Tahoka citizens will get an opportunity to view the new Tahoka High School Gymnasium here Thursday evening, Aug. 12, with "Meet The Bulldogs" scheduled at the new gym at 7 p.m. The new gym is located in TISD's new sports complex, west of the intersection of N. 5th and Ave. P.

Tahoka High School athletes will be introduced at "Meet the Bulldogs," and parents and other citizens will have a chance to see the new gymnasium, which is almost finished.

There won't be an official ribbon cutting or grand opening at this time, because all areas of the sports complex are not yet completed. It is anticipated that school officials will plan an official grand opening ceremony when all areas of the complex are completed soon. In addition to the gym, the complex includes a baseball field, softball field, field house and football practice field.

Prior to "Meet the Bulldogs," students and parents are invited to "Meet the Teachers" at 5:30 at the new gym, for Middle School and High School campuses, and for a Title I meeting. At the Tahoka Elementary campus, students and teachers are invited to the classrooms for "Meet the Teachers" from 6-7 p.m.

City reduces scope, cost of street bond election project

New information from City of Tahoka officials on Monday night informed citizens that the proposed \$8 million street bond election project has been significantly reduced in both its scope and the estimated cost – by almost half. According to Mayor John Baker, the project is no longer being considered as a two-phase project, and is no longer going to include repaving/curbing currently paved streets.

"After hearing what citizens told us at the last public hearing on this project, we went back to the city engineers and had them remove all the milling and resurfacing of current paved streets from the project. The scope of the project now is to pave streets that are not currently paved, address pot holes and drainage issues in problem areas, and to repair (not replace) currently paved streets that are in need of repair. Our best estimate for this project is

now \$4.15 million," the mayor said during the public hearing held at Monday's council meeting.

It is anticipated that the \$4.15 million bond would require between 24-cents to 26-cents tax increase to pay back the bond, instead of the formerly estimated 48-cent tax increase for an \$8-million project.

"This would be only one phase, one project," said Mayor Baker. "The bond funds would not be used

for seal coating streets, which is an ongoing maintenance. Seal coating issues would be addressed in our annual budget, and not a part of the bond election," he said.

Council members must decide by Aug. 16 whether to call for an election for the \$4.15 million street bond project, in order to have it on the Nov. 2 general election ballot. The five council members appear to be split on whether to support the bond election, with three indicating they would be in favor of calling for an election, and two indicating they may not. However, those comments were made in conversation during the public hearing, and were not an official vote, as calling for an election was not on the agenda for the meeting. The council will most likely call a special meeting

on Aug. 16 for council members to vote on whether to call for a street bond election on the Nov. 2 ballot.

If the council places the issue on the ballot, and voters approve the bond, then an additional Interest & Sinking (I&S) tax rate would be added to pay for the bond, estimated at 24-26 cents per \$100 of property value.

Baker told *The News* that the council is not considering a tax increase in the Maintenance and Operating (M&O) budget for the city. "We are not anticipating the need for a tax increase for our M&O tax rate," Baker said.

The city tax rate is currently 0.72-cents per \$100 of property value, and there is no additional I&S tax rate. If the bond election

COVID-19 Delta variant now cause of concern as Covid-19 numbers are on the rise

Delta, a highly contagious SARS-CoV-2 virus strain, a variant of the Covid-19 virus, has contributed to a surge of new Covid cases across the globe – but is it here in Lynn County? It is possible, although the Covid numbers are not high here.

In Lynn County, only seven active cases of COVID-19 cases are currently reported, according to information from the South Plains Public Health District. There has been no information, however, about whether these cases are the Delta variant.

"We have had a significant increase in testing for Covid during the past two to three weeks, and we have had six positive test results from tests administered at Lynn County Hospital," Dr. Melanie Richburg, CEO of Lynn County Healthcare System, told *The News* this week. "However, those six positive cases were patients who did not live in Lynn County. None of those who tested positive were residents of Lynn County, so the currently active cases of Covid here must have tested elsewhere."

Dr. Richburg said that the Lynn County Healthcare System's Covid

Testing Drive-Up facility in Tahoka is available, but that an appointment should be made by calling the Covid Hotline at 806-561-2076. The hotline may be called 24-hours a day, and is answered by LCH staff who can determine if an assessment is needed and can set an appointment for the testing.

"Anyone who is concerned that they may have symptoms of Covid-19 may call our hotline, or call your own healthcare provider, and they will get you the help that you need," said Dr. Richburg.

Lubbock County has reported increasing numbers of the Delta variant of Covid-19 cases, and increased hospitalizations due to the disease.

How is the new mutation of Covid-19 different from the original strain?

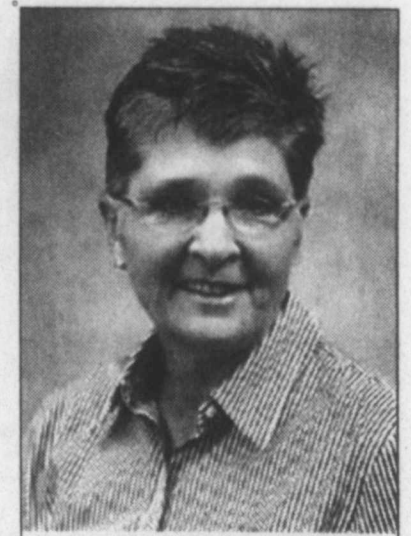
Compared to the original strain, people infected with the

new strain -- called 614G -- have higher viral loads in their nose and throat, though they don't seem to get any sicker, according to health sources. Also, they are much more contagious to others. For this reason, vaccinated and unvaccinated people need to mask up again, according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, to help prevent the spread.

On July 27, the CDC recommended that everyone in areas with high Covid-19 infection rates wear masks in public indoor spaces, regardless of vaccination status.

Dr. Richburg said that according to information she has received from the Lubbock hospitals, that the most extreme cases of Covid illnesses there – ICU patients on ventilators – are patients that have not been vaccinated against the disease.

"We're being told that although there are some vaccinated patients that have gotten Covid, that it is the unvaccinated patients who are having the most severe symptoms," Dr. Richburg told *The News* this week. "I would say that one's recovery likelihood is improved if you have had the Covid vaccine."

Her advice? Get the vaccine. Dr. Richburg encourages those who have not gotten a vaccine to get one (unless one's physician recommends a patient not to get the vaccine). She reminds citizens that the Covid vaccine is still available by appointment at Lynn County Healthcare System, by calling the local Covid Hotline at 806-561-2076 to set an appointment. There is no cost to get the vaccine. (See COVID CASES, page 6)

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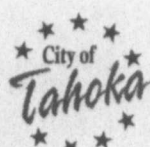
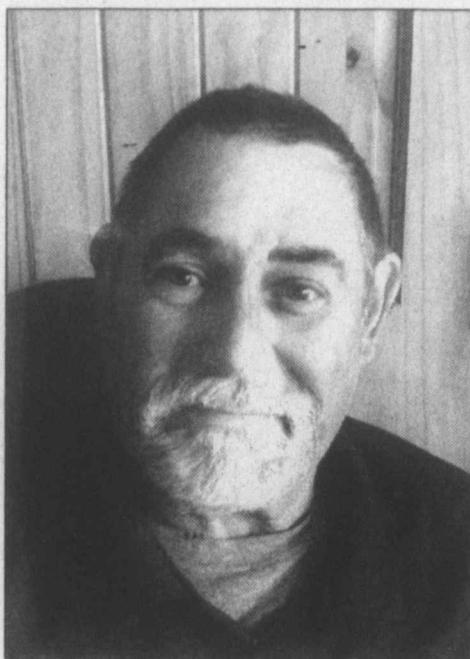
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New City Judge ...
T.J. McAuley is the newly appointed Municipal Judge for the City of Tahoka.

T.J. McAuley appointed Municipal Judge here

T.J. McAuley is the new Municipal Judge for the City of Tahoka, with the City Council approving the city administrator's recommendation from among a slate of six candidates for the position. McAuley, a former Lubbock police officer, is currently the Municipal Judge for the City of Shallowater, and he will also serve Tahoka as a Municipal Judge, which is a part-time position here.

Judge McAuley fills the position that was recently vacated by Dr. Ed Smith, who retired from the position at the end of July. Tahoka City Council members approved the appointment during Monday night's city council meeting.

City officials have appointed Marisa Webster as the Municipal Court Clerk, as a full-time position. Webster was formerly the Director for the City/County Library here. The city is currently accepting applications for a new library director and an assistant at the library.

In other action at the council meeting, the council approved updates to ordinances for animal control, and for vehicle parking. A public hearing on the street bond election was also conducted, and about a dozen citizens were in attendance. One person, Ross Mason, spoke in regards to the street project during the hearing, and two other citizens, Betty Ehlers and Mary Belew, addressed the council regarding senior citizen funds and street drainage issues.

A zoning variance was approved regarding front and side yard setbacks on property at N. 1st and Ave. Q, as requested by the property owner, regarding easement for an existing structure.

The council approved an interlocal agreement between the City of Tahoka and the Lynn County Sheriff's Office for the reimbursement of inmate housing and care, at a rate of \$40 per day.

An agenda item regarding the possible utilization of city resources to tear down homes at the request of residents was tabled after some discussion, to be considered at a later meeting.

A resolution approving the negotiated settlement between the cities served by Atmos Energy (including Tahoka), was approved, and the 2019-2020 financial audit was approved. Jay Dee House was reappointed for another term to serve as the city's representative for the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority, and council members approved an agreement between the City and South Plains Association of Government (SPAG) to provide grant application preparation and administration for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept. Local Parks Grant program. A copier contract with Hilliard Office Solutions was approved as well.

Mayor Baker led the meeting, with all council members present including Ronny Jolly, Ray Don Box, Shiloh Braddock, Ryan Curry, and Courtney Stennett.

Wilson ISD to propose keeping \$1.32 tax rate

Wilson Independent School District is publishing information this week that they are considering proposing a tax rate of \$1.32240 per \$100 of property value, which is the same rate as last year's total tax rate.

The \$1.32 tax rate includes a Maintenance & Operating (M&O) tax rate of \$0.96300, and an Interest & Sinking Fund (I&S) tax rate of \$0.35940 to pay off bonded indebtedness. Wilson ISD voters approved a \$7.6 million bond November of 2019, for school improvements, including construction of a new ag facility, and renovation of the school auditorium into a new science facility. Other improvements included roofing, electrical, plumbing,

installation of air conditioning for the gymnasium, security fencing, and additional security for entryways at school facilities.

The total appraised value of all property in Wilson ISD increased from \$253,486,940 last year to \$276,487,225 this year, including total appraised value of new property of \$761,360, compared to \$289,480 the previous year.

The WISD Board of Trustees will hold a public meeting at 6 p.m. Tuesday, Aug. 24 in the Wilson ISD Board Room to discuss the school district's budget that will determine the tax rate that will be adopted. Public participation in the discussion is invited.

City -County Library awarded \$2,500 grant

The City-County Library has received a grant from the Texas Book Festival in the amount of \$2,500. The Texas Book Festival awards grants to support collection enhancement for Texas pub-

lic libraries, and enables libraries to share the diversity and breadth of literature with their entire communities.

grant is to help build up our Teen and Young Adult section here at the library, along with our Large Print section."

Under state law, the dollar amount of school taxes imposed on the residence homestead of a person 65 years of age or older or of the surviving spouse of such a person, if the surviving spouse was 55 years of age or older when the person died, may not be increased above the amount paid in the first year after the person turned 65, regardless of changes in tax rate or property value.

Traffic accidents, brush fires in law reports for the week

Two traffic accidents, two brush fires, and a report of a potential dog attack were in law enforcement reports for the past week.

Just after midnight Sunday, Lynn County Sheriff's Office (LCSO) and DPS officers responded to a caller who said he was driving westbound on US 380 and that another vehicle was in his lane. The caller said he moved his vehicle over to avoid the other vehicle but that it struck his side mirror. A black Dodge Ram 1500 and a black Toyota Tundra were involved in the incident, and both stopped to wait for officers to arrive at a location between CR HH and II on US 380. No injuries were reported. The driver of the other vehicle was a minor, who was transported to the LCSO to wait on parents to pick him up, according to the LCSO call sheet.

At 5:17 a.m. Monday, a caller to LCSO reported that the back end of a red Dodge Avenger was sticking out into the road, after it had apparently struck a guardrail on FM 179 near FM 2053, and said that the vehicle was not occupied. Officers arriving at the scene discovered that the vehicle had been reported stolen out of Dawson County, and had the vehicle towed away from the scene.

In Wilson last Thursday morning, a caller to the LCSO reported at 9:30 a.m. that a blue Toyota had been sitting at a four-way stop sign for about 45 minutes, at 12th and Gouger Ave., and said that the vehicle had front-end damage. Shortly afterwards, LCSO received a second call about the same vehicle, from a City of Wilson employee who

reported that the male driver sitting inside the vehicle appeared to be passed out. A deputy arriving at the scene arrested the male driver on charges of No Drivers License and Possession of Drug Paraphernalia.

A woman at a residence on Hiracheta Dr. in New Home reported to LCSO that a neighbor's pitbull tried to attack her, at 4:23 p.m. Aug. 5, and said that it was not the first time that the dog had tried to attack. The woman was reportedly able to escape harm. A deputy met with the owners of the dog, notifying the owners that the dog had been identified as aggressive and must be kept on their property.

Tahoka Volunteer Fire Dept. responded to two brush fires during the past week, one just south of the FM 400 overpass near Tahoka on Friday, and one Monday south of the west roadside park, north of Tahoka on US 87.

Police responded to a residence in the 1700 block of South 1st at 10:30 p.m. Monday after the Lynn County Sheriff's Office pinged a location from two 9-1-1 hangup calls. Police called for Lynn County EMS to respond to the location, and one person in the residence was transported for medical treatment.

Other calls during the week included a dog reported missing in Wilson, suspicious vehicles, assisting motorists, civil matters, domestic disturbances, reckless drivers, and a report from Lynn County Hospital stating there was a female in the ER with a cat bite, and that the cat belonged to the female who was bitten.

New Home ISD Board to propose property tax rate of \$1.45

New Home Independent School District Board of Trustees is proposing a total tax rate of \$1.4553 for 2021, which includes a Maintenance and Operating (M&O) tax rate of \$0.9603 and an Interest and Sinking (I&S) tax rate of \$0.4950, per \$100 of property value.

The proposed total tax rate is an increase of 25-cents, compared to the previous year. Last year the school district had an M&O rate of \$1.0137 and an I&S tax rate of \$0.1962, for a total tax rate of \$1.2099.

The M&O rate is about a 5-cent decrease from last year's rate of \$1.0137, but the I&S rate is 30-cents higher than the previous year, to pay for bonded indebtedness for new construction of facilities.

Voters within the school district approved an \$18 million bond election in May for the construction of a new elementary campus and new football and track facilities, due to the district's continued unprecedented growth in student population.

Total appraised value of all property in New Home ISD has increased from \$217,682,230 last year to \$255,162,800 this year. This includes a total appraised value of new property of \$11,876,100 for this year, up from \$9,902,900 last year.

The NHISD Board of Trustees has scheduled a public hearing on the proposed tax rate and budget at 7 p.m. Monday, Aug. 23 in the New Home ISD Board Room.
