## Indians Win In Final Minute, 34-28

# Time Runs Out For Hounds

The Knox City Greyhounds lost a thriller Friday night to the Quanah Indians 34-28. The Hounds were not beaten - they just ran out of time. Four times the Hounds fell behind. Three times they fought back to take the lead and were driving as time expired.

Quanah scored on their first possession of the night. It took 11 plays and an offside penalty against the Hounds that negated a recovered fumble that would have given the ball over on the Indian four yard line for the first touchdown. The extra point try failed. Score was 0-6.

Midway through the second quarter the Hounds' offense came alive, moving on the ground 65 yards with Scott Lynn running off the right side for nine yards and a touchdown. Ricky Gonzales kicked the first of four extra points. Score was 7-6.

The Indians came back in four plays to score. A run for two points failed. Score was 7-12.

The Hounds answered with a 10 play drive for a touchdown. The big play was a 33 yard run by Dwayne Johnson, two passes to Steve Rumley, and a nine yard pass from Johnson to Sammy White for the score. The extra point was good and the score at halftime was 14-12.

The second half opened with the Hounds getting good field position when Andy Barnard recovered a short kickoff on the Hound 46. A fumble and Indian recovery on the first play gave them excellent field position.

The Indians scored on four plays. A run for two points failed. Less than two minutes of the second half gone. Score 14-18, Indians.

The Hounds could not move the ball and had to punt into a brisk wind. It took the Indians ten plays to score this time and a pass was good for the extra two points. Score 14-26.

The Hounds with their back to the wall and the third quarter coming to a close moved to the Indian 15 before an interception ended the drive. The big play on the drive was Terry Watson's 20 yard run off the right side for 20 yards and then four more by Ricky Gonzales when Terry fumbled and Ricky grabbed it in mid-air.

The Hound defense rose to the occasion. Big plays by Jay Rutherford, Andy Barnard and Kelley Boone forced a punt.

A 29 yard pass to Ricky Gonzales by Johnson set up a 38 yard screen pass to Tim Roberson for the touchdown. The play was set up beautifully by the offensive

line. Their blocks sprang Tim loose and Sammy White made a sensational downfield block to clear him into the end zone. Score was now 21-26 Indians with 8:34 left in the game.

After the kickoff, the defense rose up again. This time, Robert Espinosa, Tim Roberson, and Chuck Hutchinson had big plays forcing a very short punt.

The Hounds clicked again when Roberson ran behind the excellent blocking of Kyle White, Sid Richardson and Barnard for 20 yards, Lynn ran for five, Robinson three more, and Johnson's 15 yard run to the 12. Offsides against Quanah set up a six yard run and a one yard run by Terry Watson for the touchdown. Gonzales' fourth extra point was good. Score was 28-26.

The Hounds had some good defense in the next drive by the Indians but could not stop the big plays - Arturo Rocha and Jay Rutherford on the kickoff, Robert Espinosa, Ricky Gonzales, Terry Watson along with the rest of the Greyhound defense against the run. The Indians were able to complete two big third down pass plays and with the help of a 15 yard penalty against the Hounds scored a touchdown and a two point pass with just 41 seconds left in the game. Score was 28-34.

The Hounds came right back and had a first and ten on the Indian 34 with no time outs left. Four desperation passes were incomplete.

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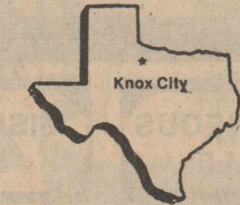

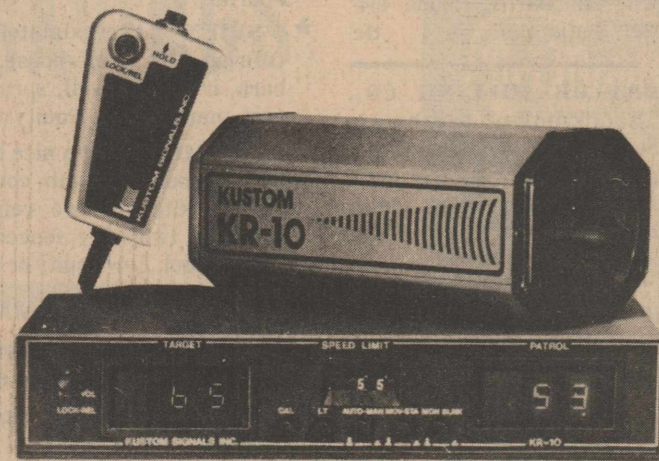

The system's ultra-high K-band frequency enables him to pick up distant targets, update speeds more quickly, and select multi-lane targets with increased accuracy.

## Downtown Streets Are Remarked

City employees recently repainted the parking lanes on the downtown streets and officials are asking local and area citizens to please note the changes and observe them properly.

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation is planning the improvement of U.S. Highway 82 in King County from the intersection with U.S. Highway 83, 1.1 miles south of Guthrie to the Knox County line.

The proposed improvement project consists of widening the existing drainage structures; reconstructing, widening and strengthening the existing base; and placing a two-course surface treatment. The new facility will have two 12-foot driving lanes, and two 12-foot continuous passing lanes with 9-foot surfaced shoulders. A minimum right of way width of 170 feet will be necessary to provide for the proposed improvements. The additional right of way to be acquired will not involve any displacements or relocations.

Maps and other drawings showing the proposed location and design, environmental studies, and any other information about the proposed project are on file and available for inspection and copying at the Resident Engineer's office at Munday, Texas. Also the maps and drawings showing the proposed location and design have been placed on file with the County Judge of King County.

**YARDS COVERED**  
The gin yards are getting to be covered up with trailers and modules. Two days last week we weighed in more than 700 bales per day, now that is a lot of cotton for one day's work. We have two night crews now and are ginning 24 hours a day, and with good luck they can gin around 400 bales a day. So you can see that there is no way they can stay caught up, when we weigh in 300 more than we can gin. The module yard is

the one you should come by and see if you have not already. It is something to see, reminds me of a cemetery, first you see just white tops of the cotton. I'm not sure just how many they have on this yard. We have to have this yard separate from the trailer yard. You have to put the modules so many feet apart for the insurance to be good. There have been more people going to modules this year than some of us thought would for the first year. I'm sure by next year there will be more that go to this in getting their cotton out. It looks like in a few years this will be the only way the farmers will harvest cotton. I know that J.O. and Sammy really think the module feeder at the gin

is the last thing in cotton ginning. It lets the cotton go through so much faster than a suction that is run by a person.

# Methodists Dedicate Church

Members of the First United Methodist Church of Knox City along with former pastors, their wives, and other special guests celebrated Sunday morning by burning the church note during dedication service held at the regular morning worship hour.

Bishop Alsie H. Carleton of the Northwest Texas Annual Conference was on hand, as were former pastors, the Rev. Jarrell H. Sharp, District Superintendent of the Seymour District; the Rev. Walter Driver, retired, of Big Spring; and the Rev. B.J. Foster, semi-retired due to health, of Lubbock. The Rev. James P. Patterson, pastor, was assisted by Jim Dillon, chairman of the administrative board, church trustee Steve McIlhane, and church lay leader, treasurer, and trustee Alton Fitzgerald.

Bishop Carleton, who delivered the morning message, resides in Albuquerque, New Mexico. He was elected as United Methodist Bishop in July, 1968. Previously, he served as professor, church administration and director of field education at SMUs Perkins School of Theology. He held pastorates in Northwest Texas Conference until 1953. He attended McMurry College, Southern Methodist University, University of Chicago Divinity School, and Boston University. He holds several honorary degrees and also received the SMU Distinguished Alumnus Award.

When Bishop Carleton was elected bishop, he was assigned to the Northwest Texas-New Mexico area, reassigned to the same area in 1972, and again in 1976 for the 1976-1980 quadrennium.

During Rev. Walter Driver's pastorate here from

1954 until 1958, he not only carried on an active ministry, but managed to build a new parsonage, doing about eighty-five percent of the work himself.

Rev. Jarrell H. Sharp and his family moved here in 1960, finding the church ready to enter into a building program for an education facility. Ground-breaking ceremonies were held on February 19, 1961. Open house for the new building was on May 28, 1961. The new sanctuary was begun in the spring of 1965 and finished

later in the year. In 1966 it received one of the sixteen awards in the Texas Architecture competition.

In 1974, the First United Methodist Church accepted the home of the late Mrs. C.A. Hull at 500 Main. The Church trustees were authorized to sell the property and apply the income to the debt on the Church building.

In 1977, Mrs. Evelyn Warren, a longtime member and organist for the church, died, designating in her will her home at 401 South Second, her piano and organ to the First United Methodist Church.

The trustees were authorized to sell the Warren home and it was purchased by Rev. James Patterson. The administrative board and trustees applied the income to pay off the Church debt.

The note was burned Sunday - fourteen years, eight months and thirteen days from the groundbreaking in 1965.

Following the dedication service, dinner was served, prepared by the United Methodist Women and other church members

# Lone Star Gas Asks Service Charge Hike

KNOX CITY, October 23, 1979 - Lone Star Gas Company's local manager, Lester Yates Jr., filed an application last Thursday to change the service charges and revise the gas cost adjustment clause in Knox City.

Yates emphasized the base rate being charged for gas consumed by residential and commercial customers will not be increased under the proposal.

The new service charges being requested by Lone Star are \$20 for a reconnection; \$18 per hour for appliance service; \$20 per hour for air conditioning service; \$5 for a

returned check; and \$40 to disconnect and reconnect a customer's yard line for repair.

"These charges are designed to recover Lone Star's expenses for these extended services," Yates said. "A relatively small portion of Lone Star's customers require these special services, and these charges put the cost of the work on those who use the service."

The gas cost adjustment requested in the application would allow Lone Star to recover distribution operating expenses that increase with the city gate cost

of gas. The estimated total increase in annual revenue for Lone Star's Knox City distribution system under the proposed change is \$7,221 or 3.87 percent.

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### Bullock Says

## Tax Adoption Would Be 'Blow'

AUSTIN - State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday, October 23, said the adoption of a ten percent, federal value-added tax would be the sneakiest blow to the American public since Pearl Harbor.

"It's the income tax wolf in sales tax sheep's clothing," Bullock said, saying "it has the complexities of the income tax system and the regressiveness of a high sales tax."

Bullock said the proposal by U.S. Representative Al Ullman, House Ways and Means Committee Chairman, borders on tinkering and financial experimentation that could result in a tax Frankenstein.

The tax would be ten percent of the value each manufacturer or distributor adds to a product or service

in each stage before it reaches the marketplace.

The tax would finally be included in the sales price and as a result consumers would never know what part of the price covers the tax.

"Consumers will absorb the tax and it will fall hardest on lower and middle income groups. Business will absorb a new set of federal tax filings and paperwork. And the economy will absorb a little more disruption."

"The only winner," he said, "seems to be the federal treasury which will be raking in ten cents on the dollar for every product and service in the country."

Bullock said he did not think the offset measures - tax cuts for businesses - would be a good trade-off for a national sales tax.

"If Congress wants to cut taxes, they don't need to link it to a value-added tax," he said.

"Let's face it, they want a new tax to pay off the billions of dollars we now owe as the result of deficit spending," Bullock said.

He said the cost of products sold in Texas would be dependent on the "value-added" by out-of-state manufacturers and distributors.

Everything is going to cost a heck of a lot more if this new federal tax passes, he said.

## VA Annual Report Due Before Jan. 1

On November 1, 1979, a large number of people receiving Veterans Administration benefit payments will receive an annual income report, which must be completed. According to Allen Lowrey, Veterans Service Officer for Knox County, persons receiving the card must complete it and return it to the VA before January 1, 1980, or have their benefit payments terminated.

Those receiving the income questionnaire card will be veterans, widows and children who are receiving nonservice-connected disability or death pension under the new pension law, which went into effect January 1, 1979. Also receiving the card will be veterans and widows who are receiving pension under the laws which were in effect prior to January 1, 1979, and dependent parents of veterans whose deaths were caused by military service.

Veterans, widows and children being paid under the new pension law, as well as parents receiving dependency and indemnity compensation, should remember that their countable income may be reduced by any unusual family medical expenses they pay out in 1979. It is therefore important that the medical expenses be shown in the proper space on the income card. Upon receipt of the card showing medical expenses for 1979, the VA will recompute entitlement and, if necessary, increase benefit payments retroactively to January 1, 1979. All VA claimants should report ALL of their income for 1979, and their anticipated income for 1980. Based upon the information shown on the card, a determination will be made as to whether VA benefits will continue in 1980.

## 'Slimnastics'

# Former Resident Teaching Course

Former Knox City resident, Mrs. Ray (Gail) Etheredge of Pampa, is helping figure conscious women of Pampa with "Slimnastics," an exercise course now being offered through the local branch of Clarendon College. And for those involved, it's a lot of fun - mixed with a wide variety of exercises, jogging, walking and jumping rope.

Mrs. Etheredge, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C.H. Cornett of Knox City, is a slim and trim young woman who has a physical education degree from Tarleton State University as well as her master's degree in education. The \$15 course has been offered since last January with four sections of approximately 30 students in each group.

"The turnout has been just super," Mrs. Etheredge says. "We've got all ages - from 18 to 60 - and all physical levels."

"We started out with only one class, but interest grew so we added more sections," she added. "Our night classes are mostly working women and the morning classes are primarily women who enjoy getting out of the house for a while."

The women begin the eight week course by taking their measurements, which Gail says she never looks at - "it's strictly for the women themselves."

Every session, they begin by jogging and walking a one and one-half mile course with

rope jumping following with about an hour of exercise after that.

"We start out warming up with exercises going all over the body, then we work on specific areas," Gail explained. "We work on a specific area at each session - today we did the arms and shoulders. That way, they can later do the exercises at home."

About 40 percent of the women now enrolled in her classes have taken the course before, she says.

She tells her students to be "totally selfish and do it for themselves, not for anyone else." She adds that last summer one of her students lost 17 pounds.

"Of course, this is one of those things that you only get out of it what you put into it," Gail said. "And if you stick with it even after the course is over, you will lose weight and inches."

That hope is one of the reasons women keep coming, besides the laughter and camaraderie shared by the women.

It's a class obviously enjoyed by students and teacher alike, not because it's so easy, but because it's fun and hopefully, worth all the effort.

Gail's husband, Ray, is manager of the Feed Lot in Pampa and they are the parents of two sons, Matt, who is four years old, and Wjil, two.

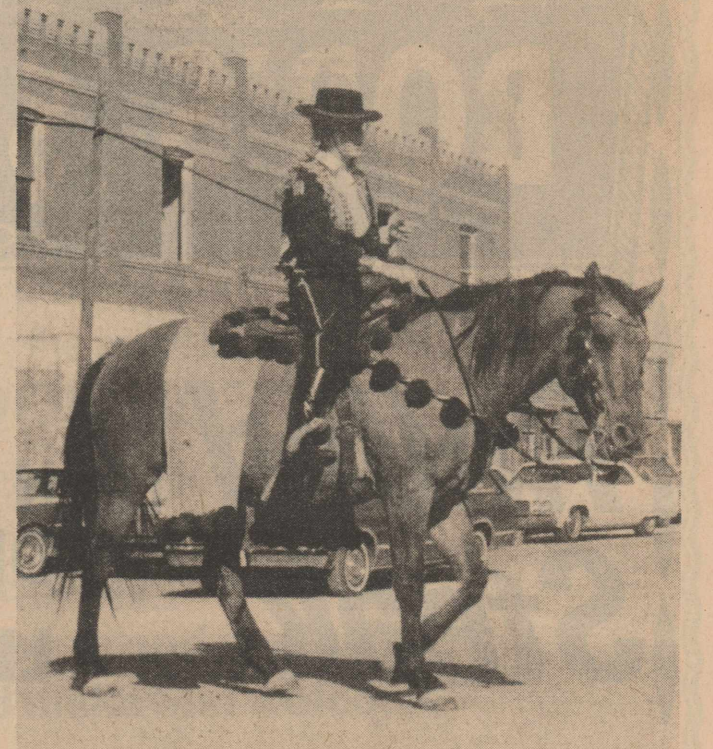
