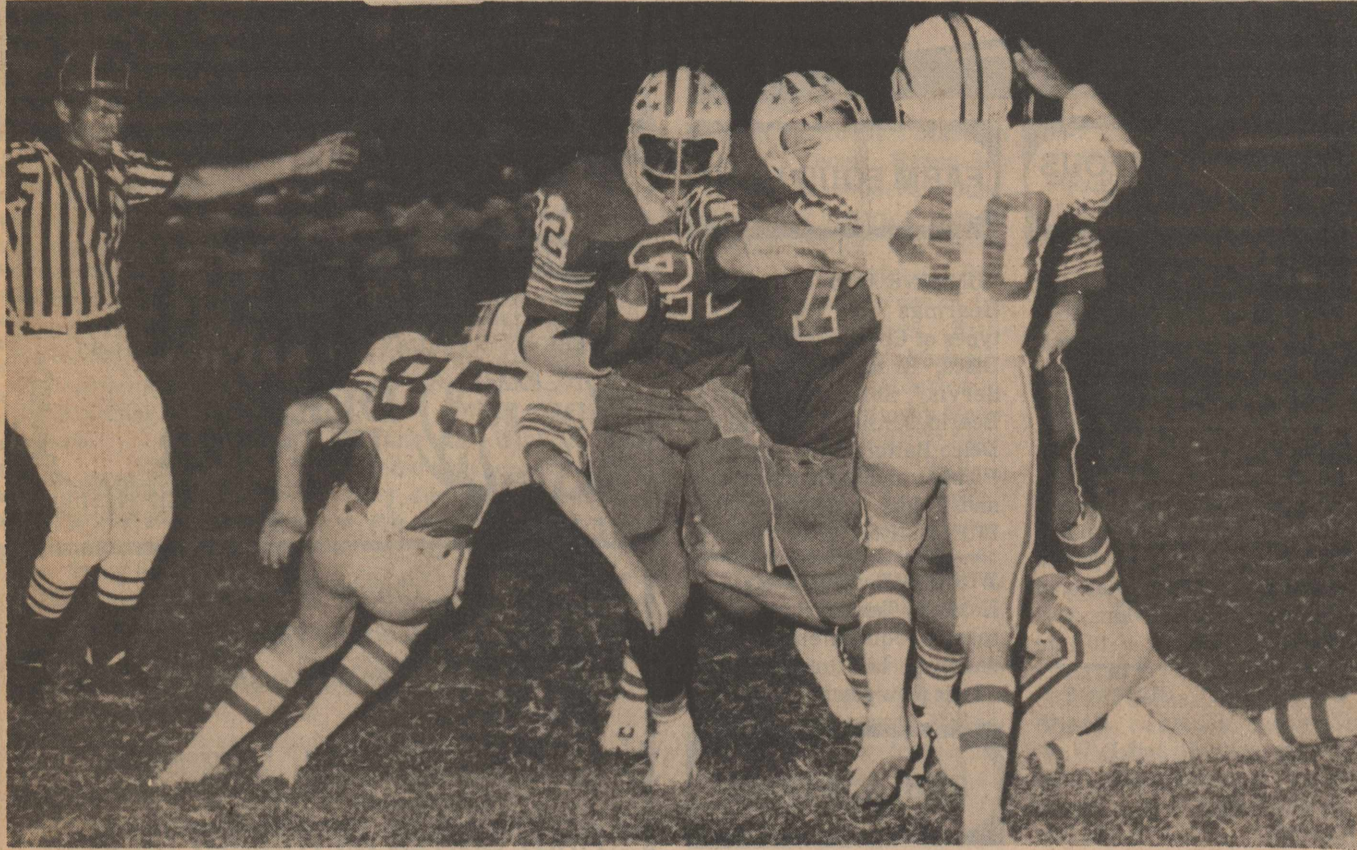

# Hounds Are Top Dogs

Who says you have to go to Juarez to see a dog race? The Knox City Greyhounds outtraced the Throckmorton Greyhounds Friday night 46-7 to go 4-0 for the 1979 season.

The Throckmorton Greyhounds, hereinafter called Dogs, tried to make a game of it but the Hounds from KC were just too strong in every area.

The Hounds followed their pattern of fumbling the ball away the first of second offensive play but Terry Watson recovered a Dog fumble on the next play. The Hounds then moved steadily downfield with Scott Lynn going over from the seven with 6:22 left in the first quarter. The extra point was missed. Score was 6-0. Tim Roberson contributed 35 yards in the drive.

After the kickoff, an excellent defensive play by Greg Whitten for a 13 yard loss forced the Dogs to punt. A good runback set the ball in play on the Dog 26.

The blocking by the Hound offensive line continued to open hole after hole for the back to run through. In this drive, Roberson ran for four. Then Watson carried three times scoring on the last from two yards out. Ricky Gonzales kicked the extra point. Score was 13-0.

Jay Rutherford recovered a fumble to stop the Dogs' next possession. The Hounds could get no further than the Dogs' seven before giving up

the ball on downs. The Dogs could do not better than three yards in three plays with Kenny Cornwall making the big defensive play. The Dogs had to punt.

Ricky Gonzales received the punt on the Dog 43 and raced down the west sideline into the end zone for a Hound score. Gonzales then kicked the extra point. Score was 20-0.

On the next kickoff, Daniel Alsides made an excellent open field tackle for the Hounds. Big plays by Chuck Hutchinson and Kelley Boone forced the Dogs to punt.

After the punt, the Hounds' Dwayne Johnson passed 32 yards to Roberson but a 15 yard penalty rubbed most of it out.

Following the punt, the Dogs set to work on their 25. The defensive charge this time was made by Cyle Clayton and Jay Rutherford.

Gonzales returned the punt to the Dog 32, Terry Watson carried for five yards, Johnson on a quarterback keeper for 12 yards, Johnson then passed nine yards to Steve Rumley to the Dog 4, Tim Roberson then ran into the end zone. The extra point try was no good. Score was 26-0.

The second half got underway with Jay Rutherford returning the kickoff to the Hound 39. Terry Watson then exploded 61 yards for a Hound TD with less than a minute gone in the third quarter. Gonzales connected the extra point. Score was 33-0.

Following the kickoff, Cyle Clayton recovered a Dog fumble to set up a quick burst by Tim Roberson scoring from 13 yards out. Adam White then tried to connect the extra point but was wide. Score was 39-0.

This was the end of the first

team offense only playing two minutes and nine seconds of the second half.

The Hounds began to play a little loose about this time. The defense stayed strong with outstanding plays turned in by Greg Oliver and Arturo Rocha.

The next offensive possession was highlighted by an eight yard pass from Jay Rutherford to Barry Sutton and a 46 yard punt by Dwayne Johnson.

Ricky Gonzales then recovered a Dog fumble but the Hounds could not move.

After the Dogs took over the second team defense came on the field for the Hounds. The Dogs were then able to make their only drive of the night. They scored and kicked the extra point. Score was 39-7.

As the game was winding down Robert Espinosa sacked the Dog quarterback for a seven yard loss.

A long punt and a slip by Gonzales set the Hounds up on their four yard line. On the first play Terry Watson broke over the left side for 85 yards to the Dog 11.

Scott Lynn then scored on a four yard run and Gonzales converted. Final score was 46-7.

Adam White recovered a fumble to allow Jay Rutherford to run out the clock by falling on the ground.

So much for pre-season. The four impressive wins by the Hounds leads us to this

Friday night where the Hounds play their first conference game with the Haskell Indians.

Now if you missed the game with Haskell last year you missed a thriller. Haskell was undefeated and rated number one in the Harris Poll. The Hounds were undefeated and rated 48 in the poll. When the smoke cleared, the Hounds had won 6-3.

A major factor in last year's win was crowd reaction. The fans from Knox City cheered and encouraged the team all the way through.

I would ask you to do this. Get excited about this game. Look through your stuff and junk and find your old cow bell. Bring it to the game and use it.

The team will be up and ready. The area papers will probably pick Haskell to win much like they did last year. But I can assure this bunch of Greyhounds are not going to roll over and play dead. You are going to see one good football game.

You better come early if you want a seat. There will be lots of football fans from all over this area coming to the game.

Scores for other 7-A teams: Aspermont 19, Rochester 0; Haskell 41, Stamford 23; and Munday 7, Hamlin 21.

The District 7-A teams ended pre-season with Knox City, Haskell, Aspermont and Quanah undefeated.

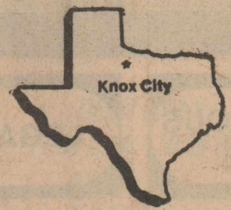

## Zone One Director To Be Elected Tuesday

An election for a director to serve in Zone One on the Wichita Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District Board is scheduled for Tuesday, October 9, at Sutton Station in Vera, according to L.D. Offutt, chairman of the Wichita Brazos SWCD. The election will be at 10:00 a.m.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district director's election, a person must own agricultural land within the subdivision where the election is being held. The person must also live in the county, all or any part of which is in the district, and the voter must be 21 years old.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district director must own land in the zone he represents, be 21 years of age, and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. He must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district.

Zone One of the district includes all of the land in Knox County between the Brazos and South Fork of the Wichita Rivers east of a line about half-way between Vera and Benjamin running north and south between the two rivers.

The purpose of the Wichita Brazos SWCD, with headquarters in Knox City, is

to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

The district board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state, and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purpose.

All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator and all services are available to anyone without regard to race, creed, color, sex, or national origin.

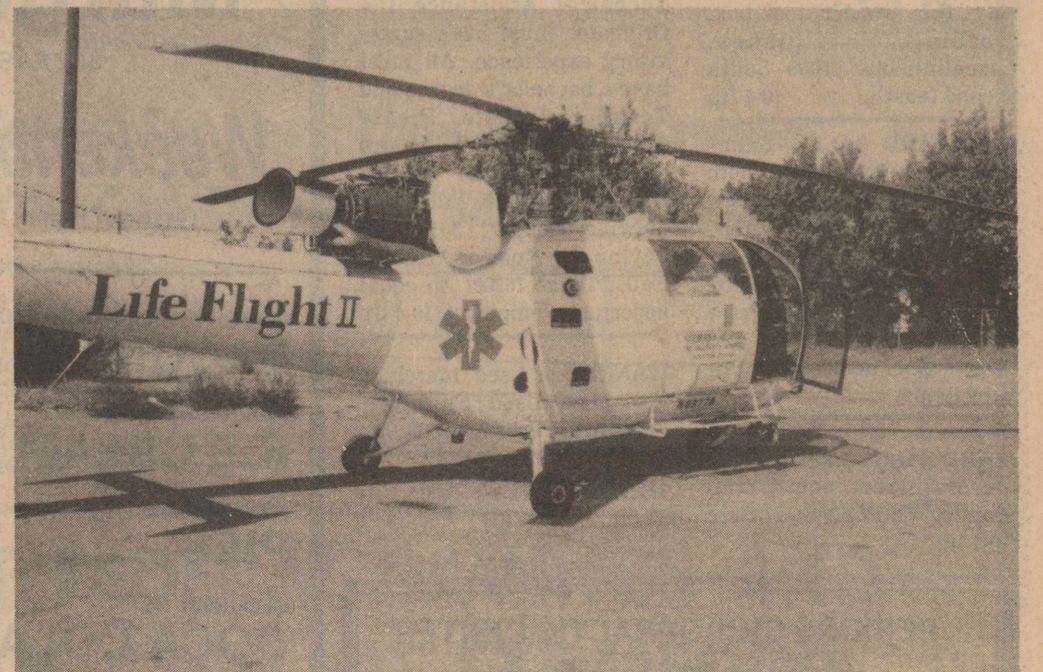
Cash prizes will be presented to winners in the float category of the parade with the first place winner receiving \$150.00; second place, \$90.00; and third place, \$60.00.



## Steagall To Head Fort Worth Show

FORT WORTH (Special) - Red Steagall, one of country music's favorite entertainers and song writers, is returning to headline the 1980 Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show, reports W.R. Watt Jr., president-manager.

Steagall and his band, the Coleman County Cowboys, will appear at each of the 22 performances of the World's Original Indoor Rodeo January 23 through February 3 in Will Rogers Coliseum.

"Red was guest entertainer at our 1977 rodeo," Watt said, "and we have had numerous requests for him to return. His show is most appropriate for our rodeo and we are fortunate to have him back."

Steagall said of his forthcoming date here, "The Fort Worth Rodeo is recognized as one of the top rodeos in the country and we look forward to playing it again. We want to do our part in making the rodeo the best that has ever been presented in Fort Worth."

The red-haired, blue-eyed entertainer was born and reared in the North Texas

town of Sanford. He attended high school at Phillips and was graduated from West Texas State University at Canyon with a degree in animal husbandry and agronomy.

After college, he worked in agricultural chemistry for five years, but gave it up for a full-time career in music as a song writer, composer, publisher and entertainer.

Steagall has had more than 200 songs recorded. "Here We Go Again" became an instant hit, then came "Walk All Over Georgia," "I Gave Up Good Morning, Darling," "Party Dolls and Wine," "Freckles Brown," and more recently, "The Devil Ain't a Lovely Woman's Friend." He has had his songs recorded by such artists as Ray Charles, Dean Martin, Glen Campbell, Roy Clark, Charlie Pride, Bobby Goldsboro and Eddy Arnold.

In 1975, Steagall organized his permanent band and chose the Coleman County Cowboys for their backgrounds in agriculture and cowboying. Each band

member has an understanding and appreciation of the heritage and influence of the American West and its music.

The group of Texans includes Danny Steagall, Red's younger brother who plays

rhythm guitar; Snuffy Elmore from Joshua, three times Texas State Fiddling Champ and twice World's Fiddling Champ; Ricky Solomon from Justin, a third generation fiddler; Dale Bruce from Aubrey, impressive on the bass guitar; Tim Harmon from Texarkana, piano master, and Lynn Massey from San Angelo, drummer.

"It is my feeling that the sport of rodeo, its contestants, producers and spectators are the major factors that keep the spirit of the West and the heritage of Western America alive," Steagall said.

"The rodeo cowboys' way of life has always been an important part of my life and

has had a definite bearing on the kind of songs I create and record," he added. "The men and women of rodeo are unique individuals. They are dedicated to their way of life and are strongly convicted about their beliefs.

"In no other facet of

American life is everyone concerned with their profession, so enthusiastically dedicated to perpetuating their way of life as the rodeo competitor.

"The spirit of the American West has been and will con-

tinue to be a vital force in the overall spirit of the United States and Canada. I firmly believe that these men and women of rodeo, as professional cowboys and cowgirls, are the primary forces that keep that spirit alive." Steagall concluded.

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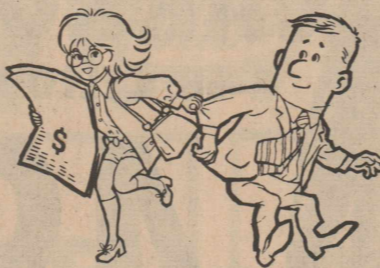

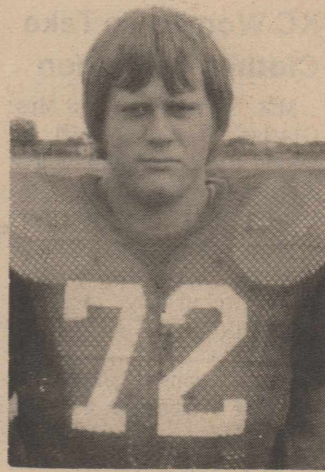

The 4-H Week theme is ex-

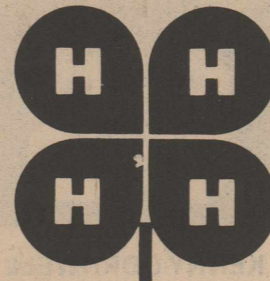
