



TRIAL AND CRUCIFIXION OF JESUS

International Sunday School Lesson for March 21, 1937.

GOLDEN TEXT: "Hereby perceive we the love of God, because he laid down his life for us "-1 John 3:16.

(Lesson Text John 18: 1-19:42.)

After the last Thursday evenng with his disciples in the Upper Room at Jerusalem, Jesus led his eleven followers (Judas having deserted) to the Garden of Gethsemane, where he was accustomed to retire for prayer. Here he left eight at the entrance to the garden, taking Peter, James and John further with him. Leaving them, he withdrew a little further and made soitary prayer. Fully realizing the betrayal and torture which were ahead of him, Jesus only prayed that his Father's will be done.

To this retreat the soldiers of Pilate and the temple police came that he would meet him in parato arrest the religious teacher whose influence the ecclesiastical leaders feared would overthrow their authority and wealth. Judas came with the party, pointing out his former master by means of a kiss. The bearing of Jesus was so majestic and his reputation so widespread that even some of the soldiers fell down in awe as he

approached. To the surprise of those who had come to take him, Jesus surrendered without protest, and was arried before Annas, regarded by the Jews as the lawful high priest, although the Romans had deposed nim and placed his five sons successively and then Caiaphas, his son in law, in the priestly office. Annas seems to have been the chief mover in the plot to kill Jesus, probably desiring revenge for the daring attacks Jesus had made upon the perverted system of religion of which he was the nominal head.

After the examination before Annas, which was made in the early hours of the morning, Jesus was carried before Caiaphas, who seems to have occupied another wing of the same palace, connected by a court yard. In this open place Peter, who had followed John to the palace, waited, and during his wait, denied on three separate occasions charges that he was a follower of Jesus. As the third denial was made, Jesus was being led through the court yard for his next examination and it was then that he rebuked his fickle follower by one sad look, which was enough to cause Peter to rush out into the night, weeping bitterly for having so soon belied the brave words spoken arlier in the night.

There seems to have been two trials before Caiaphas. For the first only a few members of the Sanhedrin were present, but, for the last, after sunrise, the full Council seems to have been on hand. Although the witnesses brought in to falsely accuse Jesus failed in their mission, Jesus, at last, in answer to a question from the high priest, solemnly af-firmed that he was the Messiah and the Son of God. This was blasphemy to the Jewish jury and sufficient cause for death. Before he could be so executed, however, the consent of the Roman Gover-

nor had to be obtained and there fore, Jesus was carried before

Here the Jews dropped their re ligious charges against Jesus and charged that he was trying to set himself up as a king, an offense against Caesar. Pilate was intelligent enough to understand the subterfuge of the Jews and had no desire to see Jesus crucified, the dictates in the face of the anmob and ordered Jesus crucified.
