Of Death Last Sunday When Marylea Cowan Sinks To Death In Icy Depths
The sad story of last Sundsy's de plorable tragedy at the Gates lake, when Marylea, the pretty and well beloved fourteen year old daughter of Mr. and Mra. F. B Cowan, was
drowned, will in all to accurate de tails prohably never be told, for the horror was so suddenly precipitated that the dead giris companions, her cham and inseperable friend, Millie Morrieon, and their bey eacorts, Weldon White and Aivia Brown be. their beloved chum sank to death in the cold waters of the swimming pool that there is a lack of coherency in the stories told by those who witnessed the tragedy. Mrs. Cowan mother of Marylea, had accompan. ied her daughter and Millie Morrison to the lake and witnessed the trage dy from the bank. The party entered the lake on the south gide at
the diving platform. Millie Morrison is a fair swimmer and entering the water swam out to a raft floating on the lake nearby. The dead girl was jast learaing to swim. She wanted to join her chum on the raft and started out supported on either side by the buys, Weldon White raft, according to the statement made by the boye she becamestraig. led and her hand slipped from the shoulder of one of the boys, and with the frienzied instinct of self-preservation, the clutched her compan ion and they both weat under.
Then ensued s struggle, in which the boys tried their best to save their girl friend, but she was mad with fright, and her struggles so hampered them that they were un able to keep her afloat or get to the raft nearby.
