## As los

 losses occurring in fcr crop calendar year as d result ofdrought, hail, escessive (including insect infestation or plant disease resulting from these conditions) began October 3, 1988 and goes through March 31, 1989. Crops eligible for the program include participating program crops, non-participating program
crops, peanuts, sugar beets, soybeans and other non-program crops. Double cropped acreage behind a destroyed crop (ghost acres), are not eligible.
Disaster payments Disaster payments will be
available to eligible producers on available to eligible producers o
losses greater than 35 percent of
expected normal production (AS CS established yield X total acres of the crop planted).
Any producer whose gross
income exceeds $\$ 2,000,000$ for income exceeds $\$ 2,000,000$ for

tax return shall be ineligible to receive any disaster payment o any forgiveness of advance defimount of payments a person may receive may not exceed $\$ 100,000$.
