Five Area Men Arrested

Cartwright Appointed At Benjamin

Sectional Center manager/postmaster D.E. Holster of Midland has announced the appointment of W.T. Cartwright as the new Postmaster at Benjamin effective Saturday, December 15, 1979.

Cartwright, 49, has been employed with the U.S. Postal Service since October 25, 1967. He began his postal career as a clerk in the Benjamin Post Office where he worked until July 1, 1978, when he transferred to the Knox City Post Office as post office clerk. He remained at the Knox City Post Office until his appointment as Postmaster of the Benjamin office.

He is married to the former Jo Etta Ressel.

Postmaster selections for offices of this size are made on the basis of merit from a list of qualified candidates submitted to the Sectional Center manager at Midland. He selects and recommends to the Postmaster General the best qualified person for appointment to each vacancy.

A joint effort by law enforcement officials from six area police agencies ended early Saturday morning in Knox City with the arrest of five area men.

The twenty five-hour long effort began just after midnight on Thursday when Knox City Police Officer Dave Thompson arrested and booked one man into the County Jail for driving under the influence of drugs and possession of a deadly weapon. Then Thompson and Knox City Police Chief John Turner were called upon to investigate a break-in at the Knox City High School. Both the main building and the Ag building had been broken into and an attempt was made to break into the school safe in the main offices. The attempt was not successful and only a small amount of money was taken from a desk in the Ag building. Both buildings suffered substantial window damage in the attempt to break in.

Knox County Sheriff James Redwine and Ranger Marshall L. Brown of the Texas Rangers entered the investigation at noon on Friday at the request of the Knox City officers. Ranger Brown questioned the prisoner at the County Jail and a "Consent to Search" was obtained to search a Knox City residence for possible evidence. A search of the residence by Ranger Brown, Sheriff Redwine, and both Knox City officers resulted in a marijuana type substance being held as evidence.

Information was obtained from school officials that led City Officer and DPS Officer Brian Williams to look for another subject. He was located and arrested for the high school burglary. During questioning by Ranger Brown, information was obtained that led to the recovery of the boots worn during the break in, with the boot sole design matching the footprints left at the high school. Additional information led to the arrest of two other Knox City men on a variety of charges.

Ranger Brown and Sheriff Redwine began an intensive six hour questioning session that led to the clearing of two other residential and four business burglaries within Knox City. Another attempted break in was also discovered and cleared by admission. A substantial amount of items taken in these burglaries was recovered by Knox City Officers Turner and Thompson.

Acting on information provided by the subjects already in custody, another "Consent to Search" was obtained and a search was conducted at another Knox City location. Knox County Sheriff Deputy Pete Hatfield, Chief Turner and Officer Thompson recovered a substantial amount of a marijuana type substance and placed one person under arrest on a felony charge of Possession of Marijuana.

Investigator Jim Fox from

the District Attorney's office for the 50th Judicial District arrived from Seymour and began the process of filing of complaints and arrest papers for the offenses. City Secretary Faye Railsback and Chamber of Commerce Secretary Doris Crownover arrived at City Hall late on Friday evening to help with the vast amounts of paperwork that is required by law. City Judge Walter Rauch issued one warrant and Justice of the Peace Guy Bradley signed the complaints and warrants, then arraigned the subjects at City Hall. Bond was set for each subject. Three were then taken to the County Jail to join the one subject already there and one was released on a cash bond. It was 1:00 in the morning on Saturday before the officers and helpers were finally able to go home for a much needed rest.

Chief John Turner and Officer Dave Thompson both highly praised the combined effort of so many different law enforcement agencies on one case. Thompson went on to say, "A vast amount of information was obtained during the questioning of all five arrested persons that will greatly aid us in future arrests for drug charges here in Knox City and other areas as well." Both Thompson and Turner praised the Knox County Sheriff's radio dispatchers Jan Carver and Mary Tom Jones for the many computer checks they ran to aid in obtaining information.

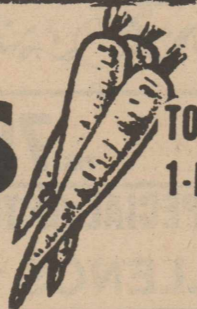
