Sandhill Cattle Co. is WHPD ranch rodeo winner

It looked a lot like the old west again, as cowboys and cowgirls found their way to Haskell last weekend for the twenty-first production of the Wild Horse Prairie Days.

Twenty working ranch teams competed in the big event. Other events held in conjunction with the rodeo were the John Wallace Memorial Calf Roping, the Ranch Horse Competition and the WRCA team roping.

The first place overall team winner was the Sandhill Cattle Co. The Sandhill Cattle Co, established in 1998, is owned by Tripp Townsend and Riley Smith. Sandhill leases 15,000 acres of grass in Lamb County, which runs about 2000 head of yearlings in the summer. During the winter, 3000 head of yearlings are cared for on wheat pasture. They also own a 4000 head preconditioning lot. Team members are Trip Townsend, Riley Smith, Randy Knight, Tyler Rice and Trail Townsend.

kungunya case

The Texas Department and mosquito surveillance of State Health Services has confirmed the first locally acquired case of chikungunya, a mosquito borne illness. A Cameron County resident got sick with the illness in November 2015 and was diagnosed with a lab test in January 2016. The case, however, was not reported to the local health department until last month. The investigation performed by the Cameron County Department of Health and Human Services determined the patient had not traveled, and the case was confirmed last week by testing at the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Chikungunya disease is a viral illness spread by mosquitoes and was first detected in travelers returning to Texas from areas with local transmission in 2014. All previous Texas residents who contracted the illness were infected while traveling abroad. Because this case was contracted more than six months ago

has not found chikungunya in local mosquitoes, the primary risk of infection remains related to travel. DSHS encourages people to protect themselves from mosquito bites at home and while traveling to stop the spread of chikungunya, Zika and West Nile virus.

Chikungunya and most other viruses transmitted by mosquitoes are required to be reported to the local health department or DSHS regional office within one week. DSHS reminds laboratories and health care providers to report cases promptly so health officials will have the information they need to make decisions that will protect public

Chikungunya illness is rarely fatal but can cause severe joint pain, high fever, head and muscle aches, joint swelling and rash. Most people feel better within a week, though some may develop longer-term joint





Citizen-Soldiers and Airmen with the Texas Military Department will begin conducting annual training in various cities across Texas, now through the end of August.

During this time, citizens may notice an increase of military personnel within their communities and at businesses, as well as vehicles and convoys passing through town and travelling major thoroughfares, like I-10 and I-20. In fact, some convoys may travel across state lines in and out of Texas.

"This designated training will put a lot of service members on Texas roads and highways as they convoy to and from training," said Texas Adjutant General Maj. Gen. John F. Nichols. "We ask our fellow Texans to take care in passing these convoys and even single military vehicles on our roads. Please be aware that our equipment has the same blind spots and longer stopping distances common to all large trucks so we ask that you give them a little

extra space." The annual training by the Texas Army and Air National Guard and the Texas State Guard is designed to give military commanders the opportunity to take their staff and units to the field to hone service members' proficiency and maintain a high level of mission readiness. Additionally, annual training conducted in a joint environment with local and state agencies enables the Texas Military Department to test its ability to react and help improve communication and coordination with its

civilian partners. "We pride ourselves in standing ready to serve the citizens of Texas when needed and called upon," said Nichols. "We are thankful to the citizens for welcoming us into their communities and could not be successful without their continued support."

Over the last ten years, the Texas Military Department has trained and mobilized more than 30,000 Soldiers across the state of Texas in support of combat operations and natural disaster relief. Most recently, these citizen-guardsmen have responded to fires and floods throughout portions of the state.


