KC Hounds Defeat Albany Lions To Gain Second Win

night for football, clear and cool. To make it even more perfect, the Hounds brought home a 27-13 victory over

The Hounds won the coin toss and elected to receive the opening kickoff. Ricky Gonzales returned the kick 11 yards to the Hounds' 29. Scott Lynn burst off a tackle for 17 yards, and Terry Watson followed with a 16 yard run up the middle. Lynn did his thing again for 12 more yards to the Albany 25 yard line.

The drive stalled with some strange calls for the offensive line moving their fingers before the ball was snapped. The defense held the Lions

to three yards in three plays and forced a punt.

Following the punt, Tim Roberson ran for 28 yards and Watson smashed over from 12 yards out for the first Knox City score. Gonzales kicked the extra point. Score was 7-0 with 3:30 left in the

When the Lions got the ball again, they could not muster enough yardage to keep the ball. On third and needing two yards, Robert Espinosa stopped the runner for no

On the first play following the Albany punt, Dwayne Johnson hit Ricky Gonzales streaking down the right side line for a 43 yard pass and run play. The drive got to the Lion 10 before running out of gas.

The Hound defense was again super, led by Cyle Clayton, forcing a Lion punt.

The Hound offensive line was superb all night long. The blocking was sharp and crisp as demonstrated on the next possession. Roberson ran for nine yards over blocks by Sid Richardson and Robert Espinosa, then went to the other side over Kelley Boone and Kyle White and a cut off block by Andy Barnard for 18 yards. The last play of the drive was a nine yard run by Roberson that scored his first of two touchdowns for the night. Gonzales' kick was good and the score was 14-0 with 3:56 remaining.

After the kickoff, the defense let down for the only time in two weeks. On the first play, the Lion quarterback was almost trapped for a loss but scrambled to find an open receiver who caught the pass and ran 77 yards for a score. The extra point was good and the score was 14-7. Time left was 3:44.

The Lions received the second half kickoff. Greg Whitten led the defensive charge that forced the Lions into a passing situation and set the stage for Chuco Magana to intercept a pass.

After the interception it took only three plays to score a touchdown. Watson ran for 33 yards and Roberson ran 19 for his second touchdown of the night. The extra point was

Friday night was a perfect missed, and the score was 20-

Following the touchdown, flags filled the air, six (yes, six) flags against Knox City. In nine plays, the Lions got to the Hound ten yard line but were stopped when Andy Barnard sacked the quarter-

Starting on their own 11, the Hounds moved down the field overcoming two more penalties with Watson contributing five yards, Johnson 26 on three carries, and a big 32 yard gainer by Lynn. On the third play of the fourth quarter, Dwayne Johnson passed to Sammy White for 10 yards and the touchdown. The kick by Gonzales was

good, score was 27-13. The Hounds moved the ball on the next possession but had to punt on fourth and needing five. Johnson punted the ball 40 yards to set the

Lions up on their own 13. With time running out, Chuck Hutchinson made an excellent tackle for a six yard loss. The game had its moments.

Roberson had his second 100 plus yard game rushing (135 each), Lynn had 80 yards on six carries, Watson 94 on 12 trips. Two touchdown passes were dropped in the end zone. One touchdown pass that was caught was brought back because of a penalty

This Friday, the Hounds will have to work extremely hard if they are to beat Archer City, as the Wildcats play extra hard at home. They defeated Henrietta 7-6 last Friday night.

Rebates Set Record In **Tax History**

AUSTIN - State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday said rebates to Texas cities of the local option one-percent sales tax set a record in the tax's 11-year history.

He said more than 900 cities shared in \$124.2 million during July, August and September - passing the state's previous high three-month allocation in the final quarter of 1978 by more than \$6 million.

Bullock also announced that his office was sending September sales tax rebate checks totaling \$73.4 million.

"This month's allocations are just under the record payments of \$7.49 million made in December of 1978," Bullock said.

Knox City's net payment for the period was \$6,474.73, slightly above last year's \$6,432.05. The city's total for the year is \$32,370.26, a 14% gain over last year's \$28,191,59 to date.

Munday's check for this period was \$6,055.81, as compared to last year's \$5,855.15. Payments to date for 1979 total \$26,977.02, reflecting a 13% increase over 1978 payments of \$23,669.60.

payments for this period include Benjamin, \$349.61; Crowell, \$3,621.64; Haskell, \$16,029.67; O'Brien, \$102.60; Rochester, \$2,689.88; Rule, \$2,505.03; Seymour, \$16,881.44; and Stamford, \$20,066,40.

The city and MTA sales tax is collected by merchants and other sales tax permit holders along with the state sales tax and is rebated monthly to cities in which it is collected by the Comptroller's office.

The government estimate was \$34,101,775 and the high bid was \$34,262,278. There were ten bidders. The work is to be complete in 1.100 days.

La Resolución Conjunta

Senatorial #13 propone una enmienda en la constitución de Tejas para autorizar a la Legislatura para que provea una garantía de préstamos, a las personas calificadas, para la compra de bienes raices agrícolas y ganaderas. De esta manera, la enmienda propuesta podría permitir a la Legislatura el proveer, emitir y vender bonos de obligación general llamados "Farm and Ranch Loan Security Bonds" (Bonos de Seguridad Para Préstamos Agrícolas y Ganaderos) del Estado de Tejas, sin exceder la cantidad de \$10 millones de dólares. Todo dinero recibido de la venta de estos bonos sería depositado en un fondo diferente en la Tesorería Estatal y sería administrado por el comisionado de agricultura, sin más apropiaciones. Estos fondos garantizarían préstamos para la compra de bienes raices agrícolas y ganaderas. El comisionado de agricultura usaría estos fondos bajo las provisiones prescritas por la Legislatura, con el propósito de garantizar préstamos para la compra de bienes raíces agrícolas ganaderas; para adquirir hipotecas de bienes raíces o escrituras de bienes raíces compradas con préstamos garantizados. 




