The accident occured about 9:30 Saturday night while Young and Anthony were walking along the highway near Truscott. The car which struck the two men failed to stop, officers reported af-ter investigating the accident.

Magee, arrested several miles from the scene of the accident by Sheriff Amos Lilly of Foard county was released Sunday on \$2,500 bond arranged by his son, Fred Magee, of Vernon.

#### Heads New Concern Downpours Sunday, Monday Bring More Than Three Inches of Moisture

This section's most timely rainall in years came Sunday and Monday, when a total of more than three inches of needed moisture was received over a wide area, to blast fears of a summer "drouth" which had already been heralded by wilted fringes in fields of cotton

Heavy showers general over the ounty Sunday afternoon provided slightly more than one-half inch and were followed Monday afternoon and night by torrential rains which flooded surface anks and streams. Precipitation uring Monday night was gauged at 2.82 inches in Haskell, and was considerably heavier in the east and northeast parts of the county, where estimates of the fall ranged from four to five inches. Farmers rejoiced over the fact that usual igh winds and hail was absent during the downpours, seasonably expected as a major hazard to young crops.

This immediate section, embracing practically the entire county, apparently was in a "favored" spot for general rains. In other areas of West Texas floods caused damage at Snyder and Crowell. while "twisters" devastated reas west of Lubbock and in New Mexico. Other points near the line of Oklahoma reported only light showers where beneficial rains are needed to break a drouth of several months duration.


