

It was in August of 1917 that Roy and I were together. Often we talked of where we wished to go. My lot fell to a converted Yacht Roy's to a collier, the Cyclops. The Cyclops went to South American water; the May to the Bay

of Biscay. The fate of the Cyclops is known to all. That is, all know that it disappeared, where or how is not known to man. At the time here was much speculation as to its fate, but not one bit of evi-dence was ever adduced to sub-stantiate any theory. The ship with all aboard was lo t. Not one word of distress was sent from its radio room, how could it happen? Not one sign of wreckage was ever located The disappearance of the Cyclops was the baffling mystery of the war. The problem is still un olved, and will ever re main so.

From the fact that Roy died in the service of his country is not enough within itself to distinguigh his mother from any other Gold Star Mother. There were thou-sands of them. The fact that there no mounds for mothers to vi it and offer their prayers over the bodies of their heroic sons is what makes the mothers of the crew of the Cyclops a separate body of Gold Star Mothers. That is what makes me feel so tenderly towards tho e mothers.

The gratitude of our govern-ment towards the Gold Star Mothers has been gracious. It or-ganized and paid for the pilgrimage of those mothers to visit the grave, of their sons in Foreign





The following article is reprint-ed from a leading farm magazine at the request of several of our farmer readers, in connection with the practice of some livestock own-ers who allow cattle and horses

to run at large: "An increasing number of far mers are letting their livestock run at large. Sometimes it is be-cause of a shortage of feed and pasture.

"One cannot pasture his cattle on his neighbor's wheat without paying a price. That is true even though the neighbor may be pat-ient and forbearing and make no trouble. The one who imposes on him still pays.

"He first pays by losing the good will of the family imposed on. Even though the family may treat the imposter courteously, there cannot be the same feeling of interest and respect after such deliberate and continued impo.i.

"There is also the loss of repu-"There is also the loss of repu-tation. Of course, an imposter can-not be considered a straight shoot-er by neighbors who know these things. Because it is not fair or honest deliberately to let ones livestock run at large, a man who does that sort of thing cannot be considered strictly honest by those considered strictly honest by those who know him. "Therefore the imposing neigh-

bor pays and pays, both in loss of friendship and in loss of re-putation which in turn injures his business relationships among his neighbors.

"It seems to me that one who stops to consider the matter must conclude that pasturing one's live. stock on a neighbor's crops is so expensive he can't afford to do it."—G. O.





GOLD SEEMS TO BE A PUZZLE

Anybody who understands money has some thing on us, we admit, but we recall some months ago wondering what good our vast accumulation of gold would do if the other nations of the world decided that they could get along without a gold standard.

That the idea wasn't altogether foolish is confirmed by a recent dispatch from Washington, tell. ing how some monetary authorities explain that the United States is like a poker player who has won most of the chips If the others are unable to get chips they will likely turn to a new set of chips and then our buried gold will not keep us in the game

Worse than that, however, is the fact that the continued inflow of gold has caused the Treasury to buy all gold sent to this country. The policy be-gan in December and already \$126,000,000 has been necessary to take up the incoming yellow metal. At this rate the government would have to borrow \$1,500,000,000 in 1937 to purchase and "sterilize" gold imports, which is deemed advisable to keep the gold from boosting our available credit facilities to a dangerous peak.

RAILROAD'S BRIGHTER FUTURE

During the year 1936 some 140 Class 1 rail roads made a profit of \$140,000,000, which was highly encouraging to a huge industry which for five years had seen bu iness cut in half, dividends disappear, bonds go into default and about one third of the total mileage in the hands of the Court.

Back of the year 1936 was the fear, amount ing to a conviction, that the industry was wreck-ed, that the government would lose it: \$700,000,000 advanced to bail 'em out and that about a million workers would soon have to look for jobs the railroads definitely gave up the ghost Gross income had dropped from six to three billion dollars and there was, apparently, no end in sight.

Today the picture is vastly changed. With the first year of net profits the railroad executives are looking ahead, with the lessons of the past well fixed in their mind. Gone is the old complacent idea that the nation had to have the railroads regardless of how the public was treated and that there was nothing for the people to do but to like what they go. Gone is the conviction that passengers and freight will gravitate to the railroad this shibboleth left when the motor trucks came into rapid competition and took a lot of business.







powder and 1-2 teaspoon salt. Cut n 1.2 cup of shortening until the mixture is full of lumps about the size of small marbles. Add enough milk to make a light dough, that can be rolled very lightly on a board Roll to 1.4 inch thickness and cut rounds of 2 inches in diameter. In the center of each round put a heaping teaspoon of meat filling. Fold rounds in half. pinching the edges together, place olded edge down in a greased baking sheet. Brush the rolls with egg yolk and little water beaten together. Bake in an oven 450 to 475 degrees about 10 minutes

Meat Filling

Put through the meat grinder 1.2 lb. of cooked beef, chicken liver, or ham-or a mixture of these-with 1 bay leaf, 1 small chopped onion, a teaspoon of parsley and a tea poon of chop-ped cucumber pickle, with salt and pepper to taste. Brown this mixture in a little fat and blend with enough sour cream to make a paste. One heaping teaspoon of this peppery filling is enough for each roll.

Browned Rice

Cut 6 slices of bacon into nat row pieces, put into a skillet with 2 chopped onions and cook until the onions are tender and well browned; add 1-2 cup of chopped boiled ham, 1-2 cup of grated cheese, 1-2 cup of diced chicken or veal, and 2 cups of cooked rice. Mix together lightly and turn in to a hot greased omelet pan. Heat and brown carefully on both sides over low heat. Turn out upon a platter. Serve with creamed car rots and peas.


Egg Plant Balls

Scoop out the inside of an egg plant that has been steamed or boiled without peeling. Mash the pulp. Measure and add half as much soft bread crumbs and half as much cooked meat. Season with 1.2 teapoon of salt, 1.4 teaspoon pepper and 1 tablespoon of onion jucie. 




