

Six traffic accidents occur here; 'psychic' man says spirits led him to break in to local residence

everal traffic accidents and an unusual residential burglary with the suspect claiming that the 'spirits' sent him there, were in law enforcement reports during the past week.

An unusual burglary report was taken at 10 p.m. on Aug. 8, when a caller reported a burglary of his residence at a rural location 4 miles south of Tahoka. According to the LCSO call sheet information, the caller said that a Hispanic male wearing a black sweatsuit was in their home when they got back from Lubbock. He said the suspect was sitting on the couch watching TV, and told the homeowners that he was a psychic and the spirits had led him there, but he apparently did not take anything. The suspect left the premises before a deputy arrived at the scene, and the officer was unable to locate the man.

On Aug. 1, a head-on collision occurred 11 miles north of Tahoka on US 87, reportedly with injuries. According to Lynn County Sheriff's Office (LCSO) call sheet

information, one person was transported by Lynn County EMS to a Lubbock hospital for treatment of unknown injuries. No driver or vehicle information was available. LCSO, EMS, Tahoka and Wilson Volunteer Fire Departments, and DPS all responded to the scene.

A one-vehicle rollover just south of Tahoka on US 87 last Wednesday morning, Aug. 3, resulted in the four occupants being transported for medical treatment, but the extent of injuries was unknown. Monica Salgado of Midland, the driver of a 2011 Infiniti SUV, reportedly lost control and overcorrected the vehicle while traveling southbound on US 87, taking an abrupt turn into the median, striking a sign, and rolling over twice before coming to a stop. Zoning request withdrawn after discussion at City Council meeting

zoning change request that had been on Tahoka City Council agenda for the past two sessions was officially withdrawn for consideration after citizens at Monday night's council meeting protested the change from residential to commercial zoning.


Several citizens were on hand to express concerns over the request of a zoning change for property on N. 7th and the US 87 access road, which would allow the property to be used for commercial purposes, in an area surrounded by adjacent residential homes.

The council had discussed this issue at a previous meeting but had tabled it for further information, and invited citizens to return to the Aug. 8 meeting for further

During the public forum to hear citizens remarks prior to the business session, several citizens presented concerns regarding the zoning request, dumpster usage, and the need for repairing potholes in streets.

Huffaker then immediately formally withdrew his request for the zoning change, and the council did not vote on the is-



for city IT systems, and authorized a one-year extension on a contract with Republic Waste Services of Texas, LTD for residential and commercial trash service. Action on upgrading the phone system for the city was tabled until the next

Additional work on the city's new water well was authorized at a cost of \$5,600, which according to remarks by the mayor was due to apparently inaccurate engineering specifications on the part of the city engineer, which did not provide for adequate water accessibility. Council members expressed concerns over the original insufficient specifications, but because the new well needed to be completed in a timeline for TCEQ approval, the additional work was approved so as to get the well up and running.

The council approved a \$10,000 grant presented by the Tahoka Economic Development Corporation (EDC) for Crusher's 40 Weight







Did you know? about TEXAS

 The deadliest natural disaster in United States history occurred in Texas. The Great Galveston Hurricane of 1900 took between 6,000 and 12,000 lives with a storm surge of 8-15 feet. The next deadliest hurricane in U.S. history was Hurricane Katrina, which claimed 1,200 lives.

 The largest known bat colony in North America is located in Texas. Located in Bracken Cave the largest known North American bat colony has over 20 million bats, which is more than the entire human population of Mexico City. The largest known urban bat colony is also located in Texas over Lady Bird Lake in Austin.

 The Texas State Capitol building is the largest state capitol in the nation. In terms of gross square footage, the Texas Capitol is only smaller in size to the U.S. Capitol building. Additionally, the Texas Capitol dome actually sits 7 feet higher than the U.S. Capitol's.

· King Ranch, located in Kingsville, is larger than the state of Rhode Island. Sprawled across 825,000 acres, King Ranch is home to over 200 Quarter Horses and over 35,000 heads of cattle. The ranch reaches into six different counties and was designated as a National Historic Landmark in 1961.

 A time capsule in Texas contains a passbook to a bank account expected to be worth \$1 quadrillion by the time it opens in 2968. The Helium Centennial **Time Columns Monument** was built in 1968 in honor of the 100th anniversary of the discovery of helium. 

For calendar year 2022 forward, producers must submit a notice of loss to their local FSA office within 30 calendar days of when the loss is apparent. Producers should contact FSA as soon as the loss of water or feed resources are known.

Producers should maintain records and receipts associated with the costs of transporting water to eligible livestock, the costs of transporting feed to eligible livestock, the costs of additional feed purchases, and the costs of transporting eligible livestock to forage or other grazing acres.

ELAP assistance is also available to producers impacted by wildfire. Contact the local FSA office for more information on ELAP resources for wildfire losses. Additionally, beekeepers can benefit from ELAP provisions and should contact their county FSA office within 15 calendar days of when a loss occurs or is apparent.

MTC plans to hire 240 employees as it reopens

"We are currently hiring for all positions. If employees were laid off in June, they could return and retain their seniority. We have hired a Jail Administrator, Rick Martinez, who was a warden at the MTC Otero Facility. The Assistant Jail Administrator has been hired, and we hope he will be on-site by Monday, Aug. 15."

In a recent interview, Merlak said, "MTC could not have accomplished as much work as they have without the support of Garza County Commissioners and the three extra employees they hired to help get the facility ready for the TCJS Certification."

"We will need more employees than MTC previously employed, and job offers will be made onsite during this time. Besides jailers and security supervisors, we will be hiring for medical and transport services. Unit support, programs, and administration will complete our team needed to open the facility.

"It's not as hard to qualify for a position with MTC now as it was for federal positions; the background checks are not as comprehensive. With the economy and the oil field business on the decline, now is the perfect time to apply and join the team of MTC. MTC plans to hire 240 employees as it reopens

POST - In Garza County Commissioners Court Monday, Aug. 1, Management and Training Corporation (MTC) Director of Corrections Operations, Steve Merlak, emphasized their commitment to the ees. Based on new and pending contracts, MTC is working to revamp the Giles W. Dalby Correctional Facility in Post.

Merlak, who is in Post for the next four weeks to help reopen the facility, said MTC would be hiring to staff the facility to accommodate the contract for Harris County to house 600 inmates.

"A similar contract is being worked on for Tarrant County to house 400 inmates. The Tarr-ant County commissioners will meet on Aug. 9 to approve the contract. Once contracts are approved, we will have 28 days before beginning the intake," Merlak said.

The facility expects to receive the Texas Commissioner the next three weeks.

"We will need 160 security personnel to accommodate the 1032 inmates we expect to house at the facility," Merlak replied when asked the number of employees MTC planned to

'We are currently hiring for all positions. If employees were laid off in June, they could return and retain their seniority. We have hired a Jail Administrator, Rick Martinez, who was a warden at the MTC Otero Facility. The Assistant Jail Administrator has been hired, and we hope he will be on-site by Monday, Aug. 15."

In a recent interview, Merlak said, "MTC could not have accomplished as much work as they have without the support of Garza County Commissioners and the three extra employees they hired to help get the facility ready for the TCJS Certification."

"We will need more employees than MTC previously employed, and job offers will be made onsite during this time. Besides jailers and security supervisors, we will be hiring for medical and transport services. Unit support, programs, and administration will complete our team needed to open the facility.

"It's not as hard to qualify for a position with MTC now as it was for federal positions; the background checks are not as comprehensive. With the economy and the oil field business on the decline, now is the perfect time to apply and join the team of MTC. Employee benefits include medicals, vision, dental, paid time off, and paid holidays. No appointment is necessary, just show up between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. for the interview process," Merlak


