 trict should be organized "in the interest of the public health, safety and welfare," it calls an election in which only resident landowners may vote. If a two-thirds majority of the voters favors organization of the district, the board appoints two district supervisors. Landowners in the district then elect three supervisors to complete the five-member board which will govern the district. All five supervisors actively engaged in farming or animal husbandry.  
**Consent of Owners Necessary**  
 The district, through its board of supervisors, has authority to plan and carry out soil and water conservation programs on land in the district with the consent and agreement of the owners. The board of supervisors may receive financial aid, technical assistance, or materials, seed and plants and equipment from any local, state or federal agency in a position to assist farmers.  
 District, however, can not levy taxes nor issue bonds. Consequently, it is explained, the organization of a soil conservation district can not increase the tax obligations of landowners.  
 Land use regulations or ordinances can not be placed into effect unless landowners petition for such regulations and then approve them by a nine-tenths majority vote in regularly-conducted elections.

**Do You Know TEXAS?**

**Q. What is the oldest grant in the General Land Office? T. P. A.**  
 According to Bascom Giles, present Commissioner, the oldest grant is that of the Queretaro Missions at San Antonio—Concepcion, Espada and San Juan—to certain Indian tribes—"reduced to a Christian and civilized community," by the Viceroy of Mexico on October 4, 1730. The captain of the military post at San Antonio, on March 5, 1731, put the chiefs of the tribes in possession of their land, taking each by the hand, leading him about the circumference of the location, and having him pull up grass, throw stones, and perform all the other acts of true possession.  
**Q. What was the Archives War? C. C.**  
 In 1842, President Houston instructed Col. Thos. Wm. Ward, the peppy Commissioner of the Land Office, to remove "the archives and government stores to Washington on the Brazos". In a confidential letter, he said: "They are certainly in a very precarious and unsafe situation. What the Mexican or Indian enemy might not do, I am led to believe, by various threats that have reached my ears, might be accomplished by the irresponsible, unprincipled and lawless among our own citizens. I am told that their destruction by fire has been frequently denounced by some of those who oppose their removal. Such an event would produce not only incalculable but irreparable injury to the people of Texas." "Certain indignant citizens of Austin did not share the President's opinion. They gathered at Col. Ward's house and fired "a Howitzer loaded with grape" into it, with the cry of "Blow the old house to pieces!" While the archives were being slipped out in the custody of two clerks, their wagon was stopped and the records stolen and taken to a house on Pecan (now 6th) Street. While this was going on, other residents of Austin were kept from boredom by an Indian attack.
