Hounds 'Slay' Dragons

The weather was a little cool for the fans but it was just right for slaying Dragons. The Greyhounds beat the Paducah Dragons 52-6 before the home folks.

The tone of the game was set in the first two and one-half minutes. The Hounds kicked off, and on the Dragons' third play, they fumbled and the Hounds recovered.

It became apparent that the Dragons were no match for the mighty Greyhounds. The Hounds could do just about anything they wanted. Terry Watson started the touchdown parade with the first of his three touchdowns, a seven yard run.

Ricky Gonzales kicked the first of his four extra points for the night. He had successfully kicked 11 in a row before missing after the Hounds' fourth touchdown.

This was a game that football players like to play. Every varsity player got to play and every player was a hero. Almost every player made a great play at some time during the game.

Scott Lynn scored the first of his two touchdowns on the Hounds' second possession of the night, a six yard run behind 'super' blocking.

The offensive line opened some huge holes in the line for the backs to run through. The downfield blocking was excellent. The defense was superb as usual.

When Scott Lynn burst off the left side for 35 yards and a 21-0 lead with the second quarter only two plays old, the coaches began substituting freely to give the younger players some playing time and to try to keep the score down. This is sometimes not popular with the players or the fans but it is good sportsmanship. You never know when the shoe might be on the other foot.

The one bright spot for the Dragons was on the next series, after Scott Lynn intercepted a pass and returned it 35 yards. A Johnson to Hutchinson pass set the Hounds up first and goal to go on the Dragon six yard line. The Dragons, however, rose up and the ball went over to them on the 20 yard line, four plays later.

The bright spot faded when the Dragon punter dropped

the ball. He attempted to run then, only to be caught for a loss.

Dwayne Johnson scored three touchdowns behind the blocking of Sid Richardson and Kyle White.

Just as the first half was ending, the Hounds blocked a punt. Adam White caught the ball and ran toward the goal line. When he was caught, he then pitched to Kelley Boone, who fought his way into the end zone. The ball was brought back. The pitch was ruled illegal.

Two plays later, Watson scored. Score at halftime was 33-0.

The second half started just as the first ended. The Hounds kicked off and forced a punt. Watson blocked the punt, and three plays later ran through a big hole up the middle for 29 yards and a score.

Mass substitution took place here. The defense held and the second team set out

on a 13 play scoring drive. On the first play, Greg Whitten followed a great block by Kyle White for 21 yards. The drive ended with a two yard scoring dive by Jay Rutherford.

Arturo Rocha recovered a Dragon fumble, setting up the next Hound scoring drive. Chuco Magana ran for 37 yards to start it off. Four plays later following a 15 yard penalty against the Dragons, Russell Hacker, running for the only time on the varsity, ran 21 yards up the middle for the touchdown.

The Dragons moved against the second Hound defense and scored on their fourteenth play of their only drive, a 20 yard pass.

For all practical purposes, the game was over. The Hounds completely dominated the helpless Dragons.

The Hounds have this week off to get ready for their final

Re-Alignment Puts KC In District 4-A

Schools in the area received their new football alignments from the University Interscholastic League last weekend, and Knox City was among a minority who failed to move up.

The UIL studies enrollment figures every two years and reorganizes the districts accordingly, school officials said. New districts will be effective next fall.

The major change was dropping Class B from the classification and moving the others up. The Class B schools are now Class A, A is now AA, etc. through AAAAA.

For the most part, districts are smaller. Other schools who did not move up a classification are AA: Eastland, Cisco, Seymour; A: Roscoe, Aspermont, Cross Plains, and Goldthwaite.

In the area, Goree dropped from Eleven-Man to Six-Man football.

The alignments are also for basketball in Classes AAAAA to AA.

District 7-A in which Knox City has participated will now become District 7-AA and will include Crowell, Haskell, Munday, Paducah, Quanah, and Seymour.

District 8AA will include Albany, Anson, Baird, Hamlin, Hawley, Merkel, Rotan, Jim Ned, and Winters.

Knox City will be reclassified as District 4-A with Aspermont, Chillicothe, Jayton, Newcastle, Rochester, Rule, and Throckmorton.

In Six-Man, District 3 will include Benjamin, Goree, Guthrie, Patton Springs, Harrold, Higgins, Northside, and Weinert.

Supt. Baker explained that lower enrollment has not been the major factor in the re-alignment, as the minimum number of students in high school determines the UIL classification. Several years ago, the minimum for Class A was 115, then 120, then 125, then 130, and current minimum is 135.

Class AA is 135 to 264, AAA 265 to 614, AAAAA 615 to 1309, and AAAAAA 1310 and above. Knox City has always been one of the smaller Class A schools, but talented athletes have proved that they could be competitive with the larger schools, winning district any number of times in football, basketball, volleyball, track, golf, and also in literary competition.

One of the disadvantages in not advancing, school officials say, is the fact that Knox City's athletic program is geared to competition in junior varsity, as well as teams in the seventh and eighth grades in order that the students coming out might have the opportunity to play and gain experience and in some of the smaller schools, the number of teams is limited.

The 1980 tentative football schedule was released to the News office by school officials Tuesday morning.

Varsity Pre-season games beginning at 8:00 - September 5, Hawley; September 12, Seymour; September 19, Munday; September 26, Open Date; (District games beginning at 7:30) October 3, Chillicothe; October 10, Jayton; October 17, Throckmorton; October 24, Aspermont; October 31, Newcastle; November 7, Rochester; and November 14, Rule. Pre-season scrimmages are planned with Holiday and Hamlin. Sites are still being discussed and will be released at a later date, officials said.

Junior Varsity - September 4, Hawley; September 11, Seymour; October 9, Jayton; and November 6, Jayton.

Eighth and seventh grade games tentatively scheduled are September 11, Seymour; October 9, Jayton; and November 6, Jayton. Eighth and seventh grades will begin play at 6:00 and 5:00 respectively.

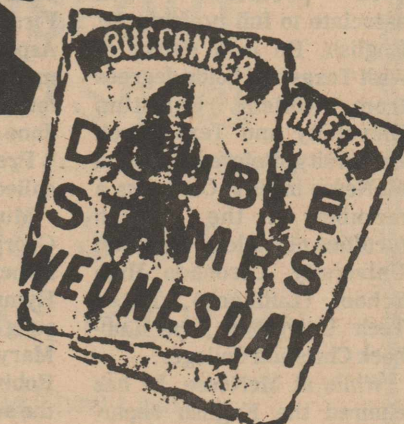

Discussion Held On Prevention Of Crime

A group of twelve interested persons met Tuesday morning of last week at First United Methodist Church to discuss and learn more about the National Neighborhood Watch Program which was designed to help individual citizens help themselves in preventing crime. Neighborhood Watch focuses on the prevention of residential burglary.

Statistics show that burglary is not just a big city crime. For the past five years, burglary rates have increased faster in the suburbs and rural areas than in the cities.

Studies by local law enforcement agencies and the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration have proved that burglaries can be prevented by deterrence, delay, and detection.

Over 75% of all burglaries require forcing a door or window open to gain entry. Most houses and apartments are protected by simple and ineffective door and window locks. Modern hardware is available for door and window locks which will stop the amateur burglar and slow up the experienced burglar. Good locks are a deterrent since they eliminate the opportunity for an easy burglary.

Delaying a burglar for four minutes is generally considered sufficient to prevent entry into a house or apartment.

Finally, the fear of detection is the third element of burglary prevention.

In addition to 'How to Protect Your Home', the group also discussed the importance of being a witness. They learned that most crimes cannot be solved without the help of a witness and in order to catch a thief, citizens must be willing to testify.


Also discussed was 'Operation Identification', a citizen participation program to prevent burglary. The 'Hands Up' program, a national volunteer effort to halt crime, is a project of the General Federation Women's Clubs and sponsored locally by the Knox City Study Club, wherein persons borrow an engraving tool available at the City Hall and mark their valuables with their driver's license number. It should be engraved on an area that cannot be easily dismantled and which is not easily seen.

After marking their

property, persons should make a list of their valuables and keep a copy of the list in a safe place. If one should become a burglary victim, he or she will be able to describe the stolen property from the list.

Once property has been marked, persons should display an Operation Identification sticker at doors and windows which might be used for entry. By advertising their participation in Operation Identification in this way, burglars realize the stolen property would be difficult to re-sell. Often the presence of the sticker alone is enough to deter a burglar.
