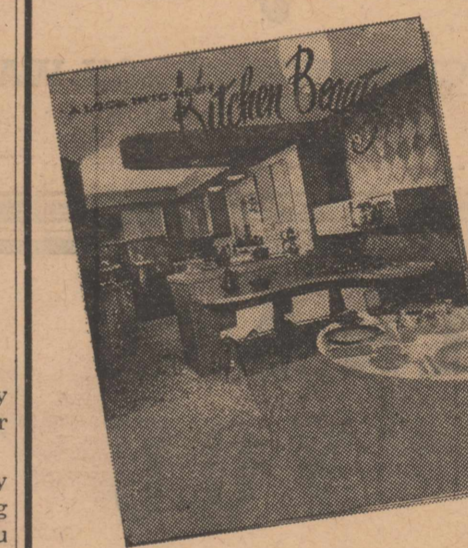

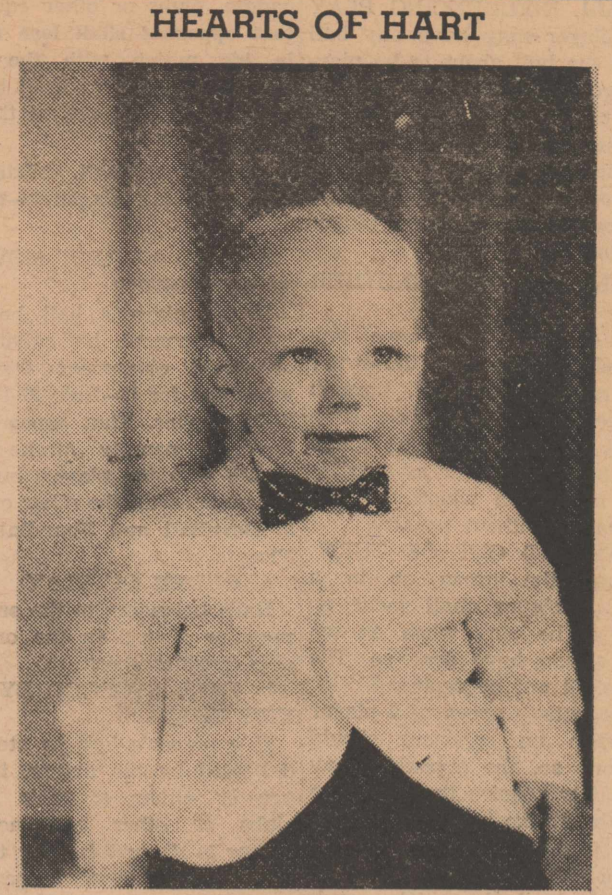

### Golfing Rules Are Listed

Section XIII  
Three-Ball, Best-Ball and Four-Ball Play

**RULE 40**  
Three-Ball, Best Ball and Four-Ball Match Play

**General**  
a. RULES OF GOLF APPLY  
The Rules of Golf, so far as they are not at variance with the following special Rules, shall apply to all three-ball, best-ball and

four-ball matches.  
b. BALL INFLUENCING PLAY  
Any player may have any ball (except the ball about to be played) lifted or played, at the option of the owner, if he considers that it might interfere with or be of assistance to a player or side, but this is only permissible before the next stroke is played by the player whose turn it is.

c. BALL MOVED BY ANOTHER BALL  
If a player's ball move any other ball in the match, the owner of the moved ball shall, through the green or in a hazard, drop his ball, or on the putting green place his ball, as near as possible to the spot from which the ball was moved, without penalty.

d. PLAYING OUT OF TURN  
Through the green or in a hazard, a player shall incur no penalty if he play when an opponent should have done so. The stroke shall not be replayed.

On the putting green, if a player play when an opponent should have done so, the opponent may immediately require the player to replay the stroke in correct order, without penalty.

2. Three-Ball Match Play  
In a three-ball match, each player is playing two distinct matches.

a. BALL STOPPED OR DEFLECTED BY AN OPPONENT  
If a player's ball be stopped or

deflected by an opponent, his caddie, clubs or other equipment, that opponent shall lose the hole in his match with the player. The other opponent shall treat the occurrence as a rub of the green (Definition 27).

Exception:—Ball striking person attending flagstick—Rule 34-2.

b. BALL AT REST MOVED BY AN OPPONENT  
If the player's ball be moved by an opponent, his caddie, clubs or other equipment (except in searching for it—Rule 27-1b), Rule 27-2a applies. That opponent shall incur a penalty stroke in his match with the player, but not in his match with the other opponent.

3. Best-Ball and Four-Ball Match Play  
a. ORDER OF PLAY  
Balls belonging to the same side may be played in the order the side considers best.

b. BALL STOPPED BY PLAYER'S SIDE  
If a player's ball be stopped or deflected by the player, his partner or either of their caddies, clubs or other equipment, the player is disqualified for the hole. His partner incurs no penalty.

c. BALL STOPPED BY OPPONENT'S SIDE  
If a player's ball be stopped or deflected by an opponent, his caddie, clubs or other equipment, the opponent's side shall lose the hole.

Exception:—Ball striking person attending flagstick—Rule 34-2.

d. PARTNER'S BALL MOVED BY PLAYER ACCIDENTALLY  
If a player, his partner, or either of their caddies accidentally move a ball owned by their side or by touching anything cause it to move (except as otherwise provided for in the Rules), the owner of the ball shall incur a penalty stroke, but the penalty shall not apply to his partner. The ball shall be played as it lies.

e. BALL MOVED BY OPPONENT'S SIDE  
If a player's ball be touched or moved by an opponent, his caddie, clubs or other equipment (except as otherwise provided for in the Rules), that opponent shall incur a penalty stroke, but the penalty shall not apply to the other opponent. The player shall, through the green or in a hazard, drop the ball, or on the putting green

place the ball, as near as possible to the spot from which the ball was moved.

f. PLAYING WRONG BALL  
If a player play a stroke with any wrong ball except in a hazard, the player shall be disqualified for that hole, but the penalty shall not apply to his partner. There is no penalty for a player playing a stroke or strokes with a wrong ball in a hazard provided he then play his own ball.

g. DISQUALIFICATION PENALTIES  
A player shall be disqualified from the match for a breach of Rule 37-5 (Time and order of Starting), but, in the discretion of the Committee, the penalty shall not necessarily apply to his partner (Definition 28—Note).

A side shall be disqualified for a breach of any of the following:  
Rule 2—The Club and the Ball.  
Rule 4—Agreement to Waive Rules Prohibited.  
Rule 37-2—Caddie and Forecaddie.  
Rule 37-7—Undue Delay (repeated offense).

A player shall be disqualified for the hole in question and from the remainder of the match for a breach of Rule 37-6 (Discontinuance of Play), but the penalty shall not apply to his partner. (Modification of penalty—Rule 38-5).

h. INFRINGEMENT ASSISTING PARTNER  
If a player infringe a Rule or Local Rule so as to assist his partner's play, the partner incurs the relative penalty in addition to any penalty incurred by the player.

i. PENALTY APPLIES TO PLAYER ONLY  
In all other cases where, by the Rules of Golf, a player would incur a penalty, the penalty shall not apply to his partner.
