Supt. Baker explained that lower enrollment has not been the major factor in the re-alignment, as the minimum number of students in high school determines the UIL classification. 



Most cotton gins are operating from 15 to 24 hours a day and are still unable to keep pace. In some sections of the territory over half of the cotton crop is harvested and ginned or stored awaiting ginning.

Spot cotton prices were steady to slightly lower from a week earlier. Grade 31, staple 32, with mike between 35 and 49 brought 56.10 to 56.85 cents per pound. Grade 31, Staple 31 was 55.00 to 55.50 cents per pound. Buyers interested in contracting acreage were slightly less than last week.

The Munday classing office graded just over 4500 samples last week. This makes the season's total just under

Grades were just slightly lower overall but the perdominant quality remained Grade 31, making up 48 percent of the total. Grade 41 comprised 30 percent. Staples 32 and 31 accounted for 43 and 28 percent, respectively. Almost 90 percent of this week's samples miked in the 35 to 49 range.

In addition to 'How to Protect Your Home', the group also discusseed the importance of being a witness. They learned that most crimes cannot be solved without the help of a witness and in order to catch a thief, citizens must be willing to testify

discussed was Also 'Operation Identification', a citizen participation program to prevent burglary. The 'Hands Up' program, a national volunteer effort to halt crime, is a project of the General Federation Women's Clubs and sponsored locally by the Knox City Study Club, wherein persons borrow an engraving tool available at the City Hall and mark their valuables with their driver's license number. It should be engraved on an area that cannot be easily dismantled and which is not easily seen. After marking their

property, persons should make a list of their valuables and keep a copy of the list in a safe place. If one should become a burglary victim, he or she will be able to describe the stolen property from the

Once property has been marked, persons should display an Operation Identification sticker at doors and windows which might be used for entry. By advertising their participation in Operation Identification in this way, burglars realize the stolen property would be difficult to re-sell. Often the presence of the sticker alone is enough to deter a burglar.
