Warm-up at the driving range will be at 11:30 a.m. with tee-off time at 12:30 p.m.

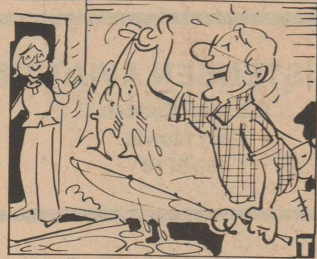

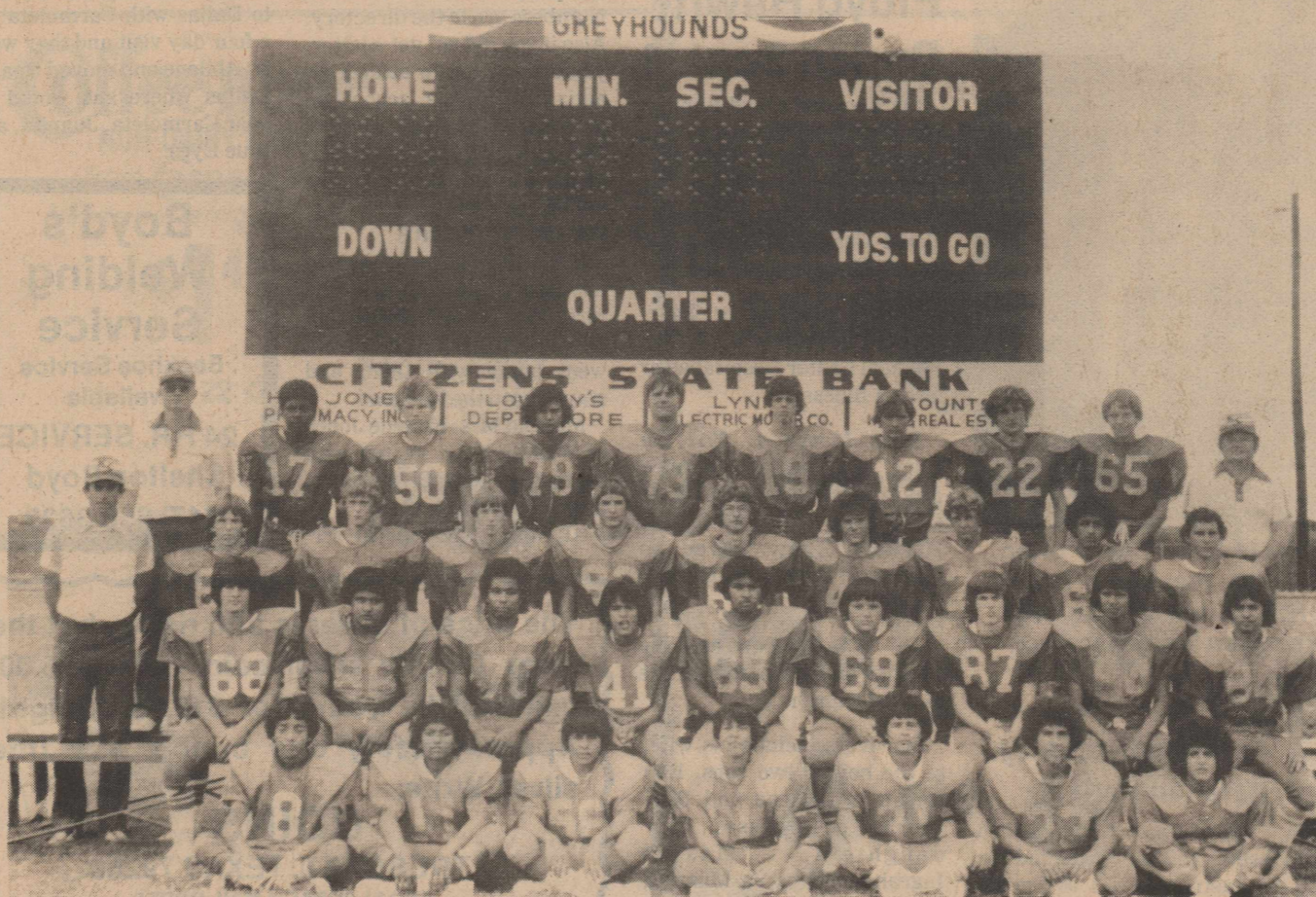

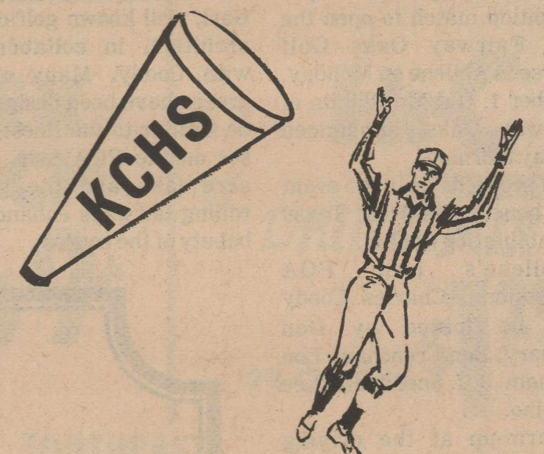

# Bob Bergland To Visit 17th District

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Plans for a two-day visit by Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland to the 17th Congressional District have been announced by Congressman Charles W. Stenholm.

Bergland, accompanied by Stenholm and Congressman Kent Hance of Lubbock, has scheduled a press conference and address in Abilene Thursday, September 20, and will tour agricultural facilities in

Stephenville Friday, September 21.

The head of the U.S. Department of Agriculture will arrive in Abilene around 4:00 p.m. Thursday, after spending the morning in Hance's district. Members of the area press have been invited to the 4:30 p.m. press conference scheduled at the Kiva Inn, Stenholm said.

The Thursday night banquet will be co-hosted by the Abilene Chamber of

Commerce and the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, with tickets on sale at the Abilene Chamber through Monday, September 17. The dinner will be held at the Abilene Civic Center Foyer and reservations are being restricted to 500 due to seating limitation.

"As far as I know, this is the only trip of this type scheduled for Bergland this year," Stenholm said. "It isn't often that an area has a unique opportunity such as this to brief the Secretary on areas of specific concern to farmers and ranchers.
