

NYA Woodwork Shop Is Opened This Week

Permanent Project Set Up To Serve Youths of Three Counties

Designed to serve an area which embraces Haskell, Knox and Throckmorton counties, announcement was made this week of the opening of the National Youth Administration's Woodworking Shop in the Gay building in this city under the supervision of T. M. Hass of Wichita Falls, formerly connected with the Wichita Falls Planing Mill. Mr. Hass has been employed in the furniture and planing mill industry for more than ten years and is highly recommended as a competent instructor.

Orman L. Kimbrough of this city, Area Director of NYA, stated that the Haskell shop would contain more square feet and would be one of the largest shops located in this vicinity of the state. It will be modernly equipped with new machinery costing approximately \$10,000 and a part of the equipment has already arrived and has been set up, and the shop will begin mass production just as soon as an adequate supply of tools arrive, the area director said. The project, set up on a permanent basis, has been designed to provide work experience in woodworking to boys between the ages of 16 and 24 and will employ a maximum of 20 youths when the full operating schedule is attained.

Both Mr. Kimbrough and Supervisor Hass invite interested youths and the public as well, to visit and inspect the shop.

TOTAL OF \$321 IS REPORTED IN RED CROSS DRIVE

Reports Yet To Come In From Several Communities

With reports from several communities in the county yet to be included, a total of \$321.25 has been received by Mrs. Carl Power secretary of the Haskell county chapter of the American Red Cross representing receipts in the annual Red Cross roll call campaign conducted last month.

This sum, although below the figure chapter leaders had hoped for, represents a response from all sections of the county, and when consideration is given the fact that adverse weather conditions hampered volunteer workers practically throughout the time set for the campaign, total receipts could have been much lower. Final reports from all sub-communities in the county will likely add a sizeable sum to the total. Making up the \$321.25 total were the following sum reported from various communities: Sons of Hermann \$18.25; Rochester \$53.00; Rule \$51.00; Winnet \$42.25; Sagerton \$13.25; Haskell \$138.50.

32,426 Bales of Cotton Ginned From 1940 Crop

Yield from the 1940 cotton crop in Haskell county is gradually nearing the 35,000 bale mark, as indicated by the report of cotton ginnings to December 1st, released Thursday by W. F. Trice, special agent for the department of commerce, bureau of the census. The report shows that 32,426 bales of cotton were ginned in the county from the crop of 1940 prior to December 1, as compared with 17,897 bales for the crop of 1939 on the same date.

Haskell Man, Now Cotton Economist, Lauds Texas Staple

John L. McCollum, senior agricultural economist of the division of cotton marketing in Washington, announced recently in Dallas that 563 organized cotton improvement clubs this year had used the government's free classing of cotton and that almost 500,000 bale samples had passed through the Dallas office. McCollum, in Texas to confer with J. R. Kennedy, in charge of the Dallas office, was gratified with the use of the service which was nearly double that of last year and expressed pleasure at the improved condition of Texas cotton as reflected in the bi-monthly report of the Dallas office.

The report issued by the government showed that cotton classed during the last two weeks in the Dallas district was more than 80 per cent middling or better and about 15 per cent was one inch or longer in staple.

In the state it was shown that 24.5 per cent of the cotton was one inch or longer in staple compared with 13.7 per cent in 1939. While rain during the last two weeks had lowered the quality somewhat, for the entire season through Oct. 31, spotted cotton was less than one half that of the 1939 season.

Landowners Will Vote Saturday On New Soil District Proposal

District Includes North Half Haskell and All of Knox County

Landowners in the north half of Haskell county and all of Knox county will ballot tomorrow — Saturday, Dec. 14 — on proposed creation of the Wichita-Brazos Soil Conservation District. If the proposal is favored, facilities of the State Soil Conservation Act will be available to landowners in that area, and a long-range program of soil and water conservation will be set up in the district. If the district is created, no taxes will be levied nor bonds issued now or at any future date, in connection with the program. On this point, Attorney General Mann has ruled that the State Soil Conservation Act "Does not authorize the issuance of bonds or the levying of taxes."

All landowners residing in the proposed district will be eligible to vote in tomorrow's election, and they will simply mark their ballots "For" or "Against" creation of the district in registering their approval or rejection of the proposal.

Former Resident of Haskell Dies In Dallas Friday

The death of Mrs. Fannie Jane Cunningham, former resident of Haskell and sister of Mrs. Lena Cunningham and Tom Glenn of this city, occurred in Dallas Friday Dec. 6th. She had made her home in that city for thirty-five years.

Funeral services for Mrs. Cunningham, who was 76 years of age at the time of her death, were held in Dallas Saturday afternoon and burial was in Laurel Land Memorial Park in that city.

Deceased is survived by a daughter, Miss Effie Cunningham; three sons, Hubert Smith and J. W. Cunningham, all of Dallas, and W. L. Cunningham of Cleburne; a sister, Mrs. Lena Cunningham, a brother, Tom Glenn, both of Haskell; and five grandchildren. Another brother, R. P. Glenn, former Haskell peace officer, died several years ago.

COTTON FARMERS OF COUNTY FAVOR AAA 1941 QUOTAS

Total of 982 Votes Polled In Referendum Last Saturday

Haskell county cotton farmers voting in the AAA's referendum last Saturday, gave an overwhelming majority in favor of marketing quotas for the 1941 crop, polling 828 votes for and only 154 against continuing the marketing quota. Returns from the fifteen voting boxes in the county were compiled Monday in the County Agent's office and the totals made public.

The new location will provide larger quarters and permit the company to offer better facilities in handling their expanding patronage, the manager explained. Additional equipment will be installed, principally in the cream department, he added, as well as enlarged cooling quarters for poultry.

Lunchroom Projects In Haskell County Schools Making Satisfactory Progress

School lunchroom projects being maintained in several Haskell county schools are operating smoothly and on an economical basis, and have been a material factor in better school work of pupils, according to school officials and state and district supervisors who have recently visited the various lunchroom projects set up in Haskell county.

Child Protection Week Proclaimed By Mayor Leflar

By official proclamation issued this week Mayor J. E. Leflar designated the week of Dec. 16, 22 as Child Protection — Crime Prevention Week in Haskell, and joined by the Chamber of Commerce and other civic organizations called upon all citizens of Haskell, especially parents, to consider the necessity of providing proper instruction, recreation and other interest for the youth of the community in developing clean and healthy minds as the best means of combating crime.

Mayor Leflar pointed out that American boys and girls become criminals through neglect or through wrong instruction, and if proper instruction could overcome this neglect of underprivileged children, a great deal could be accomplished in the matter of crime prevention and child protection.

Special Traffic Officer Employed During Holidays

At the meeting of the City Council Tuesday night, Aldermen authorized the employment of a special police and traffic officer during the holiday season, and an additional nightwatchman for the business section until Christmas. Appointed as police and traffic officer was Constable J. H. Ivey, while Raymond Stewart was named as assistant nightwatchman.

The Council also authorized remodeling of a part of the City Hall housing fire department apparatus, made necessary by the recent addition of two modern fire engines which could not be adequately housed in the former quarters.

Age Requirement In Texas Reduced For NYA Program

The National Youth Administration in Texas has lowered its age limit from 17 to 16 years of age, thereby making eligible 127,000 boys and girls for work on projects. To qualify they must be out of school and have no present employment.

Orman L. Kimbrough of Haskell, Area Director, who received news of the change in age requirement from Fort Worth said approximately 50 boys and girls will be put to work in this county. There are about 142 engaged in similar work now, he said. Applications should be made to the NYA Area Office on the first floor of the Haskell Court House. As the youths go into private employment or join the nation's military forces their places will be taken by youths registered for the program, Kimbrough said.

Cowboys Christmas Ball Will Be Enacted At Anson

The cowboys of the ranges are bedding down their "doggies" putting away their branding irons, polishing up their high heel boots and getting ready to hit the trail for Anson for one grand "sworray", the Cowboy's Christmas Ball to be held there December 19, 20 and 21.

For the first time the Ball will be held in its own home, the new Pioneer Hall, of rock construction erected this year. Pioneer Hall has the largest dance floor in this section and in addition has a lobby, kitchen, rest rooms, cloak rooms and stage. As usual many of the pioneers who attended the first Ball will be back to re-live by-gone days. And just as in the early days the lads and ladies who attend will come attired in fashions of the 1880's and each night the most appropriate costumed couple will be given a prize, as well as for individuals.

MEXICAN FARM LABORER DIES OF GUN WOUND

Rifle Discharged Accidentally Inflicts Fatal Wound

Fatally wounded by an accidental bullet wound inflicted with a 22-caliber rifle in the hands of a friend, Santiago (Jim) Casiano, 22-year-old Mexican farm laborer, died in the Haskell hospital Wednesday morning. The accident occurred on the evening of December 1 on a farm several miles north-east of Haskell, where Casiano and several other Mexicans were employed. Leonard Padilla, 17, and two other Mexican boys had returned to Casiano's camp following an afternoon spent hunting, and the small rifle Padilla was carrying was accidentally discharged. The bullet striking Casiano in the shoulder and ranging upward through his neck, rushed to the hospital here, little chance for his recovery was held by physicians.

Officers who investigated the accident said that all facts in the case indicated the mishap was purely accidental. Following Casiano's death, officers said that no charges would be filed against the Mexican boy.

Casiano had been in Haskell county for the past three months, coming here from Taylor, Texas. His bride of a few weeks preceded him in death two weeks ago. Immediate survivors include his mother and step-father, four brothers and one half-sister. Funeral services for Casiano were held at the First Presbyterian Church in this city Thursday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock with the pastor, Rev. Clifford W. Williams, reading burial rites in Spanish Interment was in Willow cemetery with Holden funeral home in charge of arrangements.

Surplus Commodities Would Be Handled By Local Retail Stores

Application for setting up a government Food Stamp program in Haskell county was filed Tuesday with James S. Allen of Dallas, regional administrator of the food stamp program in thirteen Southern states.

Presenting the application, together with information and facts concerning need for the food stamp program in this section was a delegation of Haskell businessmen headed by County Judge J. C. Davis, Jr., and Ralph E. Duncan, secretary of the Haskell chamber of commerce. Others in the group were Henry Atkinson of Haskell, Oswald Cole, Douthitt Payne and Homer Chambers of Rule.

Cooperating in the movement to have the program extended to a four-county area in this section, similar applications were filed by county officials and business men from Baylor, Knox and Throckmorton counties. In addition, representatives of the four counties filed a joint request that a four-county district program be set up in the event that applications for the independent county units were not approved.

Members of the Haskell county delegation were given assurance that the application would receive early consideration and that a survey would be made to determine feasibility of inaugurating the food stamp program in the county areas.

Under provisions of the Food Stamp Plan, surplus commodities which are now distributed through the county welfare board, would be handled through retail channels of local food stores. The plan has proven highly successful in all areas where it has been placed in operation, and sponsors of the movement to secure the program for Haskell county are confident the plan would work to an advantage here.

BURGLARS LOOT THEATRE SAFE HERE SATURDAY

Thieves Take Approximately \$75 In Currency and Checks

First burglary in this city in almost a year occurred last Friday night or early Saturday morning, when the office safe of the Texas Theatre was blasted open and looted of approximately \$75 in currency and checks, according to a check-up made by Mrs. E. G. Post, theatre bookkeeper-manager. (The robbery was discovered by J. E. Taylor, theatre employee, when he came to work Saturday morning and found the demolished safe in an upstairs theatre lobby. He notified officers, and Sheriff Olan Dotson and deputies who investigated the burglary, said the thieves had rolled the small safe from the theatre office into the lobby and then wrapped the vault in tapestries torn from the walls of the lobby to deaden noise of the blasting. Entrance to the building was gained through a rear door, which was prized open. Local officers credited the burglary to experts, because a poison gas device on the safe door had been skillfully removed before any effort was made to break open the safe.)

No arrests in connection with the burglary had been made on Thursday, members of the sheriff's department said. It was the third robbery of the theatre, burglars having twice before visited the theatre during the past five years.

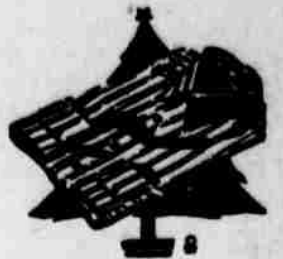

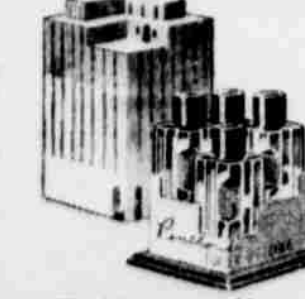
