'Coming Home' Game Set Saturday Hounds Win, 21-12

The Knox City Greyhounds spoiled a perfectly good homecoming for Aspermont by winning, 21-12.

The game pageantry was nice for the homecomers. A fresh norther blew through about game time but did not affect the players.

The Hounds contributed what they could to the enjoyment of the hosts. The Hornets took the opening kickoff and marched 63 yards for a score. The last four yards was a questionable play where the ball was fumbled beyond the line of scrimmage but not across the goal. The runner picked up the ball and advanced it into the end zone.

The extra point was missed. Score was 0-6.

Ricky Gonzales received the Hornet kickoff on the Hound 27, and ran to the left behind a wall of blockers, down the sideline 83 yards for a Hound score. Gonzales then booted the extra point. Score was 7-6.

Following the kickoff, the Hound defense, led by Sammy White and Kenny Cornwell, shut down the Hornets forcing a punt. The Hornet punter, after being burned by the return TD, kicked the ball away from Gonzales. The bad part about that was Tim Roberson returned the ball 32 yards to the Hornet 42. Roberson then carried three

times for nine yards. On fourth down, Dwayne Johnson on a keeper got the first down. Scott Lynn knifed over a good block of Robert Espinosa for 32 yards and a Hound TD. The try for the extra point was wide left. Score with 21 seconds left in the first quarter was 13-6.

To the delight of the homecoming crowd, the Hornets, who came into the game with five wins and no losses, moved the ball steadily down field. Outstanding defensive plays were turned in by Jay Rutherford, Greg Oliver, and

KC News Observing Birthday

The *Knox County News* is celebrating another birthday this week, the eighth one to be exact.

The county's 'oldest' newspaper was established on October 14, 1971, one day before the *Munday Courier* followed suit.

Both towns, as well as Rochester in Haskell County, were left without newspapers when former publisher T.P. Herring declared voluntary bankruptcy intentions October 13, 1971, for the three weeklies. Knox City merchants were saddened by the close of the *Knox County Herald* but were determined to have a paper. A town meeting was called by the Chamber of Commerce where businessmen and women pledged advertising in definite amounts for the time required to set up a new weekly.

The newly-formed Women's Action League took the responsibility of selling subscriptions and Mrs. Myrtle White gave her building rent-free for three months. With the assistance and cooperation of many, the *News* began with one typewriter, a borrowed typewriter, and lots of faith. Copy was prepared here and carried to the late Roy Craig publisher of the *Stamford American*, where composition was done until the *News* office came up with its own set of justwriters and a headliner.

The *News* last year acquired a new direct input photo-typesetter that offers four type styles in eight sizes from six point to 48 point, thus eliminating the need for the headliner.



THIS OLD BUILDING in downtown Knox City was completely ablaze in the upstairs southeast corner when firemen arrived on the scene at 7:00 p.m. Sunday, but with the help of neighboring Benjamin and Munday firemen, the blaze was contained to about six rooms by 10:00 p.m. Firemen remained on the scene until midnight to make sure the blaze did not break out again in the business district.

Old Hotel Damaged

Quick action by the Knox City Volunteer Fire Department, along with help from neighboring towns of Benjamin and Munday, contained a fire which was discovered about 7:00 o'clock Sunday evening in the old hotel building downtown, owned by Ronnie White.

Steve Pepper turned in the alarm as black smoke boiled from the southeast corner of the second floor. Fire Chief Ken Lawson said a fire of this nature is a "nightmare" to firemen as other businesses are endangered by flying sparks.

Lawson asked the *News* to please remind readers to park their cars at least three blocks away from a fire in order that roads will remain open for emergency traffic. The Munday firemen, who had been advised where to stop, had to unload their hoses near the building and then had difficulty getting to an available hydrant due to congested traffic.

He expressed the appreciation of the local firemen and the townspeople

to the Benjamin and Munday firemen as well as Munday police who assisted in handling traffic.

Lawson reported that damage from the fire was confined to four rooms upstairs and two rooms downstairs.

White has owned the former Harbert Hotel for several years and had some household goods as well as children's toys stored in some of the rooms. However, the old hotel had been subject to vandalism for two and a half years. Observers described the damage from vandals as 'unreal' with telephones pulled from the walls, mirrors broken on antique

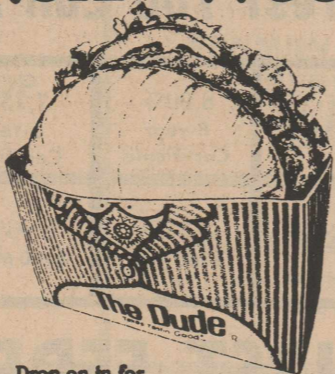
Yard Of Month Is Selected

The Railroad Commission of Texas has issued its final order and granted the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railway Company the authority to discontinue its agency station in Knox City, to make Knox City a non-agency station, and to transfer the agency functions performed at Knox City to its Rule, Texas agency.

The ATSF Railway Company filed application July 13, 1978, seeking authority to discontinue its agency station at Knox City, and to retire and dismantle the depot building.

A community hearing was held at the Knox City Community Center on December 5, 1978, before the examiner, James O. Houchins. The hearing was well-attended, and this was the first hearing ever held, according to reports, where 100% of the shippers and receivers attended.

On hand to testify of the need of the local depot were Bruce B. Campbell Jr., Citizens State Bank president; W.R. Baker, Chamber of Commerce president; and Mayor Kenneth Crowover, representing the City of Knox City.

Shippers on hand to request the continuance of the local depot were O'Brien Cooperative Gin, represented by manager Samuel

Tankersley; Chickasha Elevator of Benjamin, represented by Sam Leaverton; Farmers Grain, represented by Lee Smith and Charlie Groves, Knox City Grain, represented by Billy Mitchell, and Riverside Chemical, represented by Hiram Whitaker.

The records showed that revenues attributable to the agency station at Knox City exceeded expenses by \$22,241.98 for the period April 1, 1976, through September 30, 1978. They reported, however, that this fact alone, was not determinative as to whether the agency should continue operating.

Local agent Z.I. Smith's job will be protected under his union contract. Smith will be relocated elsewhere under the seniority system.

The closing of the Knox City station will not affect the train schedule operated over this line and railroad business will be conducted through the agency station at Rule.

After having examined the record as a whole, the examiner concluded that there is no public necessity that the ATSF continue to maintain its agency station at Knox City. Duties will be shifted to the Rule agent, where an additional clerk is to be employed to assist in meeting the particular needs of its Knox City patrons during the peak shipping months of October, November, December, January, and June.

K.O. Richardson of the Brotherhood of Railway, Airline & Steamship Clerks, Freight Handlers, Express and Station Employees, acted as spokesman for the protestants at the Knox City hearing.

In a May 25, 1979, issue of *The Texas Observer*, a bi-weekly publication with

editorial and business offices in Austin, two articles of special interest to KC residents appeared. One, "Closing The Depots" by Linda Daniel, said rail companies have cut their service to 76 Texas towns and in the last nine years, 30 entire line (828 miles of track) have been terminated. Another article, "Knox City Loses Out" pursued the approval of the closing of the depots by the Texas Railroad Commission. RRC chairman John Poerner told *The Observer* that his decision on whether to vote for the abandonment of a Texas town "depends on the interest of the local people."

(Editor's note: If it weren't such a serious loss for the entire area, we could all laugh at that remark! Mr. Poerner won a landslide victory in Knox County in the last election for the unexpired term on the Railroad Commission. Another of the three-member board, Jim Nugent, will be faced by candidate Jim Hightower who was editor of *The Texas Observer* at the time the above articles were written concerning the closing of the depots in Texas. In a brief press conference at Abilene Municipal Airport Saturday afternoon, Hightower, in his announcement as a candidate for the Railroad Commission, said

his election would bring a new perspective to what has emerged as a "railroading" commission gouging the people of Texas. The three-member commission regulates all energy concerns, affecting gasoline and utility prices, noting, "The Railroad Commission takes money out of the people's pockets and puts it in the corporations. They're (the commission) taking too much out of the people's pockets." He promised to be "one independent commissioner" on the three-member board, if elected. The next election, Knox Citizens may want to remember how much help we received from the current board members.)

There is so much more good fresh fruit this year than last year, you won't know "witch" to choose?

For a crispy, red delicious dessert, select from the record large harvest of new-crop apples. Supplies peak in October and this year's crop is larger than last year's.

Put fresh grapes on your shopping list - they're plentiful - and look for good supplies of fresh Bartlett and winter pears and cranberries.

You may be paying slightly less for fresh apples, pears, and grapes than you did last year, as prices decline to seasonally low levels.

Late summer and fall crops of apricots, sweet cherries, nectarines and plums were about five percent larger than last year.

Citrus season begins to peak, as October gives way to November, with supplies coming from all four major commercial producing areas. Supplies of fresh oranges are adequate, but supplies of fresh grapefruit are light.

Peanut and almond production will set a new record this year and the pecan crop will top last year's. Let your tricksters shell their own. The nuts will have a better chance of surviving the bottom of a "trick-or-treat" bag.

Congressional Comment

WASHINGTON, D.C. — This past week, I was prepared to present an amendment to the House of Representatives which, standing alone, might have been confusing to those who recognize my stand on government intervention in the private sector and, in particular, on the subject of price controls.

The amendment was to be offered to the Department of Energy Authorization Bill and read, "All coal deposits known as of 1973 shall be immediately placed under Federal price controls at 1973 levels."

The purpose of this amendment was not, as it might appear, to add further to the burden currently faced by the coal industry, but to point out the political duplicity of singling out oil and gas as the only energy source to be kept under the crippling yoke of price controls.

The coal amendment, fortunately, was not necessary to

achieve the goal I sought: The defeat of another amendment which attempted to reverse decisions to gradually decontrol the price of petroleum.

My logic was simple: To present the choice of either voting for both the continuation of mandatory controls on domestic crude oil and the placement of such controls on coal, or the choice of opposing both proposals. Obviously, the latter choice is the most sensible and would be in the best long-range interest of all American consumers.

A great deal of attention has been focused on rising petroleum costs and the effect of those increases on our economy. Little note has been made, however, of the fact that from 1973 through 1978, the price of coal rose 224 percent. Rolling back the price of coal to the 1973 level would initiate a savings of some \$11.77 billion for the American consumer. A practical course? Not when taking into consideration the need for increased energy supplies in this country. Such a move would break the back of the coal industry and serve only to further decrease current energy supplies. But, when you think of it, is it any more absurd than posing these same restrictions on the petroleum industry, or any other industry in this country?

To support the continuation of mandatory price controls on domestic petroleum, while voting against an amendment such as the one I would have proposed, is political hypocrisy that does little to promote the interests of the consumer or to solve our nation's serious energy problems. Decontrol will increase oil production, help balance our trade deficit and will best serve the long-term interests and prolong the need to take actions which might prove unpopular at home, but which are necessary to solve our energy crisis.

The price control system is a bureaucratic nightmare. The fact of the matter is that those who advocate controls in the interests of the consumer are actually the ones doing the consumer the most harm.

In addition, he participated in the Six Man Coaches Association All-Star Game as

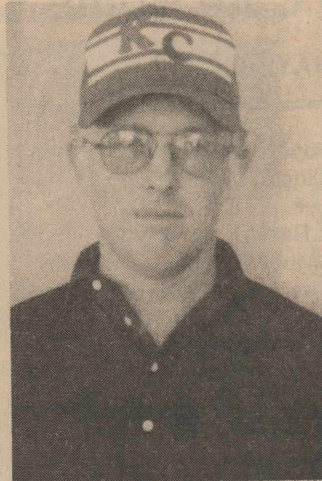

CHOCOLATE CHEESECAKE CUPS

- 12 vanilla wafers
- 1 package (8 oz.) cream cheese, softened
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 package (4 oz.) sweet cooking chocolate, melted
- 3/4 cup chopped pecans

Place a vanilla wafer, flat side down, in each of 12 whipped topping and chocolate aluminum foil baking cups; late curls or maraschino cherries, if desired. Store cream cheese until smooth, in refrigerator. Makes 12 servings.

Gradually beat in sugar and continue beating until light and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well. Blend in flour and vanilla; then blend in chocolate. Spoon into cups, filling about 3/4 full, and sprinkle with pecans. Bake at 325° for 30 minutes. Cool on rack and serve cool or chilled. Garnish with thawed frozen

OVERPAYMENT OFFENSIVE

Social Security and Supplemental Security Income beneficiaries who fail to report changes affecting their payment status, thereby causing an overpayment, must repay any such overpayments, according to James Harper, Social Security branch manager in Vernon.

All beneficiaries are given an explanation of their reporting responsibilities when they apply for benefits, Harper explained. Their obligation to keep Social Security informed of all changes in wages, marital status, school attendance, address, and (in the case of SSI beneficiaries) living arrangements, all income and resources, cannot be overemphasized, he added.

Any change can affect the amount of payment due, he explained, adding, "If there is a change and you don't
