Two names were left off the honor rolls.

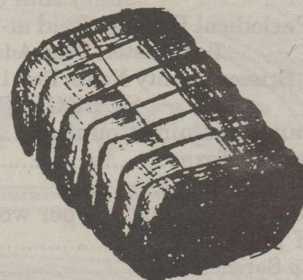
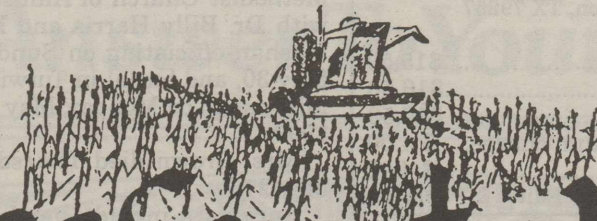
Lindsey Jennings was left off the yearly honor roll, and Matt Martin was omitted from the six weeks, semester and yearly honor rolls.

Driving Skills Earn TxDOT Rodeo Honors

Darrell Reynolds and Rickey Minyard of the Texas Department of transportation's (TxDOT) Childress District Silverton Maintenance Section, were the top finalists in their section at the district Truck Rodeo held at the Childress Airport.

Texas Department of Transportation sponsors the Truck Rodeo as part of the fleet safety training. Drivers are scored on two different levels. First, they identify safety defects on equipment within specific time limits. Then, they drive through an obstacle course designed to simulate truck maneuvers encountered during a normal workday.

Reynolds and Minyard will receive a special award at the Childress District Safety Awards Banquet.

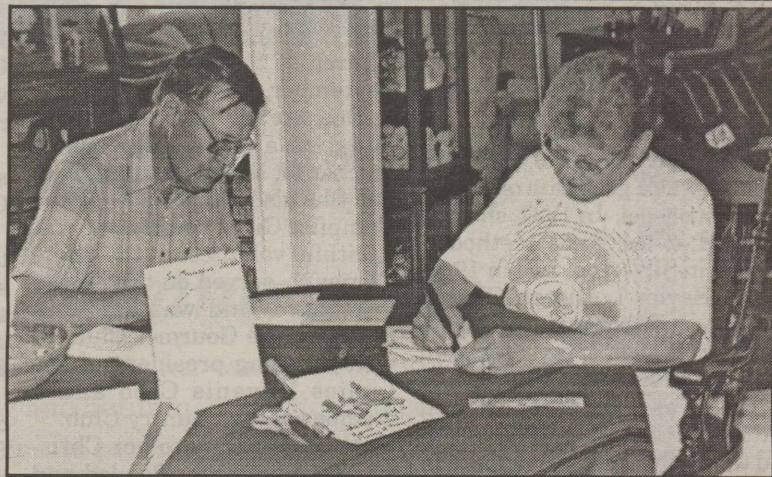
Harley Redin Inducted Into Hall of Fame

Harley Redin was in Knoxville, Tennessee last weekend for induction into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame on Saturday night, but the 79-year-old feels that honor could hurt his chances of being recognized by the National Basketball Hall of Fame.

"I kind of doubt that I'll ever make that now," Redin said. "This might take away from any of us (Women's Basketball Hall of Honor inductees) getting in the Naismith (Hall of Fame)."

Redin was nominated for the Basketball Hall of Fame for the first time last year, narrowly missing receiving the necessary votes to join in a class that included former Boston Celtics **See REDIN--**

Don't Miss the Relay for Life Event Friday Night at Valley

Friday, June 11, the Relay for Life promises to be a unique event held to raise funds for cancer research and to bring together families and friends to celebrate those who have survived cancer and to remember those who have not.

Relay for Life is a team event in which walkers or runners compete against each other to raise the most money and to have the most unique theme. The event will be held at the Valley ISD track. One member of the team is on the track at all times. Teams consist of eight to sixteen people representing various businesses, civic groups, social organizations, church groups and families. While the Relay for Life is in progress, a community party atmosphere is created with entertainment, food, games and camaraderie.

Team captains need to meet at 5:30 p.m.

The event is unique and it offers something for everyone. Cancer survivors need to register between 6:00 and 7:30 p.m. and will kick off the Relay for Life with a Survivors Lap at 7:45 p.m.. Luminarias will be lighted at 10:00 p.m. in memory of those who have lost their battle with cancer and in honor of survivors. It will be truly breathtaking to see the candlelit bags lining the track.

A moment of silence and special music concludes this ceremony.

As the night grows later, there

will be a pajama contest, local talent and other fun activities to keep everyone entertained. The Relay for Life will end the next day with a closing ceremony and a final Victory Lap for all participants.

Each team has been asked to raise a minimum of \$50 before the event. Prizes are offered for those raising more money. All of the money goes directly to the American Cancer Society's life-saving research, education and patient service programs. Other fundraising opportunities exist for the Relay for Life, such as corporate underwriting and sponsorship, the sale of luminarias and individual donations.

Relay for Life offers many opportunities for the public to learn more about cancer in their own community. People from Turkey, Quitaque and Silverton are taking part in this event.

Cancer survivors will be there to remind everyone that cancer is not always a death sentence. Their testimonies provide a way for the public to become aware of the strength and courage shown by cancer patients.

You are invited to be at the Valley School track Friday night to walk in the Relay for Life or to support those who are walking.

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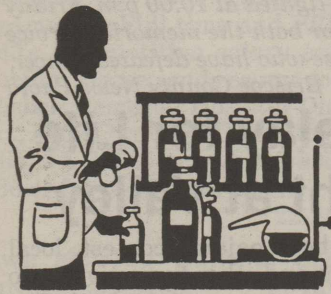

great Larry Bird, NBA coaching legend Lenny Wilkens, ex-Harlem Globetrotter Marques Haynes and Jody Conradt, the all-time winniest women's coach at The University of Texas who joined him in being inducted this weekend, along with the likes of Nancy Lieberman-Cline, Cheryl Miller, Ann Meyers-Drysdale and Pat Summitt.

One of the reasons Redin doubts he'll make the Basketball Hall of Fame is that he hasn't received any news about it this year.

"I haven't heard one thing. Last year I heard some different things off and on."

And it's getting about time for another class of inductees to be announced.

"They usually announce them in June and have the induction in October," Redin noted.

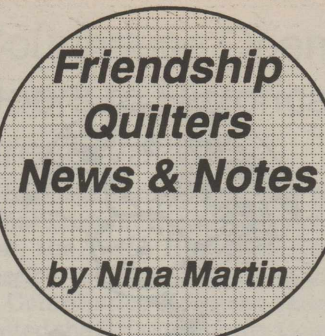
"They may have changed policies and formats."

But Redin sure isn't giving up hope. "I could be wrong," he said of his theory.

In the meantime, the man who won twice as many games as any other coach of the all-time winningest women's basketball team is cherishing his weekend festivities in Knoxville.

Besides all the numbers--a 431-66 record, two undefeated seasons, six national AAU cham-

 pionships and a 76-game winning streak during the 18 years he coached the Flying Queens--Redin is being honored for contributions to the women's game like lobbying for the unlimited dribble and the 30-second shot clock and the move in the late 1960s to playing full-court.

Being in on those rules changes were especially meaningful to Redin because the teams he coached in international competition against Russia, Mexico and South American countries were at a big disadvantage having to play "the two-division system--two forwards, two guards and two rovers."

Redin is also proud of "just having the opportunity to be in on the ground floor of coaching student-athletes. "We were probably the first that actually had a college team that could compete with strict eligibility rules," he said. A 1936 graduate of Silverton High School who flew bombing missions during World War II, Redin doesn't have any regrets as he looks back over his career.

Although . . . "Sometimes I think I wish I would have hung around coaching a little longer," he said. "I got out just when women's basketball was really taking off."

Redin quit coaching and started banking in 1973, after he wore both hats for six years.

"Back at that time salaries were notoriously low for coaches, and I was trying to make a living."

Chances are Redin's teams would have won a few more games.

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Courthouse Opens Doors to Historical Preservation

Representatives from the National Trust for Historic Preservation, the Texas Historical Commission, and the engineering firm of Compliance Services Group visited the Briscoe County Courthouse on Tuesday, June 8, to conduct an assessment as part of the county's participation in the "Courthouse Smart Start" program.

The Southwest Office of the National Trust, through a generous donation by the Meadows Foundation and in partnership with the Texas Historical Commission and Preservation Texas, established the Smart Start planning grant to be awarded to twelve select Texas counties in anticipation of the Governor's Texas Courthouse Initiative. The legislation will provide an estimated \$50 million in matching grants to be used by Texas communities to repair and restore their historic courthouses. It is hoped that the twelve counties that have secured a basic preservation plan with their Smart Start grant will be better positioned to apply for a receive funding from the state. The plan is to be completed by September 1, 1999.

Jay Firsching of the Texas Historical Commission will be inspecting the courthouse along with John Sutter and W. Scott Schellhase of Compliance Services Group, the firm hired by Briscoe County to prepare the plan. Firsching, Sutton and Schellhase will be conducting a comprehensive assessment of various elements of the courthouse including the building's structure and foundation, electrical and plumbing
