## SEVEN FARMERS SIGN AGREEMENTS **EROSION PROJEC**

4,018 Acres Embraced In Area On Which Work Is Now Being Done

Work in the Haskell county drouth relief project under the direction of the Soil Conservation Service is moving along rapidly according to a statement made today by J. M. Bird, in charge of the local office.

A total of seven farmers have signed cooperative agreements with the Service for carrying out of a soil and water conservation program on their farms. To date there are 4018.1 acres under

The work in this section is principally that of terracing cultivated land, contour cultivation, strip cropping and contour ridging per-manent pasture lands. This project on the Miller Creek watershed is now employing 64 WPA

laborers "It is hoped through this pro-gram" Mr. Bird said, "to demonstrate to land owners in Haskell county the practicability of a coordinated erosion control program. The same measures that are applied to farm lands to slow down the run off of rain water and hold soil and moisture on the land naturally make the land more drouth resistant during long periods of deficient rainfall. When we hold water on the land and give it an opportunity to soak into the soil, instead of rapidly running off, it is only natural that such acres will produce better crops from the stored moisture than acres where no erosion control measures have been applied.'

#### Education Chief Tuberculosis Foe

Tuberculosis continues to be one of the major causes of death in Texas. Public health authorities agree that the death rate will not diminish satisfactorily until the average person appreciates that tuberculosis is preventable, that it is not inherited directly, that it is acquired by direct transmission of the tuberculosis germ from the stick to the healthy; and above all, that he must be concerned immediately if any symptom appears.

"In combatting tuberculosis," said Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer, "education of the public is of prime importanceeducation as to the treacherous character of the disease and its methods of transmission, how to prevent the disease and how to treat it when contracted, to the end both that recovery may be as rapid as possible and that spread of the disease to other members of the family and to neighbors may be avoided.

"Children pick up tuberculosis as readily as they do measles or scarlet fever or any other conta-gious disease, but tuberculosis differs from some in not showing up as quickly as other germ diseases As a rule the characteristic symptoms of other diseases develop in a few days after a person has been exposed, while it takes a much longer time for the symp-toms of tuberculosis to be recog-

"The periodic health examination by a competent physician plays an important role in the fight to stamp out tuberculosis. #### IT'S AN ILL WIND

A queer quirk of the motor traffic problem is the fact that the fewest accidents take place at times when conditions on the highway are worst. An advance taste of winter weather-snow, sleet, and cold-swept over part of the middle west recently; and immediately traffic accident figures dropped almost out of sight. The roads were icy, visibility was bad, it was perilously easy to put a car into a skid-but for several days no one was killed and hardly any serious accidents were re-corded. The explanation is clear. When streets and roads are slippery, motorists drive carefully. They are willing to spend an extra five minutes on the highway, for the sake of safety. It is only when the path is clear and the road offers no danger that they hurry, take chances-and kill each other.

#### MORE ORCHIDS TO CCC

One of the valuable byproducts of the CCC program seems to have been a great gain in the campaign to conserve wild life resources of America. Director Robert Fechner reports that the CCC work actually has helped the conservation program to such an extent that certain species of migratory is, supposedly doomed to extinction, now are supposedly doubted to survive and increase in numbers. The CCC, for instance, has helped the U. S. Biological yey to expand and develop a nation wide sysof wild life refuges. It has helped other government services to set aside wilderness areas for game. It has aided in federal wild life censuses, has mproved fishing conditions, has fed animals and birds in cold weather and by its reforesting activities, has provided a vast amount of much-needed cover for wild life. Just one more reason for writing the CCC down as one of the very best of the New Deal experiments!

#### JOBLESSNESS REMEDY

If we want to see a boom such as we have never seen before, we have only to set our indusrial plant to work to make up the production deficiencies of the seven years of depression. This is on the word of the canny Dr. Harold G. Moulton. president of the Brookings Institution. Dr. Moulton told the Executive Club in Chicago the other day to rake up for the deficiency in durably goods upwards of 8,000,000 additional workers would be kept busy for at least five years. Nearly \$000,000 more would be required for a similar period to make up the deficiency in non-durable goods. Dr. Moulton has a way of knowing what he is talking about. It begins to look, too, as if we were in the kind of business upswing in which these deficiencies in production would be made up. Adding those two facts, we can look ahead confidently to a period in which the unemployment probiem will be reduced to minor proportions-if, indeed, it is not wiped out

#### CURRENT COMMENT

SERVING TEXAS SOIL

Semi-Weekly Farm News (Dallas) Active co-operation by Texas farmers in combating soil erosion in this State was reported recently in Austin by Dr. Hugh H. Bennett, chief of the United States Soil Conservation Servise. Federal erosion control already has been effected on 200,000 acres in Texas, with highly beneficial results; and work is nearing completion on 600,000 additional acres in regions of the State most susceptible to erosion.

This is a creditable showing, especially when it is realized that individual farmers in all parts of the State have come to understand better the urgent need for soil conservation and have begun to practice on their own farms the erosion-control city Wednesday prospecting with to its pastorate, was in Haskell methods demonstrated in Federal projects. Terracing, strip-cropping, contour plowing and other methods are being used to prevent valuable topsoil from being washed off from farms.

These methods help to conserve water as well as soil, and they are important as flood-prevention measures. The underground water level is being raisd, and flood peaks and the silting of stream channels and reservoirs are being reduced. These matters are especially important in sections in

which the annual rainfall is unevenly distributed. Texas is adopting soil conservation methods none too soon. Most of the land here has thinner topsoil than that of the Middle West, and continuous cotton growing has robbed the land of much of its original fertility. Constant combating of erosion is essential, if the State's most valuable resource is to be maintained at its full value.





Simply provide adequate ventilation in the room through a slightly opened window. Keep connecting doors open so that a natural circulation of pure, warmed air prevails from one room to another.


