#### Nickel-A-Bale War Chest For Cotton On Way

Cotton firms and cotton farmers of Haskell and surrounding area were called on today by President Oscar Johnston of the National Cotton Council for "100 per cent allegiance in cotton's total for increased consumption."

In a message addressed to local producers throughout the county President Johnston declared that the raw cotton industry is arming as never before in its history to smash down the blitzkrieg of sub-

The message came simultaneous-ly with the National Cotton Council's announcement of a "universal service" plan to provide funds with which to carry on the fight during the coming year. The new plan, to go into effect August 1. calls for a defense fund of five cents of every bale of lint and three cents on every ton of seed, mobilized with the help of each of the five primary raw cotton interests.

Under the new plan, arrangements have been perfected enabling the producer to make his nickel-a-bale contribution at the first point of sale, either to the cotton merchant, large or small. or the ginner or warehouseman acting as merchant. This contribution is carried on from the mer-



#### Growth of Hospitals

In 1875, when this nation was already nearly a century old, it had only 149 hospitals, containing 35,000 beds. In the 65 years which have elapsed since that time these facilities have been increased to more than 6,200 registered hospitals with a total 1,195,026 beds, and with a capital investment estimated at nearly four billion dollars.

These figures are from a review by he Hospital Research Institute of Chicago, which states that at present a hospital is accessible by automobile to the most remote parts of the country. The review adds:

"Annual reports of many typical hospitals show a persistent operating deficit, which endowments and donations by loyal citizens lower, but do not entirely wipe out.

"Health education and a deep appreciation of the splendid work of our hospitals has stirred civic pride in many localities. To maintain a community hospital, public spirited citizens realize that their help is needed throughout the year. They also know by the number of lives saved and those reclaimed from ill health, that their aid in providing such useful institutions is a sound investment in com-

#### Library of Congress

Within a short time it is likely that the Library of Congress in Washington will become the greatest in the world, if it is not so already. In the number of printed books it is surpassed by the public library in Leningrad, Russia, but it has many more treasures in the way of maps, charts, usic and pictures of every description.

The Library of Congress was established in 1800, but was destroyed when the British burned the capitol in 1814. It was started again by the purchase by Congress of ex-President Thomas Jefferson's private library of 6,760 volumes for

Additions were made from time to time, but another fire in 1851 destroyed about 35,000 volumes This loss was again replenished through purchase and donations until the library now has more than 4,477,000 volumes, more than a million maps charts and views, more than a million pieces of music, and half a million photographs, prints, engravings and lithographs.

The growth of the library has been greatly hastened by the operation of the law which requires copies of all copyrighted books and other materials to be deposited there.

Priceless treasures in the way of rare books and manuscripts gathered from all parts of the world are included in the collection, housed in the largest and most magnificent library building in the world with a floor space of more than 14 acres. In it are kept the originals of the Declaration of the cost amounted ot 440 million Independence and the Constitution of the United dollars. States, with thousands of other historical docu-

#### Insurance on 1941 Wheat Crop Is Now Available Thru AAA

Producer's may now make application for wheat crop insurance on their 1941 crop, according to J. E. Thomson, Secretary, Haskell County A. C. A. Federal crop insurance is protection offered to wheat growers under the Federal Crop Insurance Program. The program provides the means by which wheat growers may insure 75 percent of their average yield against unavoidable hazards such drought, flood, hail, frost, fire, winter-kill, tornado, storm, sects, plant diseases and any other natural cause of loss not specifically mentioned. M. M. Cobb of Lueders, Texas made the first application for wheat crop insurance for 1941. He has an allotment of 55.3 acres of wheat which he insured for \$54.54 and which guarantees him a production of 442 bushels, whether the wheat makes or not. Since the rate of premium is based on the market price the day you make application for insurance, it seems that now is the time to take out insurance since the market is low. 
