

Austin, Texas—In his recent May Day-Child Health Day proclamation, President Roosevelt stressed the vital important of the health of children to the strength of our nation. He urged that all Americans exert every effort at this time to conserve child health not only through the application of positive health measures, but also by reducing the incidence of the more devastating childhood



Gibson, to his parents Mr. and Mrs. Lester Gibson of La Grange, Texas, and a copy of which was received on Wednesday by his grandparents here, Mr. and Mrs. H. S. Gibson and Mrs. Ida Dunlap. The letter reads as follows:

February 23, 1942. U.S.S. Lexington.

"Dearest Mom and Dad: "Had a chance to write you and dad a few lines. I don't know a thing to write except that I am well and doing fine, and I have had a taste of real war, folks.

"A few days ago 18 Japanese heavy bombers attacked our ship. They really got a surprise though. We know that 16 of them were shot down and maybe the others too. I've got a lot of things to tell you and dad when I get back home. Well dad you can say that I have been in real action now I didn't see a sailor or marine that was afraid during the attack.

"I will write later on folks. Don't worry over me. Tell Adeline about the attack. Your son,

Paper Worries

(Abilene Reporter-News)

Several of the nation's popular magazines have thrown tradition to the winds and hiked their prices for single copies. Some women's magazines have advanced from 10c t | 15c, and a number of nickel weeklies will soon raise the price to ten cents Among these latter are the Saturday Evening Post, Liberty and Collier's.

The price of paper of all grades has already gone up by leaps and bounds, and there is every reason to believe the advance will continue. Rationing is almost inevitable in this country later on; in practically every country on the globe it has been a commonplace ever since the war broke out. Just recently in Britain publishers had to take a new notch in their paper belts, although they had been limited to four pages a day for months. American newspaper publishers have recently been hit from a new direction; they have had to switch from water to rail. The difference between the all-rail haul and the combination rail-water haul is something terrificic Incidentally, in Britain the penalty for wasting cardboard or paper has been increased. You can go to jail in Britain for wasting a paper carton or throwing away a newspaper. We may come to that in this country before the war is over, and in one sense it may not be a bad thing-we'll get some of the tons of loose paper off our vacant lots and out of our shrubbery and mesquite thickets, maybe.

Blank paper is the biggest single expense item in the publishing business, and when prices began to skyrocket publishers are hit in their most sensitive nad vulnerable spot. Corners have to be cut and condensation resorted to. Writing on the sugar situation, Mr. Mailon says: Food authorities have counted up sugar stocks and conclude these are sufficient to furnish 100 pounds to everyone in this country this year. The average consumption for eight years from 1932 to 1940, was 103 pounds, so the amount available is only four pounds less than normal.

"But whether you will get your 99 pounds this year is a question. While stream are almost adequate, hourding continues. Rationing is inevitable, solely because of demand and not because of inaurquate supply.

In short, those who hoarded sugar brought the cloning wegt in on themselves and all other e hearders will not even be individually benefited by their abnormal stocks. When you get your sugar ration cards, tickets will be removed to compensate for whatever excess supply you have on hand. Extremely severe crimical penalties are provided for fraudulent declara-

The best advice any consumer can take is this: Buy normally-don't purchase in excessive quantitles-don't hoard." The retail stores of this country, led by the chain systems, are preaching that doctrine now. It is an essential protection against inflation and shortages of necessities. You can be certain that free competition in manufacturing and merchandising will keep prices at the lowest level —and make possible the widest distribution of




