The computer will be used to help in reporting range fires and equipment use. This will help the local department and the Forest Service to more efficiently communicate in battling the range fires that have been all too common in the local area over the past few years.

The computer originated from the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) in Childress. TxDOT has had to upgrade some of its automation equipment recently to keep up with the processing demands of engineering software programs. Pat Swindell, TxDOT Information Resource Administrator in Childress, said, The computers are in good condition and will run any of the usual programs except the highly technical programs used by our engineers. Pigg Family To Members of the Class of 1999 Rebuild Again

Nearly a year after Roye Pigg was shot to death, the family business, The Sportsman Cafe, has been partially gutted by an electrical fire. But by Thursday, the family was back in business. They had a catering job to finish.

We're gonna try it again," said Mary Pigg, Roye's widow. "That's the only way Roye would have it.

The cafe, one of Quitaque's most popular hangouts, caught fire shortly before 12:30 a.m. Tuesday, Quitaque Volunteer Fire Chief Dennis Farley said.

The establishment was built in two parts. The bar, a building adjoining the main restaurant and kitchen, was destroyed.

"All of the back is lost. It's a total loss," Farley said.

The kitchen, which burned and

was rebuilt in a new location within the building in 1997, was unharmed. The cafe's seating area suffered some smoke dam-

A state fire marshal's investigation determined that an electrical short in the bar's ice cooler most likely ignited the blaze, Farley said.

The blaze took two hours to extinguish, but because the building is located just one door down

TxDOT was able to transfer the computers to the Forest Service, who in turn facilitated the local department's acquisition. Mona Bridges of the Texas Forest Service added "We are always glad to work with our partners at TxDOT in Childress and the local volunteer fire departments to improve our fire fighting capabilities in West Texas.

"Congratulations to the volunteer fire department on their recent acquisition of the computer," said State Senator Haywood. "I am pleased with the Texas Forest Service Helping Hands Program and their involvement with these rural areas in my district. This type of technology will help insure the welfare of rural Texas and protect it against the violent destruction caused by fires. I commend the fire department as well as the Texas Forest Service."

"I am glad the Texas Department of Transportation in Childress and the Texas Forest Service were able to work together to provide local volunteer fire departments with computers," said Texas House Speaker Pete Laney. "The West Texas community will benefit greatly because of their efforts."

The research sample includes fourth-, fifth- and sixth-grade students from five Texas counties. The survey incudes eight questions and was designed with the help of Extension Agents. A researcher says ag science fairs expose students to different agricultural industries within their counties. The survey questions cover livestock, crops, natural resources and food, and is tailored for each county.

Overall, students who attend fairs have a greater knowledge of and more positive attitudes toward agriculture.

from the fire department, officials first had to insure the city's emergency building was safe.

"Our first priority was to get everything out of our building, just as a precaution," Farley said. "Then we just pulled around the corner and went to work.

Mrs. Pigg said the business was not insured, but the family wouldn't consider taking donations to help get restarted.

Even without the help, she said, she plans to reopen the restaurant within a week.

"We've already got it coming along," she said. "We didn't lose that much equipment back (in the bar), thank goodness

The family has endured plenty of tragedy in the last two years.

In July 1997, a fire ravaged the Sportsman's kitchen and restaurant area. Roye Pigg, the cafe's owner, decided to rebuild.

The kitchen was originally in the front of the building, and we had to rebuild in the back portion," Mary Pigg recalled.

Early on the morning of June 4, 1998, Roye Pigg was shot to death at a neighbor's home. Mary Pigg said landing on their feet is what Roye would have wanted.

Scanty Peach Crop **Predicted This Year**

Pammy Millican County Extension Agent The 1998 drought coupled with a warm winter means fewer peaches this year.

Extension horticulturist Marty Baker says it is the worst combination of weather conditions for peaches he has ever seen. Last year's drought hurt peach trees as much as it did any other crop in Texas, but the trouble for orchard owners began with the hot, dry weather of late August and September.

Baker says the weather stunted new bud growth. Many of those buds that were produced did not reach full maturity. He says this could lead to a tremendous drop of fruit in late April and

May.
Peach orchards were dealt a second blow by the extremely warm winter. Depending on the egion, the trees need 700 to 850 hours at temperatures between 42° and 45°. Some varieties now have as few as one leaf every two



A WEEKLY SUMMARY OF COTTON MARKETING NEWS

For the Week Ending May 13, 1999

USDA's supply/demand report released on May 12. The market tumbled lower after the anxiously awaited report provided more disappointment for the bulls

USDA's cotton supply/demand report showed higher U. S. production and ending stocks for 1999-00, which analysts termed bearish for new-crop cotton futures. The department projected 1999-00 cotton production at 18.0 million bales and ending stocks at 5.5 million. These figures were well above 1998-99 production, which was raised by 100,000 bales to 13.9 million, and ending stocks of 3.6 million, also up 100,000.

Consumption for the new season is estimated at 10.6 million bales, compared to 10.5 million in the current marketing year. Also, U. S. exports were pegged at 5.5 million bales, versus the current year's 4.1 million.

According to analysts, the new-crop estimates appear to be assuming the absence of USDA's Step 2 cotton export subsidies, a program credited with helping enhance export and domestic mill demand for U.S. cotton. Step 2, which provides certificates to U.S. shippers and mills for using higher priced domestic cotton, expired when \$701 million in funding was depleted in December 1998. Although most in the industry still are optimistic that the program eventually will be reinstated. funding may not be available until this fall, well into the new cotton season.

In the meantime, the market will have to digest some bearish figures that may point to lower cotton prices. Analysts notedthat the stocks-to-use ratio for the new U. S. crop has jumped to a level not seen in several years, reflecting ample supplies. The ratio rose from approximately 24 percent for the current season to a projected 34 percent.

World numbers for 1999-00 also appear bearish with production and ending stocks at 87.0 million and 41.7 million bales respectively. The figures are higher than the 84.0 million bales produced in 1998-99 and that year's stocks of 41.2 million bales.

Some analysts noted that the big world numbers obscure some important details. A closer examination of the figuresshows the increase total world carryout is mostly credited to the jump in U. S. supplies. Foreign stocks actually are estimated lower at 36.2 million bales compared to the current season's 37.6 million. With a large crop and large stocks, the U. S. could become the residual supplier to the world cotton users, analysts said.

Turkey was the largest buyer of U.S. cotton with purchases totaling 32,500 bales, a sale larger than the previous week's total sales. Mexico kept its place into the premier buyer list with a 7,100 bale acquisition, and China rounded the top three with 5,200 bales. Additionally, new crop commitments totaled 22,100 bales, slightly lower than the previous week's 32,900 bales.

Spot cotton sales, however, were not as robst. Due to discouraging cotton prices, many producers were reluctant to sell their cotton. In the five trading days ended May 13, sales on TELCOT's electronic marketing system totaled just 2,903 bales, down from the previous week's sales of 4,384 bales. Average daily prices received by producers utilizing TELCOT ranged from 35.09 to 44.48 cents per pound, compared to a range of 41.35 to 45.93 cents per pound, compared to a range of 41.35 to 45.93 cents per pound the prior week.

In addition, USDA itself has indicated that the long-awaited 1998 Disaster assistance package will fall short of covering the financial hardship it identifies.

We continue to trust our Congressional leadership to put the interests of cotton, and the rest of agriculture, on the next available train so that we aren't left standing alone at the station.
