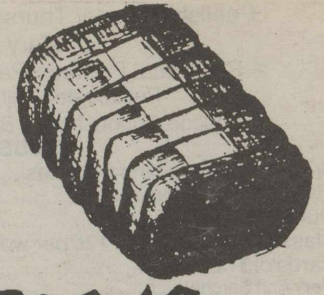
And my little Molly isn't so little anymore. She is very busy playing basketball and will be a junior next year. Now those years have REALLY gone fast!

## Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by flooding, hail and high winds that occurred on May 25-26, and June 11, 1999 are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Tulia, Ross W. James said.

Briscoe and Swisher counties are two of seven in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from flooding, hail and high winds.

Mr. James said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA

emergency loan," Mr. James said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance Program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until July 17, 2000, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Mr. James added.

FSA is a credit agency of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U. S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U. S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FSA office is at 219 N. W. 2nd Street in Tulia and is open from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

**TELCOT<sup>®</sup> Report**

**A WEEKLY SUMMARY OF COTTON MARKETING NEWS**

For the Week Ended January 20, 2000

Cotton futures bounced sharply higher January 19 based on technical considerations and stronger world prices. The March contract, at one point, traded up the 300 point daily limit to reach its highest level in nearly seven and a half months, but settled slightly off the day's high. Traders were unable to sustain the rally in the next session, however, and a technical correction pushed the market lower.

The market's brief surge is being attributed to a variety of reasons ranging from dry conditions in the key growing state of Texas, the lower-than-expected net long position of speculative funds in the weekly NYCE spec/hedge data and the robust performance of the Cotlook A Index cotton prices.

Concern mounts as the drought continues in Texas, and record high temperatures have been recorded in parts of the Texas High and Rolling Plains and the Coastal Bend. Producers in these areas would welcome winter precipitation to replace valuable soil moisture and freezing temperatures to kill over-wintering insects. Excessively dry conditions have hampered land preparation in some sections, and many producers are waiting on moisture before doing any fieldwork. However, progress in the state has not been halted completely as some farmers in the areas that received snow and rain late last year have been preparing the ground for spring planting.

More cotton acres could be planted in the U. S. in the upcoming year as analysts noted last week's rise in new-crop prices might make cotton more appealing. December cotton futures rose above 60.00 cents per pound last week. "Sixty cents begins to tease back new acreage," said a broker in the U. S. Delta. "I use the word tease because it's still not a great price," he explained.

Also, market watchers believe

many U. S. farmers likely will be planting more cotton because of government support programs like loan deficiency payments. World cotton supplies also might rise as foreign growers, expected to plant less cotton because of low prices, may change their minds after seeing a recent rise in U. S. and world prices.

Recently, world cotton prices continued on their upward course. The Cotlook A Index, an average of the lowest priced high-grade growths in the world, continues to rise each week. Analysts are keeping a close watch on the components of the A Index as a new quote may enter the average. The quote for Pakistan has been nominal for some time and could disappear from the index soon. Its replacement is likely to be China, not Spain, which has been taken off the list of qualified quotes. China's cotton, which is several cents higher than the five cheapest world quotes, would raise the index substantially.

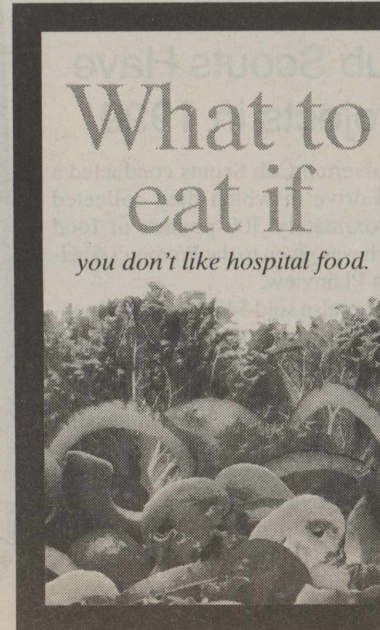
Meanwhile, U. S. export sales remain brisk as net sales for the week ended January 13 totaled 146,700 bales, 42 percent above the previous week and 19 percent higher than the four-week average. U. S. trade partner Mexico purchased the bulk of the week's cotton with the acquisition of 28,700 bales. Taiwan and Turkey rounded out the list of top buyers with purchases of 25,900 and 21,200 bales, respectively.

Cotton is flowing quickly from producer to merchants as 31,720 bales were sold over the TELCOT electronic marketing system in the week ended January 20; a healthy figure, but down from the previous week's sales of 85,803 bales. Producers selling their cotton on the system received average daily prices ranging from 40.37 to 43.16 cents per pound, an increase from the previous week's range of 38.25 to 40.63 cents per pound.
