## Good Jobs Available Through SS

For readers who would like to work for the government but have not passed the Civil Service Examination, Social Security is implementing its own recruiting system which will require no written examination.

During 1980, Social Security will need more than 1,000 persons to occupy Claims Representative positions nationwide and wants to hire qualified men and women of all ages, races, national origins, and ethnic backgrounds. Some of those needed are U.S. citizens with a good knowledge of Spanish as well as English.

The Claims Representative career begins at the GS-5 level (approximately \$11,000 a year) and advances to the GS-10 level (approximately \$18,000 a year).

Persons may be eligible with a background of public contact work or college training or a combination of both.

## Cotton Harvest Slowed By Rain

The cotton harvest was slowed by rain in some portions of the Munday territory last week, according to Garland Dye, officer in charge of the Munday classing office. Even so, the harvest continued to be well ahead of ginnings. Most gins in the area still have large backlogs of seed cotton on gin yards. It is estimated that 75 percent of the cotton crop is harvested in Baylor, Haskell, and Knox Counties.

Cotton prices remained steady on local markets. Demand was strong for cotton miking in the 3.5 to 4.9 range. Grade 31, staple 32 brought mostly 58.10 cents per pound. Grade 41, staple 33 brought about 58.95 cents and grade 31, staple 31 brought 56.75 cents. Cottonseed prices were steady at 110 dollars per ton.

The Munday classing office classed 15,512 samples last week, bringing the total classed in the Munday office this season to just over 53,000. An additional 16,000 samples of Munday cotton was classed early in the season in Abilene.

Eighty-one percent of the samples classed last week were White grades. Grade 31 was 55 percent and grade 41 was 26 percent. Grade 32 comprised 11 percent of the total. The single most common staple length was staple 32 at 43 percent. The remainder was about equally divided between staple 31 and staple 33. Staple 33 was 27 percent and staple 31 was 21 percent. Eighty-seven percent of last week's classing fell in the 3.5 to 4.9 mike range. Twelve percent was below 3.5.

The latest information available on fiber strength shows Munday territory cotton has had an average breaking strength of 86,000 pounds per square inch this season.

## REA Loan Awarded To Vernon Co-Op

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Congressman Charles W. Stenholm announced recently that the Santa Rosa Telephone Cooperative, Inc., of Vernon, has been awarded a loan in the amount of \$4,403,000 by the Rural Electrification Administration of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

These funds will be used to finance facilities to connect 404 additional subscribers, construct 35 miles of new line, upgrade service to one-party lines throughout the system, and construct new dial central office buildings in the Foad City, Thalia and Kirkland exchanges.

The counties serviced by this system are Willbarger, Baylor, Childress, Clay, Cottle, Foard, Hardeman, Knox, Cotton and Jackson.

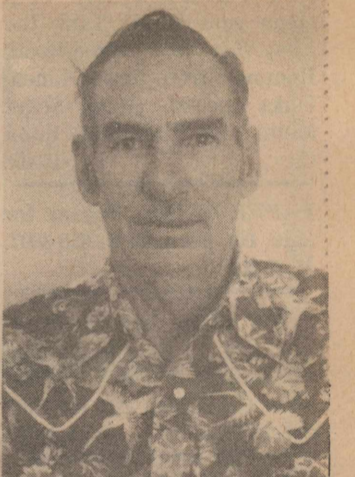

We have said that we are going to take off two days for Christmas, here's hoping nothing happens that we cannot. They will all be through stripping and we will only be ginning and it will not hurt anything to stop the gins for a couple of days. By that time they may stop by themselves, they are getting pretty well worn now. After all we did not make this good crop in a day or two, and it will not hurt to let the trailers and modules sit there for two more days. I think we had better stop and give thanks to the good Lord for the last three good crops. Without His help we would not have made them. And no one really thought that this crop would turn out like it has. Cotton that was thought to make maybe 1/2 bale per acre is making a bale or more.

## "The Book Report"

### BAKE A GIFT OF LOVE

Gift giving remains one of the most accepted customs we have. This popular tradition varies from country to country and family to family, but it is an integral part of every holiday celebration. Before making your gift giving plans, take time to think about the true meaning of Christmas and gift giving. Do you put yourself into Christmas giving or has it become the "annual gift swap"? Homemade gifts from the oven provide a way to personalize gift giving. The time and effort you spend, the love you give will truly be appreciated. Put yourself into Christmas this year and "Bake a Gift of Love".

The efforts of baking will be wasted if proper storage is not carried out. Here are some helpful tips:

1. To freeze unbaked dough,

use one of these methods: Pack dough into freezer containers or wrap air-tight in foil or freezer bags. Dough can thaw at room temperature, but allow to thaw only to the point where it can be spooned out.

Drop cookie dough according to recipe directions onto wax paper-lined cookie sheets. Place cookie sheets in the freezer about one hour. Removed unbaked, frozen cookies; quickly pack into freezer container. To thaw, remove from container, place on ungreased cookie sheets, let stand ten minutes, then bake.

2. Cool all cookies thoroughly before storing. Do not overlap or stack cookies until completely cool.

3. Properly wrapped cookies or cookie dough can be stored in the freezer several months without losing flavor and freshness. Be sure to label each item with the date and recipe name. When ready to serve, cookies and bars should be frosted while still frozen but before thawed.

4. Soft cookies should be stored separately from crisp cookies.

5. Plain and frosted cakes and cookies, except those with whipped cream or custard fillings, are usually not stored in the refrigerator as they absorb too much moisture.

6. Store soft cookies in a tightly covered container and crisp cookies in a container with a loose cover.

7. If soft cookies dry out, place a slice of apple, orange or bread into container.

- 1/2 cup lemon juice
- cherries

Into a saucepan over low heat, crush can of jelly and add water with beater, adding sugar — cool. Stir in juice, extract, gingerale and soda. Chill and add lime slices and cherries just before serving. (If liquor is desirable, 1/2 cup vodka and 1/2 cup white wine may be added.) Serves 12.

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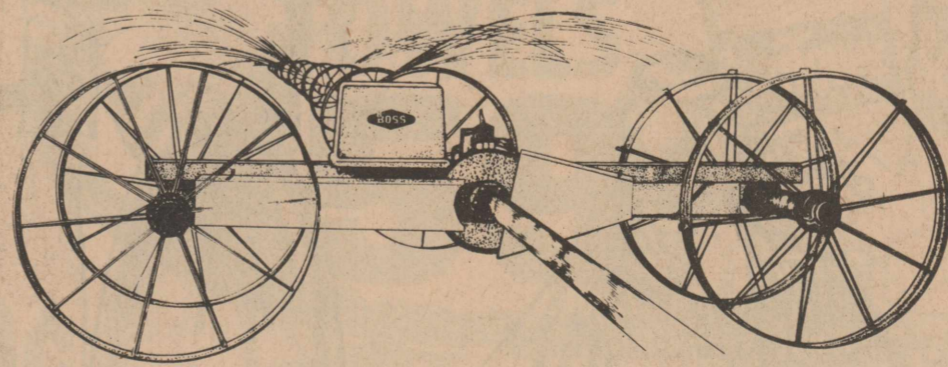
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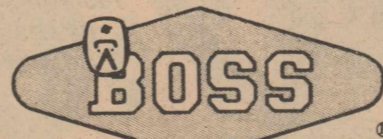
