#### NEVER FORGET

(From Industrial News Review)

Today, as many an historian has been pointing out we are witnessing an attempted world revolution The purpose of Nazism Facism and Communism are, basically, to destroy the established economic and social orders of the world. and to put in their place an entirely different order.

In attaining that revolutionasy goal, the first step invariably taken by the total governments, when seizing power in their countries, has been to take over all sources of credit-to take control of money out of private hands, and place it in the hands of the ruling clique. The dictators realize that whoever controls the nation's money and credit, controls that nation in every phrase of its life

There is lesson in this for the United States. Under our system, the people control their money Those who take care of it for them such as the banks are simply the people's fiscal servants, and are subjected to the most stringent public regulation. That system has worked. It is the system of a free and sovereign people. There are those who would change this sys-

tem and give government an infinitely greater control over the nation's money and credit Often their arguments are plausible. But if they have their way, the only possible end will be economic dictatorship — to be followed in due course by social dictatorship. Those are harsh words, but Europe has shown us how true they are. Let them not be forgotten here.

#### WORKING ALL THE TIME

They work quietly in the industrial laboratories. The public doesn't often hear what is going on, or have occasion to realize the vast amount of hard, painstaking effort that goes into the development of a new product. All we see is the final successful result. with its prospect of more jobs. more payrolls. and added comfort for all Americans

It is worthwhile occasionally, simply to keep things in their proper perspective, to remember that industry is hard at work all the time, spending large sums of money in an effort to find new products that will benefit the entire economy.

Farmers, for instance, will be interested in experiments that have been going on for many years aimed at turning the whoe cotton plantstalk leaves boll, and fiber-into rayon. If and when this becomes commercially feasible, it will

help to save our trees-for wood is a main base source for rayon-and will also be one more example where industry has helped agriculture.

Hundreds of earnest experiments like these many of them brought to completion each year. serve to stress the importance of research to the American concept of an expanding economy that constantly distributes more goods and more pleasant living to all its people.

#### PRIVATE INDUSTRY BEST DEFENSE

In defending stoutly the American railroad system against possible government operation in defense or war. J. J. Pelley, president of the American Association of Railroads has hit on the crucial point of the whole question of the relationship between private industry and defense

"The railroads are ready now to do whatever they may be called upon to do." Pelley told the Association's annual meeting "The railroads will keep themselves ready, ahead of any demand which may come.

If that proves to be true, the railroads need worry over-much about government operation

What the country wants in the present defense drive is service an what it must have in event of war, is service. It must have it wants when it wants it.

Pelley believes the railroads have learned from their experiences of 1917-1918. He believes they have set up regional boards and other means of co-ordinating their facilities such that the government will get what it needs from them, and get it promptly and without red tape

Three recent tests show the preparedness o the railroads according to Pelley. First, the peak freight movement of this year found a nice surplus of cars on hand Second, during tast summer's maneuvers, the railroads moved 40.000 men a day, and did it in better style than they moved an av erage of 20.000 a day in the peak month of July 1918 Third. export freight at times this year at one port even exceeded the 1918 peak and was handled so smoothly that no on noticed it at all.

These are good signs. If other industries can point to a similar ability, readiness and willingness to meet national demands, there will be less talk of nationalization.
