Oops! We Goofed!

Depot Issue Not Final

In the article in last week's paper concerning the closing of the local depot, the information submitted to the News office was misinterpreted. A copy of the final order issued October 12, 1979, by the Railroad Commission of Texas on the application of the Atchison, Topeka, and Santa Fe Railway Company asked the authority to discontinue its agency in Knox City, to make Knox City a non-agency station, and to transfer the agency functions performed here to its Rule agency.

However, this instrument will not have any force or effect unless or until an official order adopting the proposal is signed and issued by the commissioners.

All parties are entitled to file exceptions to this proposal within twenty (20) days of its issuance; similarly, parties are permitted to reply to any exceptions filed within fifteen (15) days after the due date for such exceptions.

Parties of record are still hopeful that the three member Railroad Commission will act in their favor.

Decision is now in their hands.

Hounds Please Crowd

Homecoming games have been good to the Knox City Greyhounds this year. This was no exception - winning their own homecoming game by beating the arch rival Munday Moguls, 28-14.

Many former students and teachers were on hand to see a very physical football game that was strange to say the least. How many football games have you seen with seven pass interference calls?

Interference calls set up both Mogul scores. The first was a razzle dazzle pass and then a lateral after the reception. With 2:14 left in the first quarter, the score was 0-7.

The Hounds had a pass picked off to stop their next drive but the defense held and forced a punt.

Starting on their own 20, the Hounds marched downfield in 11 plays with Terry Watson carrying over from the four for the touchdown. Ricky Gonzales kicked the first of his four extra points for the night. This tied the score with 6:50 left in the half. Score was 7-7.

Scott Lynn recovered a Mogul fumble to set up the Hounds on their own 34.

The Hounds were able to score a touchdown in six plays. The big plays were a 21 yard pass from Dwayne Johnson to Steve Rumley and a 29 yard scoring run by Johnson around right end for the score. Extra point was good and the score was 14-7.

The Hound defense did an excellent job on the Moguls led by Robert Espinosa and a sack by Andy Barnard forcing a punt.

After the punt, the Hounds were able to move from their own 16 to the Mogul 11 as time ran out in the first half.

The second half started with the Hounds receiving the kickoff. A well mixed attack moved the ball steadily downfield and on the 11th play, the Moguls intercepted a pass at their four yard line.

The Moguls could not move the ball and had to punt.

The Hounds would not be denied this time. Fourteen plays later, Johnson passed four yards to Sammy White for the touchdown. This was White's third catch of the drive. Extra point was good and the score was 21-7 with 19 seconds left in the third quarter.

Assisted by an interference call, the Moguls moved the ball to the Hound 18 before Kenny Cornwell stopped the runner for no gain. Kelley Boone crashed through to throw the runner for a third yard loss. Two incomplete passes turned the ball over on downs.

The Hounds, taking over on the 20, roared down the field in nine plays to score with Watson going the last six yards for the touchdown. A 41 yard pass and run from John-

son to Gonzales set up the score. Extra point was again good and the score was 28-7.

The Moguls came back in less than two minutes, aided by three major penalties against the Hounds and a pass interference call at the

one setting up the one yard run for the score making it 28-14.

The Hounds got the ball and ran out the clock with 11 running plays.



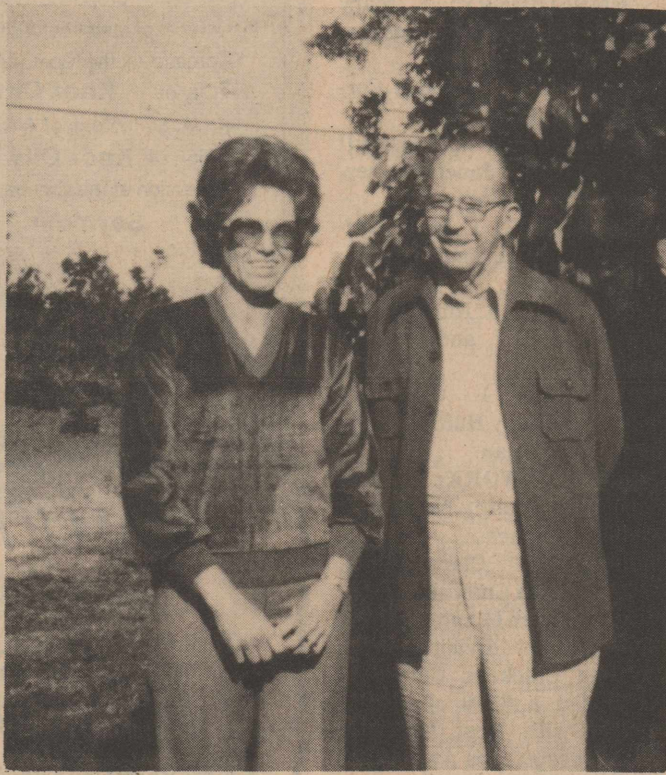
O'Brien Happenings

Appraisal Board Nominations Filed

The representatives of the taxing entities in Knox County have concluded a series of joint meetings which has resulted in the nomination of five persons to govern the newly created Knox County Appraisal District.

Nominees for the first two years are J.V. Carver and Clyde Voss of the Knox City area, D.B. Gass and Ernest Horton of the Munday area, and Don W. Hertel from the area north of the Brazos River. When elected, the five will serve a two year term beginning January 1, 1980, and ending December 31, 1981.

The Knox County Appraisal District is being created because of the enactment of Senate Bill 621 66th Texas Legislature. When the district becomes fully operational January 1, 1982, property taxpayers will find

their property subject to only one appraisal and that appraisal value will be used by all taxing entities. The exception to this would be where property owners for a taxing entity are located in more than one county; in which case the property can be appraised in a different county. The appraisal district can also be given the responsibility of assessing and collecting taxes for member districts.

The new appraisal district board duties will consist of the overseeing of the operation of the Knox County Appraisal District, which includes employment of staff and budget planning necessary to cause a district wide appraisal to function. The board will also elect future equalization board members.

The entities participating are the City of Benjamin, the Benjamin ISD, the City of Goree, the Goree ISD, Knox County and the Knox County Hospital, the City of Knox City, the Knox City-O'Brien CISD, the City of Munday, the Munday ISD, and the Knox County part of the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority.

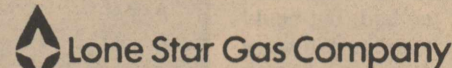

"The Book Report"

HALLOWEEN COSTUME SAFETY

This Halloween, check safety features for children's trick or treating costumes, advises Sharon Book, assistant county Extension agent.

She suggests these Halloween costume safety features: 1. Consider using makeup to decorate the face rather than wearing a mask which may block vision. Apply cold cream before putting on makeup for easy removal. 2. Sew or glue reflective tape to both front and back of

the costume. Be creative and incorporate the tape into the costume design.

3. When possible, choose light-colored costumes - they will be more visible to motorists.

4. Check labels or packaging on bought costumes for flame-retardant finishes. Children may be exposed to many direct sources of fire such as lighted pumpkins, colorful candles or open fires or toasting marshmallows.

5. For home-sewn costumes, select fabrics with a flame-retardant finish.

6. If costumes are too long, shorten them by hemming or cutting them off with pinking shears. This will lessen the chance of a child tripping or falling.

7. If possible, give each child a flashlight to use at night. If he/she wants to carry a jack-o-lantern, put a flashlight inside - never a candle.

Classing Office Opens At Munday

The Munday Marketing Services office opened for business on October 15, approximately seven weeks earlier than the previous season, according to Garland Dye, in his first season as officer-in-charge.

The cotton harvest moved into high gear in several areas of the territory. A considerable amount of defoliation has already been accomplished. Demand for early ginnings was good and reported prices ranged from 55.25 to 56.25 cents per pound for cotton with micronaire readings in the 35 to 49 range. The Munday office classed 1,847 samples during the first week of operation and quality was high.

Grade 31 accounted for 48 percent of the total with Grade 41 comprising 26 percent. Staple lengths were mostly 31 and 32 with staple 31 accounting for 47 percent, and staple 32 making up 38 percent. Ninety-five percent of the samples had micronaire readings in the base range of 35 to 49. Farmers received from \$110 to \$115 dollars per ton for cottonseed.





- ★ When disconnecting an appliance, don't pull cord; pull plug.

- ★ If an appliance has a separate cord, attach cord to appliance before plugging it into an outlet; disconnect cord from outlet before disconnecting it from appliance. Store cords away from cutlery, heat and dampness.
- ★ Don't place cords where they'll be tripped over or be subject to wear (under a well-travelled rug, through doorways).
- ★ Teach children not to play with or around electric sockets or equipment.
- ★ Don't use an electric lawn mower or hedge clippers when barefoot, or on wet grass or hedges.
